sions to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Elder W. B.

W. G. Brinson and C. L. Smith are added to the Committee on Periodicals in the place of Elder C. J. Nelson and B. F. Dillahunt, who are absent.

Invitation is extended to visiting brethren to seats with Elder J. A. Leslie, of the Tar River Association, accepts the invitation as a representative of the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

On motion of Elder Albritton, that clause in the General Order of Business relative to reading Constitution and Rules

of Order, is stricken out.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Moderator calls the Association to order. Prayer by

The committee to which was referred the matter of Bayboro and Capernaum Churches report that they find that Bayboro Church has been regularly constituted, and recommend that it be admitted. The report is adopted, and the delegates from Bayboro are welcomed by the Moderator.

Moved that the usual standing committees be appointed

at the convenience of the Moderator.

The report on Foreign Missions is read by Dr. Whitfield, and after being ably discussed by himself and Elder A. J. Hires, is adopted, each church agreeing to do as much or more than it did last year for this cause.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

God's Word delares that the heathen will inevitably perish unless the gospel be sent them, for they are idolaters, and these are shut out from "The City," Rev. 22:15, "and shall have their part in the lake that burns with fire." 21:8. They are sinners lost by nature, and unless they hear of the only Savior, cannot be saved. Acts 4:12. Our Lord Jesus has commanded his disciples to give the gospel to every nation, to every creature. So long, therefore, as there are any persons in the world who have not heard the gospel, our duty is imperative to give it to them. We are not required to convert all men, but to preach the gospel to all, and so give all an opportunity to be saved. This work has long been neglected. Although the professed christians have been able to do it, and are so now. What are the Baptists of the South doing to preach the gospel to those that have not heard it? We have fifty-one foreign missionaries. Of these only twenty-five are ministers. What a small force is this for one million white Baptists to send forth to tell 850,000,000 of heathen the way of salvation! How many of North Carolina's Baptist ministers have gone about this great work? Only one, though two others are now ready to go. How much do we give to send out the heralds of salvation to those perishing multitudes? Only \$4,456.71 last year, or four cents each from the 109,000 Baptists in the State.

Last year the churches composing this Association gave \$130.65. This is a small sum for 1,300 christians to expend in so great a work, and in a time of so great need. Brethren, we are called upon to arouse ourselves to obey the command of our Lord. The Board at Richmond asks this State for \$8,000. Of this amount this Association is asked to give \$175. We could do far more. One dollar each, or \$1,300, could be given without distressing any-nay, without depriv-

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that intense missionary spirit at home develops intense missionary spirit abroad, and vice versa; indifference to missions at home begets

indifference to missions abroad.

We rejoice to learn that the cause of Home Missions has met so generous a response from our people in the last few years, and we indulge the hope that it will steadily grow in favor until, by the liberality of our churches, all of the waste places of our Southern Zion shall be built up, and Home Missions shall be displaced by Foreign. But in order to such a happy consumation, our pastors must instruct their flocks on the subject, and see that they have an opportunity to honor the Lord by the gift of their substance. There, is great destitution in our bounds. Many weak churches struggling for existence; many important points calling for help. We have but to mention poor, priest-ridden New Orleans holding out its hands for the word of life; and Florida, so rapidly rising into importance, to touch the heart and open the purse of all who in sincerity and in truth love the kingdom of the Lord. Great good has been already done; and by proper exertion and interest, and by humble prayer and faith, the South can be secured to the Baptists.

# REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

DEAR BRETHREN: Through the mercy of God we are permitted to present this our annual report of our labors for the year now closing. Under our recommendation the State Board appointed the following brethren to labor within the bounds of our Association: Elders W. T. Jones, C. S. Cashwell and T. J. Leary.

We agreed to give the State Board \$200. Of this amount we have paid \$111.75; and the State Board appropriated \$450 to these brethren. In addition to this, we have agreed to give Bro. T. J. Leary \$25, Bro. C. S. Cashwell \$25. Brother W. B. Knight we have paid \$20,62, and Bro. D. F. Aman we have paid \$10.

THE WORK DONE.

Rev. T. J. Leary reports: Weeks of labor, 29; churches supplied, 4; out stations, 2; sermons preached, 85; protracted meetings. 4; baptized, 29; prayer meetings held, 24; churches building, 1; Sunday schools, 3; collected for church building, \$290; collected on my field on salary, \$75; collected for State Missions, \$42. The prospects of the churches on my field are brightening. The prospect is also good at Hunting Quarter, one of the out stations reported.

Rev. C. S. Cashwell reported: Churches supplied, 5; out stations, 1; sermons preached 152; protracted meetings, 4; baptized, 24; collected for State Missions, \$50; collected for Foreign Missions, \$22.5r; collected on my field on salary, \$377.50. The prospects of the work

Rev. W. T. Jones reported: Weeks of labor. 53; churches supplied, on my field are good. 2; sermons preached, 148; prayer meetings attended, 70; Persons 2; sermons preached, 140; prayer meetings attended, 70; Persons and families religiously visited, 420; baptized, 10; Sunday schools in and lamines religiously visited, 120, Dappized, 10; Sunday schools in good condition, 2; collected for State Missions, \$64.50; collected for good condition, 2, collected for building and church expenses,

In addition to this work I have organized a church at Bayboro, Pamlico county, with a membership of 16. A subscription to build a church has been raised amounting to about three hundred dollars. The pros-

pect on my field is encouraging.

