AKE FOREST, N.

The Three Forks Baptist Association met this day in its <u>eightieth</u> annual session, in Gap Creek Baptist Church. What a Friend We Have in Jesus was sung, after which John Norris led in prayer.

In the abscence of J. H. Farthing, the appointee for the annual sermon, R. C. Eggers, (by appointment of the Moderator) read some verses from the 12 chapter of Luke and led in prayer. "Will You Come?" was sung. Bro. Eggers then announced as his text, Luke 12 chap. 15 verse. Subject: Covetousness. After the sermon, E. M. Gragg led in prayer. Amazing Grace was then sung.

The Moderator called for the church letters that had not been sent to the clerk.

The term of officers having expired, John Norris moved that the present officers, Smith Hagaman for Moderator and W. Y. Perry for Clerk, be elected by acclamation.

The Order of Business as read by the clerk, was adopted.

Geo. Hopkins and G. F. Blackburn of the Ashe Association announced themselves as visitors.

Lee Swift, H. E. Greene and E. F. Sherwood were appointed as Committee on Finance.

The pastor and messengers of this church were appointed a Committee on Religious Exercises.

A motion prevailed to discontinue the com. on Digest of Letters. The Report on Books and Periodicals was read by L. C. Wilson. Discussed by R. C. Eggers and L. C. Wilson. Report adopted.

BOOKS and PERIODICALS

The paramount issue of the Baptists today is information. To know the Bible and its teachings in reference to the world's redemption is to know the greatest thing that can be known.

For Baptists to know what they really and truly do believe is to know more than thousands do know; hence the necessity of a more thorough study of the Book. And that is not all. To fail to read many other good books and tracts published by the Baptists on doctrinal lines and giving information as to the needs of the world is to deprive ourselves of much needed information, without which we can never be what God would have us be, nor what is possible for us

to be, and especially would we emphasize the very great importance of reading the Biblical Recorder, Charity and Children, and "Home and Foreign Field," giving special information on all the departments of our work that must be had if we are prepared for the great task laid upon us in the salvation of the world.

TUESDAY EVENING SESSION

The association reassembled to the sing ing of Nearer My God to Thee. Prayer was offered by Levi Green.

The Report on Temperance was read by W. S. Farthing, after which the report was discussed by W. S. Farthing, L. C. Wilson, Clyde R. Greene and John Norris. Report adopted.

TEMPERANCE

One of the most encouraging features of the temperance and prohibition movement in our State and Nation, is the marvelous change of public sentiment, which resulted in the passage of prohibitory laws in many states and finally, in the enactment of the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution of the United States and its ratification by the requisite number of states to make it a part of the constitutional law of the land. And our Republic, in a legal sense was made, "bone dry" by that act.

We think the results of prohibition have fully justified our lawmakers in enacting it, and our people in ratifying it. Chief Justice Clark and many other Judges testify that crime in N. C. has materially decreased since prohibition became effective. Convictions for murder in the first degree, decreased from 301 during the last five years of license, to 136, during the first five years of prohibition, and we have similar testimonials from other states, and we are confident that the Court records of Watauga County would present us with similar statistics, testifying to the good effects of prohibition.

We feel assured that prohibition has come to stay, for no virtuous and intelligent people, who have realized the blessings of prohibition by actual experience will welcome the return of the open saloon.

But the work of our temperance forces is not completed. The sentiment in favor of prohibition and self-control needs to be strengthened and the laws pertaining to the liquor traffic and the cigarette curse, as well, need to be enforced, and our Christian people as citizens, should aid in this work.

There are other phases of intemperance-other forms of social vice,

that tend to degrade the young manhood and womanhood of our country, that should be combatted by all professed Christians, and especially they should so live and deport themselves that their lives would serve as object lessons of temperance and Godliness to all by whom they are surrounded, for a Christian's life is his greatest asset and is as influential for good, perhaps, as anything he could write or say, and our churches everywhere should maintain the Christian standard of self-control and personal purity for both sexes of their membership alike.

God has placed upon His people the responsibility and duty of caring for the orphan children. We have 527 orphans at the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville, looking to us for support as your own children look to you for the things they need; can we deny them? God, too, has a right to expect it of us; will we be faithful?

