As another mile stone in the history of the Tuckaseegee Association we wish to pay tribute to this great "Soldier of the cross" who has laid his armor down and has given to us a challenge to go forth with greater zeal in the conquest of making "disciples of all men."

**TUCKASEIGEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS**

(Revised August 16, 1957)

ARTICLE I. The name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III. (1) The Association shall have power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V. The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI. (a) The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of Deacon's organization, Brotherhood President, Superintendent of Education, and a parliamentarian, and such other officers as the association may desire to elect. (b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the clerk and treasurer of the association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee. (c) The term general officers shall apply to the moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk and treasurer.

ARTICLE VII. (a) The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the vice moderator. (b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report. (c) The vice moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the moderator, he shall act in his stead until another moderator is elected. (d) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made. (e) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office. (f) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the executive committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (g) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the records of the association up to date. (h) It shall be the duty of all other officers to execute the function of their office pertinent to a well directed association.

ARTICLE VIII. All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX. The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X. The Promotion Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of the Deacon's Organization, President of the Brotherhood, Superintendent of Education, Associational Missionary, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Promotion Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI. It shall be the duty of the promotion committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII. The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII. The association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this association in particular shall be the test of each church as a

missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the association.

ARTICLE XIV. The association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst, the members of these communities are to be nominated annually by the committee on committees unless otherwise determined by the association.

ARTICLE XV. This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read on the previous day of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

BY-LAWS

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Promotion Committee shall be filled by the Promotion Committee.

2. The Promotion Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Promotion Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

5. Duties of the committees of the association:

1. Order of Business Committee: This committee shall plan the annual program for the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.
2. Committee on Committees: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committees.
3. Finance Committee: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year.
4. Resolutions Committee: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.
5. Credentials Committee: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each

church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.

6. Nominating Committee: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.

7. Committee on Organization and Reception of New Churches:

This committee shall have the responsibility of advising with groups proposing the organization of new churches and offer such suggestions as are deemed advisable, and submit a written report of same to the association or Executive committee and grant to the proposed church a certificate of commendation which must be presented with the first letter of the church to the association. This committee shall be composed of the Baptist Pastors of the Churches of the Tuckaseigee Association. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. The chairman of the committee shall be named by the committee on committees.

6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report, and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

Historian's Report—1958

That the churches of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association have made history is evident in the fact that this is the one hundred twenty-ninth annual session of the body. Our pioneer Baptist had a vision of the future. They organized new churches, built meeting houses and established schools that the name of Christ be lifted up in the Mountains of Western North Carolina. All their labors and prayers were made under very difficult circumstances. Today we are making history for tomorrow. Our records will be read by those who come after us. What will those records include from your church?

The Rev. Ray McCall reports that the Balsam Church has been painted inside and outside, an electric bell system installed in Sunday School rooms, an oil furnace installed and the parking area of the church enlarged and improved. A B.T.U. has been organized and four deacons ordained, Jack Fisher, Harley Barnett, Vencent Crisp and Billy Crawford.

The Rev. J. E. Brown, pastor of Calvary Church reports a new entrance built to the church grounds, a new lighting system installed and a building fund set up to reseal the building and build Sunday School rooms.

The Rev. Ralph Stanley, who was called recently to the Cashiers Church, reports all indebtedness of the church paid, a new entrance to the church built and the grounds graveled. A Y.W.A. has been organized with Mrs. Jean Stewart as leader.

The Rev. Quentin M. Perrault, pastor of the Cullowhee church reports that the Sunday School rooms of the church have been redecorated and a new Sunday School class organized.

Mrs. Ruby Birchfield, clerk of the East Sylva Church, reports that an indebtedness of eight hundred dollars spent on the improvement of Sunday School rooms has been paid and a beautiful scene for the baptistry bought. Plans are now under way to build additional Sunday School rooms. A new building was built at East Fork in 1955. Walks have been built around the building at a cost of four hundred dollars. The Rev. Grover Cabe is pastor of the church.

Eva Allen, clerk of Green's Creek Church reports that four new Sunday School rooms are almost completed.

Jarrett Memorial Church has called a full time pastor, the Rev. Lawrence Jackson, who reports that a brotherhood has been organized, new pews have been purchased, and the floors of the sanctuary re-finished.

