CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The name of the organization shall be the Randolph Baptist Association.

Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. The promotion of harmony, fellowship and cooperation among the churches of the Association.
- b. The propagation of the Gospel within the territory of the Association and to the uttermost part of the earth.
- c. The promotion of the missionary, education and benevolent causes of Christ within the Association and in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II — MEMBERSHIP

Section 1.

- a. The membership of the Association shall consist of messengers of Baptist churches regularly affiliated with the Association. All churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall present to the Missions Committee proper petitions, accompanied by satisfactory evidences of doctrinal regularity and general acceptability. After one year under the watchcare of the Association the said Committee will report to the Association its recommendation. Upon a favorable vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the annual associational meeting the petitioning church may become regularly affiliated with the Association.
- b. "Fellowship may be withdrawn by the Association at any annual meeting upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, from any church in its membership that has been found, by due investigation, to have departed from the Missionary Baptist faith and practices, or has failed to abide by the provision of this Constitution and By-Laws, or has failed to either have its pastor or lay member or both in attendance in one or more of the four regular meetings of the Executive Committee, or has failed to make a contribution to the expenses of the Association in addition to the cost of Association minutes, or has failed to properly prepare and return to the Association office a copy of the associational letter, or has failed to send one or more messengers to the annual session of the Association."

Section 2. Such a church may, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and vote of the Association, be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such action have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish to the Association each year a letter, on the form provided by the Clerk, giving full information and statistics provided for on the form, and to send with the letter or by messenger a contribution toward the cost of printing the minutes and other expenses of the Association.

Section 4. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except of an advisory nature.

Section 5. A church may withdraw from membership in the Association by a vote of the church according to its own by-laws, regulations and procedure.

ARTICLE III — MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually on two days during the week following the Third Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall be composed of messengers chosen by the respective churches of the Association from their membership. *Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above one hundred it has enrolled*, but not to exceed ten such messengers. All pastors in the Association and the Director of Missions are messengers in all the Associational Meetings, each having but one vote.

Section 3. The Association may hold a Mid-Term meeting each spring at such time and place as may be determined by the Association or its Executive Committee. The purpose of the Mid-Term meeting shall be that of information and inspiration without the transaction of business, except that urgent matters of business which cannot well be delayed until a later meeting may be considered and acted upon.

Section 4. Other meetings of the Association may be held when called by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three Trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected on the first day of the regular annual session. The prior approval and consent to serve, if elected, shall have been secured from a prospective nominee prior to placing his name in nomination for any one of the several associational elective offices. They shall take office at the close of the Annual Session and serve through the next Annual Session. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall not serve more than two years in succession.

Section 3. Duties of the Officers:

- a. The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association and discharge such duties as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body.
- b. The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of or at the request of the Moderator.
- c. The Clerk and Treasurer position shall be fulfilled by the office secretary unless otherwise recommended by the Executive Committee.
 - (1) The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of the association, together with the reports and statistics, and have the same printed and distributed.
 - (2) The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at the Annual Meeting.

- d. The duties of the Trustees shall be to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of said Trustees shall be authorized by the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 4. "The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches of the Association for the promotion of the various phases of their work involving Sunday School, Church Training, Baptist Brotherhood, and Woman's Missionary Union. The Directors of the Associational Sunday School, Associational Church Training, and Associational Baptist Brotherhood shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Association, and approved and elected by the Executive Committee of the Association in the May meeting, and shall serve officially from October 1 to September 30. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary organization of the Association. These officers are elected in the WMU Annual Meeting in the spring."

ARTICLE V — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Committee comprised of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Trustees of the Association, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Baptist Brotherhood Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Associational Director of Missions, all pastors, all church educational directors, and one member of each church in the Association desiring representation on the Committee.

Section 2.

- a. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings once each quarter during the second month of the quarter, the date to be set by the Board itself, and at such other times as may be required at the call of the Moderator, or at the call of not less than five members of the Executive Committee.
- b. Twenty members of the Executive Committee shall be required to be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. To act for and on behalf of the Association between sessions.
- d. To carry out the orders and resolutions of the Association pertaining to it.
- e. To superintend the Associational Mission work, employ a missionary and determine the salary to be paid.
- f. To fill vacancies which may occur during the year in the personnel of the Associational officers or workers for the remainder of such unexpired term.
- g. To investigate any report of complaint that may be brought to its attention about irregularity of doctrine, practice, or conduct on the part of any individual or group in the Association and report its finding with such recommendations as it considers advisable, to the Association in a regular meeting.
- h. To make such recommendations as it may deem wise for the strengthening and upbuilding of the churches and the work of the Association.
- i. The Executive Committee shall not involve the Association in debt to exceed one hundred dollars for necessary operating expenses of the Association.

