Report on State Missions

State Missions are a very important division of work. From the Recorder we find that during the last ten years our missionaries have baptized 18,844 persons; completed on mission fields 169 houses of worship; and have collected for the objects of the convention \$52,756.48.

We have 148 men on the field this year and we have planned to raise \$45,000.

Needs: 1st. We need more money in order to pay adequate salaries.

2nd. We need more men on the field.

3rd. We need a building fund as we need a number of houses on the mission fields.

Report on Foreign Missions

There are two distinct aspects of the subject of foreign missions. One pertains to the work of the missionary on the field, his needs, opportunities, and responsibilities, his successes and failures, the other pertains to those who remain at home and upon whom devolves the responsibility of supporting the missionary upon the field.

The work of the missionaries on the field is reported at the Southern Baptist Convention. It is the province of this report to deal with the second aspect of the subject of missions and record what has been done during the past year by the Baptists of this association for the fostering of interest in foreign missions and the raising of funds to support the missionaries.

During the past year there has been manifested a greater interest than ever before in the subject of foreign missions. This is due largely to the going from our midst of Rev. James Justice to labor in Argentina.

Yet it is felt that our interest in missions is not yet what it should be, and therefore we would suggest certain plans for the developing of the needed interest. First, we would urge upon all our people the desirability of taking the Foreign Mission Journal. Then we would advise the formation of mission study classes in connection with our churches. At present we have but one such class, that at Fruitland. We would also urge the formation of Woman's Missionary Society in connection with such churches as do not already have them.

In 1908 this association reported \$233.23 raised for foreign missions. This year we report \$348 04, an increase of \$114.81 or 49 per cent increase on last year. This is highly encouraging. Yet it must not be forgotten, that we undertook to raise \$600.00 We have fallen short of this amount \$252.00. That is, we have raised only 58 per cent of our pledge. This is a consideration which should prevent us from being satisfied with our present attainment and induce us to put forth a greater effort this year in order to raise the \$252.00 that we fell short of our pledge the year just closing. To do this we would emphasize the need of systematic giving. Collections for missions should be taken throughout the year. Where this course is pursued it is found that the churches are most likely to raise the amount pledged and even to go above it. We would also urge that something be given by all of our Sunday Schools for foreign missions and thus the rising generation may be educated to take a due part in this great enterprise which should lie nearer the heart of the Christian man than any other, the bringing of a lost world to the feet of Jesus.
