AFTERNOON SESSION.

After singing, prayer was offered by J. A. Speight. Letters were presented and read from Balsam Grove, Yellow Mountain and Caney Fork churches. F. A. Luck offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, Believing as we do in the importance of sustaining adequately our home paper and recognizing our share of the responsibility resting on the Baptists of Western N. C., to sustain the Asheville Baptist, this association renews its request that the pastors of the churches press the claims of the paper on their congregations and further recommends to the pastors that they appoint a committee of one or more active members to urge the matter on the attention of each community.

And after remarks by John Ammons recommending, Home Field and Charity and Children, the report on Periodicals was adopted:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Your committee would report that there is no agency outside of the Bible and the living Ministry so potent for good as the Religious Newspapers. Our Baptist churches cannot be efficient at this age in the work of the Lord without the printing press. We are glad to state that we have an organ which commends itself to the patronage of our churches and it is worthy of a place in every home in the land. The Asheville Baptist is your paper, it is run in the interest of your churches and your work and we urge the pastors to constantly present its claims to their charges and ask all our people to give it a place in their homes. We commend Charity and Children published in the interest of the orphanage and also Home Field with the Foreign Mission Journal.

The report on Sabbath Schools was read by Rev. H. D. Welch and was made special order for 11 o'clock P. M. Saturday.

The obituary of Rev. John Owen was read and ordered to be printed in our minutes.

BIOGRAPHY.

Rev. John Owen was born on Crabtree creek, Haywood county, N. C., August 9th 1805.

He was married September 28, 1826, to Miss Sarah Fore, in Flats of Middle Creek, Macon county, N. C. In a few years after he moved to, what was then, Pickens district, S. C., where he lived 50 years. On the 4th of November 1851 the Lord took his wife from him by death. He was married again May 16th 1852, to Miss Mary Ann Edney, with whom he lived till his death. He joined the Baptist church at Keowee in the year 1844 and soon after, he commenced preaching. He was ordained in 1845. He was pastor of, from 3 to 4 churches most of his time, and has had charge of 5 churches at once. He built up many churches, was the first to take

a bold stand for missions in the bounds of the Twelve Mils River Association, received the first appointment, and did the first preaching as a missionary in their bounds. He did much labor in part of Macon, Jackson, and Transylvania counties of N. C., being contemporary with, Joshua Ammons, Merit Rickman and others of their day, and thus touching shoulders, as it were, with

the labors of the beloved Humphry Posy.

Father Owen served the church at Hamburg when it was an arm of Caney Fork church, helped constitute her a church, and served her as pastor several years. On May 6th 1888, having moved to Jackson county, N. C., he united with the church at Yellow Mountain, of which church he remained a member till his death. On the 15th of February, 1891, after being ailing two weeks, he said he was much better, he read, talked, and was lively and cheerful till about 11 a.m., he became sleepy, lay down on his bed and went to sleep, some two hours later the family found that he had passed away without a frown or struggle, but for his pallied face, he looked as natural as he ever did when asleep. His age was 85 vears 6 months and 6 days, he had been preaching nearly 47 years. On the 17th ult. he was buried in the grave vard near the Pine Creek church, with true masonic honors-Rev. B. N. Queen conducted the burial services, which was attended by many weeping relatives and friends, who feel that a Father indeed is gone.

to honor and love the man who labored and toiled for the lowly Nazarine in Hamburgh.

That we should perpetuate his name is not only our

privilege but it is our duty.

He has been called to his reward, but his works remain to encourage us onward in the christian's warfare, and eternity alone shall gather the harvest. We love to honor Rev. John Owen for preaching the Lord Jesus in this part of N. C., for the upright life he lived, and we remember that "blessed are the dead that die in the A. E. PINCKARD.

SATURDAY-THIRD DAY, AUG. 15TH.

Singing and prayer by Rev. I. D. Wright The report on education was reconsidered and recommitted.

The report on Home and Conventional Missions was read by Rev. John Ammons, and was spoken to by I. D. Wright, S. C. Owen, F. M. Morgan and John Ammons.

After which a collection for Conventional Missions was taken, Amt. \$18.00.

The report was then adopted.

HOME AND CONVENTIONAL MISSIONS.

The title at the head of this report indicates that we are called upon to contemplate two departments of mission work, Home Missions is used to denote mission work in the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention. God's blessings have been abundant upon the labors of the Missionaries of the Home Board.

Churches have been planted in many places which have become strong central points, and which have become strong moral and spiritual forces in pushing the work into other fields.

