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DURHAM ANNOUNCES After more than 24 years of teaching at Southeastern Seminary, John I Durham has

RETIREMENT announced plans to take early retirement in order to pursue a more active career in research, writing, lecturing, and travel, according to President Lolley.

Durham, Professor of Hebrew and Old Testament, is a widely known Biblical scholar, teacher and writer. A B.D. and Th.M. graduate of Southeastern (1959, 1961) and a D.Phil. graduate of Oxford (1963), he began his teaching career at his alma mater on August 1, 1963, and will enter into his vocational redirection July 31, 1987.

In receiving Durham's announcement, Lolley expressed "profound appreciation for John's ministry of teaching as well as the positive influence he has had on so many of our students. He has our prayerful support as he moves into these years of renewal and redirection."
