THE MASKED MARVELS

A recent A.P. item, datelined Toronto, reported the horrible experience of a man running up and down the street before his burning home, crying for help in saving his family. Passersby ignored his shouts and the screaming of his trapped family.

How often in our day-to-day living have we ignored the silent signs and pleas for help? Perhaps, "to ignore" is the wrong term; "I don't want to get involved" is more like it. But can we be blamed for such an attitude? Obviously without some 'selective involvement' we would go nuts overly identifying with everyone and seeking to aid them in their afflictions.

Then again, we are not as aware of pleas for help that are less dramatic than the Toronto case. "Speak out and we will hear and heed," we urge, but would we dare to unmask and openly reveal our needs to anyone else, or reach through our protective shells and lend a hand?

There seems to be a bit of truth in the meditation that (in part) runs:

"...We view ourself in the roles we play wearing masks and protective shells each day--We wonder which, as we review the show, is really--really the true?-- Is it the cynic?--the poet?--the egotist?--the deep?--the shallow?--the flippant?--the one who needs?--the one who can do without?--The show continues 'till we learn anew that the harder the shell and the more elaborate the mask--beneath it all is a soul who...--yet we dare not look longer for it hurts, you see, and--who cares anyway?"

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

It is our opinion that the Church is a living, developing body, creatively adapting to minister to the needs of the day. Also, we see the Church to be probing into and exploring new ideas with which to better be a servant in the future.

As a part of the greater body of the Church, Southeastern Seminary has a role in this search for a relevant and developing and ever sustaining servanthood. The Enquiry has sought and will continue to serve as a means of sharing the questions, ideas, and possible answers raised by the members of this community as we engage in this search.

Much research and thought has gone into several articles concerning the churches and various Federal Programs in terms of the churches' participation in the latter, or our ministry of referral, or bringing the need and the source of aid together. Yet, some issues or questions have gone unanswered or seemingly unnoticed. One such was the concern raised in the March 5 issue in a letter by Jim Winslow dealing with the theological implications of, or the Church's ministry on the frontier of modern medical advances. Has the Church no concern either in leadership or counselling as the issues of organ transplants, a definition of death, donation of one's body to science, mercy killing, removing the archaic abortion laws from the books, etc. are raised? What are your feelings and suggestions on these matters?

Other matters not raised in The Enquiry per se, but may be classified as "Unfinished Business" none the less, include: the churches role in meeting the summer crisis of our cities, Did the recent Riot Report tell the whole truth? Where is the Church in relation to advancing technological frontiers? What are the aspects of a 'Space Age Theology'? Are denominational colleges out of date? What is Christian ministry to higher education? etc.etc.etc.....
