MINUTES.

Monday, 8:00 A. M., September 3, 1888.

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Messengers from the various churches composing the Towaliga Association of Primitive Baptist, assembled in the Ozias Churchhouse. Singing and prayer by Elder S. J. Blackwell.

Read letters from 15 churches composing the association and re-

corded Messengers' names.

1. By nomination and election, chose Elder I. L. Gunter, Moderator, and W. T. Godard Clerk.

2. Received into our Union. Mount Nebo church of Glascock

County, and Little Flock, of Fayette Co., Ga.

- 3. Received correspondents from Little River, Elders, J. M. Stewart and S. J. Blackwell and brethren W. J. Donalson, E. S. Coker, W. C. Anderson, Jno. Kemp and I. H. Wilson; from Blue Ridge, Elder J. M. Thomas.
- 4. Appointed a committee on divine service towit, W. P. Person, J. M. Stanley, J. L. Hays with the Messengers of Ozias Church.
 - 5. Appointed T. G. Preston to write corresponding letter.
- 6. Appointed the cierk to condense a report on deceased members, by the reports in the respective letters.
- 7. Called the roll, and on motion omitted the reading of Decorum for present session.
- 8. Appointed correspondents. To Little River, Elders I. L. Gunter and W. J. Oxford, and brethren, A. J. Brown, J. M. Stanley, Dr. Jac. F. Jackson, N. Willingham and W. G. Burk.

To Blue Ridge, Elders Gunter, Carr and Godard and brother J. M. Stanley.

- Appointed Union meetings for 1st district at Friendship, Friday before and embracing 2nd Sunday in July, 1889, for 2nd district at Little Flock, Friday before and embracing 4th Sunday in July, 1889.
- 10. Appointed next session of this body with Mount Olive Church, Baldwin Co., Ga., 6 miles east of Millageville, on Saturday before 1st Sunday in September, 1889.
- 11. Appointed Elder W. Γ. Godard to preach next introductory sermon and Elder I. L. Gunter in case of failure.
- 12. Appointed brother Jno. F. Jackson to write next circular letter.
- 13. Called for contributions and received for Minutes \$29.50 for Visiting Ministers \$47.95.

14. Ordered 1,000 copies of these Minutes printed and distributed by the clerk; fixed clerk's compensation at balance of minutes fund after paying for printing and distributing the minutes.

15. Called for corresponding letter which was read by brother T.

G. Preston, was received and adopted.

16. On motion by brother W. P. Harden, Resolved: That this body tender thanks to Ozias Church and friends of this community for their hospitality and kindness so abundantly made and lavished upon this body and visitors during this session.

17. Read and adopted minutes and adjourned to meet at Mt. Ol-

ives on Saturday, before 1st Sunday in September, 1889.

DEAR AND BELOVED BRETHREN:

Having at the last ression agreed to return to the custom of addressing you by circular letter, we send you this our epistle of love in conformity to that agreement; praying that God of His infinite love and mercy may bless it to our mutual good and His glory.

The Apostle John (1st. John 1:3) says, "That which we have seen and heard declare we unto you, that ye also may have fellowship with us, and truly our fellowship is with the Father and with His son Jesus Christ." Thus presenting to us the great and soul comforting doctrine of Christian fellowship for our contemplation and encouragement. Suffer us then dear brethren, in a brief way to call your attention to this sublime subject.

The word fellowship as used in the Scriptures seems te convey the idea of equality and oneness in the Kingdom of Grace, and in our relation to God, and to each other as His children: that is, we are fellows or equals in all that pertains to our salvation, by the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ. And this fellowship that we have for each other as saints is predicated upon the fact of our fellowship with the Father and with His son Jesus Christ, for without this, true fellowship with each other is impossible. To have fellowship with the Father and with His son Jesus Christ, we must be embraced in the Covenant of Grace; in the electing love of God. Redeemed by the blood of Christ, begotten and born of the Holy Spirit, have Christ revealed in us the hope of glory, be delivered from the power of darkness, and translated into the kingdom of His dear Son, blessed with the gift of eternal life and made heirs of God and joint heirs with Jesus Christ. What a glorious consummation! What blessed re-What love and gratitude should fill our souls and animate our hearts toward God when contemplating Him as our Father and toward the Lord Jesus Christ, when viewing Him as our Redeemer. Savior and older brother. But our fellowship for each other is made manifest and brought into active operation by a declaration of "that which we have seen and heard in our experience of what is thus effected in us in this great work of grace. How ready then we should be to give the reason of the hope that is within us to every one that asketh with meekness and fear, and how careful we should

be to maintain, perpetuate and keep in active exercise our fellowship for and with each other, by walking as the children of light and of the day.

What tenderness, what sympa hy, what loving-kindness and brotherly love should flow out to each other, exhibiting in all our conduct and conversation our allegiance to Christ, and our love to one another, ever striving to live together in peace and love, working, suffering, sorrowing and rejoicing together here on earth, hoping finally to dwell toget er Heaven.

Let us constantly watch and pray dear brethren that we enter not into temptation; for, if watchfulness and prayer are neglected, we stand in great danger of being led astray by the seductive influences of Satan, the world and the flesh, by which oftentimes false notions. errors, false constructions and improper conduct is brought in to the injury of the fellowship of God's dear children. Dogmatism and Pharisaical obstinacy, usurps the place of charity and brotherly forbearance; a fleshly striving for our own peculiar notions of orthodoxy and order is substituted in the place of humble, earnest and loving advocacy of the truth as in Jesus, to the destruction of peace, and to the bringing in of jealousies, envies, strife, contentions and every evil work, the foibles, weaknesses and wrong opinions of biethren are exagerated, a harsh, critical and intolerant spirit manifested-and ultimately unscriptural alienation and division wrought; but let us thank God and rejoice that none of these things seem to be manifest among us at present, and let us constantly endeavor to keep the unity of the spirit (not of exact sentiment) in the bonds of peace, and as companions in our journey through this vale of tears, continually meeting with dangers, trials and distresses that tries our faith and patience.

Let us be patient one toward another, bearing each other's burdens and so fulfilling the law of Christ, as children of the same Father, subjects of the same redemption, objects of the same grace, members of the same brotherhood, inheritors of the same kingdom, cemented together by the blood of the same Jesus, heirs of the same glory having the same experience and traveling the same road, subject to the same weaknesses, trials temptations and warfare. How sweet should be our association together, how endearing our fellowship one for another, and how perfectly agreed should we all be in the one great object of our calling which is to live for each other's good and God's glory.

Finally brethren let us constantly and earnestly pray that our present state of love and fellowship with each ot er and with the Father, as we trust, and with His son Jesus Christ may ever be maintained that no apple of discord to mar or destroy our peace may ever be introduced among us, that our stakes as a body may be strengthened and our cords lengthend, that we may ever stand fast in the liberty wherewith Christ has made us free, as witnesses for the truth as in Jesus.
