

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

# Constitution and By-Laws

Randolph Baptist Association

Revised: October, 1990

## ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this body shall be known as the Randolph Baptist Association. It may hereafter be referred to as the Association.

## ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 1. This Association is a self-determining Baptist body, created and sustained by the churches affiliated with her and responsible to them through their Messengers.

Section 2. The purpose of the Randolph Baptist Association is to enable member churches, individually and together, as they endeavor to enlarge, strengthen, and enrich the fellowship of God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to foster cooperation in the programs and ministries of this Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, thereby fulfilling the Commission of Jesus Christ as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.

## ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches within the area of the Association. A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an Annual Report to the Association, elects Messengers to attend the Associational Meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be sole judge of it's membership and may receive churches, according to the Constitution and By-laws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire.

Section 3. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association over a period of two years shall be contacted by the Credentials Committee of the Association to determine the intentions of the church regarding it's desire to remain in the Association. In the event the church does not respond to the efforts of the Credentials Committee, the church will be considered as having chosen to withdraw from the Association.

Section 4. Any church that has departed from Baptist faith and practices and has failed to abide by the provision of the Constitution and By-laws of the Association, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee. Such church upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee and a vote of the Association shall be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such actions have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the Meetings of the Association.

Section 5. Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make a written request to the Credentials Committee of the Association at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October), for examination and recommendation to the Association. A church (or mission) is first received into the watch care of the Association. Upon completion of one year in watch care relationship, a church may be received into full membership of the Association by a recommendation of the Credentials Committee. There must be a vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the Associa-

tional Meeting for petitioning church (or mission) to become a regularly affiliated member church of the Association.

Section 6. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except in an advisory nature, and this by invitation only.

#### **ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS**

Section 1. The Associational meetings shall be composed of Messengers elected by the affiliated churches according to the plan. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) Messengers, including the pastor, and one additional Messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above one hundred in its resident membership, but not to exceed ten (10) such Messengers. The Director of Missions and General Officers shall be Messengers in all Associational Meetings.

Section 2. The Associational Meetings will be held as follows:

- (1) The Fall Meeting shall meet on two days, the week following the third Sunday in October.
- (2) The Winter Meeting shall meet in January. All Mission Performance Directors shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the Messengers at this meeting. In order for the Messengers to have adequate time to consider the nominees for Program Directors, the Nominating Committee will mail a copy to the Messengers two weeks before the January Meeting. They shall be Director-Elect until October 1 when their tenure of service begins.
- (3) The Spring Meeting shall meet in April. All General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the Messengers at this April Meeting. This will give each person selected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. In order to give Messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, a copy will be mailed to them two weeks before the Spring Meeting.
- (4) The Summer Meeting shall meet in late July or early August. The Associational Budget for the new year, beginning on October 1 and ending on September 30 of the following year, shall be presented by the Finance Committee for approval by the Messengers of the Association. In order to give the Messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee shall mail copies to the Messengers two weeks before this Summer Meeting.

Section 3. Other meetings of the Association shall be held when called by the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions. Before calling a special meeting, a notice of at least two weeks shall be given to the Messengers, with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. No other business can be considered. A quorum of fifty (50) Messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

#### **ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES**

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three (3) trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected in the Spring Meeting in April by the Messengers of the Association. The Nominating Committee will present nominees to the Messengers with the privilege of other nominees from the body. Prior approval and consent to serve shall have been received from a prospective nominee before placing his name in nomination before the body.

Section 3. The officers of this Association shall serve from October 1 through September 30 of the following year. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall serve no more than two years in succession.

Section 4. Duties of the Officers:

- (1) The Moderator shall preside over all Meetings of the Association, and fulfill such duties as required upon the presiding officer of this Associational body.
- (2) The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.
- (3) The Clerk-Treasurer shall fulfill the following duties:
  - a. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of all the Association Meetings. The Clerk shall distribute the Uniform Church Letter forms to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. The Clerk shall compile the reports and statistics of the churches and issue a book of minutes as soon as is practical after the Fall Meeting.
  - b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at each Quarterly Meeting, plus a year end report at the Fall Meeting.
- (4) The trustees shall have the authority to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of the elected trustees shall be authorized by the Association in its meetings.
- (5) In the event the Office of the Moderator of the Association shall become vacant, the Vice-Moderator shall immediately become the Moderator for the unexpired term of office without any further action by the Association.
- (6) The vacancies occurring in the office of Vice-Moderator and other General Officers, except Moderator, will be nominated by the Nominating Committee at the next Association Meeting.

## **ARTICLE VI - MISSION PERFORMANCE ORGANIZATION**

Section 1. The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches for the promotion and training of the various phases of their work.

Section 2. The Directors of these organizations shall be: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Stewardship Director, Family Ministries Director, Christian Life Director, Pastoral Ministries Director and Seminary Extension Director.

Section 3. These Organizational Directors shall be elected at the Winter Meeting, (January), or no later than the Spring Meeting (April), for a term of three years. The Directors shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The Directors shall assume their duties on Oct. 1, and serve through September 30, or until their successors are elected. They will be Directors-Elect in the Winter Meeting and will have the privilege of training, planning and enlistment of their Council members until October 1.

## **ARTICLE VII - ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE**

Section 1. The Administrative Committee is composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, Chairman of Communications, and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. If there are major decisions to be made between the Quarterly Associational Meetings, the Administrative Committee will act in behalf of the Association, and will report the actions to the next Quarterly Meeting.

Section 3. The Administrative Committee will meet as needs arise between the Quarterly Meetings.

### **ARTICLE VIII - ASSOCIATION COUNCIL**

Section 1. The Associational Council shall be composed of the General Directors of all Mission Performance Programs, the Associational Officers, the Associational Staff, and the Chairman of Finance, Strategy and Communication, and others deemed necessary to attend the Council in planning the work of the Association.

Section 2. The Director of Missions will serve as the Chairman of the Council. Other officers will be elected in their meetings, such as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.

Section 3. The Associational Council will conduct at least six meetings per year, at least once every other month. The time and place for the meetings will be set.

Section 4. The purpose of the Council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the Association, and evaluate the progress toward fulfilling the plan. Also, the Council gives guidance to the work of the Director of Missions.

### **ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES**

Section 1. The Association shall have the following Committees with terms of office extending three years from the time duties of the office are assumed on October 1 of each year. To be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the April Meeting:

- a. Annual Meetings - By-Law VI, Section 1
- b. Finance - By-Law VI, Section 5
- c. Nominating - By-Law VI, Section 7
- d. Properties - By-Law VI, Section 8
- e. Credentials - By-Law VI, Section 3
- f. History - By-Law VI, Section 6
- g. External Relations - By-Law VI, Section 4
- h. Strategy - By-Law VI, Section 10
- i. Communication - By-Law VI, Section 2
- j. Search - By-Law VI, Section 9
- k. Personnel - By-Law VI, Section 11

Section 2. Each Committee nominated by the Nominating Committee will begin serving on October 1, and will serve for three years with the terms rotating, so that only 1/3 of the members are elected each year.

Section 3. Each Committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons from every area of the Association.

Section 4. Each Committee should meet once each quarter to fulfill its duties.

### **ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS**

The Constitution may be amended at the Fall Meeting of the Association, (October), by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present, provided the proposed Amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Fall Meeting and voted upon on the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

## ARTICLE XI

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority of the Messengers present and shall supercede any and all Constitutions, By-laws and Amendments previously adopted.

# By-Laws

### BY-LAW I - PARLIAMENTARY RULES

*ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER*, Latest, revised edition, shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting the business and assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

### BY-LAW II - ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1, and close September 30.

### BY-LAW III - NEW CHURCHES

Section 1. Any church or mission seeking membership in the Association shall petition the Credentials Committee at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October) of the Association. The church shall be studied for its Church Covenant, intentions, relations to other member churches of the Association, and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. The Credentials Committee shall report to the Association at the Fall Meeting its findings and recommendations for Associational action.

Section 2. Each church or mission applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. Each church received under a watch care relationship, shall submit a Quarterly Report to the Credentials Committee of the Association, and also submit the Annual Associational Letter at the end of the year.

### BY-LAW IV - ORDINATION OF NEW MINISTERS

Section 1. When a church desires to ordain a candidate for the Gospel Ministry, it may petition the Credentials Committee of the Association for an examination and approval for ordination. The Credentials Committee shall work with the requesting church concerning date, time, and other persons forming the Examining Committee.

