CARVER-BARNES MEMORIAL LECTURES -- IN CHAPEL

The Carver-Barnes Memorial Lectures will be given at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, April 15-18, by Dr. Barrington R. White, Tutor in Church History, Regent's Park College, Oxford, England.

Under the title "Particular Baptist Foundations 1638 - 1660," Dr. White will give four lectures: 1. The Separatist Inheritance 2. Believer's Baptism under Fire 3. Mission Methods 4. Independence and Association. They will be delivered in the seminary chapel at 10:00 a.m. and are open to the public.

Dr. White holds a M.A. degree in theology from Queen's College of Cambridge University and a D. Phil. degree from Regent's Fark College of Oxford University. Ordained in 1959, he became minister of the Andover Baptist Church, Hampshire, England, and was appointed in 1963 to teach church history and to do research in Baptist history at Regent's Park College. He lectures for the Oxford Theology faculty and acts as examiner of doctoral theses for the Universities of Oxford and London. He writes for English learned journals and in May will be inducted as President of the Oxford and East Gloucestershire Associatin of Baptist Churches.

The Carver-Barnes Memorial Lectures are made possible by anonymous donors in memory of Dr. W. O. Carver and Dr. W. W. Barnes and given annually at Southeastern Bartist Seminary.

Dr. George A. Torney, Associate Secretary of Metropolitan Missions of the Southern Baptist Home Mission Borad, will conduct another class on "The Social Involvement of the Minister."

The seminar is sponsored by the Alumni Assocation of Southeastern and is structured by a special alumni committee, of which the Rev. Jerry L. Niswonger of Zebulon is chairman.

(Continued: Summer School Schedule) <u>Curriculum--(First Term--June 15-July 11)</u> A course in elementary Hebrew, designed for beginners in the Hebrew Old Testament, will meet four hours each day for six weeks and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Hebrew.

The course will be taught by Dr. Emmett Willard Hamrick, Professor of Religion at Wake Forest University.

The student who does not take the course in Hebrew may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

The student who elects to take M 366s the first term will earn five semester hours. In or ler to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of classes offered in the summer session.
