MINUTES.

CLEMENT CHURCH, PERSON CO., N. C.,
Tuesday, August 5, 1890.

The introductory sermon is preached by Rev. J. B. Jones, from I Corinthians, 6:11.

A recess of one hour was then given.

The Beulah Association meets in its 56th annual session. The Moderator reads John 14, and leads in prayer.

On motion of Bro. Gwaltney a committee of three are appointed on petition of Ruffin and Lea

Bethel churches for admission into this body. Brethren Jones, Yarbrough and Gwaltney are appointed.

Visiting brethren called on to report—the following respond: Rev. J. A. Speight, of the Biblical Recorder; Prof. Carlyle, of Wake Forest College, representing the Board of Education; Prof. Brewer, of Wake Forest College; Rev. C. E. Taylor, President of Wake Forest College; Rev. A. T. Hoard, of Mt. Zion; Rev. S. F. Conrad, of Pilot Mountain; Rev. J. A. Beam, of the Flat River Association; Bro. H. A. Reams, of the Mt. Zion; Rev. W. E. Warren, from Flat River, and Bro. Wilburn, from the Dan River.

Committee reports favorable to the admission of Ruffin and Lea Bethel churches.

On motion these churches were received. The Moderator gave the hand of fellowship to the delegates.

The committee on religious exercises appointed during the session, pastor and deacons of Clement church. On motion the hours of meeting named are as follows:

Report on periodicals read; pending motion to adopt remarks are made by brethren Speight, Conrad and Jones. The report is adopted.

On motion, adjourned. Prayer by Dr. Taylor.

WEDNESDAY, 9:30 A.M.

One-half an hour spent in an interesting prayer and praise service led by Dr. Taylor, of W. F. C.

A good suggestion is made by Bro. Gwaltney about praying for God's blessing upon the speaking on reports.

Minutes read and approved.

Report on Home Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention is read. Pending motion to adopt remarks are made by Bro. Wright. By request of the Moderator, Bro. Durham led in a prayer for

Diaz, his work and the spread of the gospel.

Report on education read by Bro. J. R. Jones. Remarks are made by Bro. H. A. Foushee, Dr. Taylor, Bro. Jones, Prof. Carlyle, Bro. Beam and Prof. Penick, of Oxford Female Seminary.

Moved special order. Foreign missions at 10 A.M., State missions at 11 A.M. tomorrow.

AFTERNOON.

Visiting brethren called on to report. Rev. G. T. Watkins, missionary to China, reports himself and is welcomed.

Report of committee on time and place:

Place—Shiloh church, Caswell county;

Time—Tuesday before 2d Sunday in Aug. 1891.

Introductory sermon—Rev. W. L. Wright and Rev. R. R. Moore, alternate.

Report on Sunday-schools read; pending motion to adopt remarks were made by Brethren Kitchen, Brewer, Rominger and Speight. On motion adopted.

Report on State Missions read by Rev. J. H. Lamberth.

Report of Executive Board read by Rev. W. R. Gwaltney; pending motion to adopt it is discussed by Rev. C. Durham and others.

On motion a committee is appointed to ascertain the amount necessary for the church building at Ruff. Brethren Gwaltney, Wright and Lamberth are appointed.

Prof. Crudup makes an announcement about High Point Female College.

Committee appointed to nominate new Executive Board report as follows: Dr. C. A. Rominger, Dr. F. P. Tacker and Rev. W. L. Wright.

On motion adjourned.

THURSDAY, 9:30 A.M.

One-half an hour is spent in religious exercises, led by Bro. Conrad. Letter read from Summerfield church. Visiting brethren invited to seats. Bro. Mills is present from the Orphanage.

Report on Foreign Missions is read by Bro.

Gwaltney. Pending motion to adopt, remarks were made by Brethren Gwaltney and J. K. Howell. Special order extended 30 minutes. Rev. G. T. Watkins under appointment to China and Rev. C. Durham address the body. Report adopted.

Rev. Mr. Wade, of the Presbyterian church, is recognized and welcomed to a seat.

Orphanage report read. Brethren J. H. Mills and Rev. C. Durham discuss the report.

A collection is taken up amounting to \$30.12.

Rev. W. R. Gwaltney moves that the Executive Committee be instructed to consider the advantages of having a tent for the meetings of this body.

The committee on Ruffin church building offer their report. (See table of reports.)

Bro. Wright offered the following resolution:

Resolved, that the thanks of this Association are due and are hereby tendered to the people in the vicinity of Clement Church for their very liberal hospitality and kindness shown to the members and visitors to this body.

Choir sang, "Shall You? Shall I?" the congregation joined in.

THURSDAY, 2 P.M.

Rev. G. T. Watkins preached to a large congregation.

The Association is adjourned to time and place: Shiloh Tuesday before the 2nd Sunday in August 1890.