Section 2. After the examination of the candidate has been conducted by the Examining Council, a report of its findings shall be given the requesting church.

Section 3. Guidelines for Ordination:

- (1) The Credentials Committee requests that it receive a copy of the minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the requesting church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The Committee requests that the candidate be examined at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

- (4) The Committee shall examine the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, personal and family life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (5) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the Gospel Ministry.
- (6) In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall provide a written report of the examination of candidates to the Gospel Ministry to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

### **BY-LAW V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS**

Section 1. The Moderator will preside over the Quarterly and called meetings of the Association. As the presiding officer, the Moderator will open the Meetings punctually, at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer, according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be followed. The Moderator, if desired, appoints a parliamentarian to serve at any or all Meetings of the Association during his term of office. This person must be approved by the Messengers-in-session. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

Section 2. It would be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. Details are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

Section 3. The Clerk will record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association and make this information available upon request. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*. The Administrative Assistant of the Association will serve as Clerk.

Section 4. The Treasurer will receive all the funds contributed to the Association and disburse them in accordance with the Budget of the Association, or for which the funds were contributed. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*. The Administrative Assistant will serve as Treasurer of the Association.

### **BY-LAW VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES**

#### Section 1. ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called Meetings of the Association. They will propose an order of business and enlist all program personnel, and publicize the program to the churches in advance of the Meetings. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) This Associational Meetings Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

#### Section 2. COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions, and services of the Association to the churches and to the general public. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) The Communications Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

### Section 3. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will assist the Association in counselling churches who fail to cooperate with the Association, help churches to meet the qualifications for being properly accepted in the Associational fellowship, and assist in examination of the candidates for the Gospel Ministry upon the request of the member churches. Detailed duties are outlined in the *ASSOCIATIONAL HANDBOOK*. Procedure for ordination is located in BY-LAW IV.
- (2) The Credentials Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. It is suggested that three pastors and three deacons serve on this committee.

### Section 4. EXTERNAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the Association, such as the various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) The External Relations Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (3) Membership will also include the Associational representatives of the various agencies, boards, foundations, and Baptist related groups. These would be eligible for re-election at the end of the three years for another term.

### Section 5. FINANCE COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee assists the Association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. They shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association and report to the Quarterly Associational Meetings and a final report to the Annual Fall Meeting. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) The Budget will be prepared and copies mailed to the Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Summer Meeting. (July or August) The Messengers will vote on the proposed Budget during the Summer Meeting of the Association. The fiscal year of the Association will be from October 1 through September 30.
- (3) The Finance Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with terms rotating so that only two members are elected each year. The Treasurer serves as an ex officio member of the Committee.
- (4) The Finance Committee chairman will serve on the Associational Council.

### Section 6. HISTORY COMMITTEE

- (1) The History Committee will gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work. The Committee will make a report at the Fall Meeting of the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) The History Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

### Section 7. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- (1) The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all Association-elected leaders except paid personnel. They shall nominate a complete slate of General Officers, Mission Performance Directors, and Council

members, and Committee persons. Equal representation should be given from all pastors, staff members, men and women. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

- (2) The first report of the nominations will be in the January Meeting of the Association, in which Mission Performance Directors are elected for training, planning and enlistment of their council members.
- (3) The second report of nominations will be in the April Meeting of the Association, in which the General Officers, Program Council members and Committee members are elected.
- (4) The Nominating Committee will consist of six members, representing all areas of the Association, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

#### Section 8. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE

- (1) The Properties Committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the Association. It will make recommendations to the Associational Meetings concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) The Properties Committee shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the term rotating so that only one member is elected each year.
- (3) The Committee shall give a written report to the Fall Meeting of the Association.

#### Section 9. SEARCH COMMITTEE

- (1) The Search Committee will serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions.
- (2) The Committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one woman, all named by the Nominating Committee, plus the Moderator, and the Chairman of Finance Committee.
- (3) The Committee will use the guidelines and duties found in the *Associational Handbook* for calling a Director of Missions.

#### Section 10. STRATEGY COMMITTEE

- (1) The Strategy Committee will assist the Association in determining its Strategic Objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. The Committee also shall be available to study change or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.
- (2) This Committee will work very closely with the Associational Council. The Strategy Committee Chairman will be an active member of the Associational Council.
- (3) The Strategy Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. Also, two members from the Associational Council should serve with the Committee in determining Annual planning objectives.

#### Section 11. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- (1) The Personnel Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (2) The Committee will prepare and update as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, except the Director of Missions, whose responsibilities are described in BY-LAW VIII, Section 1.

- (3) The Committee will survey the need for additional staff positions, recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel with the guidance and approval of the Director of Missions; and when necessary, recommend to the Association the termination of employment of staff personnel.
- (4) Annual review will be conducted by the Director of Missions to the employees, and employees' differences and grievances may be appealed to Personnel Committee by the individual.
- (5) The Committee will review annually, salaries, benefits, and make recommendations to the Budget Committee.
- (6) Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

### **BY-LAW VII - TRUSTEES**

The Trustees will act as the legal agent of the Association. The duties will be to hold title to the property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association, with the Association's foreknowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution and By-laws of the body, and with state laws as they affect the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

### **BY-LAW VIII - EMPLOYED PERSONNEL**

#### Section 1. DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

- (1) The Director of Missions shall be an officer of the Association. As an officer and general leader of the Association, the Director of Missions shall be an ex officio member of all Committees, Councils, and groups of the Association.
- (2) The Director of Missions shall be elected to this office upon a recommendation of the Search Committee, and by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present at a regular Meeting by the Moderator for that particular purpose. Letters of information concerning the prospective Director of Missions shall be sent out to all Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Meeting.
- (3) The time of service shall continue until terminated by the request of the Director of Missions to the Association, or at the request of the Association, which would require a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers to the Associational Meeting. Proper notice and explanation of termination shall be provided to or by the Director of Missions and/or the Association.
- (4) The Director of Missions shall promote the work and ministry of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers, and Associational Committees and organizations.
  - a. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Associational Council.
  - b. He shall serve as Chairman of the Associational Council, and make an annual report to the Association at the October Meeting.
  - c. He shall seek to visit each church in the Associational in order to:
    - (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
    - (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
    - (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.
  - d. He shall have full responsibility for supervising all personnel employed by the Association.
  - e. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

## Section 2. OTHER EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Other personnel shall be employed as needed by the Association with a two-thirds majority of the votes from the Messengers in a regular Meeting of the Association. All personnel must come as a joint recommendation of the Budget and Personnel Committees.

### (1) ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

- a. The Administrative Assistant shall serve primarily in a secretarial role, assisting the Director of Missions with the daily administrative matters of the Association.
- b. The Administrative Assistant shall be responsible for the media and resource center, making available materials, pamphlets, video tapes, and other equipment for individuals and churches in the Association.
- c. This person shall also serve as the Associational Clerk/Treasurer, unless Personnel Committee deems otherwise.
- d. This person shall supervise the work of office help, along with Director of Missions.
- e. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the Budget Committee salary and benefits annually.
- f. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the *Associational Handbook*.

### (2) OFFICE HELP

- a. Office help shall be provided by one or more persons as needed.
- b. This individual(s) shall fill in for the Administrative Assistant during leave times, such as vacations, sickness, conferences, etc.
- c. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the Budget Committee, salaries and benefits.
- d. Detailed duties are outlined in *Associational Handbook*.

### (3) CUSTODIAL SERVICES

- a. Custodial services shall be provided by one or more persons in order to keep the associational properties in clean and acceptable condition.
- b. This person(s) shall be recommended by the Properties Committee to the Personnel Committee who shall consider the selection, and upon approval, shall present the person(s) to the Association for final approval.
- c. The Properties and Personnel Committees will recommend to the Budget Committee salaries and benefits for service rendered.
- d. The Properties Committee and the Director of Missions shall jointly supervise the custodial services personnel.
- e. Detailed duties are outlined in *Associational Handbook*.

## **BY-LAW IX - ANNUAL REPORTS**

Persons preparing reports for the Annual Meeting of the Association in October, shall present the same in writing for inclusion in the printed *Book of Reports* two weeks before the Fall Meeting. These reports are to be limited to 300 words each.

## **BY-LAW X - AMENDMENTS**

Amendments to the By-laws may be made at any Session of the October Meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the Messengers present and voting.

- **Evangelism Report** submitted by Rev. Ron Chaney. No report of past activities given at present time. Rev. Chaney introduced new Chairman for 1992-93, Rev. Mark Sink.

