ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada.

REGISTRATION

FIRST TERM-Monday, June 9, 1975. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 10. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes June 11 and schedule changing closes June 13, 4:00 p.m.

SECOND TERM-Monday, July 7, 1975. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 8. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes July 9 and schedule changing closes July 11, 4:00 p.m.

COSTS

Fees \$20.00 per term. Rooms \$22.50 per term. Meals, approximately \$3.50 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the courses taken.

FACILITIES

Air-conditioned library and classrooms. Modern dormitory facilities are available for men and women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

RECREATION

The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A ninehole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The Seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

CURRICULUM

FIRST TERM, June 9-July 4, 1975

A course in elementary Hebrew, designed for beginners in the Hebrew Old Testament, will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Hebrew.

The student who does not take the course in Hebrew may enroll in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

The student who elects to take M 366s the second term may earn five semester hours. Classes for this course will begin on July 7.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio the Seminary reserves the right to control the size of classes offered in the summer session.

B 116s BIBLICAL HEBREW

Mr. Rogers

M 256s INTRODUCTION TO CHURCH MUSIC Mr. Johnson A survey course covering the use of music in worship, Christian hymnody, and church music administration, designed primarily for students interested in the pastoral ministry.

M 235s AN INTRODUCTION TO RELIGIOUS JOURNALISM Mr. McDonald*

Practice in writing religious news stories and articles for denominational papers, other religious publications and newspapers, as well as curriculum materials.

M 366s SEMINAR ON URBAN STUDIES[†] Mr. Bland and Guests A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches.

5 semester hours July 7-Aug. 1 8:00-12:30, Monday-Friday

H 319s PRACTICUM IN HOME MISSIONS[†] Mr. Copeland A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Twelve weeks summer practicum or one semester, open to middlers, seniors and graduate students. (In the summer of 1975 the course is limited to eight students, to be assigned to the New York area.)

8 semester hours May 26-August 15

Two courses are being offered this summer in cooperation with Regent's Park College, Oxford, England, as a special extension of the Southeastern Seminary summer curriculum and as an experiment in travel and learning as an academic undertaking. Oxford, England, has been chosen as the base of operations for the courses because of its strategic location as an ancient center of learning.

H 203s FOUNDATIONS OF BAPTIST FAITH AND POLITY[†] Mr. White[†]

A study of the British origins and the early forms of Baptist faith and practice. Visits to important sites are an integral part of the course.

M 214s THE ARTS AND THEOLOGICAL COMMUNICATION[†] Mr. Carlton, Mr. Durham

A consideration of literature, music, painting, sculpture, architecture, cinema, television, and other forms of artistic expression as media of theological communication.
