#### Constitution

ARTICLE 1. This association shall be called the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 2. The primary object of this association is to extend Christ's kingdom at home and abroad.

ARTICLE 3. The association shall be composed of representatives selected by Missionary Baptist churches which have been received.

ARTICLE 4. Each church shall send to the clerk of the association two weeks prior to the convening of the body a letter containing full information concerning the church, using the blank form suggested for this purpose by our state denominational headquarters.

ARTICLE 5. This association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall it have any clerical power over the churches or infringe on any of their internal rights.

ARTICLE 6. The association shall have a moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday school superintendent, and Baptist Young People's Union president. It shall be the duty of Sunday school superintendent and the Baptist Young People's Union president to effect such organization as is necessary to do effective work in the Sunday schools and the Baptist Young People's Unions of the association and to report annually to the association.

ARTICLE 7. The association shall have the right to determine what churches shall be admitted as members of this body.

ARTICLE 8. This association shall have the right to with-draw her fellowsh'p from any church for not complying with her rules, or for violating the orthodox principles of the Gospel.

ARTICLE 9. Each church in the association shall be entitled to three delegates and one additional delegate for each \$10.00 contributed to any of the causes fostered by the denomination.

ARTICLE 10. It shall be the duty of the clerk to have the Articles of Faith and the Constitution printed in the minutes annually. It shall also be the duty of the clerk to send to the clerk of each church, not less than six weeks prior to the convening of the association, the blank form to be used in making up the church's associational letter.

ARTICLE 11. The association shall appoint a Board of Trustees for Sylva Collégiate Institute, consisting of twenty- ne members, seven of who shall constitute a quorum. The first seven to serve one year, the second seven to serve two years, the third seven to serve three years. These trustees are empowered to receive and hold school property for the association; to select teachers, and to attend to such other business as may be necessary for the educational interests of the association. The association shall appoint seven trustees annually and fill all vacancies that occur by resignation or otherwise. Said trustees are required to report annually to the association.

ARTICLE 12. This constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

ARTICLE 13. There shall be an executive committee com-

posed of the moderator and clerk and as many other members as the association may deem wise, which committee shall be elected annually.

#### Recommendation

We, The Tuckaseigee Association in session, at John's Creek Baptist Church, Cowarts, North Carolina, having forty-one churches to constitute our membership, and having more than fifty ordained ministers in our territory, with many of our churches having only once a month preaching and many of our ordained ministers having no work at all, believe it necessary to take some steps in our association whereby our local churches may be more cautious in the ordination of our young men to the ministry with no church in view: Therefore, we recommend:

First, That this Association in session appoint a presbytery consisting of not less than five pastors to sit in session and pass upon the qualifications, advantages and possibilities for pastoral work of any man or church who may desire a young man ordained.

Second, That any man who has been licensed by a local church to the gospel ministry shall preach and exercise his calling where-ever he may desire to do so for a period of not less than two years before he shall be eligible for ordination unless some church shall call him as its pastor.

Third, That the association encourage all young ministers who may be found worthy to make progress and prove themselves capable of spreading the gospel of Jesus Christ throughout our bounds and elsewhere.

Motion that a committee be appointed by the Moderator as follows:

Committees appointed to interpret article 5 of the constitution and pass on the legality of the ordination of Brother G. M. Parker of Cedar Baptist Church. Committee, L. H. Crawford, W. N. Cook, J. E. Brown. Motion passed.

Report on Periodicals and Religious Literature was read and discussed by Rev. R. L. Cook. Report adopted.

#### Biblical Recorder

For more than a hundred years the Biblical Recorder has sought to serve the Baptists of North Carolina and the world. It seeks in a constructive way to comply with the command of the Master to carry the Gospel to every part of the world. Page 5 is set aside in almost every issue for this particular work. The 64 Baptists who compose the stockholders in the Biblical Recorder Pub. Co. are lending every effort to make the Recorder of interest to our people and to instruct them concerning our Baptist work. For a number of years they received no dividend, but they have received, in later years, six per cent on their investment. But for the other interests of the Biblical Recorder Pub. Co., publication of the Biblical Recorder would have been suspended ten years ago.

But the income from rent on the building and other sources have been taken to pay the deficit on publishing the paper. The Christian culture of our future Baptist homes depends, in no small degree, upon the contribution the Biblical Recorder makes to that end.

People are largely influenced by what they read. The Biblical Recorder seeks to bring to our people weekly a summary of our Baptist news, local and general. It seeks to give a Christian and Baptist interpretation to the events of the day. It seeks to record achievements of our schools, churches, Sunday Schools, B. U.'s, W. M. U., and laymen's work. It carries news from our missionaries at home and abroad, and informs the reader of what is being accomplished through h's contributions.

The Home Circle offers help for the development of the spiritual and intellectual needs in every young church member. It seeks to inoculate high ideals in our young people and to be of real help in the development of Christian character. All this means much good for the future generations. Never before was there a time when our boys and girls had greater need for wholesome literature which will instill high ideals, create a desire for pure living, and stimulate them to render unselfish service. The Biblical Recorder seeks to lend aid at this particular point.