- j. To appoint and elect the officers for the Associational organizations of the Sunday School, Church Training, and Baptist Brotherhood.

ARTICLE VI — ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1.

- a. The Associational Council shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Associational Music Director, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Director of Missions, and others deemed necessary by the Moderator to carry on the work of the Association.
- b. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Council, the Vice-Moderator as vice-chairman, and the clerk as secretary.

Section 2.

- a. The Associational Council shall hold meetings once each month and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman, Director of Missions or at the call of not less than 5 members of the Council.
- b. Seven members of the Council shall be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. The duties of the Associational Council shall be:
- (1) To plan the general work of the Association.
 - (2) To assign responsibility of the implementation of proposed plans.
 - (3) To receive and help correlate into a general associational program the proposed plans of the individual organizations.
- d. The Council shall give a quarterly report to the Associational Executive Committee along with any recommendations it may have.

ARTICLE VII — COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the August Executive Committee Meeting, before the Annual session of the Association. This committee shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the Annual Session.

The committee shall name the following committees to report during the Annual Sessions.

Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees:

Nominating, Budget and Finance, Missions, Evangelism, Constitution and By-Laws, Ordination, Time, Place and Preacher, Order of Business, Christian Life and Public Affairs and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

This committee will continue to function to replace vacancies that occur during the year.

Section 2. Duties of Committees for Annual Session:

- (1) Memorials: This committee will be composed of two members. They

will prepare a list of those members of the churches who have died during the year and present suitable memorial resolutions for adoption by the Association in the annual session.

- (2) **Appreciation:** This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare and present appropriate resolutions of appreciation and concern to the annual session.

Section 3. Standing Committees Membership and Duties:

A. Term of Service

Each standing committee will have members who will serve on a rotating basis: three (3) years, two (2) years, and one (1) year, with the term of office being from the close of the annual session through the following Annual Session. It is suggested that each committee meet once each quarter or as often as needed.

Each committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons with every area of the association represented.

B. Duties of Standing Committees.

- a. *Nominating Committee:* The nominating committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The nominating committee shall nominate a complete slate of officers for the next year. Their first report would be to the May Executive Committee meeting, in which the Sunday School Director, Church Training Director and Baptist Brotherhood Director would be presented and elected. These Directors would make suggestions concerning leaders in their organizations to be presented at the annual session for election and approval.
- b. *Budget and Finances:* The Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The Budget and Finance Committee shall study the association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the quarterly Executive Committee and a final report to the Annual Session.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the association, upon request, with the stewardship program offered by the Baptist State Convention or Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee should meet once each quarter to review financial affairs of the association, or as often as is needed.

- c. *Missions Committee:* The Missions Committee shall be composed of six (6) members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. Also WMU Director and Brotherhood Director shall serve as Ex-officio members. This committee shall meet at least once each quarter or as often as is needed. Guiding Principles for the Work of the Missions Committee of the Randolph Association.

1. The Committee is to seek to discover areas where new work is needed and to lead in the sponsorship or establishment of new work to meet present need or the securing of property by a local church and/or the Association in the anticipation of future need.
2. All new work does not necessarily need to be nor should be intended to become an organized or constituted church. New work

may be started and maintained on the basis of a mission to meet particular needs (This provides for institutional missions such as jails, prisons, rest homes, etc.).

3. The location of missions or new churches shall be determined by the need revealed in an adequate survey conducted by the Missions Committee and local interested groups or churches.
 4. Any church, committee, group or individuals considering beginning new work, acting with or without church sponsorship, should approach the Missions Committee for guidance before having any service or choosing a temporary or permanent location.
 5. The Missions Committee shall institute basic, understandable operational procedures and practices for a mission that leads in establishing and strongly urges that each church establishing a mission does the same. The guidance of missions by the Missions Committee shall continue until a co-operating church or churches can be led to accept the responsibility of sponsorship.
 6. A mission organized or assisted by the Missions Committee shall accept the recognized principles and practices of a church cooperating with the Randolph Association, the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 7. The Missions Committee shall plan and develop special associational projects and make the churches aware of these mission opportunities to participate.
- d. *Order of Business:* The Order of Business Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee will prepare well in advance a suggested order of business for the annual session. The committee will notify those who are to make reports or have a part on the program. The program for the annual session of the association shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting. The Moderator, Clerk, and Music Director shall be Ex-officio members of the committee.