The Rev. J. W. Myers, pastor of the Hamburg church reports that eight Sunday School rooms and an assembly room have been completed in a new addition to the church. A brotherhood has been organized with Frank D. Bryson as president. This church had the signal honor of having Dr. Fred Brown, a former president of the Southern Baptist Convention and a native of the Hamburg Community as guest speaker at the homecoming in 1957.

The Rev. Fred Rice, pastor of the Heddy Mountain Church, reports a great revival of interest in this church with the addition of

new members and rededication of the old members. A Sunday School has been organized. He adds "Pray much for this small church located in the very southern most part of Jackson County."

The Rev. Sterling Melton, pastor of Moses Creek, reports that the building has been painted, a bell tower erected, beautification of the grounds, and other improvements.

The Rev. Hubert Bryson was called as pastor of the New Hope Church in July. He reports that the building has been repainted on the inside, considerable improvement has been made on the cemetery, and water has been piped to the church. A Brotherhood has been organized and the W. M. S. reorganized.

Mrs. Ruby Cagle, clerk of the Old Savannah Church, reports that additional land has been bought for a parking lot. The overhead of the church has been refinished, the church repainted and the bell-tower remodeled.

J. M. Lambert, pastor of the Scotts Creek Church, reports that a new parsonage has been built. The Rev. Lambert was called to this church in January following the retirement of the Rev. B. S. Hensley, who had been pastor of the church for sixteen years. The Rev. Lambert said of Hensley "He did a great work and the church grew under his leadership. He will be remembered for the giving of himself for church and community." The Rev. and Mrs. Hensley are living in Asheville.

The Rev. Abrams, pastor of the Sylva Church, reports that a ground-breaking was held on November 1, 1957, and work on the new church building began immediately. Mrs. Hattie Hilda Allison was ordained as a deaconess in August, 1957.

Mrs. Cordelia Ashe, clerk of Tilley Creek Church, reports that the church licensed the Rev. Will Webb to preach and called him as their pastor.

The Rev. Finley Fox, of the Tuckaseegee Church reports that the walls of the sanctuary of the new church building have been finished and a Y. W. A. organized.

The Rev. Walter Middleton, pastor of the Wilkesdale Church, reports that a new organ has been bought, the choir loft remodeled and the building repainted both inside and outside.

Our hearts have been saddened this year by the death of the Rev. W. N. Cook, who was a faithful leader in the Tuckaseegee Association for many years.

The resignation of Mrs. Dorothy Edwards Zannon as our Associational Missionary is a great loss to us. As we recall her work among us and the sacrifices that she has made to carry out the "Great Commission" in our churches may we pray that as she goes forward into a larger field that her work will be blessed in a great way.

"Let us go making disciples in our local churches."

It fills the needs for all, beginning with the youngest child and continuing through to the oldest adult. Our Sunday School puts major emphasis on reaching people—people in all walks of life; people of all classes; the lost as well as the saved. By teaching the Bible from Sunday to Sunday to the large number of lost people, it provides a church with its greatest opportunity for Evangelism.

We have 50 active Sunday Schools in the association, and in many, we have had an increase in the enrollment. But think of the hundreds still in our association that have not been reached. Let us assume the responsibility that rests upon each of us to go after them. So that souls can be won, churches strengthened and homes fortified throughout the land.

Several of our churches have conducted Sunday School study courses and have had a week of Bible Study from the book of Mark. We have had four Associational Sunday School planning meetings with a number of our officers attending.

The Sunday School Convention has been held each month with excellent attendance. We meet each Monday night after the 4th Sunday at 7:30. There have been 36 Bible Schools conducted this summer with 3 more to be conducted. We commend all those who had a part in helping, to give our boys and girls an opportunity to attend Bible School. We especially wish to express our appreciation to Rev. Alton Hooper, our Associational Missionary, for the success in Bible School work this summer.

Some of our churches are replacing old buildings with new, and others have added classrooms and departments.

September 18, at the Sylva church, we will have our Regional Sunday School Convention. We are urging our Sunday School workers to take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to better equip themselves for the teaching and training opportunities that lie ahead in the coming year. May all of us from all our churches set big goals this year and strive, with Christ as our leader, to reach them.

The Associational Brotherhood was organized two years ago at the East Sylva Church. It has been my pleasure and honor to have served as its president for two years.

The full enlistment and utilization of men for Christ is the greatest challenge facing our churches today.

A rapid growth in the Brotherhood movement has been witnessed in every section of the Southern Baptist Convention since 1940. Tens of thousands of men have responded to this organization which has as its objective the enlistment of men in magnifying all the work of their churches and denomination.

