84th Annual Session

THREE FORKS BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

CONSTITUTION

The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union and duly sent to represent them in the association, who on producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to their seats. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates, the ministers being members ex-officio.

2 In the letters from the different churches is to be expressed their members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed by letter, excommunicated and dead since last association.

3 The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they have any special power over the churches. They shall not infringe any internal right of any church in the union.

4 The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk who shall be chosen annually by the suffrage of the members present

5 New churches, or any regular Baptist church of Christ being legally dismissed by letter by any sister association, upon application by letter and delegates, shall be admitted into our union.

6 Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the association.

7 Every query presented by any member in the association shall be once read, and before it is debated, the moderator shall put it to vote, and if there shall be a majority for it being debated, it shall be taken into consideration and be debated, but if there shall be a majority against it, it shall be withdrawn.

8 Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

o The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of their proceedings. The best method for accomplishing this purpose shall be at the direction of the future associations.

10 We think it absolutely necessary that we should have an associational fund for defraying the expense of the same.

raising and supporting of which we think it to be the duty of each church in the union to contribute annually such sums as they shall think proper and send it by their delegates to the association. The money thus raised shall be deposited in the hands of a treasurer, appointed by the association, who shall be accountable for the same. He shall pay the money out from time to time as the association may

- 12 The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected (if for his services. needs be) and signed by the moderator and clerk before the associ-
- 13 Amendments to the plan or form of government may be made ation rises. at any time by a majority of the association when they deem it necessary, by giving the churches twelve months notice.
 - 14 The association shall have power:

To provide for the general union of the churches

To endeaver to preserve a chain of union amongst the churches.

To give the churches the necessary advice in matters of dificulty.

To inquire into the cause why the churches fail to represent themselves at any time in the association.

To appropriate the money contributed by the churches for an associational fund to any purpose they may think proper.

Shall have power to withdraw from any church in their union who shall violate the rules of this association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.

To correspond with sister associations.

To invite any Baptist brethren in the ministry to a seat in the association, who may be present at the time of their sitting.

To adjourn the association to any future time and place they may think proper and most convenient to the churches in the union.

Rules of Decorum

- I The association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- Only one person shall speak at a time who shall rise from his seat and address the moderator. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by any except the moderator, till he is
- 3 He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on done"speaking. the person who spoke before him so as to make remarks on his steps failings or imperfections, but shall fairly state the matter as he can

so as to give his views or ideas.

- 4 No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the association without liberty obtained from it.
- 5 No person shall rise and speak more than three times to any one subject without liberty from the association.
- 6 No member shall have liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same or whispering in the time of public speaking.
- 7 No member shall address another in any other appellation than that of brother.
- 8 The moderator shall not interrupt any menber in, or prohibit him from speaking till he gives his light on the subject except he break the rules of this decorum.
- o The names of the several members of the association shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as often as required by the asso.
- to The moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as any other members, provided the chair be filled. He shall not vote unless the association be equally divided.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS

Reading has much to do with one's thinking. Thinking determines largely the actions and actions produce character. Therefore, our reading material should be selected with great care. In the selection of literature for the home, the development of all sides of the individual should be kept in mind; the industrial, social, political and religious. None of these should be neglected if we are looking for-

ward to an intelligent citizenship and to a well developed allrounded church membership. The activities of the church will depend very much on the individual member. But as the strength of an army lies largely in its leadership, so the larger work of the kingdom, likewise depends very much on the dnowledge and wisdom of its leadership.

The reading of the denominational paper is a thing sadly neglected in this association, and we believe the pastors have the key to this situation. Therefore, we recommend that the pastors read and encourage their churches to read the following papers:

The Biblical Recorder for information about every activity of the

Baptists of our state.

The Home and Foreign Fields for information about our Home

and Foreign Mission work. Charity and Children, to keep us in touch with our benevolent work, and for the children of the homes, we heartily recommend Kind Words, Boys' Weekly, Girls' Weekly, and Child's Gem, all of the last named may be had from the Baptist Sunday School Board.