- **Christian Life Report** was submitted by Dr. Richard Crider, in lieu of Rev. Johnny Henderson, Chairman. A statement was released, attached, issued by the Officers of the Association, Reginald Dawkins/Moderator, Richard Crider/Vice Moderator, Judson Rotan/Director of Missions, and Johnny Henderson/Chairman of Christian Life Council, expressing grave disappointment in the endorsement of homosexuality and the licensing of a practicing homosexual by the Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh, and Olin T. Brinkley Baptist Church in Chapel Hill. A Resolution and News Release, attached, was read. A motion made that it be approved and seconded as read with one correction, that the cities of the above named churches be included in the Resolution and News Release. This Resolution recommended that the General Board Meeting on May 19-20, 1992, support the proposed change in the Business and Financial Policy as follows:

"No funds of any kind, designated or undesignated, shall be accepted by this Convention, its Programs, its Institutions, or Agencies from any church which knowingly takes, or has taken, any official action which manifests public approval, promotion, or blessing of homosexuality. Any such church shall not therefore qualify as a "cooperating church" as defined in Article IV, A, 3 of the Constitution of the Baptist State Convention of N.C."

A copy of this Resolution will be sent to the President of the Baptist State Convention - Glenn Holt, the President of the General Board - Lamar Brooks, the Executive Director/Treasurer - Roy J. Smith, and the *Biblical Recorder*, journal of the Baptist State Convention.

- **Missions Council Report** was given by Rev. Bobby Blanton.

1) Presentation in the form of a motion was made to recommend that we participate in a joint partnership to send two more teams to Brazil, one evangelistic, and one construction to build a chapel. Associational cost would be \$1,500.00. Individual cost would be \$1,756.00/person to be supplied by individuals. Motion was approved and seconded. Discussion included two questions, 1) Will both teams go at the same time? Yes, and 2) Which Associations are involved in the partnership? Sandy Creek, Montgomery, and Sandhills.

- **Call to Order** by Moderator, Dr. Richard Crider/Pastor, Oakhurst.
- **Welcome** by host pastor/Dr. Stephen Hensley.
- **Hymn** "The Church's One Foundation" led by Min. of Music, Rev. Boyd Ammermon.
- **Prayer** by Director of Missions, A. Judson Rotan.
- **Theme Interpretation "Share Heritage Through Christ's Mission"** by A. Judson Rotan. He challenged each one to realize that missions are for all. Every Christian must be "on mission" as from the beginning; the first church was "on mission."
- **Constituting of the 58th Annual Session** by Clerk/Treasurer, Mrs. Mary Ann Ingold. Moved and accepted.
- **Assoc. Meetings Report** Rev. R.L. Hughes/Chairman, Seagrove, 1st, presented the Program for both days of the Annual Session as stated. Moved and accepted.
- **Recognition of New Pastors and Staff** by A. Judson Rotan, as follows: Rev. Gary Mullis/Pastor, Cedar Grove; Mr. Danny Miller/Min. of Youth and Children, Cross Road; Rev. Roger Carlson, Pastor/Maple Springs; Rev. Wayne Dunn, Pastor/Mt. Pleasant; and Rev. Pete Lamb/Pastor, White's Memorial.
- **Treasurer's Report** was presented as stated in the "Book of Reports." Year-ending balance of \$936.57.
- **Financial Emphasis** was given by Chairman, Dr. Dan Wood/Pastor, Franklinville, 1st. He used the illustration of a bow and arrow compared to the Assoc. in reaching the target or our goals. In the Assoc. it depends on how far we pull the string, by our giving, our support, and our ideas. In summary, 22 churches plan to increase their giving, 21 are giving 3% or more this year, and 6 of 21 churches are going to give 6% or more, 1 will give 5%. He challenged individuals to become involved and excited about our Assoc. and the work, and expressed thanks for their giving.

Bray/Ramseur, 1st, 6) Mrs. Nancy Hunter/Balfour, 7) Mrs. Jo Davis/Franklinville, 1st, 8) Mrs. Pearl Haithcock/Cedar Falls, 9) Mrs. Carolyn Santanella/Greystone, and 10) Mrs. Belinda Hayes/Calvary.

- **Feasibility Committee Report** was given by Chairman/Dr. Reginald Dawkins/Pastor, Liberty, 1st. He recognized the Feasibility Comm. A motion was made from this comm. to accept their recommendations as stated in the "Book of Reports." Mr. Dewey Shelton/Glenola, a member of the Feas. Comm., was recognized to express his encouragement of this issue. Upon the recommendation that a building committee be formed, discussion followed. Dr. Stephen Hensley/Pastor, Cross Road, suggested that no. 1 under Recommendations, be amended to read, "a perspective location be found." Rev. Ron Hester/Pastor, Center Cross, requested that a clarification of the term "feasibility" be made. - **Recommendation that remaining Reports be moved until tomorrow's Session.** Seconded and approved.



## **History of Cross Road Baptist Church 1992**

In 1977, Stan Haywood and Bill Applewhite met at a meeting and came back with the idea of "doing something bold." Some months later, they met with two other men and wives to form the nucleus which led to the organization of the new church. The group was then joined by three additional families to comprise the charter membership of the church. Those 24 charter members represented the Merrill, Applewhite, Haywood, Mark Sink, J.B. Sink, Wiley, and McIntyre families.

On February 2, 1978, the group came to a final decision and contacted Rev. Don McIntyre who became the first pastor. Don came on May 22, 1978 and the first service was held on Wednesday, May 31, 1978 with the 24 charter members. The first worship service was held on June 4, 1978 with approximately 65 people attending. The membership rose to 176 the first year and by the fifth anniversary the membership was 435. Now it is approximately 700.

This was the first independently organized Baptist church to apply for membership within the Randolph Association in more than 25 years. The name of the church was actually taken from the Scriptures, Matthew 16:24, when Jesus told his disciples, "If any man would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me."

The first meeting place for the church was the VFW building from June 1978 to September 1978 when the new church was constructed. In April of 1979, bonds were sold to finance the new building on property purchased by the church. In just 72 hours, \$275,000 in bonds had been sold by members to finance the building. By September, 1979, the building was ready to be occupied. Most of the work inside the building was done by church members.

The Constitution and By-Laws were written and adopted in 1979. It was in 1979 that the new deacon family ministry was started. Every person who joins the church is assigned a deacon.

In February, 1980, the church produced a television program which aired every Sunday morning on channel 45 for several months. The first program was televised on March 9, 1980.

In August, 1980, the first monthly newsletter was published by Beulah Tote. "The Cross Road Review" was chosen by the congregation as the name for the newsletter. It was published the week following the monthly business conference until about two years ago and it is now published the last week of each month.

In 1981, the new Sunday School addition was built through love offerings of the congregation. In the fall of 1981, the Christian Growth Institute was started, replacing Training Union on Sunday evenings.

In November, 1981, weekly Bible Clubs were started by Bea Cole. The Bible Clubs met on a bus that had been renovated to provide a classroom atmosphere.

In October, 1981, the Navigator Discipleship classes were started. This was a two year program. Other programs of the church now include Vacation Bible School, extensive outreach programs, rest home ministry, missionaries at home and around the world, Men's Fellowship, Women's WMU, children's programs, and more. Church members have been sent to such places as West Virginia, North Dakota, Argentina, Chili, France, and India to assist in new buildings, medical assistance, and winning souls.

In October, 1982, funding for a rest and retirement center was approved and the building was started in 1983. By November 1, 1983 the Cross Road Rest and Retirement Center was opened for the first residents to move in. The capacity for the center is 116 residents and it is usually filled. Church members and others from the community provide devotions each morning for the residents. Later five apartments were added to the complex and in 1988 the Railey property was purchased and is now being used as assisted living space. Recently they broke ground for four additional apartments with plans for more in the future. It is called Cross Road Village.

In September, 1985, the church purchased Camp Cedarwood for \$110,000 and funds were contributed through the Challenge to Grow program. It was sold in July 1991 for \$175,000.

In November, 1991, ground was broken for the Christian Life Center. It will house the church offices, some Sunday School classes, and a fellowship hall which includes new kitchen facilities.

Several young people from the church have committed their lives to God's work. They are: Allison Myatt Brown, Cindy Myatt, Walker Armstrong, Phil Bray, Johnny Tote, Donna and Dean Beck, Kelly Bennett, Danny Williams, Ben Dowd, Tommy and Karen Kidd, and Don King.

