7. Appointed Elder E. L. Blankenship to write the next Circular Letter.

8. Agreed to hold our next session with the church at Leatherwood, Henry Co., Va., to commence on Friday before the fourth Sunday in August, 1907, and continue three days; and that Elder G. F. Dyer preach the introductory sermon, with Elder E. L. Blankenship his alternate.

9. A vote of thanks were unanimously given by the Association to the brethren, sisters and good citizens, of the town of Martinsville, for their kind and hospital treatment shown to us during the meeting.

10. Dismissed in order by Elder A. L. Moore.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Dear Brethren : I desire to offer a few remarks on the following scripture.

"But the anointing which ye have received of him abideth in you, and ye need not that any man teach you : but as the same anointing teacheth you of all things, and is truth, and is no lie, and even as it hath taught you, ye shall abide in him,"-1 John 2:27.

The apostle John is evidently speaking of something which the church, or "little children," as he terms them, has in possession ; and, when we search to find out what that "something" is, it is to be understood that he is speaking in a spiritual manner, or by inspiration ; and that it is, therefore, seen by a spiritual eye. This apostle seems always to deal, in a great degree, with the very principles of the virtue and power of Jesus Christ. We hear him say, "In the beginning was the Word, and the word was with God, and the Word was God." He goes right to the spiritual part of things to begin ; and, in his epistle, we see him right to the spiritual import. Now the anointing which God's people receive from the Holy One is an abiding something, and what shall we call that "something?" It is something that is true, something that teaches, something that has taught those who have been anointed, something that supplies the anointed so perfectly and completely that it is not necessary to have any other teacher. The name that we give that "something" is "The Holy Ghost" or "Holy Spirit" that God sends in the name of Jesus Christ that shall guide them in all truth. Jesus promised his disciples, when he left them, that he would tread the wine press of the wrath of God, and to send the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, and that Comforter should guide them into all truth. Therefore the guide is safe; it is true; it is powerful; it does accomplish that which the Father dsigned and desires. And the very principle that moves in the heart of the redeemed, and prompts them to action, and shows them the imperfection of humanity, and the perfections of God and of his Son Jesus Christ, and makes known their redemption to them, and their deliverance from sin and condemnation, is the very thing that anoints them, and covers them up, so to speak, and so completely out shines anything that they know of, that they are ready to exclaim, with all the powers in their possession, saying, It is too high ! too wonderful ! I cannot attain unto it. It is too grand to be taught by the spirit of man. And, not only so, it is the work of God's own hand ; and whatsoever he doeth shall be, and there can be nothing added to it, or taken from it.

So great is that teaching, that the humblest creature can learn; the most ignorant can discern, because it just gets hold of the heart and soul, and just leads it in the paths of truth and righteousness, and displays so much glory that there can be no failure in the matter. And the little one, forgetting his own knowledge and power, just takes hold of that guide, and is marching at a flying speed toward the Celestial City wherein dwells righteousness, and needs no one to look for bumps in the road : for all obstacles are erased by the finger of the Lord, and the power and knowledge of man is not in sight.

Think, O people, redeemed of the Lord, how much you could have been taught in regard to your sin and condemnation by the power and knowledge of man? Should he have said, All is well; come and join us, would it have satisfied you? You may not have known the first letter of the alphabet, but you know too much to take comfot from words of this kind. Why? Because the anoiting teaches you the truth, and is no lie, and all such comfort is miseraple. And your cry would have been, You cannot tell me that: for something speaks louder and with more knowledge and power than your words, and I am compelled to adhere to it.

Again, when you were delivered from sin and condemnation, should some one have said, O! it is all nonsense and imagination with you, however much he may have knowa, and however little you may have known, your very cry would have been, You cannot teach me that. Why? Because the anointing within is too wonderful to be blotted out; and it is that that cheerishes my soul and is my all and in all.

The love of God shed abroad in the heart teaches more than all human knowledge. The understanding being enlightened shows more than tongue can express, and greater is he that is in you than he that is in the world.

When I think of its teaching in every phase, I am made to exclaim, How great and wonderful its power! Its teachings being followed, how many prisons could be turned to temples? How many lawyers to quit the practice? How many judges to vacate the benches? How many dollars to give the poor? How many wrongs to be exchanged for rights? How many wounds to have the oil of gladness? Not only so; to come nearer home, How many churches to flourish and bloom? How many daughters of men to be rejected? How many members' hear's bound closer together ?

O!brethren and sisters, may we all be brought more feelingly and sensibly nearer to the knowledge of the truth; and may we feel that, what is my interest is my brother's interest, and what is our interest is the interess of the church of Christ. Be ware of the devices of men.
