## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

By Fred Forester

Missionary Baptist believe the Bible is the Divine Inspired Word of God. They believe the New Testament contains their Articles of Faith. They hold dear to their hearts the whole Bible. Baptists believe the teachings of Jesus. His words give us our great marching orders for four and one-half million Southern Baptists. The secret of their growth is found in this Scripture--"Ye shall be witnessed unto Me---". Baptists have always sent out witnesses, they have witnessed for Jesus even at the sword point and in face of jail doors. We are determined to carry out Jesus last command to us-- "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost"-Matt. 28:19. In Acts 1:8 Jesus gave a command for all the followers of all times to come, "Ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." We claim the Bible is our creed and "way bill" a Book of instructions and a "Sword".

Therefore North Carolina Baptists believe in State Missions and will try to carry the Gospel to the ends of this state. We believe

the words "Jerusalem and Judea" refer us to work in the home community and to the State we live in. "Ye shall be witnesses unto me in all Judea." Under the direction of Mr. M. A. Huggins our great layman State Sec. and Missionary here is a program of preaching, witnessing, and teaching carried to all parts of this state. Mr. L. L. Morgan directed a great S. S. Training program bringing to Shelby more than 1000 S. S. workers for two days of training. The S. S. forces under his direction conducted training classes in Western N. C. reaching the 14,000 in classes adding 604 new classes. The B. T. U. a part of the State Mission program under Mr. Brooks and Miss Starnes report 62,116 receiving this much needed training in N. C., giving out more than 14,000 awards for study courses in 1936. The State Missionary Board through Miss Mitches carries a Religious program to every campus of the state enlisting every student possible into religious work. Work for the layman under Chairman R. N. Simms for the men conducted associational rallies this year thus reaching thousands of men. Schools over the state for the Pastors are being promoted in the name of State Missions. There is a Pastors circulating library of 500 books that we may get any book or books by writing a card to M. A. Huggins and paying the return postage on the book.

The State Mission Board keeps Rev. E. M. Harris at Sanitorium to work with 500 tubercular patients and to minister to 170 girls at Samarcand who have been sent there by the courts of N. C. The State Mission Board pays the traveling expenses only of W. R. Hackney of Charlotte and G. C. Wilder of Asheville to minister to the deaf. He recently held 17 services with 610 attending and seven converted. Rev. Wayne Williams has been serving the Oteen inmates for years preaching and holding services with tuberculosis patients from U. S. Veterans lists. Some work is being done for the Negroes and Indians. The State Mission Board has 63 Missionary Pastorial assistants paying a great part of their salary; this group is serving 133 churches and preached 6,208 sermons last year. It has been recommended that the State Board minister to the inmates of the State prisons. Brothers J. C. Pipes and M. O. Alexander are State Missionaries to help strengthen weak churches and carry the gospel of "Doing" over the State.

This great State Mission Board needs the prayerful support of all North Carolina Baptists.

We, your committee, beg leave to report, that the year 1936-1937

was one of the best in point of supporting our Orphanage.

November '36 we shipped 32,000 pounds of produce from this association and nearly all of our churches made cash contributions. The produce sent amounted to more than \$400.00 and there was more than \$200.00 cash. So all together we gave more than we usually do.

There is with the churches now 200 dozen fruit jars to be filled and sent some time in October. We are happy to make this the largest offering of its kind from this section.

We are hoping that the Social Security Act will enable us to cut down the many applications and give us a better chance to hand pick over children for that institution.

#### REPORT ON PERIODICALS

There are three ways of promoting religion; by preaching, by personal testimony and by the printed page. Some people do not come to church, and that means that we, as a Baptist denomination must reach them in some way. Therefore, we must reach them by the printed page or the Kingdom work will suffer.

The fact that "Cheap Literature" is being placed in the hands of our people makes it more essential that we place in the homes of our people wholesome literature to counteract the other.

