PROCEEDINGS.

CUB CREEK CHURCH, WILKES COUNTY, N. C., August 25, 1881.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Bro. Milton McNeill, from Romans 8th, and 1st verse.

After 45 minutes, the delegates assembled in the house singing, "Bringing in the sheaves," and "There's a Fountain free," &c. Called to order by Bro. R. A. Spainhour, former moderator. Prayer by Bro. I. Oxford.

Letters were then read from 31 churches forming this Association,

Love Lady church not being represented.

Proceeded to elect officers, which resulted as follows: R. A. Spainhour Moderator, and J. B. Pool Clerk. E. B. Hendren and T. W. Paris being tellers.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

After sermon by Bro. Farthing, met as per adjournment. The Committee on Foreign Missions reported as follows:

Dear Brethren: Since our appointment at last Association, we have

been trying to increase the interest in Foreign Missions among the churches and with individual christians, by personal appeals where it was practicable, otherwise by correspondence with the churches through their clerk. In January last we held a meeting at Mt. Olive church, in the interest of Foreign Missions, where we hope good was done. During the year, so far as we have been able to learn there have been something near \$30 given to this department of work. The command under which we labor is "go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." No doubt many of you have often wondered whether Foreign Missions were really prospering. In answering this allow us to quote some facts given by a returned missionary of our Board: "The Baptist denomination in the United States increased in the last ten years at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum; the Methodist at the rate of $4\frac{1}{9}$ per cent., and the Presbyterian and Congregationalist at 3 per cent," an average of 41 per cent. During this period the membership of their Foreign Mission churches have increased at the rate of 16 per cent. nearly 4 times as much as the annual increase in this country. Eighty years ago in all heathen lands there were perhaps not more than 50,000 converts; now there are 1,650,000. Then the annual contributions to Foreign Missions was \$310,000; now it amounts to \$6,250,000. Then there were but 70 Protestant missionary schools; to-day there are 12,000. But we perhaps would do well to look about us and see what we are doing, how far we are obeying the command. There are about one and a half millions of Baptists in the South. They gave last year a little less than \$50,000 for this work, not three cents per member. Many of them are poor we know, but the 2,000 poor colored Kareens gave \$2,500, more than \$1.00 each, and the poor widow gave all she had; the 20,000 Burmese gave \$40,000, \$2.00 each-60 times as much as all the Baptists of the South; 13 times as much as all the Baptists of the country, and more than 20 times as much as all the white Baptists of the South, the above is in proportion to numbers. Disguise it as we may, this is a sad picture indeed. The freest and the most orthodox church in the world are not doing a tithe of what some heathen converts are doing for the extension of the Master's kingdom.

And now, in conclusion, let us urge upon all who love the Lord, indeed, to more self-denial, more earnest work, more consecrating of self to this great work. We appeal to all to do more, not alone on the ground of the millions of pagans dying without God, nor of the expanding and elevating reflex influence from this God-like enterprise, but our simple appeal is work in the execution of the great commission for the declarative glory of God.

We believe the Sunday School work is growing in interest, and should continue to grow until there is a well-conducted Sunday School in every church and neighborhood in the bounds of this Association.

The business of the churches of Christ is to give the gospel to the world. To this end our Associations are organized, and to this end our State Convention was organized. "Preach the gospel to every creature" is the warp upon which all our christian work is woven. Therefore following the genius of the gospel, all of our Baptist gatherings are missionary bodies. Our State Mission work therefore includes every operation among us that pertains to propagating the gospel in the State.

The work now going on under the immediate direction of the State Mission Board is mainly in the Pamlico country—the country south of the Roanoke river, the country lying on the line of the Carolina Central Railroad, and our western section. The work in each of these sections is being vigorously pushed, and is succeeding well. New churches are going up, and new points being made. There are unmistakable signs of growth and progress; and still all is not being done that ought to be done. Indeed a careful study of the field of our operations-what has been done and what is to be done in the thorough cultivation of the field is sufficient to stir the heart of every lover of the cause of Christ, and cause him to rejoice in the privilege the Master has given to work for Him. We need a greatly increased force in the field. If our contributions would justify it, we could suitably employ one hundred men. Oh! that our brethren could all see that this is the Lord's and their opportunity to serve him and be happy. Then would the wilderness blossom like a rose. Then would Zion put on her beautiful garments.

After sermon by Bro. L. P. Gwaltney, met as per adjournment. On motion, a collection was ordered to be taken for State Missions tomorrow.

Committee on Devotion reported I. W. Thomas to preach at Wilkesboro to-night and W. A. Pool at Moravian Falls Academy. At 9:30 a. m. to-morrow Sunday School mass meeting. At 11 a. m. sermon by J. B. Marsh. At 12 M. by J. B. Boone.

Committee on Education reported as follows:

We rejoice to see signs of an increase of the spirit of education among our people. Academies and high schools are growing up in various sections, and our boys and girls are laying the foundation of a good education. Our Colleges too, are fuller than ever before. Let the good work go on; let parents make many sacrifices to give their children all possible education. And while the masses are being educated, the ministry should not be left behind. They are set to instruct the people. How can they instruct those who are superior to them in education? Other denominations have an educated ministry. We claim to have the truth, and we need men who are able to maintain this truth against all opposition. A large number of young ministers whom God has called to the work are desirous of obtaining an education. Most of them are poor; they cannot meet their necessary expenses while procuring an education. They go to wake Forest College and to some of our academies free of charge for tuition. But they have no means to pay their board. It will not do for them to enter the ministry burdened with debt; the churches ought to raise the means to support these brethren. A few of the churches of this Association have taken collections for this object the past year, and have averaged \$2.50 to the church. If all the churches had done as well we could have raised half enough to support a young brother at Wake Forest College for one year. Let those that gave to this object the past year do more during the coming year, and let all the

others join in the work, that we may have men thoroughly qualified for the responsible work of preaching the gospel.

I have also been requested to extend my field of labor, and I think at no distant day all this destitute portion of our Association will be ripe for the Baptists.