Ricky Brown served as the first Director of Music. Other music directors include Sharon Wiley, Delores Crutchfield, Randy Williams, Paul LeCrone, and Boyd Ammerman.

Casey Pearson and Boyd Ammerman have served as Minister of Youth and Education. Danny Miller joined the staff as part-time Youth and Children's Director in February, 1992, and since May, 1992 is full-time.

Church clerks include: Barbara Merrill, Beulah Tote, Susan West, Joanna Mason, and Sue Griffith.

Pastors include Don McIntyre serving from May, 1978 to June, 1986; Jack Moore 1987 to 1989; and Steve Hensley, January, 1990 to present.


Church secretaries include volunteers, Barbara Merrill and Beulah Tote, and the first paid secretary, Jan Winters from 1982 to present.

The theme of the church is "The Church That Cares" and the song is "Victory in Jesus." The cross behind the pulpit is made of glass that only God's light, natural day-

light, shows through, to make it the beautiful red that shines in the morning sunlight.

God has blessed our church, providing material blessings, people to do the work, bringing people from all over the world to make up the church family. Since the beginning, years have flown by and people have changed. Babies have grown to be young adults, teens have grown up and married and now have children of their own, and heads have turned gray and some have even gone on to be with the Lord. Sometimes changes are subtle and you hardly notice - people change constantly and God changes people and situations. We never stop changing - everyday we are different from the day before. We never stay the same, but one thing is certain - God never changes. He is the same yesterday, today, and always!

Dale Robertson/Pastor, Forest Park entered a recommendation that 12 persons be appointed by the Moderator, (4 pastors, 4 lay men, and 4 lay women) with no more than 1 from any church. Question called, approved and accepted. Question of original motion with 2 amendments was made and accepted. Motion carried. No further misc. business.

Clearing House Ministry is slow and considering other possibilities at this time; ESL, 7 churches participated in Backyard Bible Clubs, requested more churches be involved in CCM and to use the resources available.

Question was called, accepted and approved.

He shared his faith from God's Word that we were to be missionaries and mission-minded. The BSC has no life of its own; it takes its life from the assoc. and the assoc. from the churches. ## Deep River Baptist Church





On the first Sunday in November, 1882, near the village of Enterprise, (now known as Coleridge), the Deep River Baptist Church was organized. The ministers participating in the organization were the Reverends T.M. Baldwin, Moses Baldwin, and J.W. Calder, with the Rev. T.M. Baldwin becoming the first pastor of the church. The charter membership consisted of nineteen members, including the following 3, who served as the first delegates to the Sandy Creek Association: W.W. Caviness, Thomas Davis, and Nathan Kivett. For many years the principle place of worship was an arbor, first a brush arbor, then later, of frame construction. It stood not far from the present building.

In 1889, for unknown reasons, the church apparently disbanded and dropped its name from the Sandy Creek Associational minutes. Some members however, continued to meet and in the fall of 1893 the church was readmitted to the Association. By 1901 the membership had grown to 48 people and needed a more permanent place of worship, so a one room white frame building was erected on land given by Mr. and Mrs. H. Frank Brown. A steeple was added to the front in 1925, and during the 1930's and 40's as membership grew, Sunday School rooms were added. The frame building was used until the spring of 1950, when services were moved to the present brick structure, dedicated on May 31, 1953. Since that time the church has undertaken many other projects, including extensive renovation of the church building in 1968, completion of a pastorium in 1971, and construction of an Education and Fellowship building in 1977-78.

Since becoming part of the Randolph Baptist Association, Deep River has hosted the Associational Meetings several times, the first being in 1938.

Pastors of Deep River Church have been: T.M. Baldwin, 1882-84, 1888; Manley Forrester, 1885-86; J.D. Hackney, 1887; G.W. Harmon, 1893-95, 1902, and 1908;






A.K. Scotten, 1896, 1899, 1900-01, and 1905; J.L. Smith 1897-98, 1906-07; W.H. Strickland, 1903-04, 1914-17; L.P. Soots, 1909; J.W. Phillips, 1910; G.C. Phillips, 1911-13; A.G. Lassiter, 1918-20; J.C. Kidd, 1921-25; C.M. Strickland, 1925-34, 1939-42, and 1952-61; R. E. Heath, 1935-36; D. L. Temple, 1937-39; Roland Kidd, 1942-45; C.L. Smith, 1945; C.J. Johnson, 1945-47, B.L. Deep River Baptist Church celebrated its 100th anniversary on November 7, 1982 with special services. A history book was published in 1983.



## Church and Community Ministries Report - 1992

This was the first full year of CCM work in our Association. We have been impressed with the willingness of some to be involved with ministries that reach out to people and have been disappointed with others and their lack of initiative. During this year we struggled to define the area of work and adjusted according to the needs of our congregations and community. Nevertheless, we can only be thankful for the work that has been done and prayerfully hope that the Lord will continue to sharpen us as instruments to be used to minister to people.

The following is a list of activities and ministries we have been involved with during the 1991-1992 year:

1. During the months from September through January, the CCM Director orientated himself to the area through interviews of various agencies that serve the needs of the people in Randolph County. These organizations included the Department of Social Services, Mental Health Center, many of the United Way supported agencies, and various ministries performed by local congregations. Through these interviews, a synopsis of each organization was written and then placed in a book to be used by churches. This book is known as the *Mission Action Resource Guide*. The guide is designed as a resource for churches when needing information on involving themselves in ministry. The guide was first distributed at the January Associational Quarterly Meeting and then again at other times during the year as requested. This guide will be updated each year.
2. Since October, we have been trying to work with the Asheboro Ministerial Association to begin a clearinghouse ministry. The first perceived need discovered through the interviews was the need for a coordinated effort by the churches in assisting people with their living needs (food, clothing, furniture, money for utilities, etc..) in the Randolph County area. Since last October, a committee of pastors from the Ministerial Association has held discussions about how we can begin this ministry and different models and ideas have been examined, but there still are no definite plans to begin anything.
3. In January plans were made to begin an English as a Second Language ministry (ESL). Due to the large and growing number of Hispanics in Randolph County, we saw this as one way of reaching them by meeting the language needs of these permanent residents. Maureen Perryman was invited to lead a workshop for potential teachers. Seven people completed the workshop. Plans were made to have our first classes start in March and run through May. During these first couple of months, we registered six students and three came on a regular basis. During the summer, we held a social gathering for our teachers, workers, and students. In August, we held another workshop for teachers and potential teachers, which was led by Glenda Reece. We had six new teachers complete the workshop and three of the first group of teachers went through the workshop again. We also had a two-hour training session led by Susan Martin for the teachers on ideas for lessons. We began our first classes in September for the 1992-1993 school year. We have registered six new students and from two to five come on a regular basis.
4. In February, preliminary plans for summer Backyard Bible Clubs (BBC) were discussed. A goal of fifteen BBC's by our churches was set. During the course of the months leading up to June, information was distributed to the churches about holding BBC's in multi-housing areas in the surrounding area. Included in this information was an invitation to training sessions being held. Seven churches responded with interest. Of these, five completed three hours of training. For the most part, BBC's were led by the youth of the respective churches. Six BBC's were held in various trailer parks and apartment complexes. We had over 115 children attend these clubs. Through these clubs, churches have had the opportunity to begin some year-round ministries. Although we did not meet our goal, we hope to exceed our goal for this upcoming summer by having at least fifteen churches performing BBC's.

Our hope and prayer is that every Randolph Baptist Church will open its eyes and be willing to begin meeting needs in its community and surrounding area, for we know

that the sacrifices made will be worth the prize of reaching people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

## Feasibility Committee Report

For 58 years the Randolph Baptist Association has been the enabler and encourager for sharing Jesus Christ through local ministries in our churches. As we review our history, we are reminded that Randolph Association grew out of the fact that the churches were in the "twilight zone" and it seemed almost impossible to develop those churches as they should. These churches were members of four difference associations. After much prayer and discussion among several pastors in Randolph County, 21 churches met in Franklinville, N.C. in the fall of 1934 and organized the Randolph Baptist Association.

