### HELD WITH ELK VALLEY BAPTIST CHURCH August 21 - 22, 1924.

### EDUCATION

The life of a nation depends upon its schools. The value of a school depends upon its ideals. The ideals of a school have their highest worth only as they are Christian. It is the duty of the churches to make these ideals dominant in education.

To this end, North Carolina Baptists have inaugurated a broad and systematic educational program. They are undertaking to maintain in this State one college for men at Wake Forest, and two for women-Meredith, at Raleigh, and Chowan, at Murfreesboro. From last reports, Wake Forest enrolled 845 students, including

81 ministerial students and 7 volunteers for the Foreign Field; the two women colleges enrolled together 503, including 23 student volunteers. The combined property value of the three, including plants, equipment and endowments, is \$3,865,494.87.

We also maintain two junior colleges, for both sexes-Mars Hill at Mars Hill, and Wingate, at Wingate. These two enrolled 685 pupils, including 64 ministerial students, and 20 student volunteers. Their property value was \$340,000.00.

Our three high schools are Buie's Creek, Boiling Springs, and Liberty-Piedmont, enrolling 1121 pupils, including 43 ministerial and 8 student volunteers. Their property value is \$431,000. We also have 100 high school students in the Thomasville Orphanage.

So the Baptist high schools and colleges in this State, owned and controlled by Associations and the State Convention, enrolled 3, 254 students, including 193 ministerial students and 58 mission volunteers, and own property worth \$4,336,494.87.

In addition to these institutions' our Home Mission Board in Atlanta, maintains 7 high schools, which enrolled 1,196 pupils, and are worth \$340,850. Their student bodies include 35 ministerial students and 44 student volunteers. So the total number of students enrolled in our North Carolina Baptist schools was 4,450, with 22s ministerial students and 102 student volunteers. And their total property value was \$4,977,344.87.

South-wide institutions in which we have a part includes the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and W. M. U. Training School, Louisvill, Ky.; the Southwestern Theological Seminary at Ft. Worth. Tex. and the Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans, La These institutions altogether enroll 1613 pupils, and their property is valued at \$3,929,404.34. It is for the maintainance of these institutions that our Education Board is laboring.

While the \$5,000,000 which we have invested in school property in this State seems a large sum, it is small in comparison with the many millions invested in State schools; and the few thousands we raise annually for our schools is a trifling sum when compared to the State's annual appropriations to her high schools, colleges and university. In addition to maintaining these institutions themselves, we are helping to support our 330 young ministerial and missionary students, which are now being trained in them; on these we expect about \$14,000 a year.

The necessity for maintaining our schools, great as it has been in the past, must increase rather than diminish for the future for the following reasons:

1 Because our institutions must be kept in the front rank along

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with those of the State in cultural training that they give, or we cannot hope to keep our Baptist boys and girls in our schools.

2 Heretofore, practically nine-tenths of our educated ministers and missionaries have come out of our Baptist institutions; and in the nature of the case, these still must be trained in our schools or nowhere. Moreover, the State is repidly enlarging and strengthening her educational program, and camp lling all her children to be educated. This, of course, means a much more intelligent membership in our churches, and that we must educate a still larger proportion of our ministers and leaders; for an educated membership will demand an educated leadership.

3 Because of the tendency of some students of science to attack the Bible from the standpoint of science, we must train our Godfearing men and women to meet these scientists on their own ground and while pursuing all knowledge in all realms, to relate all science to God Almighty. In our schools the Bible is revered and taught as the inspired word of God and the study of it is required of all.

4 The denominational school emphasizes not only the religious spirit but the denominational principles as well, and thus they help to enlighten and strengthen their students in respect to our distinctive doctrines, and also to enlist them loyally in our Bap-

### OUR BAPTIST HOSPITAL

This is the youngest child of our Baptist State Convention. It is located on a beautiful site in the City of Winston-Salem. It was built by the Baptists of North Carolina and by the city of Winston-Salem.

Superintendent G. T. Lumpkin reports that since it opened its doors, about a year ago, it has received 1,407 patients, 200 of whom

were charity patients. It had a marvelous record of healing. It is felt that prayer has been a leading factor in contributing to this success. The purpose of this institution is to give to our Baptist people throughout the state the anvantages of hospital service under distinctively religious influences at the lowest possible cost. It has already proven its right to live.

We recommend that all our churches make a special offering for the charity work of this institution next Mothers' day in May.

#### ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage is the one vital living department of our denominational work that keeps us in constant touch with the crying needs of our dependent children.

For 39 years this work has been growing until we are now caring for 550 children at Thomasville and the Kenedy Home and 312 out in the state with their own mothers.

The current fund necessary to maintain the Orphanage is around \$175,000 the year, not including buildings and improvements. The contributions of one Sunday in each month from the Sunday-school and a great Thanksgiving offering equal to ONE DAY'S INCOME has become the main source of supply. The marvelous way that the Lord has blessed this big home is a loud call for our continued loyalty. The denomination from mountain to sea has been wonderfully strengthened by the reflex influence of their generous giving to the Orphanage.

