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PROCEEDINGS

Brown Creek, Oct. 29th, 1920.

The Anson Baptist Association met in its 11th annual session with the Brown Creek Baptist Church Friday, October the 29th, 1920, at 11 A. M.

The introductory sermon was preached by W. J. Russell from the text as found in Matthew 3-8.

G. H. Parker and W. F. Humbert were appointed reading clerks. and the letters from the different churches were read.

The Moderator welcomed Revs. J. M. Page and Bruce Benton of the Pee Dee Association. The Association was organized by electing W. F. Humbert, Moderator; W. A. Gaddy, Vice-Moderator, J. M. Broadaway, Clerk; R. D. Redfearn, Treasurer.

The Moderator appointed G. H. Parker, R. D. Redlearn and W. A. Gaddy committee on order of business. The Association adjourned for one hour. Prayer by J. M. Page.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Association re-assembled at 2 P. M.

Prayer by Marvin Smith; after which the Moderator called the body to order. The committee on order of business made their report, which was adopted.

The report on Aged Ministers Relief was read and spoken to by W. M. Thompson and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON AGED MINISTER'S RELIEF

When Jesus Christ came into this world of suffering and luxury, he came to relieve suffering, and when Jewish hatred and Roman consent, nailed him to the cross, he had appointed man to forward the work of mercy. We see his heart when he said to his disciples "Give them food, for if we send them away empty, they will faint by the way." We are intrusted with a part of this responsibility to our aged ministers. The aged ministers is an honor class in every generation. They preached too much to plough enough to provide for the feeble age. They are laborers who are worthy of ample support. They went out to sow the good news of salvation by theme and song in the highways and hedges, where no gospel bells had been heard. They planted precious truth in the morning and in the evening. They held not their hand until wearing age robbed them of their youthful strength. They are no less ours to love and care for, because they are old and feeble. for many of us are the fruits of their labor. They sung in harvest time but not as the grasshopper, while the ant worked .- "Must Jesus bear the cross alone," "A charge to keep I have, a God to glorify," was their songs, and "Jesus, the light and life of the world" was their theme, and with theme and song, they went to open the door of God's kingdom to men wrecked by sin. We should thrice honor and support them. We should go to see them or write to them and tell them how the kingdom of the Christ has come by their prayers and labors. It is cheap, to say we should contribute of our means, liberally, for their support. They should have more than support. They should know that they are in the arms of a wealthy brotherhood, who will love and provide for them.

The following report on Biblical Recorder was read by Jonah Thomas and discussed by J. M. Page and adopted:

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER

For 87 years the Biblical Recorder has been the organ of North Carolina Baptists. During all this time it has given its influence to the promotion of every department of denominational work. Its columns are used freely by the servants of the denomination who have charge of our institutions and varied enterprises.

The paper is true to its name. It is Biblical in its teachings and records the acts of North Carolina Baptists from week to week. It stands for the truth as Baptists hold and interpret it and is always ready to go to the defence of our great principles when necessity demands it.

But the Recorder is more than a denominational organ. It is a family paper as well. Its columns carry wholesome matter into the family circle. It takes note of current events and publishes a digest of the most important things that occur during the week. News letters from the churches are a very important and helpful feature of the paper and the news note page given in pithy paragraphs the doings of our great Baptist family. The last page of the Recorder is for the home, and great care is taken in selecting matter for this page.

The Recorder is owned by a joint stock company. It was organized at the request of the Convention 20 years ago to own and publish the paper. But while it is under private ownership, a committee of seven appointed by the Convention acts with the seven directors when the election of an editor is necessary. This puts the selection of an editor practically in the hands of the Convention.

The directors found it absolutely necessary to raise the price of the paper on August 1st to \$2.50. They regretted very deeply the necessity which forced them to take this step. But the two alternatives not making expense at \$2.00 a year. Most of the papers raised the price to \$2.50 before the Recorder took this step. The directors promised sacredly that as soon as conditions warrant them in going back to the old price they will do so.

The Recorder management has made a proposition to the churches which will make it possible to keep the price at \$2 per year. If a church will put the Recorder in three-fourths of the resident families and send the name of the one in each family to whom the paper is to the paper will be sent to each individual as at present for \$2.00 per year. If a church finds it more convenient to pay in monthly or quar

terly installments, the management will accept that method of payment.

A good many churches are putting the Recorder in the budget. A collection is taken for the Recorder fund just as is done for State Missions, or any other object, and the paper is sent to the ones whose names are forwarded. If a church shall adopt the budget plan and see that the Recorder goes into 75 per cent of the homes, the subscription price will be \$2.00.

The Recorder is essential to the progress of our work, and it exerts a very wholesome influence in the home. We earnestly urge our churches to accept the liberal offer made by the management and secure the paper at \$2.00 per year.

Southern Baptists have undertaken a great Sunday School program. As one of the features of the 75 million campaign, our Sunday School Board, with campaign workers, have outlined for us a great challenging task; therefore we, in our Association, commit ourselves to the following policies for next year and the year following:

Co-Operation with the Sunday School Department of the State Mission Board is our duty. This Department stands ready at all times to send helpful tracts on practically every phase of Sunday School work. These are absolutely free and can be secured from Secretary, E. L. Middleton, Raleigh, N. C. He will also aid in every possible way in providing Training Schools and Institutes for groups of churches in cities, towns or country. He urges inquiry from every one who has an unsolved Sunday School problem.

Resolved. That we condemn the traffic in Coca-Cola and other cold drinks which are now degrading and destroying the manhood of our boys and young men, and pledge our best efforts to suppress its sale and use.

A very active B. Y.P. U. has been organized at Brown Creek; also one at Polkton, but the latter, just now, is somewhat in a dormant condition.

REPORT ON THOMASVILLE ORPHANAGE

On the 11th of Nov. 1885 the first child was received in the Orphanage. Since that time the number received runs up to 2,000.

On the first of last June, the Orphanage closed a very successful year. There was but little sickness among the 530 children now present.

More dormitories are needed to care for the children. Some months as many as fifty applications are received. Most of them are turned away for lack of room. The high cost of living has hit hard. The cost of supporting a child is \$16.43 a month. However, the Treasurer reported no debt at the end of the year, and so far, no money has expenses.

Funds for the Orphanage from the Sunday School and church should be sent to F. B. Hamerick, Thomasville, N. C. 40 per ct. of

the current funds come through the Sunday School. Last year's Thanksgiving offering was the best it has ever been. It was due to this large offering that no debt has been made. The churches are urged to make a very liberal offering in their Thanksgiving service this year