The Bibical Recorder has served our people that is, the Baptist of North Carolina, for about one hundred and two years. The

past few years have been most trying years, financially, for many years. We must greatly increase the circulation during the next two years if we are to go forward in our denominational work at home, and on foreign fields. We recommend that each pastor in this association urge his people to increase their subscription to The Recorder this year.

There are other publications fostered by certain departments of our work that should be read by our people. Charity and Children, published by the Mills Home gives valuable information, not only about our orphanage but also about other phases of work. Royal Service and World Comrades, are missionary publications that should be read in every Baptist home in the Southland.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

For the calendar year 1936, the Board received from the several states of the convention the sum of \$959,794.74. In addition to this amount, there was an income from the endowment fund, special gifts for debts, and from the sale of property which amounted to \$1,040,574.57. Thus for the first time in several years the total income passed the million mark.

The goal set by the Woman's Misisonary Union for the 1936 Lottie Moon Christmas offering was \$175,000.00 and the amount received was \$291,761.72. There was set aside \$100,000.00 of this offering to pay the salaries of 125 missionaries. This offering has been a life saver for the Board.

Since January 1, 1933 the Board has appointed 90 new missionaries and reappointed 28, making a total of 118 replacements. On April 1, 1937, there were 56 emeritus missionaries on pension, and 415 missionaries in the active service of the Board.

Owing to the lack of funds there were no new missionaries appointed at the semi-annual meeting of the Board in April, 1937. A long look into the future can not justify any enlargement unt

Southern Baptists increase their gifts to the cooperative program. We have work now in sixteen different foreign countries. In these lands there are 63 missionaries who are 60 years of age and over. The need for replacements is indeed acute and desperate.

Requirements for those who are to fill the places where the need is very great is being raised each year; therefore only the very best of those that have heard the call will be chosen to carry the good news to the foreign fields.

With the return of prosperity in the economic and business life of the South, there has not been the corresponding recovery and increase in the gifts of our people to the great program of Jesus. Unless our people raise the standard of giving, we will never be able to meet the challenge and opportunities that call to us from the four corners of the earth. God help us to wake up here in the Tuckaseigee Association and hear the call from the foreign fields, "Come over into Macedonia and help us".

Let's become missionary in practice as well as belief, or change our name to Stingy Baptists. This sin-cursed world is dying for the Gospel of Christ. Let's arise and get busy at the task while it is day, for the night cometh when no man can work.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

In this work of Christianizing the homeland, we are serving the world. A triumphant missionary program in our own country is necessary if we would push our conquest for Christ in lands afar. A Christianity which does not conquer at home will not be able to conquer abroad. We cannot give what we do not have.

The Home Mission Board is lifting up Christ in the homeland among the Indians, the foreigners, the Negroes, the underprivileged in the cities and congested industrial sections, and in Cuba and Panama. In all of its departments of work, including the field force, the Sanatorium, the rescue missions, the good will centers, and schools, the Board has 327 missionaries working in 850 mission stations. During the past convention year we have placed in the field 35 new missionaries. This enlargement of our work was made possible by the receipts from the Bottoms Trust and un-

solicited designations.

On fields in the South missionaries opened 39 new stations last year, bringing the total of churches and stations to 640. The churches have a membership of 11,755; during the year 2,137 were added by baptism, and there were 3,633 professions. The missionaries delivered 16,431 sermons, distributed 5,858 Bibles and gospels and 256,335 tracts.

Three new churches were organized in Cuba, where the Board has 72 workers. These misionaries made 42,383 visits and distributed 552,994 tracts.

A new department of the Board's work is that of evangelism, of which Dr. Roland Q. Leavell is superintendent. The purpose of the department is, through evangelistic conferences, the circulation of fresh and stimulating literature, and simultaneous revival campaigns in strategic centers, to keep aflame the spirit of evangelism.