The Brotherhood enrollment in the Southern Baptist Convention has grown to approximately 375,000 men, and that the number of churches within the Convention reporting Brotherhoods had climbed to a record high of 12,000.

The Royal Ambassadors have shown splendid gains, we now have approximately 10,000 churches reporting Royal Ambassador Chapters, and the enrollment in the Chapters has reached approximately 175,000 boys.

We now have in our association ten churches reporting Brotherhoods. We have made some gains over the past years, we are hoping that this year will prove to be one that will always be remembered in our Brotherhood work here in our association.

We now have a full staff of associational Brotherhood officers, who are willing to render what service they can to the churches in promoting the work of our Southern Baptist program.

We the Brotherhood officers wish to express our thanks to the churches for their offering to the George W. Truett Camp.

On May 12, 1958, our Regional Brotherhood Convention was held with the Scott Creek Baptist Church.

Report For the Associational Deacons

Report on State Missions 1959

STATE MISSIONS as the missionary effort on the part of North Carolina Baptists to reach the unsaved for Christ and to teach, train, and enlist the saved in giving, living, and serving through the churches and throughout the world.

I. SEEING THE NEEDS

(A) There are over 4,500,000 people in the State. About 2,100,000 of these above the age of eight years are affiliated with some kind of church. Over 2,000,000 above the age of eight years are unchurched. Perhaps 25 percent of the affiliated church members are unsaved; then more than 60 percent of the people of North Carolina are lost.

(B) We have over 868,000 Baptist church members in North Carolina. Perhaps 40 percent of these are enlisted and are being taught in Christian giving, living, and serving. This means that 60 percent of our church members are not dedicated to the Christian profession. In this undeveloped area, the churches have their primary challenge.

(C) The above needs present the purpose and challenge of State Missions, and demand a varied program of mission activity.

II. MEETING THESE NEEDS THROUGH STATE MISSIONS

(A) *Our people need to be taught.* Therefore many of the

phases of our State Missions' Work are promoted through the Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Royal Ambassadors, Church Development, and Music departments. Over 2,800 Vacation Bible Schools will be reported this year, giving over \$50,000 to World Missions. Several thousands of our Baptist people attended assemblies at Fruitland, Caswell, and Ridgecrest this summer. Many of our new, rural and urban churches have been enlisted in our Baptist program of stewardship and organizational life. Many quarter or half-time churches have been led to activate a full-time program of service.

(B) *Since 60 percent of the people of North Carolina are lost—* they need the Saviour. State Missions provides a Department of Evangelism that seeks to inspire pastors and churches to evangelize their communities; also to plan and promote united evangelistic efforts on a state and associational-wide scale.

(C) *A growing population demands a new and stronger church.* State Missions provides a necessary and significant ministry through aid on some church buildings and the purchase of sites for new churches and some one hundred or more salaries for pastors. Six out of ten Baptist churches in North Carolina have been assisted in one or more ways through this department.

(D) Pastors' Schools are promoted through State Missions to meet the growing demand for better trained pastors. Last year about 175 pastors received better training at Fruitland. Refresher courses are offered at Mars Hill and Chowan Colleges each summer for all pastors and their wives.

(E) State Missions seeks to minister to the colored races in our midst through the Department of Interracial Cooperation. Our main emphasis is to help train their leadership.

(F) Other areas and challenges of State Missions work are, namely: the Allied Church League; the silent people; the camp and assembly at Fruitland and Caswell; the department of church planning; Brotherhood and Royal Ambassadors Work; Baptist Student Program; Separation of State and Church; and etc.

III. SOURCES OF SUPPORT

(A) These great and growing needs of State Missions are supported largely by our gifts through the Cooperative Program and our special State Missions offering in the churches on the third Sunday of September.

(B) Will you, as individuals, through your Sunday School, W.M.U., and Church do your part so that the first part of the Great Commission might be obeyed—and that these rich ministries might be continued and that next year North Carolina and the world might have more Christians and be more Christian.

In Acts 1:8 we find these words, "And ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." May we continue to pray and pay that others may know our Saviour.

Report on Foreign Missions

Baptists are fast realizing that the *field* is the *world*. Every New Testament church *is*, or *should be* a missionary recruiting station. More of our young people should be trained to follow Christ on the foreign mission field. We can do this by our *gifts* of not only our money, but *mission study*, *prayer*, and by *dedicating* our lives more fully to *our* responsibilities.