Do not say, The Orphanage is in good shape and the children are well cared for. This may be true in a measure, but this will not excuse us from contributing freely to their support. There are other orphan children not in the home. The Thomasville Orphanage is full, and others are begging for admittance. The better the condition of the Orphanage the more children can be cared for.

The monthly cost per child at Thomasville is \$16.43. Six years ago the monthly cost was \$8.35. You see we must increase our offerings to meet the increased cost of living. This association during the last year, has supported the small number of nearly 6 children.

We urge that the pastors and superintendents keep this matter before the people, and that collections be taken weekly for the support of our orphan children. G. P. Sherrill,)

The Report on Pastoral Support was read by F. M. Huggins. PASTORAL SUPPORT

The churches of our association are under the imperative obligato support their pastors. This support should be adequate and sufficient to meet his needs so as to relieve him of secular occupation so that he could give his time and energies to the great calling where with he is called. This is true for the following reasons:

1. The preacher must live as other men live, and it takes money for him as for other men.

2. The increased cost of everything we buy makes this imperative. Former standards of giving do not meet the present needs.

3. This should be done for the sake of the churches. It makes for their development and spiritual growth.

4. It is scriptural. He that gives himself to the ministry should be supported by the churches. This is taught by the apostle Paul.

The committee on Duties of Pastors to Their Churches being absent, the Report from last year's minutes was read in lieu of a new one.

DUTIES of PASTORS to their CHURCHES

The duties of pastors to their churches depend largely on what the churches do for their pastors. The pastor should know the spiritual needs of their churches, but the pastor can never know the spiritual need of his people and get into their hearts until he first goes into their homes. The pastor that does his uttermost to visit all the homes of his people is a true pastor indeed, otherwise he is not.

The pastor should be a teacher of the Word in the homes as well as in the pulpit, every pastor should denounce error, whether taught in the church or on the outside of it. It is the duty of every pastor to do his utmost to lead the sinner to Christ whether private or public. The pastors should study and preach the Word, be instant in season and out of season, reprove, rebuke, exhort with long suffering and doctrine. Christ went before his diciples saying follow me, so should the pastor set the same example before his flock in every good work, and not act as a Pope or Lord over his flock in any wise, he should paint sin as black as hell, and make the path of the just correspondingly bright, he should visit the sick, bury the dead, comfort the bereaved, strengthen the weak, and the distressed, and those that have to baffle with the waves of adversity. In short, no call of distress or need should ever reach the pastor's ears in vain.

EDUCATION

The Baptists of North Carolina have three colleges and fourteen high schools in their system of education. These schools are valued at \$1,234,665, and have an endowment of \$729,156. One hundred eighty-two teachers instruct three thousand, four hundred fifty-six students. Among these we find 100 ministerial students.

The urgent need of our schools is enlargement. Not one is able to care for those who seek admission. The Baptisis of the state must meet the demand with their means.

Our system of schools is essential for the training of our future leaders. If we fail in this, our cause is in peril. There is nothing so effective in our religious life as trained leaders. We are suffering today for the want of intelligent leadership.

The state is providing six months of school for the children. When the state does this, better qualified leaders are demanded of us. What will be the effect if we fail? The challenge has been given. Are we able to meet it?

The danger point in our educational system is the teacher. We advise our people to find out what the teacher is. The silent influence of the teacher may make or unmake character before we are aware. The teacher is the important thing.

Never, in all of the history of our country was every denomination so arroused to the obligations laid upon them as they see it, as now.

Let us not forget that the world's eye is upon N. C. That God is looking this way and expects something at our hands. The time has come when the world is willing to hear what Baptists believe and accept what they believe.

HOME MISSIONS

FOREIGN MISSIONS

When the Master commanded the disciples to go to every nation throughout all the world, He did not fail to give them a definite task.

1. They were to preach the gospel; this must be done.

The gospel may be briefly stated: It is the story of the redemption of lost men through the atoning death or shed blood of Jesus Christ, there is no other remedy. He did not give that to angels, He committed the gospel to His saved people.

It does seem there has never been such an effort made to give the

world the gospel, since the days of the apostles, as has been made through the year 1920. This year will long be remembered.

