#### BY-LAWS.

1. The daily session of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their Churches

designating them as such.

3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly-received Churches by extending to them his right hand.

4. The Clerk shall provide blank letters for the use of the Churches of the Association previous to the meeting of the Association, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them and have it present at each annual session, read the proceedings of the preceding session at the beginning of each morning session, and the last day's proceedings at the close of the annual session.

5. Members desiring to speak shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.

6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session with-

out permission.

7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.

8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.

9. A copy of the Minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one copy to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1420 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, and one to the Field Secretary for Sunday Schools in North Carolina.

10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law."

11. The report of the Executive Board and the missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.

12. The general order of business shall be: (1) Enrollment of delegates.

(2) Election of officers. (3) Petitionary letters.

(4) Appointment of committees for this session.

(5) Appointment of standing committees.

#### PROCEEDINGS.

Morehead City, N. C., October 12, 1904.

The Atlantic Baptist Association met in its twenty-first Annual Session with the Church at Morehead City, Wednesday morning at

10 o'clock, October 12, 1904.

Devotional exercises were conducted by E. H. Mathews. In the absence of the Moderator, C. E. Edwards was elected temporary Moderator. The roll of Churches was called and delegates responded. Permanent organization was effected by the election of the following officers: Moderator, J. S. Canady; Clerk and Historian, B. H. Mathews; Treasurer, A. T. Moore.

The Committee on Order of Business made the following partial report: 11:30, aged ministers; 12, adjournment: 2 p. m. devotional exercise; 2:30, temperance; 3:15, education; 4, adjournment.

The following pastors were welcomed to the Association by the Moderator: R. P. Walker, pastor at Morehad City; W. H. Whitehead, pastor at Beaufort; L. M. Holloway, pastor of the Pamlico

The Committee on Petitionary Letters made the following report: That Mt. Herman Church, of Onslow, and Atlantic Church, of Carterett, be received into the Association as members. The report was adopted.

R. P. Walker made the following motion: That Associational Missions be incorporated in the order of business. The motion

was carried.

A motion was made by R. P. Walker and carried that a Commit-

tee on Obituaries be incorporated in the order of business.

The report on Aged Ministers was submitted by I. N. Henderson as follows: The opinion of your Committee is that there is not a more beneficent duty upon God's people than to care for the aged and wornout ministers. Both God and man approves of this good work. Therefore, we ought to contribute liberally to this object, as a God-given privilege.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee on Temperance beg leave to submit the following report: We believe that the drink habit is one of the greatest hindrances to the Christian religion now in existence; therefore,

Resolved, That we, the Baptists of the Atlantic Association, use every legitimate effort within our reach to suppress it and to bring about Prohibition.

J. S. Canady, J. B. Newton, C. E. Edwards, R. P. Walker and I. N. Henderson spoke to the report.

The following resolution was offered by J. B. Olive:

Resolved, That we protest against the seating of delegates from the churches that aid in the manufacture or sale of wine or spirituous liquors in any way.

The report on Education was submitted by L. L. Leary as fol-

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

It is very gratifying to notice the fresh impulse that education has received during the past few years. Our country districts are being supplied with a better class of teachers and the school term greatly lengthened.

On this advance movement it should be a source of pride to our Baptist people to know that our leaders have taken a very active part and our people are being more aroused to the call of

duty along the line of education than ever before.

Wake Forest College, our own institution is in better condition than ever before in all its history. We have more professors than ever before and they are better prepared. We are now putting up an Alumni Building for the better equipment for the study of Biology and medicine. The infirmary, a long felt necessity, is now a reality. A nice, well equipped building is being erected for the comfort of our sick boys at the dear old College. This should fill the hearts of our people with gratitude to those who made it possible, and most of all to God.

Our Baptist Female University is the babe of our Baptist State Convention, and we should look upon it with gratitude to God for making it possible for our girls to attend such an institution of our own. We now have nearly three hundred students enrolled there and more arriving every day. We appeal to our girls to make use of the opportunity or attending this God given institution.

Our Atlantic Institute with its good history is in fine condition. Prof. W. L. Beech, our principal is making an enviable record for himself and the school. His corps of teachers are experienced and well prepared. We now have a larger number of students than ever before at this period in the school year. There have been one hundred and ten enrolled up to the present time this year. We call upon all the brethren and sisters of this Association' to stand by this, their school. Let us give of our means and our

prayers to its support. To the boys and girls we appeal to avail themselves of the opportunity to attend this our own institute.

At Wake Forest College, we now have fifty four young preachers preparing themselves for the ministry. These young men are all poor and God has laid this work at our door for us to do. Why God calls poor boys to preach the gspel we do not know, but we do know that he calls upon us to enable them to avail themselves of an education. Let us pray for this work and do what God puts in our hearts to do.

W. H. Whitehead, C. E. Edwards, R. P. Walker spoke to report. At 7 o'clock P. M., W. H. Whitehead preached the Introductory sermon. Subject: "Let your light so shine." After which a warm and cordial address of welcome was delivered by R. P. Walker and was followed by a hearty response from J. C. Whitty.