More good books should be read by our people. The Bible should have first place, then each pastor should be able to suggest books to meet the needs of his people.

Total raised for all Objects by 188 Missionaries, \$475,613.10 The State Board of Missions was established about 94 years ago-There were only about 15,000 Baptists of all races in N. C. at that time. Now there are nearly if not quite 340,000 white Baptists alone in the State.

Churches were planted in territory which had hitherto been destitute of Baptist preaching. Many of the most efficient churches in N. C. were constituted and fostered by State Missions.

While much has been done for our people for which we are grateful to God and rejoice, yet there is about one-half of our population who are not even nominal Christians. These should be evangelized because of what it will be worth to them, because of what it will make them worth to the State and because they are needed in the work of the Kingdom.

We need the co-operation of all our people in the work of State Missions. Our Ministers should preach Missions, our singers should sing missions and every Christian should talk for missions, should pray for missions and should pay to missions, for as long as children are born in the world in a state of sin and needing to be clothed in the righteousness of Christ, Christian Missions will be needful. HOME MISSIONS

The purpose of a report should be to give information to the people. With this desire in mind the following is submitted. The Home Mission Board has a more varied task than is generally known

The co-operative mission work is its outstanding feature. By this is meant the combination of forces and resources of Southern Baptists with those of the states that are not able to care for the mission work in their own borders. The Evangelistic department sends out a force of Gospel preachers and singers to hold meetings in both towns and country-sides. Through these workers thousands are brought to Jesus. Through its Country Church Survey the Board seek information that will enable it to render country churches the most

efficient help. The foreign problem is becoming more acute year by year, but the Home Board is making faithful effort to meet foreigners at the ports and give them the Gospel and a helping hand. The Negro population is rapidly increasing and along therewith the Board is increasing its efforts to be a blessing to them. The Indian situation is also becoming more important and the need that we address ourselves to this situation with more dilligence is imperative. The Mountain School work still holds a large place in the Board's plans, as the efficiency and worthwhileness of of the work increases. The work in Cuba and Panama is encouraging and constantly demonstrates the wisdom of the efforts made in these places. The Home Board is doing a very worthy and Christlike work among the soldiers sailors and marines of the late world war. Through its Church Extension Department the Board is aiding needy congregations to build houses of worship. After many years of delay the Home Board is now giving thought and effort to maintaining a splendid hospital at El Paso, Texas.

This is merely a mention of the phases of the work the Board is doing. Each phase is promising and hopeful.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptists are under the imperative and inescapable obligation to give the gospel of Jesus Christ to the world. "Ask of me and I will give thee the heathen for thy inheritance, and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." Ps. 2: 8. Go ye, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Matt. 28: 19, 20. "Ye shall be my witnesses both in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and unto the uttermost parts of the earth" Acts 1: 8. "The Holy Spirit said Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them.' Then, when they had fasted and prayed and laid their hands on them, they sent them away " Acts 13: 2, 3. Whosoever . hall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call upon him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how they hear without a preacher? and how shall they preach, except they be sent? Rom. 10: 13,-15.

In addition to the command of God, the imperativeness of Missions inheres in the very nature of the Christian religion. When Andrew found the Messiah, he was impelled by his new experience to go out in search for his brother, Simon Peter, "and he brought him to Jesus." Paul said in explanation of his great zeal as a missionary: "The love of Christ constraineth us."

In accordance with the teaching of God's word, Southern Baptists launched their great fore'gn mission enterprise, and from the very beginning the Divine blessing has been upon it. Great advancement has been made since the 75 Million campaign. Four years ago we had 328 Missionaries, now we have 636. Then we had 627 native

today we have 2820. Churches have increased by a gain of 386: church membership by a gain of 53.669. There have been over 40000 baptisms on the foreign fields, which is nearly as many members as we had four years ago after 75 years of labor. The members of Sunday Schools and attendance have practically doubled in this period. Our schools and colleges have increased by 284, with a greatly increased attendance. Then we were doing work in 9 nations. Today we have mission work in 16 nations. Our old Missionary fields are Mexico, Brazil, Uraguay, Argentina, Chile, Japan, China, Africa and Italy. Our new fields are Spain, lugo-Slavia, Hungary, Roumania, Russia, Palestine, and Siberia. In all these countries the field is white unto the harvest, and the golden grain is ripe and falling. The call is for more missionaries and better equipment.

