## PROCEEDINGS

Cedar Grove, Nov. 23, 1918.
Owing to the epidemic of Spanish influenza, the Ninth Annual Session of the Anson Association was postponed from October the 25th, until November the 23rd.

On Saturday morning the Association met in a one day session at 10:30 A. M. Religious services were conducted by Rev. W. A. Elam of Lilesville, after which the body was called to order by the Vice-Moderator, Rev. E. J. Hutchinson. The roll of the churches were called, which revealed the fact that nine churches sent messengers, the other four being represented by letter. The Association then proceeded to the election of the following officers, to-wit:

## CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

Our Baptist school system embraces Wake Forest college for men and Meredith and Chowan colleges for women, and fourteen high schools.

With all candor I say there is to be found no where a system which is composed of better schools than ours.

The problem is not to keep them good but to make them better. This should be the great ideal of every Baptist within the bounds of the convention.
Your committee will now submit the following reasons why every man, woman and child of our great Baptist constituency of North Carolina, should stand by and behind our denominational schools:
1.-Because they are ours. We own them. Our money endows them. Our sons and daughters were and are being educated in
them. They expound our great doctrinal points. They are the sole dynamo that inspires our Baptist souls with spiritual and intellectual power. Take them from us and we can not maintain our standing as a denomination.
2.-The Baptist schools now have the greatest battle to fight of their history. The enemy is what is called the "New Theology", which is nothing more than a revival of skepticism. The propagators of this school deny that the Bible is inspired, making it a common human book full of errors and mistakes.

The divinity of Jesus, is denied by them. The Mosaic account of creation is replaced by the evolutionary view. Everything is based upon human experiences and therefore making the Bible an imaginative book instead of an authoritative one.

Practically all our state institutions are infested with this awful apostacy. Many of our boys (lots of them preachers) go to these schools, sound in the faith "once for all delivered to the Saints", but when they get through or graduate they are skeptical and their prospects for Christian usefulness impaired.

The only solution to this situation is the pure orthodox Christian schools, such as are ours. Our Convention got this vision in 1914 during its session at Raleigh and therefore appointed a Board of Education and selected the experienced and efficient Dr. Vann as secretary.

## REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Possibly it will be wise for me to define missions before I g many things necessary to this report. Many do not underst what is meant by the different names we use to designate this portant work. We speak of State Missions, Home Missions Foreign Missions, and people do not know what these terms I am of the opinion that we made a very serious mistake why began to designate missions as State, Home and Foreign. terms have so greatly confused people, and besides, some come prejudiced against one or the other because of these $t$ Let us look at them for just a minute. What is meant by Missions? Why, it means missionary work done within the borders of North Carolina. Home missions means the gospel to the frontiersman and our neighboring islands. Foreign Missions mean the gospel in regions beyond. These boards have three departments, and try to make every one of them count for the kingdom. These departments are the medical, the educational, and the evangelistic. Each one of these is an important factor in the make-up of the kingdom in sections where the gospel has not gotten a foot-hold. One cannot be separated from the other. All or none. If you faii to educate the folks, why, the gospel cannot take much hold. Heathenism is education, and to uproot it means that there must be a certain degree of education. The mind has to be brought back to its normal condition because idolatry becomes a mental disease. We