Through these 58 years, the Association has approved as its major objectives the following:

- 1) **Fellowship** - Enrich the fellowship daily
- 2) **Evangelism** - Reaching persons for Christ

- 3) **Discipleship** - Helping churches to grow
- 4) **Missions/Ministry** - Ministering to human needs

As the Feasibility Committee began its work, we discovered from our rich history and our present needs that our mission in the 1990's, as an association was a relationship in missions. It is a life-style of touching people in our communities with Christ's love. It is personal - more than just cold statistics among faceless crowds. We are a family of churches in fellowship and on mission individually and together. From Liberty to Asheboro, from Randleman to Seagrove, from Glenola Church to Beulah Church, from Macedonia Church to Gravel Hill Church, we are alike in our churches in missions, yet diverse in our methods and worship. But we are a family - a family of God's children, laboring together in sharing Jesus Christ and ministering to human needs across Randolph County.

In the history and purpose of Randolph Association, the Feasibility Committee studied and surveyed our ministry in the light of our associational building.

A Committee of 12 lay-persons from across the association was appointed by the Moderator in the Annual Meeting, 1990, to study the needs and future of our associational building. It was out of Strategy Planning, adopted in 1989 by the association, that it was recommended a feasibility study be made of our building. As the Committee began its work, two major questions were presented:

- 1) **What are the needs and opportunities for ministry in our context?**
- 2) **How can the challenge of ministry in the association be undertaken most effectively?**

**Out of these major questions and discussion, came a base assumption. The association is vitally involved in cooperative ministries to share the gospel of Christ with the whole world, beginning in our Jerusalem - Randolph County.** Therefore, a well designed associational Training and Resource Center will be a major step in preparing the association for ministry through our churches in these challenges and responsibilities. The base question we felt must be answered was - **Are our present facilities and equipment adequate to meet the needs and opportunities for ministry in the future with the growth of our county?**

During the first year, the Committee looked at the purpose of the associational building, conducted a survey of the leadership in the association and had four visitations of the churches to the building. All of this indicated several needs and concerns - the availability to the building, the adequacy of the building to the needs and ministry of the association, and the visibility for people coming to the building.

During this present year, the Committee has evaluated its survey and studies. They visited an association that is building a new facility and interviewed many leaders and church members across the association.

It is out of this two years of study and survey that we present the following conclusion.

Through the surveys, sectional scheduled meetings of churches at the present associational site, feed-back from pastors and key leadership within the churches, remarks solicited from organizational and committee directors and chairpersons, guest speakers at the associational office, Dr. Billy Graham/Director of Missions, Sandhills Baptist Association and author of a doctoral dissertation addressing the issue of feasibility of an association, indicated that particular criterion be adopted in analyzing the feasibility of the Randolph Baptist Association office and property.

Three distinct measures were chosen to assist the Committee in conducting an adequate critique - adequacy, accessibility, and visibility.

The following is a list of conclusions reached after careful examination of the three measures used:

**1. Adequacy -**

The growth of the association in regard to ministries has increased appreciably in the last 15 years. This is the result of visions (Dreaming the Dream), and expanded ministry needs. However, as in the facility prior to moving to the present location, space has become a number one concern.

The lack of sufficient floor space for expansion has...

- a. limited the need for additional offices. This has been verified by the employment of a US-2 Home Missionary and a Summer Worker. Both of these persons working out of the same office has created crowded conditions and lack of privacy. Also additional equipment, such as the computer, has caused overcrowding in the Administrative Assistant's office.
- b. deterred growth as a Resource and Training Center. Insufficient storage for videos, equipment, and other materials reduces efficiency to meet demands of churches and greatly hampers the association as a training center.
- c. created problems of adequate seating in the conference room. The conference room itself is of such size to accommodate only a small number of persons.
- d. discouraged the concept of flexibility usage as utilized by newer associational facilities.

**2. Accessibility -**

It was the general opinion of those questioned that the association was not easily accessible, thereby decreasing...

- a. the number of churches using the office as a Resource and Training Center. It is a detriment in strengthening churches' ministries through leadership training, discipleship, and involvement.
- b. the effectiveness of Randolph Baptist Association through the process of fellowship and communication.
- c. the involvement in people needs.
- d. the projected image of the association as a caring organization.

**3. Visibility -**

This ties in with accessibility. It is not readily seen because of its location - although next to a major thoroughfare, there are no immediate exits nor can it be adequately viewed because of the tree foliage. This hampers...

- a. the imagery of the association as a part of the whole community.
- b. a tie into the concept of a Training and Resource Center.
- c. physical advertisement of the associational presence.
- d. the surety of safeness during daytime and nightly working hours for staff and also for persons attending organizational and committee meetings.

**RECOMMENDATIONS...**

1. Therefore, we as the Feasibility Committee, recommend that a new location be found within the next three (3) years that is accessible, adequate, and visible.
2. We further recommend, that a Building Committee of twelve (12) persons be appointed by the Moderator to proceed with the following according to the guidelines of the Feasibility Committee study:
  - a. Search for possible relocation sites.

- b. Examination of building designs.
  - c. Projected land and building cost.
  - d. Monetary methods of addressing the projected cost.
3. Finally, we recommend that the Committee would give a report of their study and development each year to the Annual Meeting or at Quarterly Meetings until a definite recommendation be presented to the association.

With these conclusions and recommendations, we make these final remarks.

**What kind of impression does your associational building make?** "First impressions are lasting impressions," is a truism that needs no defense. First impressions can be the difference between an open door to the future or a closed door which can be opened only with great effort and difficulty.

The associational building, we believe, makes impressions on people. The kind of impression depends on a number of things - facilities, fellowship, service, and ministry being among them. We would do well to do a brief self-examination to help us evaluate what kind of impressions our associational building is making.

**1. What do the facilities say about the association?**

- Do the building and grounds indicate the association has hope for the future or the association thinks its best days are behind it?

**2. What do the facilities say about the association's relationship to God?**

- Is the association offering God its best through its facilities, or is the association satisfied to let God's business be unattractive or lacking in its witness through its facilities?

**3. What do the building and grounds say about the association's hope for the churches and its communities?**

- Does the association believe the churches and its communities need the message and ministry it offers from God, or does the association believe the churches and its communities are dying so there is no need to invest in the future?

Yes, first impressions are important. In the light of this report, does anything need to be done to improve the impressions our association is making? Only you, as Messengers of Randolph Baptist Association, can answer this question.

## Mission Development Council

The following is a list of projects that your Mission Development Council has promoted during the past year:

1. **World Mission Conference** - April 5-12, 1992 - Our Association had 25 churches to participate in this event.
2. **Brazil Partnership** - Our Association agreed to extend our partnership with Brazil throughout 1992. A team of four from our association will be going to Brazil October 28-November 11, 1992.
3. **New York Project** - A door of opportunity has been opened to our Association to help in a mission partnership to New York. This partnership will be similar to the one we've had with Brazil. More details of this 5 year partnership will be shared in our Annual Session. A recommendation concerning this partnership will be forthcoming from the Mission Development Council.
4. **Summer Mission Worker** - Miss Kelly Stratton, a student from Campbell University, served for 10 weeks during the summer of 1992. Her duties involved surveying mission sites and training and conducting 8 Backyard Bible Clubs. Also, she helped assist Seagrove, First in several community projects.
5. **US-2 Missionary** - Hoover Lee began serving our Association in the area of Church and Community Ministries. Hoover's job will continue until August, 1993. Our churches are asked to continue their financial support of this ministry.
6. **Mission Action Project** - We continue to encourage our churches to support MAP (Mission Action Project), which is a mission fund used to undergird and support various mission projects throughout the year. Recently MAP has helped offset some of the expenses for the Brazil Mission Team. Some possible projects in the future may include the New York partnership and a Spanish speaking mission.
7. **Spanish Speaking Mission** - Plans are currently being developed to organize a Spanish speaking mission in Asheboro. A committee will be formed from the Association to assist in its development. Financial support among our churches is greatly needed. The projected date of organization is January, 1993.

## **New York Partnership Recommendation Long Island Baptist Association**

“Churches in fellowship sharing Christ with Long Island”

The Mission Development Council recommends that we enter into partnership with the Long Island Baptist Association, New York. Our partnership agreement is as follows:

### **I. PURPOSE**

The Randolph Baptist Association of North Carolina and the Long Island Baptist Association of New York mutually agree to establish a working relationship for the purpose of assisting their churches and Associations in programs of ministry, church starting, church development, and evangelism.