Appointments totaling 137 during 1958 and 36 from January to May, 1959, bring the number of foreign missionaries in active service to 1,305. The appointment goal for all 1959 is 140. The board expects to have 2,000 missionaries under appointment by the close of Baptist Jubilee Advance in 1964.

At the end of 1958, there were 742 urgent requests for new missionaries.

Southern Baptists now have missionaries in 39 countries, with a total of 3,229 churches and 6,116 chapels and mission points, with 4,384 Sunday Schools and a Sunday School enrollment of 341,151 pupils. There were 29,990 baptisms during 1958 and church membership reached the 416,750 mark.

Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field such as churches, schools, hospitals, good will centers and many others.

May we consider what our own association is doing to advance God's Kingdom around the world. In 1958, we gave a total of \$12,041.61

to all mission causes, and in 1959, \$11,329.04 both designated and undesignated, the greater part of that amount being used in N. C. to support our hospital and children's home.

We are thankful to God for calling one of our own Jackson county men to the mission field within the past year.

Rev. Dale Hooper, who was born at Tuckaseegee and spent the first 15 or 16 years of his life here was appointed last summer and is now serving in East Africa.

The Jarrett Memorial Church has named their chapter of the Royal Ambassadors in his honor.

Helping some 7,000 students in Baptist colleges and some 6,000 in our seminaries.

Helping to support our Baptist hospitals at Winston-Salem and New Orleans, La.

Helping to support two Baptist Homes for the Aging, Winston-Salem and Albemarle, N. C.

Helping to support two Baptist Children's Homes with 700 children

at Thomasville and Kinston, N. C. (With many children now on the waiting list.)

Report on Baptist Children's Homes

North Carolina Baptists have shown remarkable interest in their Children's Homes during the past year. Numerous church groups have visited the three campuses. Continued financial support has been encouraging. Awakened interest in your Child Care program has been evidenced in many respects.

Program Studied

During the past year members of the Children's Homes staff, under the best leadership available, have engaged themselves in a conscientious study of the entire Child Care program sponsored by North Carolina Baptists. Findings have been gratifying. The program has a commendable history and is one of the best in the nation. Every effort is being made by the present administration to continue the best care possible for dependent children.

Children Served

More than 1,000 boys and girls were served by the Children's Homes during the past year. Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home provided care for 547 children while 197 lived in Foster Homes. Through financial assistance of the Mother's Aid program 40 children were able to live with their mothers. Supervision and financial help were afforded 30 college students. Resourceful case workers assisted 214 additional children to find homes with relatives and other social service agencies.

Cottage Construction

Three cottages are currently under construction—one at each of the three Homes. The Roy Culler family of High Point is providing funds for a boys' cottage at Mills Home. The H. C. Ferebee family of Camden is making possible a cottage for girls at Kennedy Home. The new cottage at Pembroke will provide administrative offices, living accommodations as well as kitchen and dining facilities for the Indian boys and girls.

Administrative Change

Mr. Vernon S. Sparrow became Superintendent at Mills Home, Thomasville, July 1, 1959. He comes to this post with an excellent background of training and experience. Prior to Mr. Sparrow's going to Mills Home he served as Associate Pastor and Minister of Education in the First Baptist Church of Lenoir.

Significant Convention Action

Significant recommendations relative to the Children's Homes were adopted by the Baptist State Convention in May following a two and a half year study by the Committee of Twenty-five. They are as follows:

1. That the number of children in foster home care be increased to approximate the number in institutional care.
2. That the Children's Homes begin to develop new types of programs to help children who are not being adequately cared for in other ways.
3. That increased attention be given to families throughout the state by well-trained, mature case work consultants to help avoid family breakdowns.

More Adequate Financial Support

The Convention has voted to bring the Children's Homes into the Cooperative Program on the same basis as all other institutions and objects. Churches may continue to send Once-A-Month offerings and special gifts. Designated gifts from Churches to the Children's Homes will be administered by the Convention in the same manner as designated gifts from Churches to other institutions. The Homes are encouraged with this improved financial relationship with the Convention. For lack of sufficient income the Homes operated on a \$22,000 deficit in 1958. The deficit for 1959 will be approximately \$65,000. The only way the Homes have of meeting the \$65,000 deficit this year is through a substantial increase in the Thanksgiving Offering.

What of the Future?

With the increase in population, the development of industry, the growth of cities and the mounting tensions in present day society, there is an increasing demand for services to dependent children. Your Children's Homes are being asked by the Convention to expand their services. With your prayers, loyal and generous support, your leadership will continue to move forward as resources are made available.

