Dog days are definitely over in Wake Forest. Activity on campus is intense. Final touches are being put on Bostwick Hall, completely remodeled for men students this fall. Women students have overflowed the Women's Dormitory and are being housed in the Seminary Manor and a seminary residence on West Avenue. Eighty families are living in Raleigh apartment complexes by way of a negotiated rental arrangement.

Classes begin September 5. Five new teachers, along with a number of adjunctive teachers, join the regular faculty in welcoming another large enrollment of new and returning students.

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The annual Faculty Workshop was held on campus August 28-29.

jump was gotten on a number of academic

projects including a thorough curriculum study.

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The zoning request for the seminary student housing project (100 apartments) was approved unanimously ZONING by the Wake Forest Town Board on August ANNEXATION 10. The official petition for annexation of the newly zoned land, thus adding it to the city limits and making it eligible for sewer and utility services, has been filed and a public hearing on the matter has been set for September 14.

Plans are moving along rapidly for both the subdivision development and the student apartments construction project.

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Totals for student aid of all types are now complete for the

past academic year. During 1977-78 the
STUDENT seminary was able to distribute a total of
\$227,466.00 for aid of all types. While
this amount is gratifying, there were

numerous requests which had to be turned down due to lack of funds.

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
