### PROCEEDINGS.

KERR CHAPEL, Caswell Co., N. C., August 9, 1910.

The Seventy-Sixth Annual Session of the Beulah Baptist Association met with Kerr's Chapel Baptist Church this morning at 10 o'clock. Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. D. W. Overbey.

Bro. G. W. Reid called the Association to order. On motion, P. M. Somers was elected Moderator.

On motion, R. T. Wilson was elected Clerk, and C. R. Vernon re-elected Treasurer.

The Moderator appointed C. J. Yarbrough and G. W. Reed

On motion Bro. F. M. Jordan was requested to preach the Introductory Sermon His text was taken from Proverbs 3:17.

Bro. C. R Vernon, Treasurer-elect, through his son, Boyce Vernon, offered his resignation on account of feeble health, which, on motion, was accepted, and E. F. Upchurch was elected Treasurer.

Bro. D. W. Overby, from Committee on Order of Business, reported that the committee recommended that the Association have a sermon each morning, and that the subjects be taken up in their regular order, without allotting time to either—Educa-

tion, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Periodicals, Orphanage, Temperance, Sunday Schools, Ministerial Relief and Home Missions.

On motion the report was adopted as recommended.

The Report on Education was presented by Bro. G. W. Reid. Brethren Reid A. G. Thompson, F. M. Jordan and Ellis spoke to the report, after which it was adopted.

### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Baptist hosts of North Carolina have done much along the lines of Education in the past few years, but there remains much more for us to do. If we ever hope to see the time when our people shall lead the State and the nation along educational lines, we must rally to the support of our Baptist schools All of our preparatory schools are giving a splendid account of themselves, even with their limited means, and the half-hearted support many of our people are giving them. Every Baptist in North Carolina should be a hearty supporter of our preparatory schools. It is hard to understand how a Baptist can send his child to any other than a Baptist school; and yet many of our people are doing so. This is not as it should be. We heartily commend our own Baptist preparatory schools

to all our people.

Ministerial education is of the utmost importance to our denominational growth. The time has come when we must have trained men to train our churches. Ministerial education, therefore, lies at the very basis of our denominational efficiency and progress. What our churches need above everything else is pastoral leadership. Give us men of wide vision, broad sympathies and intelligent capacity, and every denominational problem will be solved. If a narrow, forceless man is out of place anywhere, it is certainly in the pulpit—the supposed leader of one of God's churches. The reason why so many of our churches are dead is that the men who pretend to lead them are not alive to our great and growing denominational interests, and these churches are going to remain dead as long as they persist in getting inefficient men as pastors. Some of our churches get such pastors because they don't want to be waked up. They don't want to give to missions and support the work of the Lord. No man has a moral right to be pastor of a Missionary Baptist church who is himself not a missionary leader, and no church has a right to the name Baptist that will have an anti-missionary pastor

God has been very good to us this year, giving us the finest crops for years, and we live in the garden-spot of our nation and our Lord is just pouring riches into our land. Will we give as the Lord has prespected us?

We commend the Ministerial Educational Board of Wake Forest College to all our people for their hearty support and co-operation. We also heartly commend Meredith College for girls to the brotherhood, and bespeak for it your hearty support.

### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Baptist Sunday Schools of North Carolina have made great gains in numbers during the last few years. There is now a reported membership of about 154,000 scholars.

Our State was the first in the Southern Baptist Convention to do Sunday-school field work. The present Secretary of the Baptist Sunday School Board in this State, E. L. Middleton, began his work in May, 1908.

In the Beulah Association there is reported in the letters sent from the several churches up to this session of the Association the following statistics: Number of officers and teachers, 50; enrollment, 286; average attendance, 176. Three churches did not make a report. Five churches have evergreen Sunday schools. All others, reported, close during the winter season. Two churches do not have Sunday schools.

### REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

The undersigned Committee on Periodicals recommend that the churches of this Association during the next associational year make a strenuous effort to place the Biblical Recorder, our excellent State Baptist organ, in each Baptist home in our Association. That each Sunday school try and subscribe for a number of copies of Charity and Children for distribution among its scholars. We believe this will enlighten us as to what others are doing, increase our interest in all our home church work, and help to create a desire in our children for wholesome Christian literature. Thus we believe e small effort put forth in this direction will prove a blessing to our Association, and the good resulting therefrom to God's kingdom cannot be estimated this side of eternity.

Your committee further reports the Foreign Mission Journal and Home Field as excellent periodicals along their particular lines, and there is no better Sunday school literature obtainable for southern Baptists than that published by our Sunday School Board at Nashville. Tenn.

### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

There has never been a time in the history of our denomination when the Home Mission Board had larger opportunities to do a grand work for the cause of Christ and humanity than the present. And while we have steadily increased our contributions year after year, yet the demands have increased more rapidly, because of the large increase of immigration of aliens. Many of our seaport towns, as well as those inland, are rapidly filling up with foreigners who know little, if anything, of the Christian religion, and unless the hands of the Home Mission Board should be untied, thousands of these ignorant people will be drawn in by Catholicy, which means the degradation and ruin of our country. We therefore commend

this Home Mission Board to our brotherhood for their hearty co-operation.

### REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

We' the committee to report on the Orphanage, beg leave to report as follows: That our Orphanage at Thomasville, after a life of twenty-five years, is steadily increasing in value and in accommodations for our many unfortunate children in North Carolina. The buildings are both large and convenient, with all modern accommodations, valued at more than \$200,000, and caring for more than 400 children, rearing them under the very best Christian and educational influence. Some of the most influential men and women of our State are those that have spent a part of their young and tender lives under the influence of those in charge of the Thomasville Orphanage. It is true that this institution is well equipped, but when we stop to think of how much work those boys and girls have to do when that time should be spent in developing their youthful minds, we know that we should bend every energy to furnish them more labor-saving appliances. When we think of the great number of children that are growing up without the influence of a Christian home and in real ignorance, doesn't it make us willing to bestir ourselves and do all in our power to help this great cause? Especially should we bestir ourselves in the interest of this particular institution, since it is dependent on us-the Baptists of North Carolina, and we could not do better than to give of our means to this noble work as the Lord has prospered us, for which we will surely receive a blessing. ### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

To Beulah Baptist Association,

held with Kerr's Chapel, August, 19 0:

It is gratifying to know that year by year an advance in Foreign Missions can be reported. At the Southern Baptist Convention in Baltimore the Foreign Mission Board reported the greatest number of baptisms (3,233), and also that the churches have given more money for the cause than any previous year—\$501,058.84.

### OUR MISSIONS AND MEMBERSHIP.

We are directing, through the Foreign Mission Board, work in seven foreign countries, viz.: Argentina, Brazil, Italy, Mexico, Africa, Japan and China. We have on this territory 279 organized churches with a total membership of 19,231. There are also many out-stations in each of these countries where the people hear the gospel.

The schools and printing plants are proving wonderful forces of en-

lightenment.

### NEEDS.

However, the Board has ever, and will ever have, two standing needs -men and money, and we believe, as followers of Christ, we should not desire it otherwise until the ground has been covered and the Great Commission of our Lord shall have been fully complied with.

Therefore, we recommend that the churches of the Beulah Association organize a Laymen's Movement for more concentrated effort, and that our people subscribe to the Foreign Mission Jonrnal and keep in closer touch

with Foreign Mission work.

### STATE MISSIONS.

We do not believe there was ever a time when the State Mission work was as important as it is today. The material development of our State for the past decade has been marvelous. It is with the Baptists, as with no other people, to see that the religious advancement of North Carolina keeps pace with its industrial progress. In many communities this can only be done through the work of State Missions. Year by year the results of our State Mission operations add to our denominational capital.

For years our women have made steady progress, and the past year was no exception. Each year they raise the figures a certain per cent. over those of the previous year, and begin in a systematic way to work up these figures. The successful way in which they plan their work and work

their plan is a constant rebuke to us for our almost utter lack of system.
"No system, however good, will work itself. There must be a man behind every plan, and that man should be the pastor. But if the pastor will not urge the adoption of some system and press it energetically when adopted, some layman who is interested in the Church and the Kingdom should give attention to this important matter."

"To preach the gospel to North Carolinians, with the Baptist interpre-

tation and emphasis, is the task of the constituency of this Association."

As a denomination, we stand on higher ground today than we ever occupied before; and yet we are but just coming into our own. We have grown to be a great people-great in number, in wealth in influence. It is hard for us to conceive of any undertaking that we could not accomplish by a united and earnest effort. Our ability lays upon us a tremendous responsibility. The stewardship of wealth has come to be a matter of serious concern to the Baptists of North Carolina. We have been accustomed to plead our poverty as an excuse for not doing, but now we should pray to be saved from the perils of prosperity. If we give the Lord His part, how rich will be our share, and what a mighty force we will become in extending the kingdom of our Lord on earth.

### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF.

The work of the Board of Ministerial Relief certainly should appeal to every loyal Baptist in our grand old State. A more worthy and a more important object is not numbered among all the objects of our State Convention. And why it is that many of our churches do not contribute to this Board at all is indeed hard to understand; yet, such is the case. We are glad, however, that all the churches in this, our beloved old Beulah Association, contributed at least a small amount to this worthy cause this year; and yet we do not believe, yea, we are sure, that there is not a single

church in our Association that could not have done better.

Our contribution to this Board amounted to \$43 50, or a little less than \$3.35 for each of our thirteen churches; or, to bring it down to its finest analysis, a little more than 18 cents apiece for each Baptist in our Association. Scores and perhaps hundreds of our people have never contributed a cent to this Board in their lives, and yet many of them have enjoyed the preaching of the Truth by these old heroes who have worn themselves out, and at last, through sheer exhaustion, have had to lay down their mantel, and many of them are today in an almost helpless condition, depending largely, if not entirely, upon others for the necessities of life. And yet our contributions last year only enabled the Board to give to these dependents about \$100 to each family, for we must remember that while there were only thirty-two beneficiaries to whom help had been granted, many of them had children dependent upon them for bread and clothes, and there were many more applicants who really needed and deserved help that the Board was compelled to deny aid for lack of means.

We would earnestly commend this Board to the prayerful consideration of all our people, and insist upon a more liberal contribution for this