Brother Aman has baptized 9. We have great reason to thank God for the great prosperity of our Association, and we recommend that the churches make greater efforts during the coming year for Associational Missions.

# REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

The Baptists of North Carolina may well say: "The Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad." The statistical report found in the last State Convention minutes, published nearly a year ago, shows a white membership at that time in the State exa year ago, shows a white membership at that time in the State exceeding 120,000, and a total membership, white and colored, exceeding 231,000. And yet, sad to say, the Convention Board then reing 251,000. And yet, sad to say, the Convention Board then reported much destitution in the State. Several whole counties were without a Baptist church or pastor, and several appeals for help claiming consideration that could not be responded to for lack of

Such a report should not have been made, because the statement should not have been true. And now, without delay, a proper denominational pride, to say nothing of higher and holier incitements, should impel the Baptist host to wipe away the reproach and shame

We of the Atlantic Association especially, should be deeply interested in State missions, for ours is probably the most destitute portion of the State so far as Baptists are concerned. Destitution is around us, and even at our very door. Within our Associational lines Baptist churches and Baptist ministers are sadly few and far between. Lenoir has but one resident Baptist pastor; the same is true of Jones, and perhaps true of other counties within our bounds. And then by our side are Pamlico, Hyde and Dare counties, having neither a Baptist church nor preacher, excepting one little church

What shall we say to these things? Your committee respectfully recommend:

1st. That we express our full confidence in the State Board and our heartfelt interest in State Mission work by cheerful and gener-

2nd. That we cordially approve the action of the Board in securing the full service of our esteemed brother, John E. Ray, for the furtherance of this work, and that we pledge to him our co-operation, and a hearty welcome in our churches whenever he may come to see how we do, and to help us do more and better.

3rd. Your committee would also recommend that the Executive Board of this Association be advised to arrange at an early day with the American Baptist Publication Society to employ a missionary colporter to labor in the bounds of the Association, and seek a man

## REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

There is no capacity apart from the pulpit in which more can be done for the Saviour than in the capacity of a Sunday School. This is attested by the fact that a large per cent. of the conversions in our churches is from the ranks of the Sunday School The word of God is the spiritual meat of his children. The importance of teaching it to the young in such a way as to make them interested in it is seen in the fact that youth is the period of memory. A knowledge of the letter of Scripture may not make one a christian, yet we cannot too highly value that knowledge. Stored up in the mind even in an unregenerate state, what a treasure it becomes, when, by God's grace, it passes from the mind to the heart.

The Sunday School has as its one great object the teaching of the Bible to the young, though its mission is not restricted, for in the great school of Christ all are learners, and every child of God may find profitable employment wherever God's word is taught and studied.

# REPORT ON EDUCATION.

During the colonial period of our country's history, the Baptists, in addition to their own educational and religious interests, were compelled by law to aid in supporting the ministry of the State establish ments. In consequence their progress was necessarily slow. Yet the Baptists of the United States have to-day about one hundred academies, seminaries, colleges and universities, and nine theological seminaries. The total value of the property of these Baptist schools. including endowments, is said to be over \$15,000,000.

Among these schools are our own Wake Forest College for our boys, our female colleges at Murfreesboro, Oxford and Thomasville, for our girls, and Louisville Theological Seminary for our ministerial students. We have twenty-eight young ministers at Wake Forest under the netropage of the Education D. der the patronage of the Education Board, and eight of the young ministers now at the Theological Seminary are from North Carolina. The vastness of their field of labor, and the distressing scarcity of ministers drove the Baptists of America in very early times to turn their attention to the cause of ministerial education. This same Association, at its session of 1756, "concluded to raise a sum of money towards the encouragement of a Latin Grammar school for the promotion of learning amongst us, under the care of brother Isaac Eaton." This effort resulted in the establishment of the Hopewell Academy, New Jersey, in which were educated, in part, many Baptist ministers, among whom was the renowned Dr. Manning, the first president of Brown University, the first Baptist college in America. God has wonderfully blessed these feeble beginnings, until we have grown into a vast denomination, with our educational institutions dotting these United States. Yet the demand for well qualified ministers has never been greater than it is to-day. Our work grows upon us daily, without a corresponding increase of men and means. "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few." Let us make prayerful and earnest effort for more laborers. Let us seek for ministerial gifts among our pious 3 oung men, and supplement these gifts with a liberal training in our institutions of learning. Although there are over 17,000 ordained Baptist ministers in this country, the

number of Baptist churches exceeds that of ministers by more than ten thousand.

Brethren, let the cause of ministerial education have a warm place in our hearts and a prominent place among the objects of our beneficence. The success or failure of this cause involves the success or failure of all our denominational enterprises.