The Foreign Mission is today forcing a great debt. This debt is due to the falling off of the pledges to the 75 million campaign. It is not due to plunging or wild financing on the part of the Board. Repeated curtailment of the work has been made

It is urged that all pay their pledges to the 75 Million and thus release the Board, and help to send out those who have volunteered.

We should also support Foreign Missions by our prayers and by special gifts.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday School is not a work separate or apart from the chuch but is in part the teaching service of the church.

It is no longer looked upon as a place for children only, but many fathers and mothers find pleasure and profit in attending it whereas previously they took no interest. We feel that the Sunday school has made great progress in many ways during the past year.

Some of our churches have built Sunday-school rooms, others have provided curtains, and further, many are using Bible helps in studying the lessons, such as Peloubet's Notes, Baptist Teacher, Points for Emphasis by Moore, all of which are very helpful.

We think there has been an increase in attendance during the last year, but there still remains much to be done as there is at least one third the members in the churches that do not attend the Sunday-school, this is a great handicap.

We have yet to see a live Sunday-school with a dead dragging song service, there fore we recommend:

I That every Sunday-school have one singing school taught each

year.

2 That every available force be used to increase the attendance.

3 That every teacher secure and use good Helps such as the above named.

4 That the teachers in each church meet one night in each week to study the lesson together.

You will observe I have left off the odd cents when less than 5octs and made it another dollar when 50 cents or more, and when it does not come out even in the division this way I have in most instances added a dollar to what would be one fourth. PASTORAL SUPPORT

Our pastors are not able to give all their time to the work, therefore our churches suffer. Let us relieve our pastors in order that the spiritual wants of our people may be supplied. We have made some progress but we have not kept pace with the demands of the time.

DUTIES of PASTORS to THEIR CHURCHES

There is no responsibility possibly more farreaching in its character than those of a pastor. To point out the obligations that he is under would be no little task.

To visit the sick, bury the dead and bring to bear by individual and personal contact such influence as will inspire his people in every good word and work means much.

"Preach the Word; be instant in season out of season; reprove rebuke with all longsuffering and doctrine," is the Divine injunction: To indoctrinate his people in the fundamental doctrines of our faith is laid upon every pastor.

And then to be able to enlarge the vision of his people and give inspiration in the cause of missions—in the salvation of a lost world, is a glorious task.

Enlistment, enlargement is the watchword of the hour in the salvation of a lost world. And this can never be accomplished by indifference on the part of the pastor.

If a church is ever waked up to its obligation the pastor must be aroused. "And they shall all see eve to eye when the Lord shall bring again Zion," was the warry of the prophet as he looked down the ages and beheld the enlargement of the Kingdom of our Lord.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is necessary if the church is to continue to be progressive and efficient. Ignorance is one of the greatest enemies the Christian church ever had.

The church cannot maintain its rightful place in the progress of the times unless its leaders are well trained. Our Baptist schools and colleges are the Training Camps for our leaders. Ninety per cent. of our active church workers come from denominational schools. This fact justifies the recognition and support of our Schools and Colleges.

Although we need more outstanding leaders, leaders alone do not make strong churches. A State is great in proportion to the character, intelligence and loyalty of its citizens. So the Baptist Church,

owing to the nature of its organization, is great in proportion to the character, intelligence and spirituality of its laymen. A very small percent of our church members ever go to High schools and Colleges. If our churches are to be strong we must educate the masses in Christian living.