The price is \$2.00 a year, or a six months' subscription may be taken for \$1.00. It is very desirable that the circulation be increased to 25,000 as a minimum.

The report on orphanage not being ready, a motion to have the discussion by Bro. I. G. Greer pending the report. Remarks by R. F. Jarrett and D. G. Bryson.

Report on Temperance by J. T. Gribble and read by the clerk, was adopted without discussion.

#### Report On Temperance

In considering this subject, your committee has elected to discuss it in a general way as applied to two or three of the present day evils most prevalent in our land. The object of such a discussion is not to minimize the many other evils associated with this question, but to attempt to magnify the evils of the two or three basic intemperance which lead to all the other evils.

An interpretation of the word Temperance is moderation and another is self control and it is in the light of these interpretations that your committee desires to deal with this subject.

FIRST. May we consider the use of intoxicating liquors. There are two courses open to us to deal with this evil. One is by legislative acts and the other by an educational program to convince and convert the young people to the idea that there is no evil so distructive to all the finer and better qualities of man than the use of alcohol in any form, and when we become con-

vinced as a christian people that the use of alcoholic beverages is as dangerous and destructive as hell itself, then we shall be in a frame of mind and soul to earnestly teach it to our children and our neighbor's children. It is a fact that upon the fact that John Barley Corn was out-lawed and we need not fear. Legislative acts are easily modified or replaced, but a truly converted soul is stable. Herein lies the hope and security of the temperate life.

SECOND. Closely allied to intoxication is gluttony. Again we would suggest that the educational program inaugurated as to alcohol be broadened to cover the evils resulting from gluttonous habits which are greatly stimulated and encouraged by the use of intoxicating beverages.

THIRD. As a result of the indulgence in the two evils just named, we have debauchery. Here too, we should resort to the task of faithfully teaching by precept and example that honor, integrity, virtue, modesty, purety and uprightness of heart and mind cannot be obtained by engaging in or countenacing intoxication, gluttony or debauchery in any sense and that these along with hoards of other evils allied with them, or as dangerous and destructive as the deadly poisons against which they are daily warned.

Report on Foreign Missions, Read by T. F. Deitz, as follows:

#### Report On Foreign Missions

By Foreign Missions we spread the news of the Gospel of the Son of God to and in the region beyond. This is as much the command of Jesus today as it was 1900 years ago. When he said to his 12 deciples on a mountain in Gallilee, All powers in heaven and in earth is given to me. Go ye therefore into the world and preach the Gospel to all nations. And now nearly two thousand years has gone into the past and still an unfinished task is before us. What will we do about it? Our association's last record is shameful, when we see from the minutes of our last session that nearly six thousand church members gave the paltry sum of \$19.40 in a whole year to assist in carrying out the Saviors greatest command to his followers. The challenge of Jesus to his churches is "Go and I will go with you to the end of the task." Do we accept the challenge? This is his only plan, he will make no others.

We command and insist that every pastor in this association cooperate with the Foreign Mission Board at Richmond, Va., in this plan and efforts to stimulate and revive the mission spirit in the church to which they minister and preach more on the world wide mission causes. What mission spirit or interest we now have is doomed to decay if we don't preach it, teach it, and practice it.

Report on Home Missions called for and a motion made that Bro. H. T. Hunter prepare a report and turn in to the clerk.

Report on State M ssions, read by I. K. Stafford as follows:

#### Report On State Missions

From its beginning, the State Mission program has amply justified itself because of the service it has rendered and the permanent and fruitful work it has accomplished. If we would have a strong Home and Foreign Mission program, we must keep the home base strong. The outposts must depend on the home base for support and reinforcements. State Missions is the Great Commission localized "Beginning at Jerusalem." The program of State Missions has, from the beginning in North Carolina been one of preaching, teaching, and training. Mr. M. A. Huggins has the general oversight of all our Baptist work in North Carolina being the General Executive Secretary and Treasurer of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention. Under his wise and efficient leadership the work is going forward in a remarkable way. We are deeply indebted to him for the progress that has been made in reducing debts and reviving the morale and spirit of the Baptist of North Carolina. If our people will share the increased blessings that have been bestowed upon us the success of State Missions is assured. The work of preaching the Gospel in the State Mission program is in the hands of missionary pastors who are laboring in needy fields. There were fifteen new missionary pastors added the first of the year. Rev. M. O. Alexander came to the assistance of Brother Huggins and a worker among the negroes was also added. The Sunday School work which is the teaching program is in charge of Mr. Perry Morgan assisted by Mr. L. L. Morgan. These two brethern are doing their best to boost Sunday School work in our state and have made consistent progress.

The training activities known as the B. T. U. (Baptist Training Union) is directed by Miss Winnie Rickett assisted by Miss Mabel Starnes. Our work is in good hands and needs only the support of the local churches to be made a success.