REPORT OF EX-BOARD,

Your ex-committee submitted the following report of the work for the year now closing.

Bro. S. F. Conrad began work at Ruffin on Dec. last, the results of which will be seen in his report to the committee. (See report)

Bro. J. K. Howell began his labors at La Bethel in April, preaching once a month on Sunday, on the 2nd Sunday in June a church of seven members was organized by Brethren Howell and J. H. Vernon, which church, with the one at Ruffin was admitted temporarily as a member of this body. This little church has a Sunday-school of fifty-six scholars, which will keep open twelve months in a year.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The work of Foreign Missions presents many difficulties. The number of heathen is more than eight hundred millions and they are scattered over immense districts of the earth. Many of them are in low grades of civilization and many of them are savages. To give them the gospel, home and friends must be given up, oceans crossed, difficult languages mastered, ancient religions overturned and long cherished prejudices overcome.

To do this work, the churches and the men and women sent out, must have the spirit of Christ, be able to, "not my will but thine be done" -- "herc am I send me." But the darkness is breaking away, the work is encouraging.

The people are beginning to understand the work, to know when the fields and the men and women who occupy them: home opposition is rapidly giving away, and the churches are showing an increased interest in the work. They gave over ten thousand dollars to the work last year more than the year before.

New missions are being established and hundreds of heathens converted every year.

The native churches on the foreign fields gave last year \$4 680.87. And this is at the rate \$2 00 per member, which is twenty times more per member to Foreign Missions than was given by members of the Southern Baptist Convention.

These are our encouragements and they are very great, but the greatest of all our encouragements are these, "Ask of me and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance and the uttermost parts of the earth for thy possession." And Christ's promise to his people, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." The outlook is as bright and encouraging as the everlasting promises of God.

THOMASVILLE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

There are now 128 children at the Orphanage.

And many others are begging us to take them. At least one hundred, as poor and destitute, and as deserving of our care and sympathy as those who at the Orphanage are crying for admittance. More room is needed and steps are being taken to erect another building. But the greatest need at present is the means to support those who are already there. At the annual meeting on the 30th of July the treasury was about empty. But this institution lies so near the hearts of all our people, that a knowledge of its wants is all that is necessary to call forth their liberality, for no child of God can hear the cry of an orphan child and not feel in his heart a ready response.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your committee is happy to report steady advancement all along the educational front. Owing to the shortness of crops the past year has been a hard one, but our people have done nobly. Wake Forest College is now better managed than ever before. Her professors are devout christians

and their influence in moulding the character of her students cannot be overestimated. Her catalogue shows over two hundred students. Twenty-nine young ministers received aid from the Education Board. The Board, though, has been embarrassed for want of funds and has not given as much aid as was asked for. The churches should by all means increase their contribution to this noble object.

The different female schools under Baptist control at Oxford, High Point and Murfreesboro have all done well and are worthy of still greater patronage from our people. Respectfully submitted.

REPORT ON SUNDAY-SCHOOL.

This is the broadest sphere of Christian work. It lies at the very foundation of discipling the nations and hence deserves our careful study and consideration. They even call themselves Christians and have no Christ-likeness.

The real Sunday school indoctrinates the people, it familiarizes them with God's word, that makes them missionary in fact and hence makes them Chris-tike. Much Sunday-school work has been and now is a mockery of religious work.

We need Superintendents and Teachers, consecrated, taught in God's word, and willing to sacrifice their time and energies to teaching the nations. We need old men and women in our schools, like Aquilla and Priscilla, Stephen and Phœbe and Louis and Eunice, who shall teach the young Apolioses the way more perfectly.

No one in this land has any excuse for such ignorance of God's word as we often see in our schools and churches. Let us wake up to the fact that if we know so little of God here in the great day he will declare, Depart, I know you not.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION.

This field embraces all the southern States, the Indian Territory and Cuba. A vast field and one that will bring forth an abundant harvest, both in time and eternity if faithfully cultivated. Our Home Board had in its employ last year among our native white population 270 missionaries, among the Indians 30 and has aided in the support of 45 colored missionaries in preaching to their own race.

The Levering mission school is in better condition financially than it has been for years.

The Board received last year from all sources, \$171,976 22, and with this money and God's blessing, the following work and more has been done:

Who can estimate the value of these influences in time and eternity? How many souls have been saved through these agencies. How valuable their influence and work in this life; how glad their songs in heaven.

North Carolina gave last year, May 1st, '89—May 1st, '90—\$2,598.93. In co-operative mission work expended for preaching on its own field, Western North Carolina raised \$1,200 97. In building mission churches on its own field Western North Carolina gave \$3,550 00. We need to support Foreign Missions, Home Missions of S. B. C., State Missions, Associational Missions, Missions by churches and by individuals. We have missions under all these heads and yet the toilers who know and feel the needs say, "Master, we have

dore as we were bidden and yet there is room—" God has signally blessed this work, especially in Cuba, that stronghold of Catholicism. We have nearly 2,000 church members. The Board could wisely expend in Cuba all that is now given to the Home Missions.

