## OUR CHURCH COVENANT

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AVING been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour; and on the profession of our faith having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, we do now in the presence of God, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church, in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline, and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting, and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other Church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant, and the principles of God's word.

- OUR CHURCH stands for the Bible. It is our law, our creed, and our final authority in all matters relating to faith and practice.
- OUR CHURCH stands for regeneration or "the new birth from above" as a basis of church membership.

OUR CHURCH stands for believer's baptism, the immersion of the believer in obedience to the command of Christ, as a symbol of the death to the old life and the resurrection to the new.

OUR CHURCH stands for the separation of Church and State, and for the largest measure of civil and religious

OUR CHURCH stands for education, for evangelism, and for world-wide missionary endeavor.

### HISTORICAL NOTES

On Sunday afternoon, September 6th, 1891, this Church was constituted

The organization occurred in the Chapel of Mercer University, in which place the Church worshiped for eight years.

The Council of Organization was composed of Rev. E. W. WARREN, D.D.; Rev. G. A. NUNNALLY, D.D.; Rev. G. R. MCCALL, D.D.; Rev. E. J. COATES, Rev. J. W. KELLY, Rev. J. I. D. MILLER.

Dr. E. W. WARREN was requested to serve as Moderator, and Rev. E. J. COATES acted as Secretary. A Church Covenant and Articles of Faith were adopted at the first meeting.

A committee to recommend a pastor was composed of the following: F. W. GLOVER, J. S. RODGERS, J. D. STETSON, A. T. CHAPMAN, W. J. JUHAN, W. J. MOORE and D. C. HARRIS.

The first Committee on Finance was composed of J. D. STETSON, W. J. MOORE, A. T. CHAPMAN, J. S. RODGERS, C. D. PEAVEY, S. F. FULCHUM

The first organist elected by the Church was Mrs. BIRDIE JOHNSON TOOMBS. Mrs. A. T. CHAPMAN and Mrs. W. J. JUHAN were appointed on a committee to secure a communion service.

On September 16th, 1891, the Committee on Pastor made the following report: "We recommend that the Church be requested to call Rev. E. W. WARREN, D.D., as pastor, at a salary of \$1,500 per annum." The call was unanimous.

The first hymnal purchased was "My Choice," by BASIL MANLY. One hundred copies were ordered.

The first person to unite with the Church on profession of faith for baptism was Mrs. C. D. PEAVEY, on September 30th, 1891.

October 7th, 1891, Dr. and Mrs. WARREN were received by letter into the fellowship of the Church, and Dr. WARREN accepted the care of the Church.

On October 11th a committee was appointed by the Church to look for a suitable lot for the erection of a building for the worship and the work of the Church. A. T. CHAPMAN was the chairman.

The first Deacons were elected October 28, 1891, and were ordained

November 1st. These were J. D. Stetson, W. J. MOORE, R. A. MER-RITT, A. T. CHAPMAN.

The first donation to the Building Fund was a contribution of \$10, made by Mrs. A. E. KEENON, in November of 1891. On December 31st, 1891, the Treasurer reported that "We start the new year out of debt, and with a small balance in the treasury."

The first delegates appointed to the Rehoboth Association were J. S. RODGERS, R. A. MERRITT, A. T. CHAPMAN and the pastor, Dr. WARREN.

The charter of the Church was secured March 2d, 1892, with R. A. MERRITT, A. T. CHAPMAN and J. D. STETSON named as Trustees.

Rev. F. C. MCCONNELL, then of Gainesville, assisted the pastor in the first protracted meeting, beginning April 7th, 1892. At about this time a baptistry was constructed in the College Chapel.

The Finance Committee elected to serve during the year 1892 was as follows: J. D. STETSON, A. T. CHAPMAN, W. J. MOORE, S. MOORE, F. W. GLOVER and GUY HILSMAN.

The letter to the Rehoboth Association, dated October 9th, 1892, reported a total membership of 156. There were 11 received for baptism during that associational year and 56 by letter.

In October, 1892, the report shows that there were 150 enrolled in the Sunday School, with 17 officers and teachers. The offering from the Sunday School for that year amounted to \$105.00.

A Ladies' Aid Society was organized in the second year of the Church's history to raise funds to assist in the erection of a building. The records reveal the fact that this organization did much during the years by way of contributions and inspiration.