This committee will be also responsible for promoting the annual session through the various news media.

- e. *Evangelism:* The Evangelism committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. The committee shall plan and promote annual programs or clinics for persons to be trained and motivated to witness for Christ. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter and report its activities to the Executive Committee. The committee will give a written report to the annual session.
- f. *Ordinations:* The Ordination Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. Also the Director of Missions, the pastor and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate of the Gospel ministry.

Guidelines:

- (1) The committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of minutes, signed by the Clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place and procedure.
- (4) The committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
- (5) The committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (6) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the committee regarding any area of the ministry.
- (7) In every instance, the committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially 1 Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9. The Ordination Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The chairman shall report the committee's activities to the Executive Committee and provide a written report for the annual session.

- g. *Place, Time, and Preacher:* This committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee will receive invitations from the churches which desire the association to meet with them the next year. It will recommend to the association in its annual session the time and place of the annual session the following year. This committee will also recommend a preacher and an alternate for the annual sermon.
- h. *Constitution:* The Constitution Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The clerk of the association shall also serve on the committee. This committee shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed. The committee shall meet at least twice a year, once in the winter and once in the summer.
- i. *Building and Grounds:* The Building and Grounds Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the association. It will make recommendations to the Executive Committee concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. The committee should meet at least once each quarter. It shall give a written report to the annual session of its work.
- j. *Seminary Extension:* The Seminary Extension Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension classes for pastors and lay-persons as they may be

desired. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee its activities and make a written report to the annual session.

- k. *Historical*: The Historical Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. It shall be the duty of the committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Session.
- l. *Christian Life and Public Affairs*: This committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall recommend ways in which the association can work for the promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift. It will inform the churches of current issues of Christian response. The committee shall also commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee and Annual Session when needed.

ARTICLE VIII — ORDINATION AND CALLING OF PASTORS

Section 1. Inasmuch as the ordination of a man to the gospel ministry by any church in this Association is expected to be recognized by the denomination as a whole, the churches are counseled to be extremely careful in the matter of setting men apart for this sacred calling, ordaining only those who, by irreproachable character, piety of life, doctrinal soundness and suitable talents, give promise of honoring the name of Christ and of rendering acceptable service in the missionary Baptist ministry.

Section 2. To aid the churches in this vital matter, the Association will appoint each year a committee of five of the pastors to be called the Committee on Ordination. Any church desiring to ordain a brother to the ministry may request the Ordination Committee to act as a presbytery for the purpose of examining the brother according to the guidelines found under Duties of Ordination Committee.

Section 3. The churches are urged also to exercise the utmost care and wisdom, earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in calling of their pastors, choosing only men who give evidence by their Christian character, cooperative spirit and leadership ability, that they will serve the best interests of the churches, the denomination, and the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE IX — NEW CHURCHES

Baptist churches may be organized and established in localities within the territory of this Association when such new churches are seen to be needed. Those interested in organizing a new church may seek the Counsel of the Executive Committee and the Missions Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE X — RULES AND ORDER OF DECORUM

This Association shall be governed in its meetings by such rules and by-laws as may be adopted, amended, or set aside by a majority vote of the messengers present. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be the guide in all parliamentary matters.

ARTICLE XI — ADOPTION

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and shall supersede any and all constitutions, by-laws and amendments previously adopted.

ARTICLE XII — AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Annual Meeting. The vote on any proposed amendment so presented should be deferred until the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

From these activities, you would think that all I do is attend meetings/conferences. It is a big part of my time and energy, but I see them as the preparation time for the greater ministry we have-building the fellowship among Pastors and Churches, meeting needs of evangelism, missions, and church development, and creating an awareness of meeting human needs in persons around our communities. I feel a greater burden in helping our churches grow in their ministry of touching lives and changing people. To this ministry, I commit my life and energies.

There are two great events that meant much to me this past year.

First, my trip to Togo, West Africa to participate in the evangelistic campaign was a dream come true. I am deeply indebted to the Baptists of Randolph Association for providing the financial resources to go and share the gospel with these people. The response and results were tremendous. God had prepared the hearts of the Togolese people to hear the good news about Jesus Christ. During the nine (9) days I was in the Moretan area, I saw 72 persons make first time decisions for Christ. It has been a joy to share in fifteen (15) churches and three (3) schools and civic clubs. Every church in our association that gave, had a big part in this mission project. We deeply believe it will benefit the churches in months and years to come. Because of this mission trip and the sharing of the gospel, our people will pray more about our mission work and give more toward the ministry of our mission enterprise.