Diaz in prison once at Santiago de Cuba. Singing in jail, baptizing jailor and mayor, life sought by an assassins hand, later an effort to bribe him to leave thirty thousand dollars offered, child stolen, in prison again, a day and night in the deep, picked up at sea. 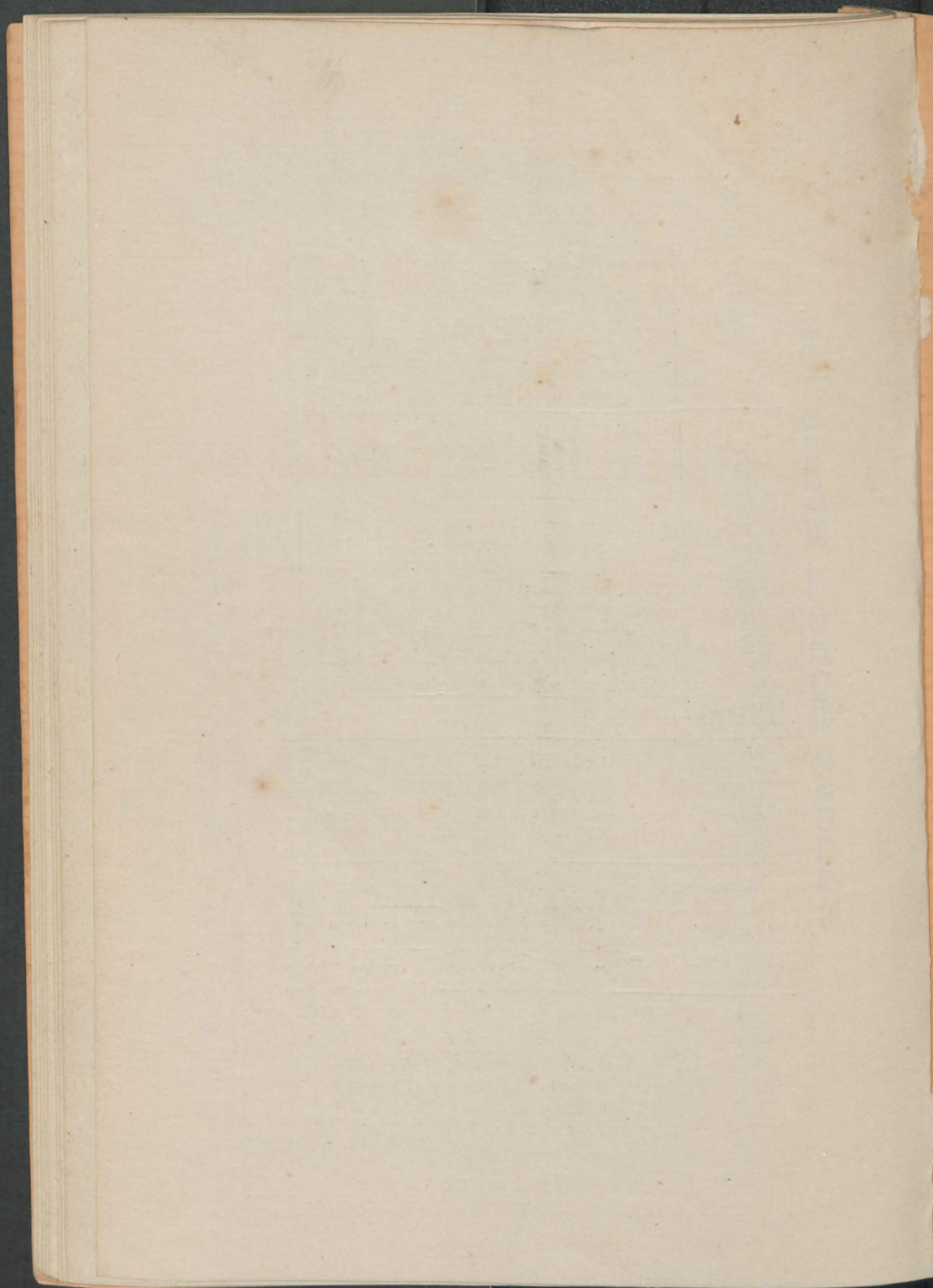

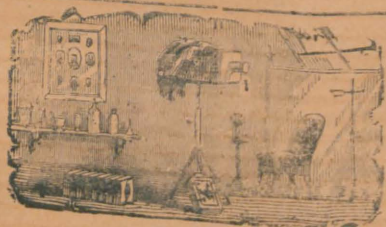