### **II. OBJECTIVES**

- A. to pray mutually for the work of all involved in partnership
- B. to discover mission needs and evaluate available resources to meet those needs
- C. to explore and implement ways in which selected mission needs may be met cooperatively
- D. to cooperatively plan methods through which the partners may assist each other in accomplishing common objectives
- E. to provide leadership and/or financial resources for the partnership process and mutually planned projects
- F. to involve mission volunteers throughout the life of the partnership

### **III. BASIC PRINCIPLES**

- A. Each partner is a separate, autonomous Baptist body and is responsible for its own program of work.
- B. The Director of Missions of the Randolph Baptist Association and the Director of Missions of the Long Island Baptist Association will work together by establishing the partnership and selecting a coordinator to implement, review, and evaluate the working partnership.
- C. The partnership agreement will remain in effect January 1, 1993 to December 31, 1996 and may also be revised as necessary, continued or discontinued by mutual agreement.

### **IV. WORKING GUIDELINES**

- A. A mutually agreed upon plan for the entire partnership shall be on file before beginning the first project.
- B. Requests for and offers of assistance may come from either partner at any time during the partnership.
- C. Requests for and offers of assistance should be in writing and may include: requests related to special projects, joint projects, program-requests, financial support, designated gifts, and mission volunteer personnel resources.
- D. Written reports shall be given for all special projects.
- E. A summary report of the work between the partners shall be made during their Annual Meetings.

## **Pastoral Ministries Report - 1992**

Pastoral Ministries, being new in the organizational structure, is still searching for identity and clarity in its purpose. The Director has joined in discussions through special meetings in Raleigh and at the Key Leadership meetings at Ridgecrest. Although the

scope of the ministry, its purpose, and its relationship to the other program areas is becoming better defined there remains much work to be done.

In the past year, we have worked some in the more clearly defined program areas. In cooperation with the Pastor's Conference, we were able to have Dr. Michael Cogdill, head of the Religion Department at Campbell University, lead us in January Bible Study preparation. On August 31, 1992, a Conference for deacons and pastors was conducted at the Clear View Church with approximately sixty persons present in which the purpose, role, and place of the deacon in accomplishing the purpose of the church was explored. From this meeting, information was gleaned to assist in planning future conferences and training sessions.

### Strategy Committee Report 1992-93

The Committee has met several times this year, reviewing the objectives and goals adopted in 1989. We are glad to report that three (3) of these objectives have been met, except for on-going actions which will continue until 1995. Those objectives were:

- 1) to expand the organizational structure,
- 2) to improve the fellowship,
- 3) to improve the involvement in people needs.

We commend the leaders and appropriate committees or groups for helping to carry out these goals and actions quickly.

The other two (2) objectives need our attention throughout the coming year. We would encourage our Organizational Directors or other groups to concentrate the effort through their programs and leadership to implement these goals and actions. They are:

- 1) to strengthen churches,
- 2) reaching persons for Christ.

As we seek to minister through our churches and Association in 1992-93, let us adopt these two major objectives as our priority for work and ministry.

To implement the strategy for 1992-93, the Strategy Committee suggests that we again adopt, as we have done this past year, the theme, "You Make A Difference." This would be a year-long effort to get people and churches involved through their organizations and groups that they do make a difference in their beliefs, their life-styles, their commitments, and their witness. God loves us and has a wonderful plan for our lives. It is out of our love relationship to God and our commitment to Him, that we begin to make tremendous differences in our lives. Yes, we all make a difference to God.

The following objectives and goals from strategy planning, adopted in 1989, should continue to receive our attention during 1992-93. We encourage every church in Randolph Association to share these objectives and goals in their work and ministry.

#### Objective 1 - Restructuring the Association

**Goal 1** - to encourage churches to consider giving 4% to the associational budget this year and to consider giving 4-1/2% in 1993-94. (The goal is 5% by 1995.)

#### Objective 2 - Improve the Fellowship

**Goal 1** - to encourage churches to request reports from Messengers concerning Quarterly and Annual Meetings

**Goal 2** - to develop and involve persons in two (2) fellowship groups this year (church staff and secretaries)

Objective 3 - Strengthening Churches

**Goal 1** - seek to increase our enrollment in Sunday School, Discipleship Training, WMU, and Brotherhood by 3% by September 30, 1993

**Goal 2** - seek to enlist three (3) churches to conduct a Church Growth Project by September 30, 1993

**Goal 3** - seek to encourage five (5) churches, who have not, to conduct a doctrinal study by September 30, 1993

**Goal 4** - seek to provide leadership training for receiving leadership diplomas for ten (10) churches by September 30, 1993

Objective 4 - Involvement in People's Needs

**Goal 1** - seek to enlist twenty (20) churches to give continuous support to the Church and Community Ministries for the US-2 program (14 churches gave last year)

**Goal 2** - to assist five (5) churches to organize a Mission Development Council in their church by September 30, 1993

**Goal 3** - to assist ten (10) churches to identify two (2) specific needs that will become a mission activity for their church by September 30, 1993 (resource: *Mission Action Resource Guide* by Hoover Lee, CCM)

**Goal 4** - to involve ten (10) churches to participate in associational projects through volunteers in missions by September 30, 1993

**Goal 5** - to develop and conduct two (2) awareness programs for drug abuse for teenagers and adults by September 30, 1993

Objective 5 - Reaching People

**Goal 1** - seek to enlist six (6) churches to conduct one-day Soul-Winning Workshops by September 30, 1993

**Goal 2** - seek to enlist fifteen (15) churches to conduct Backyard Bible Clubs in mobile home parks and apartment complexes by September 30, 1993

**Goal 3** - seek to enlist one (1) church to sponsor a new work in the county by September 30, 1993

**Goal 4** - seek to enlist five (5) churches to assist in establishing a Spanish Mission in the county by September 30, 1993

**Goal 5** - to develop an Associational Youth Council to assist churches with youth ministries and for planning two (2) associational events for youth by September 30, 1993

### **Director of Missions Report - 1992**

This year could be characterized as one of our best, or maybe the very best year for Randolph Baptist Association. God has been so very good to us and has accomplished so much through those that constitute the membership of Randolph Association. Let me encourage you to take time to read the reports included in this *Book of Reports* and those which will be printed later in the *Annual Minutes*, such as the Digest of Letters, the Financial Report, Church and Community Report, the Mission Development Report, and Evangelism Council Report, etc. It is to God we give praise and honor for all that has been accomplished during this year.

It is my joy to share with you my fifteenth report. Let me use a broad brush approach to capture the past, rejoice in the present, and accept the challenge of the future.

Past...

God's Word tells us that "where there is no vision, the people perish." Church and associational leadership must catch a vision of what must be accomplished in our midst. God's army must ever be on the advance. A vision of God's purpose gives us the direction of advance.

Vision leads us into the dreaming of dreams. The possibilities of ministry are all around us. We only need to open our eyes to the hurt and pain of individuals. Jesus saw the

hurting multitudes and had compassion on them. This must be our response also. In many ways, we have experienced this during the past two years.

In 1988, a group of 46 individuals performed a self-study of our Association. Their report, which the Association adopted in 1989, identified five objectives for the Association. They were: 1) restructuring the Association; 2) improving the fellowship; 3) strengthening the churches; 4) involvement in people's needs; and 5) reaching people. This was our dream for our Association. It was spelled out in Strategy Planning, Five Year Plan, 1990-1995. During these last three years, many in our Association have supported us in these dreams through goals and actions. Many of these goals and actions presented have been completed. The Strategy Committee is reminding us each year where we are in this strategy planning process. God has blessed our efforts in so many ways.

#### Present...

God has led us in new areas this year. Several highlights of this year are as follows:

#### 1) Church and Community Ministries

We dared to take the risk and enter into partnership with the Home Mission Board and Baptist State Convention in expanding our ministry to the community and county. We entered into a US-2 Missionary program. Hoover Lee, of Columbus, Ohio, came September 1, 1991 to help us establish ministries through our Association to meet the human needs of our area. Also, he is helping the churches develop ministries to the communities around them.

This new ministry has brought a new day to us as Baptists in Randolph County. Many of our churches have given over and beyond their regular contributions to support this program. My prayer is that more churches will support this new ministry during the coming year.

#### 2) Summer Extension Worker

Through the Church Extension Department, Baptist State Convention, we were able to have a summer student worker. Miss Kelly Stratton spent 10 weeks working in the following - surveying mobile home parks and apartments, training and conducting Backyard Bible Clubs, and seeking to develop a ministry in the apartment complexes and to students at Randolph Community College. She assisted in 8 Backyard Bible Clubs and with Seagrove, First Baptist in its ministry to the community. Many results came from this summer's activities.