Secondly, the World Missions Conference was our big event for this year in our association. It was a great success. We had 27 churches to participate in hearing five missionaries from around the world. Two foreign, two home, and one state. Over 9,000 persons heard these missionaries share their personal experiences and their work in those eight (8) days. Each of the associational meetings planned for World Missions Conference were well attended. There were over 200 at the rally and fair, 110 at the senior adult luncheon, and 108 at the youth rally. I have participated in six world missions conferences in my ministry, and I believe this one was the best, the greatest. The conference has informed us about our mission work, inspired us to the command and commission of our Lord Jesus Christ, and challenged us to be more involved in praying, giving and going. I am grateful to God for this week of mission emphasis. I truly believe we will see many results in our churches.

As we look toward a new year, let me challenge you as followers and churches to be committed to God's mission for you. Let us affirm the Bold Mission Thrust Goals as our goals as an association of churches. Let us:

1. *Reach People for Christ*

The Home Mission Board has reminded us lately that our estimated population for 1987 is 99,070, with 66% of our county unreached, unaffiliated by anybody's church.

2. *Develop Believers Unto Christ*

There is a continuous need to equip the saints by developing believers in prayer, discipleship, stewardship and calling out the called.

3. *Strengthen Missions Through Christ*

Ongoing missions endeavors, need our attention in mission education, involvement, and increased giving to mission causes.

Through our associational council and organizations, we plan and commit ourselves as leaders to emphasize these Bold Missions Goals for growth in our churches.

As I have visited our churches and shared in the activities of the association, it is exciting to be part of a group of churches that get excited about being on mission for our Lord. CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

One Baptist leader has said that Baptist colleges deserve the "Light Under the Bushel award." He meant, of course, that many of the finest most interesting stories about Baptist colleges are not widely known.

Everyone connects Baptist colleges and a superior experience in Christian education. Most would agree that there are other strong advantages for Baptist students who attend a North Carolina Baptist college. When young people and their parents are choosing a college together, here are some things to consider:

THE TIME: Life after high school is still a time for growing, maturing, learning and planning for a full life as an adult. Going to college in a Christian environment can make a world of difference for a life-time. The first experiences after leaving home can shape a life forever.

THE SIZE: All of the Baptist colleges in North Carolina are small and manageable. You can easily walk anywhere on campus. A new student, fresh from high school, does not get lost in the crowd. Classes are small. Teachers can know the names and faces of students and are available to advise and counsel between classes. Many years after graduation, former students still visit and write letters to favorite professors. Cherished friends in college often remain friends for a life-time.

THE CALL TO CHRISTIAN SERVICE: In Baptist colleges the ideal of service to others remains strong in vocational planning. A sense of calling to a variety of service leadership areas is emphasized, including church-related vocations. In a "me first" world, Baptist colleges are different in important ways.

PREPARING FOR LIFE: Christian education prepares students for making a living, but more importantly, Christian education is the best preparation for spending a life. An excellent, broad-based education provides a sound foundation for a person's last job, as well as the first.

THE ROLL CALL OF BAPTIST COLLEGES

There are six educational institutions supported financially by the Baptist State Convention: Campbell; Chowan; Gardner-Webb; Mars Hill; Meredith; and Wingate.

Wake Forest, our oldest school, has a continuing "fraternal and voluntary" relationship with North Carolina Baptists and the Council on Christian Higher Education.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT

The year 1986-87 has been an exciting time in the life of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Charged with the task of providing quality living opportunities for Older Adults within a Christian context, the "Homes" have this year attempted to "move forward" in three broad directions.

1. *Advocacy for Older Adults*

During 1986-87, the "Homes" have endeavored to become an advocate, a spokesman, for a very special segment of the state's population . . . the Older Adult. Appearing before church, associational, and convention groups, throughout the state, the "Homes" and staff have attempted to sensitize Baptists to the particular needs of Older Adults as well as the significant contribution they can make to the well-being of the churches and associations of the Baptist State Convention.