This board has been the chief agency, under God, in planting the gospel in the Southern States, beyond the Mississippi, and in the islands of Cuba. The field is large and promising, inviting the efforts of God's people.

Let our ministers keep the work of the Home Board before their churches, and urge them to contribute to its support. This Board had under appointment last year 406 missionaries. These missionaries were scattered over the South, most of the states having one or more missionaries within their bounds, they baptized during the year more than 5,000 persons, making an average of 12 or more persons baptized by each missionary. This is an encouraging view. The results in Cuba are of a most encouraging nature; the mission is but a little over three years old, and yet there are at this time nearly two thousand members in the Cuban churches. The Boards desire to greatly extend its operations this year.

Conventional Missions means, our own mission work in the bounds of our convention. A large portion of W. N. C. is destitute of the gospel, and we ought to hold ourselves under obligations to give them the means of grace that they might be saved. These spiritual foundations, were laid in the spirit of missions, when our fathers without organization, but with their hearts full of the Holy Ghost, went from settlement to settlement preaching the glorious gospel of the blessed God. In after years when these foundations were well established God put it into the hearts of our people to enter more fully into this work, hence the organization of the W. N. C. Baptist Convention.

Eternity alone can tell the good which has been accomplished through the convention. The convention has established churches at several important points. and it is trying to occupy every destitution as far as it has the means. The last year was one of great prosperity. We made an advance over the preceding year of more than one hundred and fifty per cent. This so encouraged the brethren that the convention advised the Board to extend its operations. Our expectations have not been realized, the receipts have falled far short of liabilities. This is to be accounted for from two or three causes. 1st. The winter was unfavorable. 2nd. It is to be feared that our pastors have not kept this matter before the churches. 3rd. There is want of a system of stated givings. We need organization. There were a number of applications before the Board that we were compelled to refuse for want of means.

Let us labor to get all our people to give as God has prospered them, then the Board will have ample means to supply all the destitution in W. N. C. The committee would urge upon the pastors in the bounds of this Association to try to get from their charges an average contribution of twenty cents for missions.

TEMPERANCE REPORT.

God's word admonishes us to temperance in all things, and in many instances warns us against the evils of intemperance. Recognizing the manufacture, sale, and use of intoxicating beverages as the source and soul of intemperance, and one of the most dangerous evils of the day, we believe in the light of God's word, that it is the duty of every christian to oppose in every proper way, emphatically and uncompromisingly, this nefarious trafic and to be satisfied with nothing short of absolute prohibition.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

God has endowed man with mind capable of unlimited development, and for what purpose? That his name may be honored and gloried. The strongest reason why

our boys and girls should be educated is, that God is infinite, and the mind of man is infinite in its capacities, for which it is charged by regeneration, it then reflects the One who gave it. We think that this report should refer mainly to ministerial eeucation, though not exclusively.

Last year, according to the minutes, 'this Association gave for ministerial education, 5.75, this year, we havn't found out the amt. contributed, but think it is much larger. A. E. Pinckard and Miss Sue E. Robinson gave this year to young ministers, at Hamburgh, about \$25. Some say that education makes some persons vain, and therefore they do not believe in it. Some persons who have collegiate training are vain, but true education did not do it, for it is always beneficial. Almost everything that is good cannot be counterfeited; but that is no good reason why we should discard the gold because there is no sand mixed with it.

The churches in almost every case, will not rise higher than their pastors and leaders. Then, where it is possible and expedient our preachers should be thoroughly educated in order that they may more effectually preach the unsearchable riches of Christ.

We, your committee, earnestly recommend that all our young preachers get a good education, for we think that the Lord has made it a duty upon them and us that they may be more able to rightly lead the flock into "green pastures and by the still waters."

We especially call the attention of our people to the excellent Hamburgh Normal High School, Glenville, N. C., under the leadership of Prof. A. T. Hord. There are other good schools within the bounds of this Association and we hope our boys and girls will attend them. Then, there is our own Judson College, where a full college course may be taken, and we earnestly insist that this college be largely attended by our young men and ladies.

The Lord says "the harvest truly is pienteous but the laborers are few," but now the harvest is plenteous and the laborers are many. The Lord is calling men by the hundreds to go to foreign fields and makes it our duty to send them. The parts of the world are now open for missionaries. The Lord has moved the obstruction and nothing is wanting but money to send the gospel to all the world. The heathen is lost without the gospel. It is a sad comment on the history of this Association that only \$11.67 is reported as collected for this cause during the past year. Brethren, shall this state of affairs continue? We recommend that the month of Nov. next be devoted to foreign missions, in prayer and collections. We believe in the plan of churches and associations sending missionaries into foreign lands.