Report on North Carolina Baptist Hospital

Our Baptist Hospital seeks to serve our people with a complete program of specialized medical care for all who need it. Our people go in great numbers, with all types of serious illness, from all walks of life, and in all financial circumstances, to receive the ministry of our Baptist medical center. A constant effort is made to keep it personal and Christian in its care of sick people.

Last year Service Patients from 95 counties of the State made over 66,000 visits to the 31 clinics of the Out-Patient Department, which is open to families not able to pay the full cost of their medical care. About the same number of office visits was made by Private or full-pay patients. More than 16,000 sick persons were hospitalized for 132,000 days of bed care.

Forty per cent of the hospital service is rendered the patients who go to the Out-Patient Clinics or who enter the hospital through the Out-Patient Department. The services of the physicians are free to all these patients, but the hospital charges must be paid unless other arrangements are made by the family.

Last year the hospital spent well over one million dollars in the care of these Service Patients. The Mother's Day Fund, along with the welfare funds and assistance from other agencies and foundations, enables the hospital to provide more than half of this service free for our very poor people. The Mother's Day Fund alone, however, has not covered the full cost of the care of even the most needy.

We need to lay upon the hearts of our members the necessity of the Mother's Day Fund, if our Baptist Hospital is to provide this important service for our poorer people.

North Carolina Baptist Homes For Aging

The ninth year of operation of the Baptist Homes for the Aging began March 16, 1959. All three homes—Resthaven, Albemarle, and Headquarters Building—have been filled practically all year to capacity. There has been 119, counting residents and helpers. When vacancies occur, there are always more names on the waiting list than there are rooms to be filled.

There were several deaths during the year, including the oldest resident, "Uncle" John T. Holt, formerly of Wilson Mills, N. C. Had he lived until February 26, 1960, he would have been 100 years old. He was keenly missed by all who knew him.

This has been another year of progress at the homes. A campaign to raise funds for the fourth home at Hamilton, N. C., is now on. Mr. Don G. Matthews of Hamilton has given the building site and almost \$50,000 toward the building.

The two most pressing needs of the Homes for Aging now are (1) to finish raising funds to start construction of the Hamilton Homes, and (2) to raise about \$75,000 to cover the balance of expansion of the infirmary. When they are finished the total capacity of all the homes will be 170 residents.

Would you like to have a part in helping to make these plans become a reality soon? Of the churches in the Tuckaseegee Association, only 12 churches contributed a total of \$369.30 in the special day offerings for the homes through June. If you would like to help, let this be a challenge to us to have a greater percentage of our churches contributing in the future for the benefit and comfort of our beloved aged ones.

Report on the Baptist Student Union

There are about 100 Baptist churches located in the communities where colleges are situated in the state of North Carolina. Therefore 3,000 Baptist churches are sending their young people to the colleges in these 100 church communities for the greater portion of four years or more. There are approximately 50,000 college students in North Carolina and half of these are Baptists. Of these 25,000 Baptist students approximately 20,000 are attending non-Baptist schools. Because Baptist churches and Baptist people all over the state support Baptist Student Unions through the Cooperative Program, send their young people into college situations, and follow them with their earnest expectations and prayers the ministry and purpose of the

Student Department is to supplement the work of the church, not substitute for it.

Our program is headed by the Reverend Mr. Harold Cole and his staff at the state office in Raleigh along with some 15 full-time and part-time directors who work on the college campuses. Since there are 52 colleges and universities in our state there are not enough directors to adequately carry on this program. The B. S. U. program keeps one eye turned toward the student in college and the college church, and the other upon the future college graduate and the leadership he may provide in the church in the community where he may live and work after his college training.

Some of the B. S. U. activities in North Carolina are listed as follows:

1. An annual B. S. U. Convention in November which is attended by 1,000 or more students from some 40 campuses.
2. A Spring Leadership Conference in April for the purpose of clinical training for more than 400 college students elected to serve as B. S. U. Council members for the coming year.
3. A Nurses' Retreat at Raleigh in order to extend the B. S. U. ministry among schools of nursing.
4. A summer mission program in which college students work in our churches and associations.
5. A mission offering program called Listen which sends 2 or 3 students to work on foreign mission fields during the summer.