2. *Quality Care*

During the year 1986-87, the "Homes" have continued to develop creative ways to meet the needs of Older Adults. For example, a significant new relationship has been established between the "Homes" and the Geriatric Section of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine (Wake Forest University). Mary Lyles, an attending physician in the Department of Medicine, has been appointed the "Homes" Medical Director. As a result of this new relationship, the "Homes" will be able to offer "sub-acute" care as well as intermediate and skilled nursing to its residents and patients. In an attempt to provide quality care opportunities to Older Adults who still reside in the local community setting, a respite or temporary care program has been begun at the Albemarle Home. Quality care, long the hall-mark of the "Homes" is still the institution's main objective.

3. During 1986-87, plans for institutional expansion and new development move forward at a rapid pace. "Ground-breaking" for a new Continuing Care Retirement Community in Winston-Salem will take place in the fall. The Homes' long-range plan includes the development of similar facilities in Asheville, Charlotte, and the East.

The "Good News of Jesus Christ" is the presupposition upon which the "Homes" operate. In reaching out in service to Older Adults, the "Homes" offer concrete expression to the love of the Christ for all people. The support of North Carolina Baptists makes this ministry of love possible.

This is the second year for our receiving of the special Homes and Hospitals Offering. The offering is a result of a decision made in November 1985, at the North Carolina Baptist State Convention's annual meeting in Charlotte to begin a new offering for our Children's Homes, Retirement Homes and Baptist Hospital. Formerly, these institutions received a portion of the State Missions Offering. This is no longer true. Therefore, each of these institutions is relying on the Homes and Hospital Offering to fund part of its work. From 1985 to 1986 there was an increase of \$5,067.87 given to this offering.

For 36 years, Baptist Retirement Homes have been defining security, quality medical care, independence, love and much more. 300 senior adults are now making their "Homes" on the five campuses. The senior adults living in the personal care ministry are approximately 85 years of age. Baptist Retirement Homes are working to develop new areas of ministry-respite care, adult care, and home health care.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

During the past year, Baptist Hospital admitted 22,973 patients for a total of 186,321 days of patient care. More than 1,000 of those patients had heart surgery and 27 received kidney transplants. During this period, the hospital also performed its first heart transplant and, as of June 1, 1987, has performed four successful heart transplants.

Approximately 1,000 persons with kidney stones have been treated with the lithotripter. The lithotripter has also been used to break up gallstones. Baptist Hospital was the first hospital in the United States to achieve this success.

The Air Care Program, described as "a flying emergency room staffed with highly trained pilots and flight nurses," continues to save lives and to contribute

to more rapid and complete recovery for many victims of trauma. For example, Air Care made it possible for a man whose arm was severed in a hay mowing accident to reach the hospital in time to have his arm reattached.

Baptist Hospital is one of less than a half dozen medical centers in the nation routinely transplanting living bone tissue. A woman underwent this rare procedure to correct an arthritic condition in her hip where her bone tissue had died. Bone tissue with its own blood supply was successfully transplanted from her lower legs to the upper end of the right femur.

In addition to those admitted to the hospital, 30,726 persons were seen in the outpatient clinics, 35,134 in the emergency department, and 196,556 in the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. 2,747 patients had outpatient surgery.

During the past year, the Pastoral Care Department has continued to provide pastoral services for hospital patients, pastoral counseling, clinical pastoral education, and human enrichment events. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, has offered the "Pastor's Sabbath" Program at Caraway Conference Center and has provided assistance to more than 100 pastors and their families through the Minister's Care Plan. Plans are being made to offer training in "Conflict Management," "Healing of Corporate Pain," and "Ministry to the Interim Church."

Due to the change in the method and timing of the special offering, Baptist Hospital received during its past fiscal year the largest offering from the churches in its history. The last North Carolina Missions Offering in September of 1985 and the first Homes and Hospital Offering in May of 1986, together with designated gifts, brought the hospital a total of \$474,662.00. Cooperative Program gifts to the hospital during the same fiscal year was \$608,389.00, making our total receipts from the churches \$1,083,051.00.

For these gifts and for all other continuing support and help from the Baptist Churches, the hospital trustees, staff and patients are deeply grateful.

CHILDREN'S HOMES REPORT

In behalf of Dr. Blackwell, the staff, trustees and children in care, we gratefully acknowledge your support through your prayers, concern and financial resources.

Four major emphases occurred during this exciting year at the Children's Homes:

1. There was a reorganization of group care on the Mills Home Campus in order to more effectively deliver services to children and families. Intentionalized Services will focus on specific tasks needed by our clients in order to regain their ability to function in society.
2. Moody Home Ministries, an intensive program of "friendship therapy" to troubled girls, was opened in Macon County.
3. Long-range Planning, which in today's complex world of child care can only extend up to five years, was begun. As a basis for this IRP, accreditation by the National Association of Homes for Children was awarded in 1987. We are only one of three NAHC accredited child-care institutions in North Carolina. We believe you share in this accomplishment.