#### 3) World Mission Conference

In April, 1992, 25 churches participated in one of the best World Mission Conferences in Randolph Association. Many were involved in the preparation and hundreds heard 15 different missionaries from around the world. This Conference created a deeper awareness in the lives and hearts of our church members, which causes many people to pray earnestly for our missionaries and to generously give to missions. This was one of the big highlights of the year for our Association.

#### 4) Feasibility Committee

Twelve lay-persons, plus the Moderator, have spent 2 years in surveying, interviewing, and studying the present and future needs of the associational building. They are presenting their report this year out of deep concern and prayer for the future ministry of the Association and its witness through our associational building. I am deeply grateful for their time, energy, and com-

mitment to this study. Their report and your response could be the crossroad of a new future for Randolph Association.

### Future...

Knowing and doing God's will is of supreme importance for the future ministry. I am learning daily to look and see what God is up to in His world, and see how I can fit into His plan. As an Association, we need to know what God has on His agenda for our churches, our community, and our nation and world at this time in our history; and then join Him through our ministries to meet those needs.

What are some of the areas we need to look and think about?

- 1) Evangelism - Would God honor a goal of 400 baptisms in the new year? Would each church accept a challenge to increase their baptisms 50% or 5% of their resident membership? Isn't God at work saving persons to salvation in Christ?
- 2) New Work- How many doors will God open for new work in the year ahead? Will we, the called out people of God, be willing to march through those open doors?

- a. Spanish people in Randolph County need a fellowship group. They have requested a Spanish church to be started.
- b. Mobile home parks, big enough to have a mobile chapel, are presenting doors of opportunity for us.
- c. Areas, where population has increased and no Southern Baptist Church is located, need a mission started and a church constituted.

It will take faith on our part to take the risk to meet the needs of people in places where God is at work. Let us not forget that 66% of our county is still unchurched. They are lost without Jesus Christ as Lord.

- 3) Mission Ministries- Should we begin work with the blind or the deaf in this new year? They need to hear the gospel also. Is another food and clothes closet needed in our county? Through our Church and Community ministries, we are discovering poverty, hurt, pain, and abuse. Many are crying out for help and love. Is there need for continuous ministry through the retirement and nursing homes across this county? Are churches ministering to the elderly with hope and love? Twenty-five per cent or more of our population are senior adults. Are there persons who will volunteer to extend their ministry and skill to New York state? Many opportunities will be opening up for us in N.Y. in the days ahead. God is at work in this pioneer state in missions. Will we respond to the opportunities?
- 4) Communication- I am thrilled at the new format for our *Newsletter* which will improve our communication with persons in our churches. Bulletin inserts are being printed quarterly to remind our membership about the events and work of the Association. Efforts of the Communication Committee will be made to improve on the information available in the Associational Office for individuals and churches. The office staff is working on providing information in advance for the Quarterly and Annual Meetings. Ways are also being looked at about our image and presence in the community. Newspaper advertisements and articles will be produced and made available to the public.
- 5) Fellowship- The challenge is presented to groups across the Association to improve the fellowship among them - pastors, pastor's wives, staff persons, secretaries, and other groups. Many new group fellowships will be formed this com-

ing year. This should lead to improved relations between churches. With greater fellowship, our overall effort for God will be enhanced.

The new budget for 1992-93 is a big challenge for our churches - \$95,174.00. It is a 6.44% increase over last year's budget. It is a necessary increase for expanded ministries. This budget will require increased giving by our 43 churches. We are suggesting that our churches give 4% of the undesignated offerings to our associational budget. God has opened our doors to opportunities, and churches need to take the dare, the risk for ministry in their gifts to the Association. Our God is able and gifts from churches this past year indicate this.

This is your Association. It is my Association! We all need to get involved and allow God to use us and our talents, (time and skills) for His glory. The challenge before Randolph Baptist Association is tremendous. What is God up to in our county? Let's pray that God will grant us wisdom, strength, and spiritual insight for the days and months ahead.



## 1992 Annuity Board Report to Associations

A growing number of churches and ministers are catching a vision for insurance protection and preparation for retirement. Unfortunately, far too many pastors, other ministers and church and associational personnel do not have adequate financial protection. The Annuity Board's primary focus for 1992 and 1993 is on enrolling as many people and churches as possible in the Church Life and Health Program and the Church Annuity Plan.

New medical plans will be offered on January 1, 1993, as options to help address the affordability issue.

The Church Annuity Plan is far more than a retirement plan, It is a means to provide family protection today as well as financial security tomorrow.

As of May 1992, 34,571 persons were participating in the Church Annuity Plan. This is the highest number of members in the history of the Plan. The number of churches involved was 19,930.

Eligible participants in the Church Annuity Plan benefit in five significant ways.

1. The Plan includes a Protection Section that covers disability and death. In 1991, 252 families received disability checks from the Plan, and 60 families received well over \$1,000,000 in survivor benefits. Additionally, they received the full value of the decedents' retirement accounts. All of these protection benefits are free to the members. They are funded by state convention Cooperative Program dollars.
2. The Plan includes a choice of plan funds offering valuable, advantageous investment opportunities for retirement. In 1991, the Variable Fund credited 28.3% earnings and the Balanced Fund credited 22.4%.
3. The Plan offers significant opportunities for avoiding unnecessary income tax. Ordained ministers do not pay self-employment tax for Social Security on contributions to the Church Annuity Plan. These advantages exceed those offered by IRAs.
4. The Plan includes matching state convention Cooperative Program dollars for eligible members' retirement income accounts. This can amount to \$210 per year resulting in higher benefits at retirement.
5. A fifth value is the Annuity Board's strength and stability. On July 1, 1992, a five percent increase was applied to Plan A and defined contribution funded annuities. This brings Plan A increase to 222% of what was called for by the original plan formula benefit.

Based on the needs of our people and in light of these special advantages, your association is encouraged to lead every church to participate in the Church Annuity Plan.

The Annuity Board is celebrating 75 years of keeping the confidence of the people we serve. Our ministry continues to be "Serving Those Who Serve the Lord."

## Baptist Children's Homes 1992 Associational Report

Like a marathon runner, Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina (BCH) "hit the wall" in 1991-92, but persevered to finish standing up!

In an exhausting year for staff and a myriad of volunteers, BCH successfully concluded its first statewide fund-raising campaign, received its first Thanksgiving Offering since 1979, dedicated expansion of Cameron Boys Camp, broke ground for the new Fleshman-Pratt Education Center in Thomasville, inaugurated an innovative Bible study program at Mills Home, installed two new pastors at campus churches and solidified programs that have placed it among child care leaders for decades.

These efforts enabled BCH to serve more than 1,300 children and families at 13 facilities statewide, including Chris, named All-Conference nose guard for 2A state champion Thomasville Bulldogs; Sandi, who has enrolled at Gardner-Webb College; Deborah, named outstanding Freshman at Thomasville High after enduring a court battle that sent her father to prison for abuse; Jennifer, who married on the Broyhill campus where she'd lived for seven years; Kathy, who will continue to live at Broyhill while she attends college; and a host of others who are making life-changing commitments because they've received a second chance at Baptist Children's Homes.

In April, BCH successfully concluded its **"Give a child a chance!"** financial campaign by gaining three-year commitments for \$11.2 million, topping the \$7.5 million goal, and the challenge goal of \$11 million. Significant priorities accomplished in the campaign are: expansion and relocation of Cameron Boys Camp to a more secluded site on its 903-acres of wilderness; ground-breaking for the Fleshman-Pratt Education Center, a model day care facility for infants, toddlers and two-year-olds; a unique Staff Training Institute for child care workers and social workers; and more than \$2.7 million committed for permanent endowment.

And, the first Thanksgiving Offering for BCH since 1979 raised \$510,000, a sum more than \$100,000 greater than that realized through the combined offering with Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes. BCH sent \$1,000 from the Thanksgiving Offering to the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil as fulfillment of a promise to donate 10 percent of everything received over the goal to our partners in the south.

In addition, BCH maintained the partnership with our Brazilian counterparts by sending three training teams to Brazil, and hosting a group of Brazilian pastors in Thomasville.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life, often due to alcohol or drug abuse, or having been abused herself, leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives. Behavioral problems make it impossible for the child to continue to live at home.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and set goals to overcome them, which leads to behavior change and often. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH enjoyed a year of tremendous successes, in human terms and in institutional terms, which will allow it to continue to affect change in lives. Success in the "Give a child a chance!" Campaign will help provide a margin of excellence in the future when the pledges are paid. Already, the enthusiasm engendered by the effort have lifted the spirits of staff across the state.