The Board has adjusted its budget so as to operate on a cash basis. For the past three and one-half years no money has been borrowed for current work. The budget fixed for the year was \$150,000.00 for mission work and overhead, and \$203,820.00 for interest and principal on the debt. For the calendar year 1936 the Board received from all sources, \$443,455.00, which was \$46,291.00 more than was received in 1935. Of this amount, the women gave \$113,981 in the Annie W. Armstrong offering, all especially designated, and \$56,720 came from the Bottoms Trust. During the past year \$108,313 was paid on the debt.


#### REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The year closing June 30, 1937 was the greatest in the history of the 14 years of ministry of the Baptist Hospital located at Winston Salem--greatest in number of patients admitted, in number of churches contributing to its support and greatest in amount contributed.

About 5,000 patients applied for treatment during the year. Of this number 1,000 could not be admitted for want of room. The hospital never turns away patient as long as there is an empty bed.

The Nurses' Home is now being enlarged--the capacity double--also plans are underway to enlarge the Hospital.

During the year 1,000 mothers were returned to their 3,000 children; 4,000 patients returned home to 20,000 fathers and mothers brothers and sisters, and 200,000 interested kinsmen and friends.



The Hospital depends very largely on the Mother's Day offering for providing treatment to those who cannot pay. This offering last May was a little more than \$20,000.00. Hospital linen, such as sheets, pillow cases, towels, etc., has been donated in increased quantities this year by Woman's Missionary Unions and other church organizations.

As a Christian Institution, this Hospital always endeavors to minister to, not only the suffering body, but to the distressed mind and spirit as well.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association reported last year 4300 persons enrolled in Sunday School with an average attendance of about 2600. Our minutes of this year should show we believe a considerable increase over last year.

We have had several Sunday School Conventions in our Association this year under the leadership of Brother Paul Buchanan. He has done fine work in our Association. We have not had a Sunday School revival this year under the supervision of our State Secretary, as we did last year it being deemed advisable not to have one since we had an associational B. T. U. revival, however we believe that we should look forward to the coming year and enlist all the Sunday Schools in our county in another Sunday School Revival.

The place of the Sunday School in the life of the church can not be over estimated. One of our former Presidents of the United States said "That the Sunday School is the greatest School in the world teaching the world's greatest Book".

Roger Babson said in a recent article that many of the older folks send their children to Sunday School Sunday morning while they stayed at home and read the funny paper. Every father and mother should take and not send their children to Sunday School.

We believe that every preacher, pastor, and every deacon should find themselves in Sunday School regularly and fill their places as teachers and officers when called upon.

The Sunday School has as its only text book the Bible. It is the living vital Book not of a long ago but it has the transforming



power to change the lives of men today as in the centuries past.

The statistics show that the majority of those that become Christians are won in the early years. Many of them must be won in the Sunday School if they are won at all. What a marvelous opportunity we have for evangelization in the Sunday School.

God grant that the coming year may be the best in our Association, the Southland and throughout the world in our Sunday School work.

#### REPORT ON W. M. U.

Another year has passed into history, and we bring you again the report of the W. M. U. work in the Tuckaseigee Association, and we have about the same old story to tell of great number of unenlisted churches, and a great host of women and young people still unreached. If we are tired of this same old story year after year, why not decide to change it. It can be done; for all things are possible to him that believeth.

In the long, long when Jesus and His disciples were walking through Samaria, He said to them "Look upon the fields for they are white unto harvest". He wanted them to see the great Spiritual need of their home land at close range. Today our Spiritual need is far greater than ever before in the history of the world, and there is only one source of supply.

In spite of many discouragements we do have some encouraging things to report. For the year 1936 we contributed for all objects \$517.06 which is better than the year before.

For the first quarter of this year \$119.07 which is better than the first quarter of last year, of second quarter thus \$104.67. The Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for Foreign Missions was better than ever before, also was the Annie W. Armstrong Offering for Home Missions.

