The Committee on Missions submitted their Report, and after an interesting address from Elder Bailey, showing the importance and condition of the various Missions, and explaining fully the transportation of moneys sent to these Missions, the Report was adopted.

The Baptist of the South have their work of Missions divided into four departments, as follows: Foreign Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, and Associational Missions in the Property of the Property of Missions in the Property of the and Associational Missions. The Foreign Missions include our Missions in China, Japan, Rome, Africa, and some others. In China we have about eight Missionaries; in Africa, and some others. In China we have about other places. Our work in Rome has greatly prospered. We now have a splendid house and a good church in sight of the Pope's palace. Three or four patite prospers are prosphired to the Pope's palace. Three or four native preachers are preaching the Gospel in Italy, and teaching the children the religion of the New Testament.

In China the work has been somewhat retarded by sickness among the Missionaries, and a famine that swept off over a million of the people.

The work in Africa has remained normal for years, but on one of the fields 4,000 persons have been baptized within a few months. Burmah has become a christian country. Japan has adopted many of the usual customs of chris-

Home Missions include our work of sending the Gospel to the Indian tribes on our bot ders, and the supplying of the waste and destitute sections among our own people. This work, with that of Foreign Missions, is under the direction of the Southern Baptist Convention. Brother Buckner has been the

State Missions is the effort of the Baptist of North Carolina to preach the Gospel and establish churches in the destitute sections within the limits of

Then we have what we term Associational Missions. These are the special efforts of the different Associations to supply the destitute within their own bounds. In each of these departments of special work much has been done. bounds. In each of these departments of special work much has been done, God has prospered the labor of His servants in all the fields occupied; and the prospect is hopeful in the highest degree. The one hindrance in the way means for the spread of the Way means for the spread of the Gospel. Every Christian liberality in giving of their privilege, as well as a duty, to aid in the establishment of Christ's Kingdom. They should labor and give as God prospers, them in every good word and They should labor and give as God prospers them in every good word and work. We are laborers together with God. We are His servants, bought with the precious blood of their with God. with the precious blood of Christ; we are not our own-our time and talents with the precious blood of Christ; we are not our own—our time and talend and money all belong to Him. The fields are white with the harvest and the command is, "Go work to-day in my vineyard; Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." We must either go, or aid others in

going. We should not expect to go to heaven "on flowery beds of ease, while others fought to win the prize, and sailed through bloody seas.

The Committee on Education offered the following Report:

The Baptists in the United States have about fifty Colleges; about twenty Theological schools, and a great many flourishing schools, male and female. Other denominations have a great number of institutions of learning. Other schools, entirely undenominational, are located in almost every nook and corner of the country, and notwithstanding this, the great body of our people, especially in this section, are comparatively illiterate. This state of affairs we greatly deplore. Education is not religion, but a more thoroughly educated ministry in our own section is a glaring necessity. Ignorance is the Mother of Evil, but Education is the hand-maid of Religion. A man who is opposed to education is to be pittied, and yet he is responsible for his ignorance. We call upon the brethren of this Association, to awake to the importance of this subject. We must educate. We ought to pat onize the good men of our church who are building up schools in our midst. While we need an educated ministry, our farmers and mechanics should be educated also. To this end let us go to work, and send our boys and girls to school, and bequeath to them a legacy that cannot take the wings of the morning D. W. POOL, and fly away. S. D. BROWN.