4. Partnerships in cooperation with the WMU, Personal Evangelism, Baptist Men and the Department of Aging have been both rewarding and exciting. We are grateful for their willingness to assist in informing the Baptists of North Carolina on this child care ministry.

Our commitment to you is to be good stewards of that which is entrusted to our care as we offer quality services on four group care campuses, eight emergency care homes, in our foster homes, at our therapeutic camping program, through the child development center and at our maternity home. **OUR MISSION REMAINS FIRM: TO HELP HURTING CHILDREN AND ASSIST BROKEN FAMILIES.** We encourage you to help us by promoting the 1988 Homes and Hospital Offering in May and Cooperative Program Stewardship.

UPDATE/THOMASVILLE FAMILY SERVICES AREA: The Mills Home Baptist Church continues to be a source of encouragement in light of over thirty youth making a profession of faith in Jesus Christ. This is certainly a vital part of the mission endeavor in reaching the world for our Lord.

Miss Leigh Sneed did an outstanding job as our Youth Corp summer worker.

The Arts and Craft Festival continues to be a popular event. Over 500 joined our staff for this exciting event.

Homecoming in August was an enjoyable experience as 1,000 alumni and friends returned home for their annual event. Two former editors of *Charity and Children* returned for the occasion, including John Roberts, current editor of the *Baptist Courier* in South Carolina; and Marse Grant, retired editor of the *Biblical Recorder*.

Charles Goad was named Acting Director, Thomasville Family Services Area.

Larry Sawyer was transferred to the Pembroke Family Services Area.

Through your faithful prayers and generous financial support, we continue to be laborers together for God, grateful for the opportunity to serve with you.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE of North Carolina, Inc.

Report to the Association in 1987:

The General Assembly adjourned its 1987 session on August 14, marking the first time in North Carolina's history for the legislature to last into August. Normally the body concludes its work by the 4th of July.

One of the reasons for the session to last as long as it did was due to the "rash" of liquor bills along with gambling initiatives. Longtime legislative veterans stated that this session had more bills to liberalize our liquor law than ever. With the liquor lobbyists and gambling proponents working over-time, no wonder this session went on and on.

A major victory can be claimed by the defeat of the statewide lottery proposal. Due to Virginia's recent passage of such a bill, the heat from the gambling industry was evident. With opposition to the proposal coming from Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert B. Jordan, and House Speaker Liston B. Ramsey, the bill died in a Senate Committee.

However, the gambling industry did not fold up its tent and go home. A parimutuel gambling bill, Senate Bill 732 is still alive. Its sponsor, Senator Kenneth Royall, was able to get the measure held over until the 1988 legislative session. This proposal will open the door for horse and dog gambling tracks.

Your association needs to pass a resolution opposing Senate Bill 732, in parimutuel gambling proposal. Send copies to Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert B. Jordan, III, and to your State House and Senate members.

In the war against pornography, we have special reasons to be thankful. The North Carolina Supreme Court has recently upheld the constitutionality of our 1985 Comprehensive Obscenity and Child Protection Act. The "smut peddlers" have contested this statute in both the state and federal courts. Each time the courts have ruled in support of the measure. Prior to the enactment of this nationally acclaimed law, North Carolina was known as the nation's porn capital with more porno outlets per capita than any other state. We have gone from some 750 pornography outlets to less than 50. No longer do you find sexually oriented publications available and accessible to children in convenience stores, etc.

The porn industry hasn't thrown the towel in either. There will be more court cases. In the current session of the N. C. General Assembly, an effort was made to "gut" our obscenity statute. Rep. Ivan Mothershead of Mecklenburg County sought to insert into our law a provision to apply a statewide standard rather than a community standard. Of course, that innocent sounding wording would have rendered our obscenity statute unconstitutional. The U. S. Supreme Court in its 1973 landmark case, Miller vs. California, set forth as a basic test in determining obscenity was the applying of a contemporary community standard rather than a statewide one. This reveals the importance of what one word could do to a good law. We are grateful that Rep. Mothershead was unsuccessful in his attempt.

Rep. Mothershead sought to repeal our newly enacted age 21 drinking law, but he was unsuccessful in that attempt. Of course, the beer industry was behind that effort, but the loss of federal highway funds for N. C. highway building projects was more than the legislators were willing to tackle. If Mothershead would have been successful, the state would have had to pass a considerable increase in motor fuel taxes. This might have been the reason behind his effort to raise gasoline taxes.