Your committee offers the following suggestions: First, that the parents be more diligent in teaching the Bible to their children: "And these words which I command thee this day, shall be upon thy heart: and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shall talk of them when thou sittest in thy house." Second, that we insist that Public school teachers shall be men and women of good habits and high moral character. Third, that our Sunday-school teachers be more efficient. Fourth, that young people be given more opportunity to do active church work.

All Christian Education should center around the fundamental doctrines of the Bible.

MINISTERIAL RELIEF

The nature of the work of a minister debars him from entering the field of business in any way to the extent that he may lay by enough wealth to sustain him and his wife in their declining years when he is no longer able to bear the burdens of a pastor.

Men do not enter the ministry for a financial gain. With few exceptions the salary of the minister is small. Only enough to meagerly supply his present needs. If he should attempt to make money out of the ministry, experience shows that his usefulness as a pastor is

greatly diminished. Disaster usually follows the preacher who seeks a personal fortune.

With these facts before us it becomes our indispensible Christian duty to care for the men who have given the strength of their manhood in service to us. The minister's life work earns for him a respectable living in his old days. He is not a charitable object, but we owe him for services rendered

This is a debt that the Baptists of Three Forks Association have not been paying. Only seven out of thirty five churches have contributed directly to ministerial relief during last year. These seven churches paid the sum of \$39.38.

We recommend that this phase of our duty be more emphatically put before our people, and that every church take at least one collection for Old Minister's Relief.

ORPHANAGE

No department of our work lies closer to the hearts of our people than does the Orphanage. The only cry of distress that ever comes up from our Orphanage workers is the cry that they cannot receive all who should be admitted. And yet today there are, roundly, 700 children being cared for by the Orphanage. About 150 of these are being given aid in the homes of their mothers. This is a new phase of orphanage work, but not so new that it is not proved to be succeessful. And more and more will this phase of the work be enlarged. No new plan for the support of this work has been made. The Sunday Schools are asked to make an offering once a month, and the churches are requested to make an offering at Thanksgiving. This seems to be a very reasonable plan. Surely if the pastors and Sunday School superintendents would only try, all of our churches would respond to such a plan. Let us try it.

OUR HOSPITAL

The N. C. Baptist Hospital begins its second year of ministry under most favorable conditions. The first year exceeded our highest expectations in the number of patients, in the amount of the charity work, and the extent of the influence and blessings of our great Home of Healing 1400 patients were treated, nearly 200 charity patients came to us from every quarter of the state. With joy we received these and gave them our best. Some went away disappointed, because we could not cure them. Our physicians fail sometimes to diagnose the case, as do all other physicians. Some came too late. Some had incurable troubles. But after all, the record for healing has been wonderful. Surely the good Lord has guided the physician

The percentage of cures has been unusual, for which we rejoice. We believe prayer contributed much toward these results. For the last two months our earnings have equalled our expenses,—a fact which far beyond the expectations of our Board. It was thought this would not be reached in two years. The second year began with the hospital full of patients as far as open. We have 86 available beds,—the fifth floor is being used for graduate nurses because we have no Nurses' Home. We expect to increase the number of patients at least 50% this year. We have 22 pupil nurses. After this year these will largely substitute the number of graduate nurses necessary to run the Hospital which will greatly reduce expenses.

The grounds have been greatly beautified by a splendid coat of grass, shrubery and trees.

We have increased our field of endeavor and added to our efficiency and equipment during the past months.

We need a Nurses' Home. We are deprived of 18 of our best beds because we must keep these nurses on the fifth floor.

We need radium. Many patients come with cancer and other malignant diseases who cannot be cured without radium. \$10,000 will buy us an ample supply. Some good brother who loves the Lord and suffering humanity ought to give us this and bless our people for the next 3000 years.

We thank God for the progress. We thank our people for their support. We pray for your interest and co-operation. Come to us, send your friends to us and tell others about our Home of Healing.

The Association again took up the unfinished report of Associational Betterment. Report amended and adopted.