Our great Secretary Love with others have just made a tour of the world, making a study of the situation in every land, blazing out the way for us.

Our own Drs. Love, Truit, Gambrel and Mulens have just crossed the waters and are now in London confering with our English Baptists and our Baptist brethren from every nation under heaven, as far as possible. God has put into the hearts of the Southern Baptist people a spirit of liberality, never before heard of, not only of money, but of the many lives, yes hundreds of them, who have laid themselves on the altar saying: "Here am I send me."

Just a few days passed there was a farewell service held in Texas for young men and women going to distant lands to spend their lives.

Surely the kingdom is coming. The prospects are as bright as the promise of our Lord Jesus Christ. Our association has made advances never before heard of.

Let thanks giving and praise go up to God from every heart.

PASTORAL SUPPORT

We cannot escape the responsibility, nor ought we to try, to support our old Ministers who have given their lives to preaching the gospel of Christ. Many of them have labored without money and without price, traveling long distances, and exposed to all sorts of weather. Simple justice demands that we should take care of them in their declining days.

Yet Baptists have been derelict in this responsibility. Other denominations have seen the necessity of helping their retired ministers but Baptists have been slow to do their duty in this regard. If it is the fort of wisdom for the government to pension its retired soldiers, how much more should we stand by the Cross "who have labored long and true." If the farmer does not cast away his old horse after a long period of service, but provides food and shelter in his declining days, how much more is it the duty of Baptists to support their old ministers.

Baptists are now working up to the necessity of this benevolent Christly ministry. We now have a Board of Ministerial Relief located at Dallas, Tex., With Dr Wm. Lunsford, as Secretary. This is an arrangement by which the young preacher as well as the old, may make provision for his declining days. The denomination pays 80% of the fund, while those who secure the benefits of it pay only 20%. Every young preacher has in this an opportunity to provide for himself and family in old age.

We recommend that the churches take collections for Old Ministers Relief at Christmas time, or some other, each year, and that the preachers of the association write Dr. Wm. Lunsford of Dallas, Tex. for information about the Board of Ministerial Reilef, and that they avail themselves of the opportunity afforded.

Let us obey that divine injunction: "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it."

We know of nopplace so fitted for this training as the Sundayschool. We are proud of the advancement of the Sunday-school work, but we feel that there should be further advancement in this work.

WOMAN'S WORK

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Three Forks Association made its first report to the association in 1914.

Year by year our interest in Mission work has increased, and has shown it self by greater activity and larger gifts.

We have now eight societies and two Sunbeam Bands with a mem-

bership of about 150, three Woman's Missionary societies having been organized the past year.

Our contributions to the regular objects of our work for the past year are as follows:

The annual meeting of the Union was held at Cove Creek, Sept. 16, 1919. A Beautiful spirit of consecration and devotion was manifest through the entire session, and Prayer was emphasized as being the great power that would make the 75 Million Campaign a success.

The Southern Union took as their quota \$15,000,000 of the 75 Million Campaign, and the North Carolina Union was apportioned 1,100,000 but our quota was over subscribed, total pledges to date being 2,167,330 dollars.

The W. M. U. pledge of the Three Forks Association for five years in eight churches is 4,159,15 and the pledge of the women not members of societies in these churches is 2,164,22.

Our Cor. Sect. said in her report to the annual meeting of the State W. M. U. that "Never before has the value of our great W. M. U. program of prayer, study, training, and giving been so clearly shown as during the campaign.

It was the Missionary Societies who supplied the workers; it was the Churches where we have societies which most easily raised their campaign quotas and went far beyond. It was the women of our societies who made the most liberal pledges and reported them most promptly; and it is these same women that we must look to to complete the task of enlisting others in kingdom service, and to aid in the great evangelistic campaigh upon which we are entering.

The Mobile School held at Cove Creek in July was a great success and the Union is indebted to Mrs. I. G. Greer for her splendid service rendered in teaching the Woman's Missionary Union Manual. Nine out of a class of 19 took the examination and received their certificates with seal.

We desire to express our grateful appreciation for the help extended to us by the pastors and moderator of the association, and brother M. A. Adams, our associational missionary, and we ask for their continued support.