The Finance Committee to serve during the year 1893 was composed of A. L. ADAMS, W. J. JUHAN, W. A. ORNE and S. C. MOORE.

In October, 1893, the Church reports a total membership of 197, with 185 in the Sunday School. During this third year of its life, the Church contributed \$789 to the Building Fund.

In November, 1893, the second protracted meeting was held. At that time the pastor was assisted by Rev. T. W. O'KELLEY.

On Sunday morning, November 23, 1893, the beloved pastor of the Church, Dr. WARREN, passed to his reward in the Lord. The pastor was 73 years of age at his death.

A special service was held to "commemorate the strong Christian character of the beloved pastor." JOHN P. ROSS A. L. ADAMS and GUY HILSMAN were appointed to arrange this service.

In January of 1895 the Church decided in conference to "energetically

press the raising of funds for the erection of a building." On the 1st of January, 1896, the Building Fund amounted to \$5,000.

April 15th, 1896, the Church decided to begin at once to erect a building, and the committee to see after plans and specifications was composed of L. T. STALLINGS, A. T. CHAPMAN, R. A. MERRITT and J. P. Ross.

This Committee on Building submitted plans to the Church on September 27th, and the Church formally adopted the report of the committee.

In October, 1896, the membership of the Church numbered 207. The women of the congregation gave to the various interests of missions during that year \$205.91.

The "Baptist Hymnal" was adopted as a book of praise for the congregation in March of 1898. This book was used until 1908, when the present "Baptist Hymn and Praise Book" was adopted.

When the church was seven years old, the membership numbered 254, with a Sunday School averaging 165 attendance. In that year the Church made a total contribution of \$2,505.52.

The first service held in the present building was on September 24th, 1899, Sunday morning. The sermon on that occasion was preached by the pastor, Rev. J. G. HARRISON, from the text, "I was glad when they said unto me, let us go into the house of the Lord." Dr. B. D. RAGS-DALE assisted the pastor in this service.

The building was unfinished at the time of occupancy. The Committee on Building stated that \$8,741.26 had been expended, and that \$1,195.40 was owing at that time. The estimated value of the property is now \$42,500.00.

In the fall of 1900 the Church took active control of the Hazel Street Mission. L. T. STALLINGS was appointed the special Treasurer of this interest. Mrs. C. M. SMITH has also served as the Treasurer of the Hazel Street work.

The Organ Fund was begun on January 28th, 1903, at which time C. B. PEAVEY moved that a "committee be appointed to solicit and receive contributions for an organ fund."

On June 18th, 1905, the Church decided to proceed at once to install an organ. This was done at a cost of \$1,500. Our present Organist, Miss ELIZABETH WARREN, has served the Church since.

Miss MAE CHENEY was engaged to serve the Church as City Missionary March 23th, 1906. The records bear repeated commendations of her faithful services. Miss CHENEY was instrumental in organizing the first Young Women's Auxiliary in October, 1906.

#### TWENTY-FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

The greatest year for ingathering during the Church's history was in the Associational year 1905-1906. In October, 1905, the Church reported a membership of 347, and in the fall of 1906 the membership numbered 516. During that year 80 were baptized and 122 united by letter.

The Pastorium, 111 Coleman Avenue, was built during 1909. The following committee was named by the Church to report on a suitable lot, and to propose ways and means of paying for the equipment: J. G. HARRISON, A. L. ADAMS, C. D. PEAVEY, W. E. DAVIDSON, T. E. BOLLINGER. The estimated value of the Pastorium is \$6,000.00.

In the spring of 1913 the Church saw the need of enlarging the plant, and on April 13th and the week following \$10,000.00 was pledged to construct a Sunday School room. GUY HILSMAN was elected special Treasurer of the Building Fund.

In 1913 our members numbered 597, and the Sunday School entollment was 512. The contributions for that year amounted to \$5,200.12 for local support and \$1,810.16 for missions, a total of \$7,010.27.

The Sunday School of the Church contributed \$688.60 in the year 1914. The contributions of the Church for the year ending October, 1914, amounted to \$9,371.57.

The records of our Church (during some periods incomplete) reveal the fact that during the twenty-five years of our history we have contributed \$27,000.00 to missions, and \$135,000.00 to home support.

The present membership of the Church is 687. During the twentyfive years of our history 1,752 have united with this Church.