#### Needs

There are many weak churches and groups of churches that need assistance to secure an efficient pastor that he might lead them to become self supporting. In many instances a small investment would yield large returns in souls saved and support for the Kingdom of God. We ought to be taking the Gospel to the other nationalities in our midst. Our State can rise no higher morally or spiritually than we lift these strangers within our gates. There are seven nationalities that are rather numerous in our state os follows: Indians, Negroes, Jews, Greeks, Italians, Chinese, and Russians. How we do need to take the Gospel to these! Almost every foreigner plans to go back home sometime. Why not give him the Gospel and make a good citizen of him while here and then when he goes home let him be a missionary for our Christ?

#### Recommendations

That we set apart the month of October as State Mission month and seek to enlist each church and Sunday School in the observance of State Mission Day at which time they take an offering for State Missions and send to Mr. M. A. Huggins, Raleigh, N. C., designated for State Missions.

That we urge our churches to adopt a budget for the coming year and take an every member enrollment for the financial support of Kingdom enterprises both at home and abroad.

That we urge the churches to adopt some plan to help care for the Mills Home since that does not come in the items of the Cooperative Program.

That the churches be asked to take an offering on Mother's Day for our Baptist Hospital at Winston Salem, N. C.

Report on Stewardship, read by E. H. Stillwell.

#### Report Of Stewardship

"Will a man rob God? Yet ye rob me? But ye say wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings." That we are stewards of all that we possess is evident because we brought nothing into this world and it is certain that we can take nothing out. "The earth's is the Lords and the fullness thereof, the world and they that dwell therein." We not only owe God the tithe, but we are obligated for the proper use of all our substance. Thus we are

stewards of all our property and will surely be held to account for the use we make it. It is not ours, but merely entrusted to us for a short time to be used for his glory and for the advancement of his kingdom, and for the welfare of mankind. The real test of stewardship is in the way we make use of our material possessions. These should be decidated to God and we should seek his guidance in the best way to use them. No man can go wrong in the matter of stewardship who honestly seeks His will in the proper use and investment of his goods. The good steward will not stop at giving the tenth, but will strive to use every dollar in such a way as will best prove a worthy stewardship. This will insure the Gospel, the expansion of His Kingdom, the support of charity, the dissemination of wholesome learning, the relief of suffering, and the welfare of His people everywhere.

But we are not only stewards of our material blessings, we are stewards of our talents and of our capacities. We are undoubtedly responsible to God for the right use of our mental gifts, our spiritual powers—in the word, our talents. This is as real as that of our material possessions, and possibly even more sacred. Therefore, "having gifts differing according to the grace that is given to us, whether prophecy, let us prophesy according to the proportion of our fath: or ministry, let us give ourselves to ministering; or he that teacheth, to his teacher; or he that exhorteth, to exhortation." Moreover, we are stewards of our influence and of our personality. Woe to him who causes his weaker brother to stumble!

Then, too, we are stewards of our time. Most assuredly we shall be held accountable for the way in which we are entrusted with time as we are entrusted with money and with talents. We should value time highly and not squander it, for time is the stuff that life is made of. We have only one life to live. We shall not pass this away again. Time is a sacred trust and the wrong use of it will forfeit our right to length of days.

Finally, we are stewards of God's truth. This is indeed the most important and most sacred trust of all. We are entrusted with God's message to mankind. What shall we do with it? Shall we rightly divide the word of truth? God has no other plan. We are his messengers; we are his mouthpiece. Shall we prevert the Word? Shall we twist the Truth? Shall we withhold the Gospel? Then we shall be unworthy stewards of his.

In conclusion, we quote from the report of the State Promotion Committee in urging "that earnest effort be made to build up in every church member a sense of stewardship. And as an outlet for it we would urge that tithing be presented as the minimum standard for all Christians, and let our aim be a stewardship revival in every Baptist church in the Tuckaseigee Association.

Bro. T. F. Deitz spoke of the report on Foreign Missions.

Bro. J. E. Brown read the report on Ministerial Relief as follows:

#### Report On Ministerial Relief

Our board has done well since its foundation in this great phrase of denominational work. The field has grown larger and the needs more pressing and we should not grow slack in our support of this object because those veterans who come in early in the day and labored in the heat need our help now, when they are far spent.

The great work of supplement service to pastors in fields not able to support them is a worthy one, but the difference between the changing need our veteran preachers and the aid they are receiving calls for a more religious response than many of our present churches have even considered. The call to the Christian ministery was accepted by the best brain and brawn of our fathers' day. Men who could have gone into other fields of service and amassed fortunes are in want today because they chose to be Bapt'st preachers. They have served bravely,, and without a murmer they accept their condition of life with as much calmness as they did the sacred call. Think of those fourteen hundred of our ministers now partially or totally unable to serve as active pastors who served through their active years in churches that would not pay them enough to live on much less than a little to start a saving for age and days of helplessness.

He called them to preach, They honored the call. What are we doing? Can we leave them now neglected and in want as a penalty for having been our pastors? God forbid such. They loved Him and His. We must not prove false to such a sacred cause.