ASSOCIATIONAL BETTERMENT

- 3 That the Moderator deliver an annual address at the beginning of the session.
- 4 That the Clerk prepare for publication a summary of statistics in comparison with summary of previous year.
 - 5 That we prepare and publish a standing order of business.
 - 6 That we have a digest of church letters.

WOMAN'S WORK

Article II of the Constitution gives a three fold object: 1. To stimulate a broader religious development on the part of Baptist women and girls. 2. To receive and distribute Missionary information.

3. To incourage the earnest, systematic co-operation of women and children in contributing money for missions at home and abroad.

B. Y. P. U.

There are now, according to Secretary Morgan, 1375 B. Y. P. U. organizations in the state, with approximately 50.000 members, an increase of about 300 unions over last year. More than 8,000 study course awards were issued from the Raleigh headquarters.

This trained army of 50,000 young Baptists will wield a tremendous influence upon the future character and work of the denomination

The work throughout the state is encouraging. Shall we stand between our boys and girls until the great procession in training pass them, or shall we urge them to join the ranks and enter the camp of training? This work of the young people is largely a discovering service. It helps the timid members of the church to find themselves and encourages many to offer their lives, their talents and all for definite service in the Master's work.

The B. Y. P. U. work is still in its infancy in the Three Forks Association, there being but 3 unions at present. This is a sad state of

affairs when we think of the great possibilities before us in the field. When pastors, superintendents and all other leaders get behind this work and push, conditions will change and our boys and girls will be enlisted. As a denomination we must train our young people and thus deepen the spirituality and increase the efficiency of our churches.

From this study we see that they are improving some in a financial way, but the spiritual condition is not what it should be.

Eld. Joseph H. Farthing was born Sept. 7, 1851. He was the third son of Eld. A. C. Farthing and a grand-son of Eld. Wm. Farthing, and die! June 7, 1924 at the age of 72 years and 9 months.

Our brother was twice married—first to Miss Ada Y. King—secondly to Miss Carrie Dougherty of Tenn. He left three sons and one daughter by his first wife and one son by his last wife.

Bro. Harrison was born the same year in which Bethel church was constituted, and lived all the years of his life almost under the shadow of the same and certainly under her influence.

In his youth he was not considered immoral, yet nevertheless, in Aug. or Sept. 1866, he saw himself a condemed rebel in God's government, and was enabled by grace divine to trust in Christ for salvation and ever afterward his faith was stayed in Him. He united with Bethel church by experience and baptism Sept. 7, 1866, when he was exactly 15 years old, and lived a devoted member of the same the rest of his life.

A little more than forty years ago our brother commenced preaching among his own people. He extended his labors outwardly, assisted in protracted meetings at other churches and within two years from the time he began work, having given proof of his ministry, he was regularly ordained to the full work of the gospel ministry, Elders J. J. L. Sherwood and A. C. Farthing constituting the leaders of the ordaining Presbytery.

Flung into the ministry with but a lmited education, he so applied himself to reading and studying that he not only acquired a good knowledge of the Bible but became well informed on every phase of a ministers work and on other fields of activity and thought.

The brother's first pastorate was at Beaver Dam church. He was soon called to other churches and while in health, his time was generally full of pastoral work.

During the course of his ministerial life, Bro. Farthing served quite a number of churches in the Three Forks and adjacent Associations, but a short time before his death, on account of failing health, he was compelled to give up all his pastoral work. Bethel church was the last church with which he severed his pastoral relations, and he preached his last sermon, in a sitting posture, to that body six weeks before his death.

Our deceased brother's favorite theme in preaching is expressed by Paul in the first Chap. Romans, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

He believed in all the doctrines of the Baptist denomination and

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advocated them; but he stressed the necessity of the New Birth as the one doctrine of vital importance, and he labored to lead all to an experimental knowledge of the same.

Although our beloved brother in his last sickness was aware of his apporaching dissolution yet he appeared cheerful and resigned. No one ever heard a sigh on groan from him. He has been taken from us for a wise purpose and his life and decease ought to inspire us all with loftier aims in life, especially in the work of the Master's kingdom.