Still, the Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes received \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

An increasingly important aspect of our support comes from estate gifts and bequests. More and more people who want their resources to provide new life for children include BCH in their wills.

When Sandi, and Kathy, and Chris, and Barbara comes to us, full of potential and hope, we want to be able to continue to tell them North Carolina Baptists care enough to give them a chance!

Your Baptist Colleges and Universities are concerned about college expenses families must pay. Administrators and trustees must also be concerned about operating costs on each campus. The figures above give the latest data for Cooperative Program support and financial aid to students in N.C. Baptist Colleges.

The Institutions Relationship Study Committee, appointed in 1991, will report to the Baptist State Convnention in November, 1992. Baptist colleges are a significant part of that study. The Council on Christian Higher Education requests the prayerful support of N.C. Baptists for the Committee, and for the colleges.

## North Carolina Baptist Hospital Report to the Associations 1992

Baptist Hospital utilizes the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. Last year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.

The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On-Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure an outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

Charges for the hospital services compare very favorably with those in other hospitals of the state. Reports from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission indicate that Baptist Hospital's charges are lower than the average in other hospitals which provide similar services and are considerably lower than in the other teaching hospitals. Our hospital did not have an increase in its rates for the current fiscal year of July 1, 1992 - June 30, 1993.

The hospital's physical plant continues to expand. A new 840-space parking deck was opened in January. A new Emergency Department/Dietary building which will also make possible more private patient rooms is under construction now. Construction will begin soon on the 170-bed skilled and intermediate care nursing facility and on the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. This expansion will make it possible not only to serve more people, but to serve them better.

The staff and the patients of Baptist Hospital are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for the heritage they have given the institution and for the moral and financial support they continue to give to its ministry.

## **Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.**

1992: MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our State, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist Older Adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best. In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our State in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville . . . a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly . . . the Best of Times.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.

## **Christian Action League of North Carolina, Inc. Annual Report 1991-1992**

For the 10th consecutive year, the gambling industry has not been able to secure passage of any gambling legislation such as a lottery or pari-mutuel betting (horse and dog racing).

The industry made its biggest push ever during the 1991-1992 legislative session. They secured 14 of the most effective and best known lobbyists that money can buy to push for their cause, but to no avail. When the legislative adjourned on July 24th, the gambling industry threw in the towel realizing that they did not have the votes in the N.C. House to pass their state-sponsored gambling bill, the lottery.

What made the difference? People like you did. You secured the commitments from your legislators that the role of government is not to exploit their weakest citizens, but to appeal to their strengths. Gambling violates the age-old principle.

There is one thing for sure. The pro-gambling forces will be back. However, the issue will be decided on November 3 at the General Election. If you elect legislators who are opposed to state-sponsored gambling, it will not make any difference how many lobbyists the gambling industry employs. The decision is in your hands. How do the candidates from your area stand on this issue?

There are other very important moral issues that you need to discuss with your legislative candidates. Some of them are:

1. **SEX EDUCATION.** . . Are our young people being deceived into believing that "safe sex" outside of marriage is possible and okay? The current rise in venereal diseases and teenage pregnancies, and the related emotional problems tells us we must focus attention on this issue.
2. **ABORTION.** . . The Supreme Court ruling regarding the abortion law of the state of Pennsylvania opens the door for further restrictions and conditions under which abortions can be performed — leaving this up to the states. This year we have worked on trying to get legislation passed requiring parental consent for abortion on minors, and reducing abortion funding. Both of these measures passed in the House but died in the Senate.
3. **ALCOHOL/DRUG ISSUES.** . . It is so important that we continue to address problems related to alcohol use and abuse. Reducing the blood alcohol standard for DWI from .10 to .08 was one of our targets this year, but it also failed to pass in the Senate after passing in the House.

We cannot overemphasize the importance of getting to know who your candidates are and how they stand on these key issues. Plato put it so well: "The price that good people pay for not being involved in politics is to be governed by people worse than themselves."

Thank you for standing with us in the cause of applied Christianity.

## Information for the 1992 Annual Associational Report

The Commission seeks to develop Christian morality among Southern Baptists by emphasizing the application of the principles of the Christian faith both in personal and public life. An ongoing effort is made to provide Christian ethics services to other Southern Baptist agencies, state Baptist conventions, associations, churches, and individuals to enable Southern Baptists to deal more effectively with the serious moral challenges of our time. The Commission encourages the formation and activation of Christian Life Committee at all levels of Southern Baptist life beginning with the local church. By coordinating and correlating Southern Baptist social concerns, the Commission helps to make the greatest possible impact for Christ in support of the Convention's total objectives.

The presence of full-time Washington-based staff has enhanced greatly the Commission's ability to fulfill the portion of its program statement which call on the it to "bring to bear Baptist statements, convictions and insights in the field of Christian ethics and religious liberty upon important policy making groups" and to "present Southern Baptist insight for consideration in the planning of federal government programs on children and youth, aging, housing, employment, public health, and other matters pertaining to social welfare."

During the past year, the Washington and Nashville staffs have worked diligently to share both with Congress and the White House numerous convictions and concerns of Southern Baptists. Commission staff members have been active in corresponding and meeting with members of both the legislative and executive branches of the federal government concerning areas of Southern Baptist concern. Also, with the approval of the Convention's Executive Committee, the Commission launched a new publication, *Salt*, in a newsletter format (six issues a year), which seeks to keep Southern Baptists informed on public policy and issues active in the administrative, judicial and legislative branches of the federal government. The goal of *Salt* is to inform and motivate Southern Baptists to influence their president, senators, and representatives in a responsible, scriptural manner.

The Commission has also been particularly active during the past year in leading a strong coalition of numerous groups supporting legislation restricting alcohol advertising and requiring mandatory health warnings on alcohol advertisements. Abortion, drug abuse and pornography are among the other issues on which the Commission staff has been involved through the Washington office in the past year. The Commission remains particularly concerned about the serious threats to religious liberty posed by recent Supreme Court decisions and works closely with a coalition of groups trying to remedy these threats both through legislation and judicial action. The Commission also continued to pursue the fulfillment of its program statement this past year through the filing of *amicus curiae*, "friend of the court," briefs in cases involving abortion, pornography and religious liberty.

In the religious liberty arena, the Commission also filed its first independent *amicus curia* (friend of the court) brief in the U.S. Supreme Court in the *Lee v. Weisman* school graduation prayer case. In this brief, the Commission asked the Court to overturn a lower court order prohibiting invocations and benedictions containing the word "God" at public school commencement exercises. The Commission has also asked the Court

to revise the "Lemon" test and suggested a new test to replace Lemon, a test which is premised on the principles of government accommodation of religious practices which exist independently of government action and are not induced or coerced by government. The Commission believes students must have the right to free exercise of *their* religious liberty while in school, to associate voluntarily with one another during lunch, recess and free periods to pray, study the Bible and to discuss religious issues with each other without government control or censorship.

The Commission's 1992 annual national seminar in Washington, D.C. was entitled "Citizen Christians: Their Rights and Responsibilities." The program combined interpretive biblical themes with addresses on subjects such as "How Christians Can Make a Difference Inside Government" and "What You as a Christian Can and Cannot Do." The seminar also included a White House briefing and a congressional breakfast where seminar participants had an opportunity to interact with various senators and congressmen about issues of concern to them.

The Commission continued its long-standing leadership in the field of race relations by sponsoring a consultation which brought Southern Baptists of many racial and ethnic backgrounds together. The consultation was very helpful in addressing the goal the Commission seeks and the obstacles the Commission faces in encouraging our denomination and our society to be more Christ-like on this issue in the years ahead. The Commission also provided leadership in the National Coalition Against Pornography and during Bible Preaching-Church Administration Weeks and National Student Weeks at Ridgecrest and Glorieta. Commission staff also served as resource persons in events held in numerous state conventions as well as for other Southern Baptist agencies and entities.

The Commission continued its responsibility assigned by the Southern Baptist Convention for education and action related to the issue of hunger. Commission staff produced the 1991-1992 World Hunger Awareness/Action Guide entitled *Hunger*. This guide was mailed to every church in the Convention to encourage and to support the observance of World Hunger Day. The Commission-produced film, *What Shall We Do in a Hungry World?*, which had previously been mailed in videotape form to Southern Baptist associations, continued to be used significantly in heightening Southern Baptists' awareness on this vital issue.