Thank you for standing with us in the ministry of applied Christianity. Through your prayer and financial support, you help us to be an effective applicator of "salt and light."

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

With your help many of the opportunities the Lord has given us to share His Word with people throughout the world are being met. Through the United Bible Societies, the international cooperative network of national Bible Societies of which the American Bible Society is a leading member, 600,128,459 copies of Scripture were distributed worldwide during 1986 — an increase of 9.4 percent over 1985.

The American Bible Society is continuing to lend assistance to ongoing Scripture translation projects in 555 languages. In 348 of these, some part of the Bible is being translated for the first time.

In **Colombia**, local Bible Society workers are witnessing an enormous interest in reading and studying the Bible on the part of the general population, as is evidenced by the year's Scripture distribution total of 6,616,978 copies. During 1986 a project was launched to enable young people to obtain a Bible and to encourage them to read it and share its message with others. Many major universities became the focus of efforts to promote the

reading of God's word among students. For young children, Scripture coloring books are provided to schools for use in religious education classes. The Bible Society often works with churches in planning special programs for areas where the people are very poor and often have difficulty reading, and its material is also used in government literacy campaigns.

In **Kenya**, the task of opening God's Word for all is a very demanding challenge. Although there are only two official languages — kiSwahili and English — their use is limited to only 15 percent of the population and is concentrated in urban areas. Over all, 602,200 copies of Scripture in all categories and in many languages were distributed last year.

In the **Philippines**, recent events have brought both renewed hope and an urgent need to rebuild national institutions and values. Today, more than ever before, people are turning to the Bible to discover what God's Word has to say to them. The Bible Society is expanding its distributions programs so that all may have easy access to the Gospel's message of comfort and reconciliation. Scriptures are also produced in braille and large-print versions and the New Testament has recently been brought out on audio cassettes. In total, 8,600,532 copies of Scripture were distributed throughout the country.

The work of the American Bible Society embraces many ongoing ministries which have become a regular part of its outreach each year. These include serving the special Scripture needs of hospital patients, nursing home residents, inmates of correctional institutions, blind and visually-impaired people, men and women in the armed forces, and the many thousands of expatriates from other countries who require specially-prepared editions of God's Word in their own language.

Scriptures for Young People, Evangelism, the military, and in languages other than English are the key areas of need.

We appreciate immensely the way the Southern Baptist Convention has responded so generously to global Scripture needs during the past year as it always has done. In 1986, the Southern Baptist Churches gave \$272,277 to the American Bible Society in support of the worldwide Bible Cause.

BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATION, 1987

You might call Frank Neville handicapped. He spends most of his time in a wheelchair. But he denies that he is handicapped, and instead has utilized his limited mobility as opportunity to witness. Each day he invites neighbors and acquaintances, one at a time, into his home for coffee. There he talks with them about Jesus, and Frank has been thrilled and amazed at their expressions of appreciation for his concern for their spiritual welfare.

Frank has determined that he will never stop witnessing, and his financial and estate plans have been so prepared as to insure that he will always be a part of winning the lost to Christ. He transferred valuable land into trust with the Baptist Foundation. Until his death, he will receive income earned by the trust. After that time, all income will be paid to Carolina Baptist Association to be used for Spanish mission ministries; scholarships for youngsters to attend summer camp, for students studying for Christian vocations, and for persons going on volunteer mission trips; for training and resources for associational leadership, and for camp development. Frank Neville, like others who are faithful stewards now, wishes to continue that commitment when he is no longer here.

In 1986, new trust agreements were prepared for 93 persons. Their gifts to

initiate these trusts totaled \$1,181,288. Many of the agreements provide for and anticipate the addition of funds in the future; thus, it is difficult to assess the longterm benefit to Baptist work provided through the trusts. Assistance was given to dozens of persons in preparing their Wills, all of whom included trusts through their estates for nearly every cause supported by Southern Baptists.

One imaginative concept employed in several trusts and Wills has been "Give it Twice." A trustor provides that family members receive income earned by the trust until they have received an amount equal to the principal placed in trust. Then, after the family has received the full amount, the income thereafter is paid to Baptist causes selected by the trustor in the trust agreement. He has denied his family nothing! They have received it all. But the principal is still intact and the second time around the income will support Kingdom work.