The helpless childhood of our state lays upon us the obligation to widen our work and to reach out the hands of help to those who are without a penny, a home or a friend. And there are hundreds of children in North Carolina utterly destitute, who are as worthy and as promising as those who are already enjoying the blessings and protection of the Orphanage. So the task ever widens and we are therefore asking the Sunday-schools and churches of this association to continue to make larger investments in the Orphanage.

Moving picture shows and theaters that are going up all over the country with worldly, carnal, sensual shows to poison the youth, are destroying the moral life.

The immodest, immoral way in which our women, especially the young women, go "undressed" is enough to keep minds impure, and "as a man thinketh in his heart so is he."

Each of these evils go together and should be faught together.

These societies have contributed during the last year, the sum of \$43.05 to our work.

### STATE MISSIONS

Organization: The Baptist State Convention was conceived in the consecrated brain of Martin Ross. The convention was organized at Greenville, N. C. on March 26, 1830. The following brethren were present at this first session of the Convention: P. W. Dowd, R. M. Guffie, Wm. P. Biddle, Samuel Wait. John Armstrong, Thomas Meredith, C. W. Skinner, James McDaniel, H. Austin, P. P. Lawrence, R. S. Long, T. D. Mason, George Stokes and R. S. Blount.

A "Board of Directors" was appointed at the first meeting. This corresponds to our State Mission Board of today. A dozen brethren were selected as agents, whose business seems to have been to present the claims of the convention in their respective localities. John Armstrong was the first Corresponding Secretary.

Growth: When the Convention was organized there were 15,000 Paptists in the State, white and colored. Now there are 340,000

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white Baptists, and 230,000 negro Baptists, making a total of 570,-000 out of a population of 3,500,000. We have baptized 100,000 into our churches since 1919. There are 64 associations, 2,263 churches, 2,175 Sunday-schools, 1,365 B.Y.P.U.'s and 2,075 W. M. S. and Auxiliary Societies. There are 1,300 churches without a B.Y. P. U. and about the same number without a W.M.S. organization. There are 1,998 Country Churches in the State and between 1,400 and 1,500 with just a little one-room church house. We are rapidly building new church and Sunday-school equipment and we can see from the above that we have a long way to go.

Financhial Achievements: We have had great progress in our contributions during the past few years. During the four and one-half years of the 75 Million Campaign we have paid to Missions and Be-

State Missions gets about 13 cents out of the dollar. This is far too little for our great State Mission program. In the 1925 program we are to get 20 cents out of every dollar given. With this increase we ought to enlarge our State Mission program.

Number of Workers: We have 500 churches and mission stations being served by 180 missionaries. We have 3 evangelists, 3 enlist-

ment men, 3 student workers, 4 Sunday-school workers, 3 B.Y.P.U and 3 W.M.U. workers. We have Associate Secretary A. C. Hamby, located at Mars Hill, and Stewardship Secretary W. M. Gilmore

New Testament Stewardship: A proper understanding and practice of this fundamental dictrine by N. C. Baptists would solve every one of our problems. Hence we are placing great emphasis on the study of Bible teaching on this subject. Many of our pastors have taught classes in Cook's book, "Stewardship and Missions," and have preached special sermons on the subject with good results. One of our great objectives is to get every Baptist in N. Carolina to realize that he is a steward of his possessions and not the owner, that one day he must stand before the real Owner and give an account of

how he has used everything that has been entrusted to him. To induce all of our Baptist churches to become orthodox in practicing the simple New Testament plan of financing the Kingpom of God. "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by him in store as God has prospered him", this is one of our serious problems.

Our Immediate Needs: We have at this writing, Aug. 1, a debt on the running account of the State Missions of \$70,000. We get 13 cents out of the dollar in the 75 Million Campaign. We face a terrible debt this fall unless our people pay their pledges.

Then our building fund is simply over whelmed with applications. There are more than thirty-five applications on file in the office that we have not been able to touch. We need so much a larger amount for our building fund. We could use a quarter of a million dollars next year and then not have enough.

We need to enlarge every Department of the work and we must enlarge and go forward or we shall lose our opportunity. A crisis is upon us this fall and we must meet it like men and women who love and fear the Lord. W. M. Gilmore,

### HOME MISSIONS

The Board refers with gratitude to the wonderful progress made during the last years in Home Mission endeavor, especially during the five-year period of the 75 Million Campaign, which has been unique and outstanding in Baptist annals. A study of the Board's annual reports for these five years reveals a record of achievements. Notwithstanding the embarrassment of a heavy debt that has rested on the Board for four years past, God has bestowed unwonted favor upon the labors of missionaries and evangelists of the Board. Meetings of great power have been held in various fields and thousands have been brought to Christ. Fields notably hard, where for years we have been laboring and laying foundations, are coming to selfsupport and in turn are having a part in denominational work. Enlargement is called for from every direction. The calls are many and heart-searching from weak churches needing help and destitute fields needing missionaries in the countryside and in our growing towns and cities.