REV. JOSEPH HARRISON FARTHING

It has been my good fortune to know Harrison Farthing during his entire ministerial life. He began preaching when I was but a boy—about 40 years ago. His opportunities for an education in the schools were limited, but he inherited from his distinguished father a fine mind and by close application and hard study during his entire life he amassed a wealth of information and, in the truest sense, he became one of the best educated preachers of his day.

At some time during his long ministerial life he has been pastor of almost every Baptist church in Watauga Co. and numbers of churches in other counties. He had the true shepherd heart, as he went from place to place ministering to the spiritual needs of his people. He easily found his way into their hearts and lives. They trusted him. The least little child was never passed unnoticed by him; in fact many of his sermous were directed specially to them

In all his wide reading—and he drew from every source—the Bible was the great center. He knew it as but few men know it He believed it, he accepted it, he rested upon it as the eternal truth of God, without question or reservation

Every great man has some outstanding characteristics and I unhesitatingly say that I have never known any preacher who so exalted Christ in his sermons as he did. Being a man possessing the most beautiful Christian humility, his consuming passion was that his congregation might see Christ in all his love and beauty, and not himself

Some years ago it was my privilege to hear him preach a series of sermons at Beaver Dam church—eight days I think. The first sermon was great. We felt that it was hardly reasonable to expect the next to be its equal, but possibly it was greater and by the time the third was preached the people were amazed, and each succeeding sermon seemed greater if possible than the one before. It has been my good fortune to hear a number of noted preachers, but I have never

heard anything from any man that equaled that series of sermons. They were products of a great mind, fired by an inspiration that swept speaker and audience into the very holy of holies.

These masterful sermons made such an occasion never to be forgotten by those who heard them.

This may have been duplicated many times in his life, but I have always considered this occasion the climax, perhaps, of his wonderful life.

Harrison Farthing was a great leader of men without assuming to lead. His opinions on theology and church polity were sought by his brethren and usually accepted. He was a theologian of marked ability. He was careful, but never reactionary, progressive in the truest sense. He rejected nothing because it was new, nor accepted anything because it was old; but carefully weighed and measured everything. He was never swept off his feet by the shifting winds of doctrine, but when the skies had again cleared he was still standing on safe ground.

I always think of him as I think of John, the beloved disciple, so close to his Master, tender and compassionate, gentle as a May morning, love the ruling passion of his life. It was his delight to preach to the poor and to comfort the sorrowing everywhere.

When he prayed in the congregation one felt as if he were standing in the very presence of the Saviour and speaking to Him as a man speaks to his friend face to face.

In many ways I consider him the most wonderful preacher I have ever known.

The Afternoon Devotional was conducted by Miss Ruby Cottrel of Boone. The hymn, "My Faith Looks up to Thee" was sung, after which Mrs. Horton led in a prayer of consecration.

Mrs. J. D. Brown of Blowing Rock, Mission Study Superintendent, reported that all societies had been written to, with response from three. This was an increase over last year, only one society having reported a study class last year.

Mrs. Enoch Swift, as Christian stewardship Supt., stressed the fact that all Christians are stewards of God—stewards of the gospel first, then stewards of money. He who is liberal with his money is faithful in all other things.

The recommendations of the Executive Committee were read by Mrs. I. G. Greer as follows:

"It is the recommendation of your Ex. Committee that during the coming year effort be made as never before to interest our young people, not only in our organizations, but first of all in real Christian living. We suggest further that we put every safeguard possible around our young people, and so live before them as to make the Christian life desirable.

"Furthermore we recommend a strengthening of our personal service forces. Helping the poor, like visiting and cheering the sick, was the work of our Master when among men. Let us strive to emulate Him in these as in all other things.

"We recommened that the program recently launched by the Southern Baptist Convention for the year 1925 receive our hearty co-operation in its every detail.

Last and above all else should be prayer and suplication throughout the county, in every society, in the homes, in groups where the few meet for prayer and in the secret places."