The report on Sunday Schools was submitted by L. M. Holloway,

as follows:

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee believes that the Sunday School occupies almost the same relation to the Church that the corner stone does to the house, and that no church will be successful in its work without a good live Sunday School. Knowledge is the foundation stone upon which all real, abiding progress must rest. Therefore, the teaching department of the Church is important.

H. C. Moore, Livingston Johnston, R. P. Walker and J. S. Canady

spoke to the report.

On motion the Association adjourned. Benediction by Livingston Johnson.

#### SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

Devotional exercises were conducted by C. E. Edwards. After

which the Moderator called the body to order.

The roll of churches was called and church letters read by J. B. Newton and B. H. Mathews. A motion was made by R. P. Walker and carried, that the reading of church letters shall be dispensed with in the future.

The report on Periodicals was submitted by R. P. Walker, as

follows:

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Intelligent thought is the only true basis of all successful work. The clearer the thought the surer the action.

Our cause and plan of action in anything depends largely upon how we think and what we think about it. This principal holds good in the field of spiritual endeavor as well as in the realm of

Our thinking and acting are largely influenced by the thinking and acting of others. It is very necessary therefore that we put ourselves in touch with the best thought through the best mediums. Thus are we the better prepared for all our work, secular

and spiritual.

Safe and careful reading then may be set down as one of the surest means of keeping pace with whatever progress appeals to us. And it is a matter of congratulation to the Baptist host of our State and the country at large, that we have such a splendid system of periodicals, thoroughly consecrated to the work of the denomination, and fully equipped for sending forth that intelligence to our people that enables them to do the Lord's work with great and telling effect.

The Biblical Recorder has long been regarded by the Baptists of North Carolina as their true exponent or religious thought, and it is a pleasing observation that its usefulness in its own peculiar

field increases as it grows older.

Charity and Children is well worth a place in every home, and our people can not afford to be ignorant of our Orphanage work, concerning which this paper keeps them thoroughly posted.

The subject of Missions is stirring the religious world as perhaps never before, and the Foreign Mission Journal gives such infor-

mation as intelligent Baptists can ill afford to miss.

Our varied and excellent series of Sunday School Literature published by the Sunday School Board at Nashville, may be relied upon for all our needs in this department of our work.

The North Carolina Baptist and Atlantic Messenger are doing a great work in helping to keep the spirit of progress and enthusiasm alive among our people, and are the strongest forces for the cause of temperance ever telt in our State.

In a word, all the periodicals by our denomination may be heartily recommended and safely depended upon, for they are under the watch care of good and true men, called of God for their specific work.

#### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Orphanage at Thomasville demands at this time our special attention. Over 300 little children are placed there with no one to care for them but the Missionary Baptists of the State. The time has come when we must give and pray that God may stop tne typhoid fever that is raging among them. A sewerage system is badly needed, and God's people must place one there at once. Brethren and Sisters, let us do our part in this great work.

W. H. Whitehead offered the following resolution:

Resolved. That we nereby record our especial pleasure and gratitude at the generosity of Bro. John C. Whitty, of New Bern, who in memory of his lamented daughter, has during the past year erected at our Thomasville Orphanage, "The Rowena Whitty Building" at a cost of \$3,000 and accommodating 40 orphan girls. It is a beautiful and useful memorial of a lovely Christian girl and in those walls "She being dead yet speaketh" and will speak through the coming years.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

From many sources have come assurances that the work of the Home Board was never more entrenched in the affections of our people and that the hour of supreme opportunity for service now confronts the Board. Our works in the different fields are having great success. The greatest work ever opened to the Board now lies before it.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was organized in May, 1845, and is located in Richmond, Va. The purpose of the Convention was to carry out the great commission "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

The reports which come from our workers on the fields all point to brighter days. They have baptized 2,076. Let us all pray and

work for the salvation of the lost.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

This committee recommends the securing of a man to take the field as General Missionary, and a strong man for the East Carteret and Pamlico Fields. Brethren E. O. Johnson, L. M. Holloway, J. B. Newton, J. B. Olive, C. E. Edwards and I. N. Henderson have labored faithfully during the past year. Bro. C. B. Paul was doing valuable service as General Missionary when the Lord called him to his reward. We recommend that our pastors discuss State and Associational Missions before their churches at least four times during the year, in order that our people may be better informed as to their duty along these lines, and to foster and establish Sunday schools at every Baptist church in our Association. Let our people increase their liberality, which is necessary in order to build up the Lord's cause. "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver." J. C. Whitty spoke on Associational Missions. The twenty-first annual session of the Atlantic Baptist Association was held with the Morehead City Church, Oct. 12 to 14, 1904. At that meeting we had a good harmonious session. During the year 1904 two Union Meetings have been organized within our bounds, the Atlantic Union and the Onslow County Union. Mt. Hermon church has been organized with 13 members. Mt. Hermon and Atlantic (Carteret) joined the Association this session.

Four Church buildings are being constructed, namely: Atlantic (Carteret), Marshalburg, Mount Hermon and Spring Hill.

We have lost from our Ministerial ranks by death, brethren C. B. Paul and Benjamin Ward. We have added to our churches during the year by baptism 56, and lost by death 19.

The management of the Atlantic Messenger has been placed in

the hands of the Executive Committee. Our Associational School is in a prosperous condition under the management of Prof. Walter L. Beach with his excellent assistants. The Atlantic Association is making progress.