In spite of obvious difficulties in budget, personnel, and facilities, B. S. U. in North Carolina has a great and challenging program based upon some definite purposes which can be enumerated in outline as follows: Its purposes to be,

1. The proving ground in which every college student may discover and develop a vital and personal faith.
2. The atmosphere out of which the denomination may find its leadership for local, state-wide, and world-wide programs.
3. The medium for emphasizing and realizing the relevancy of the Christian faith in all areas of vocational life, both secular and non-secular.
4. The seed-bed out of which the vital elements of the Christian faith and the distinctives of our denomination may be perennially reproduced.

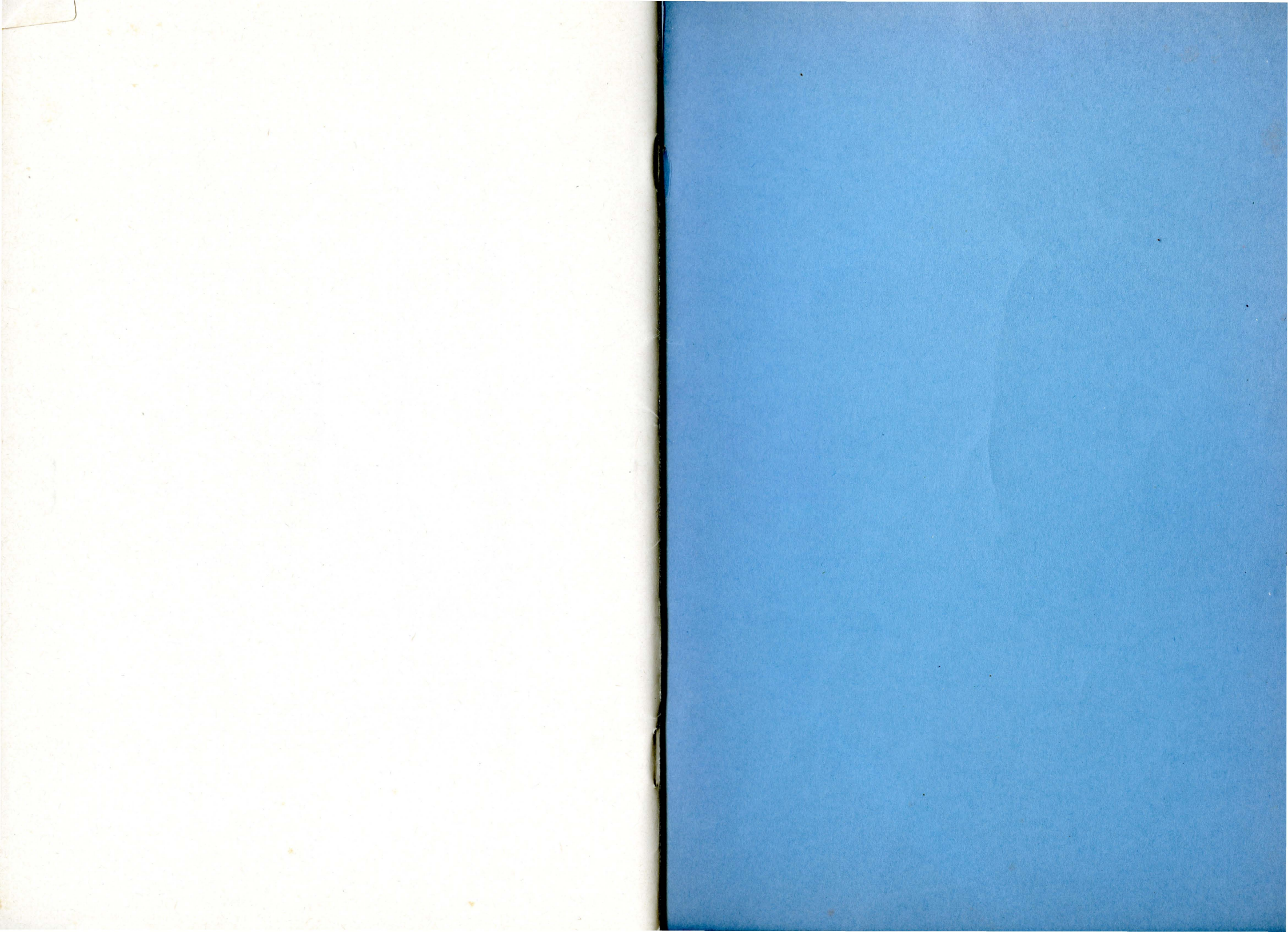