We had three quarterly meetings during the year they were well attended and very helpful.

We had the divisional meeting of the Western counties with us last October at Cullowhee. We had with us at this meeting some of our southwide as well as State leaders. And what a treat it was for us to hear these consecrated leaders. We received ew inspiration and courage for the task before us.

We have two A-1 Societies in our Association of which we are justly proud.

We have eighteen organizations in our Association.

In gratitude to God for the rick heritage which is ours as Chris-

tians and Baptists and for multiplied blessing upon the work of the past fifty years, Woman's Missionary Union is calling every member to a deeper devotion to God a more complete surrender to the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and to greater loyalty in service that we may enter upon our jubilee year more devoted followers of Christ, and that we may become more fruitful "laborers together" with God in the years that lie ahead.

It is very much to be deplored, that since the repeal of the eighteenth amendment of the Constitution of the United States that the various states throughout America have legalized the sale of intoxicating liquors and that North Carolina, has against the will and consent of the best class of its citizens. legalized the manufacture and sale of spiriutous, vinous and malt liquors and that since this has been done, many persons have seen fit to take advantage of the legal dispensing of beer and wine, all of which has brought about a very noticeable increase in the drinking of the same and thereby, drunkeness has increased to such an extent, until the conditions have become alarming.

Now, in consideration of the foregoing condition, your committee, asks that every member of the Baptist Church in this Association, every minister, deacon, and every worker in the kingdom of Christ, abstain from the use of intoxicants, and use every means within our reach to restrain others from the use and abuse of intoxicating beverages.

We beseach every minister to preach and teach the people, every

where to abstain from the evil influence of those who make, those who who sell and those who drink intoxicating liquors.

Let every teacher in Sunday school, every Superintendent of the Sunday School see that often and early, we stress the necessity of temperance and sobriety for all people everywhere.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report on Christian Education submitted by Rev. P. L. Elliott. On motion report was adopted.

One hundred and three years ago the Baptist people started their program of education in North Carolina. Wake Forest College was established in 1834 from the conviction that the Baptist ministry

should be educated in order to cope with the necessities in spreading the work of the kingdom. That act was in keeping with the movement both in Europe and America for the broadening of the intellectual and cultural life of the masses of people. That principal is no less vital today than then. It is necessary always for the leaders, the ministers, to be more thoroughly developed intellectually than those whom they lead; however, there is always the danger of developing the intellect away from the spirit.

There has been a significant development. From the meagre beginning with Wake Forest we have reached out until we have Wake Forest a Senior college for men with one thousand students. Meredith College, a Senior College for women, with five hundred students, Campbell College, Chowan College, Wingate, Boiling Springs, and Mars Hill, Junior Colleges for both men and Women with around fifteen hundred students. A significant change has taken place in that the support for these colleges has been transferred from the associations and churches to endowment and fees. The convention still owns these schools, and appoints their trustees. That is about the only official tie-up we have with our institutions. This is at once an advantage in that it gives more assurance for the continuation of these schools than the agencies of depressions, prejudices, or differences in opinion as to what should be taught. On the other hand it is a great risk in the possibility of our schools in their independence becoming merely like other schools, either state or private. The emphasis in state and private colleges has been on scholarship often to the exclusion of other considerations just as vital in the education of our children. Our schools have kept pace in scholarship. The work done at our Senior colleges ranks with the best in the land. Our Junior colleges are likewise good, especially Mars Hill, which is ranked as the third highest Junior college in America.

My plea is that we support these colleges by our individual gifts, wills, etc., and by sending our children to them; and that we urge the ruling boards of these schools to keep the scholastic standing of them equal to the best, both in curriculum and training of the teachers, but that above all that they employ only teachers whose characters and spiritual genuineness is equal to their intellectual scholarship. If this be done, we need have no fear for the future of our work.

Third, that we urge from the pulpit and from the pew of the evil that is being done by such commercial business.