In cooperation with the state convention, the Foundation established in the last year a credit line of \$3,000,000 for church loans. The Board of Directors took action to implement recommendations of its study committee, resulting in addition to the staff of a director of administration to direct the church loan and student loan programs, as well as trust management. The Board also approved construction of office facilities for the Foundation near the Baptist Building, with plans to begin construction in September, 1987.

Assets of the Foundation have increased to more than \$13,000,000. These dollars are expressions of concern made by Baptist stewards. They are the very same persons who, like Frank Neville, witness and give daily, that the lost, the needy, the hurting people of the world might know Jesus.

BRIEF HISTORY OF BALFOUR BAPTIST CHURCH

The history of Balfour Baptist Church had its beginning in the spring of 1931. This glorious event took place in the Balfour school building and was sponsored by the First Baptist Church of Asheboro.

It was on November 8, 1931, at 2:30 P.M., a meeting was called to organize a church in North Asheboro. The Council was composed of Rev. Hoyle Love, Rev. H. M. Stroup and Rev. O. P. Dix. Rev. Love was elected Moderator and Rev. Dix was elected secretary.

After a sermon by Rev. Stroup, the following presented themselves for membership and became charter members: W. J. Jordan, C. N. Moody, W. M. Green, J. C. Pearce, Mrs. J. C. Pearce, Mrs. A. L. Moody, Mrs. W. A. Underwood, Mrs. R. C. Caudle, Mrs. Edna Pearce Heath.

The Articles of Faith and the Church Covenant were read by Rev. Love and adopted by the new church. The name, **BALFOUR BAPTIST CHURCH**, was adopted. The doors of the church were opened and A. M. Newell and W. F. Cates presented themselves for church membership under watchcare until their letters could be secured from former churches.

The new church extended a unanimous call to Rev. O. P. Dix to become their first pastor. He accepted the call and served the church until December 31, 1936. Early in his pastorate the first auditorium was erected and the first service was held on November 26, 1933.

On November 15, 1936, Rev. R. E. Heath became the second pastor. He

assumed his duties on January 3, 1937 and served until July of 1951. Under his leadership the first educational building was built, thus making possible greater Sunday School growth, from ninety-five to two hundred eighty-nine.

Rev. Herbert P. Miller assumed duties as pastor on November 11, 1951, and served until April, 1959. During his pastorate, a new educational building and a temporary auditorium was erected.

Rev. W. Clyde Bearden served as pastor from October 11, 1959 until October 31, 1962.

Rev. John W. Woody became the next pastor and assumed his duties on July 7, 1963, serving until December 31, 1967.

Other pastors are: Rev. Tobert W. Nelson, from July 31, 1968 until September 30, 1972. Tom Patterson, April 15, 1973 until December 3, 1977. Under his pastorate, a new sanctuary with a larger seating capacity and more educational facilities were constructed. This new worship center was dedicated on October 24, 1976. Reverend R. Talmage Smith, former Randolph Baptist Associational Director of Missions, served as interim pastor until April 14, 1979, when a call was extended to Reverend B. L. Kincaid. Bob Blanton is now pastor of The Balfour Baptist Church.

BRIEF HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH Liberty, N.C.

The Liberty Baptist Church, later named First Baptist Church, was organized on the second Sunday in March of 1886 and was an arm of Mount Zion Baptist Church in Alamance County as most of the members moved their letters from that church.

Rev. E. P. Ellington was the first pastor, T. N. Robertson was the first Sunday School Superintendent, and Miss Lillie Stroud was the first pianist.

There is no record of when the first church was erected after the organization, but the building was on East Swannonoa Avenue. After the church moved, the building was converted to a dwelling and later was destroyed by fire.

The second church on the corner of Raleigh and Fayetteville streets was completed in 1912 while Rev. J. B. Willis was the pastor. An educational building was added and completed in 1946 when Woodrow W. Hill was the pastor.

In 1943, the First Baptist Church became a full time church and Rev. John G. Hicks was the first full-time pastor. Previous to that time, the church had preaching service on two Sundays in each month.

The third and present church on South Fayetteville Street was dedicated on July 31, 1977, with Rev. Reginald G. Dawkins as pastor.

The First Baptist Church has during its existence had 32 pastors.

A full mission program is carried on by the church with active Woman's Missionary Union and Baptist Men Organizations.

The church has a membership of 320.

Young people have gone out from this church to become doctors, nurses, lawyers, architects, scientists, teachers and to be successful in the business world, and six have gone into full time Christian Service, one of which has served on the Foreign Mission field.