Changing conditions in the industrial world, the migration of the Negroes by hundreds of thousands to the North, the test of our civilization by the creeping of insidious error in our schools and colleges, all these call for the leavening power of the gospel. Who that reads our daily papers can deny that there is throughout our land a deplorable attitude on the part of multitudes of people with respect

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to law and government. The gospel is the pure corrective for these things and our Home Mission Board furnishes for Southern Baptists a great Southern agency for giving the gospel in purity and power.

The Home Mission Board, notwithstanding its burdensome debt and consequent retrenchment in its forces, presents a wonderful out look for the future. So marvelous have been God's favors upon our people in the last few years, and especially through the 5-year Campaign, that we are able by virtue of our forces and resources to seize the present situation and make Southern Baptists the greatest single religious force in the South and thruout our nation. The South is the nursery, the training ground, the granary, the source of supply, indeed, for our conquest of all lands. If we fail here we fail everywhere!! If we succeed here we succeed everywhere! May God help our people in this great day of opportunity with high resolve to meet the issues worthily and hasten the coming of His Kingdom on earth

Following is a summary of some features of the Board's work for the last 5 years: Sermons and addresses 802, 382: prayer meetings 1 01,075; religious visits 1,238.210; baptisms 203,532; total additions to churches 324,086; workers' conferences held 4,667; volunteers for Christian service 15,049; church houses built or improved 2,225; Sunday-schools organized 3,183; copies Scripture given 55,533; pages tracts distributed 35,812,479.

The 75 Million Campaign closes with December 1924 and it has been stated that if we raise the full 75 million dollars and Home Missions receives its due proportion we can pay off all of the Board's debt and be ready for an aggressive work for the future.

For 79 years the work of Foreign Missions has been implicit in the minds of the people of God's Kingdom who are striving to do His work. Year after year the words "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" is gaining entrance into every heart. The bequests received for the last few years amounts to \$30, 534.32. Let the names of these friends of Foreign Missions be embalmed in the hearts and memories of Southern Baptists.

Field Reports: The African Mission This field has been built up just a few missionaries now some parts of Africa [like copy] are call-Ing for helpers to work with them. Two women are giving their time in organizing W.M.U's. Bible Classes. They are also doing some evangelistic work. For the past 2 years Schools, COLLEGE, and Seminary have been erected.

The North Brazil Mission. Much good has come from this new work. Fifty preaching places, 22 churches organized.

In South Brazil we have a strong college and seminary. We also

have a large publishing house, which is doing much good in putting

out all kinds of literature. Other stations that have been established for some time, al out which we already know, are doing great work in Kingdom work.

Hospitals: Eight in China, one in Africa. Publishing Houses: Two in China, r in Japan, r in Mexico, 2 in Brazil, I in Argentina, I in Chile, I in Italy, I in Hungary, in Roumania 1, and in Spain 1. Schools and Academies, 72.

The Lord has given us the world to win for Him. If we would all

work, pray and pay our pledges, the Foreign Mission Board could lift the debt and go on with the building and the work in general. We now have over 200 missionaries in the work, paid by the Foreign Mission Board.

1988 members, this year 19 churches report 2,018 members. Last year 19 churches reported Pastors' Salaries \$2780.03; this year 19 churches paid pastors \$3001.28, an average of \$146.54. Last yr. 19 churches reported 217 baptisms; this year 19 churches report 145 Last year 19 churches reported total financial expenses exclusive of Pastors' Salaries, \$1,307.60; this year 19 churches report \$2,361 03. Last year 18 churches reported Sunday-schools; this year 19 churches report Sunday-schools. 5 churches reported W. M. Societies. We request the Church Clerks to make fuller reports as to statis-

tics. There was no report from any of the churches on B. Y. P. U. work and we can make no report on this account.

The Sunday School is the Bible studying and teaching of the church. It is a church service. It should be under the care and control of the church, and all the members of the church should be connected with it and take an active part in the service. The purpose of which is to present the Word of God by the hand of compe-

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tant and consecrated teachers to every man, woman and child that they may be led to Christ, developing their Christian characters and training them for church service.

Therefore the Sunday-school teacher, next to the minister of the gospel, fills the most responsible place in church service and should study diligently in order to be able to rightly divide the word of truth. Taking as his great teacher the Holy Spirit whom Christ said: "He shall guide you into all truth," and The Holy Ghost Himself shall teach you.

While our helps are good and worthy of our close study, the Bible should be used in our Sunday-schools also, as it has a tendency to cultivate the habit of Bible reading and enables us to study for our selves and not rely entirely on the writer of the helps and will help the world to get back to the Bible and look into it with their own eyes and feed directly from its pages as the true Word of God.

These are momentous times in which we are living and the success with which our young people are instructed and trained religiously will have much to do with the welfare of the world for generations to come if time lasts, and if Christ comes soon more will be ready for his coming, if our Sunday-schools do their entire duty. As we have no denominational schools in our county and have to

rely almost entirely on our state schools for the education of our children it is here that we face the most dificult aspect of the problem of properly training our children. The public school teacher has them five days in the week, the Sunday-school teacher one. Therefore Christian citizens should exert their powerful influence in securing men and women to have charge of our county system of education and state schools of positive Christian faith and character who have a right conception of the relation of education to the religious life and men and women of positive religious influence.
