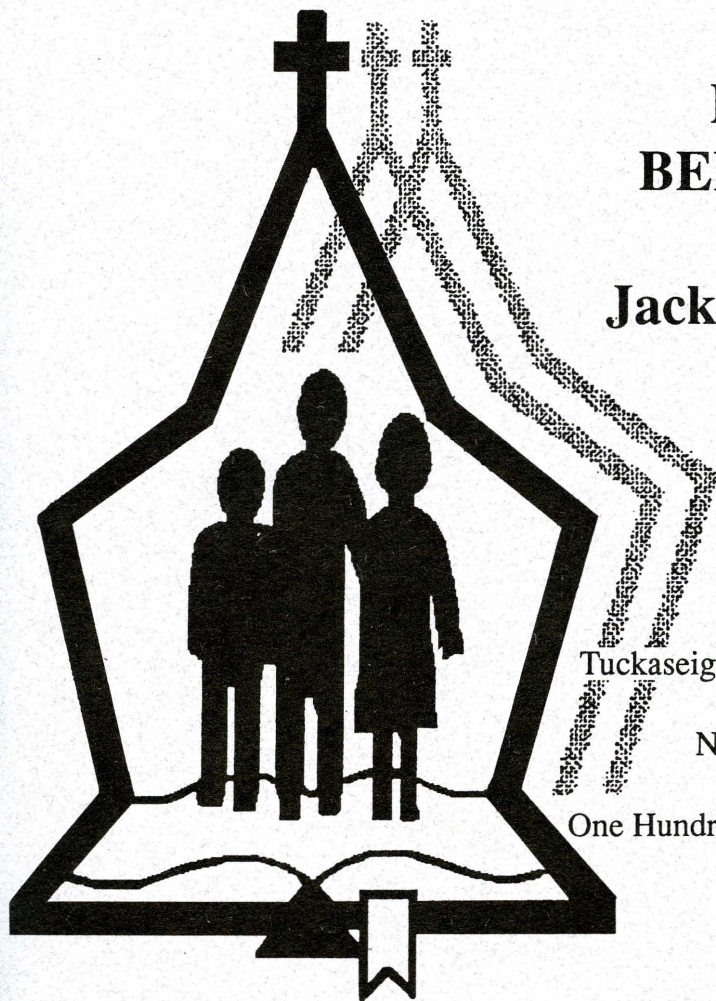

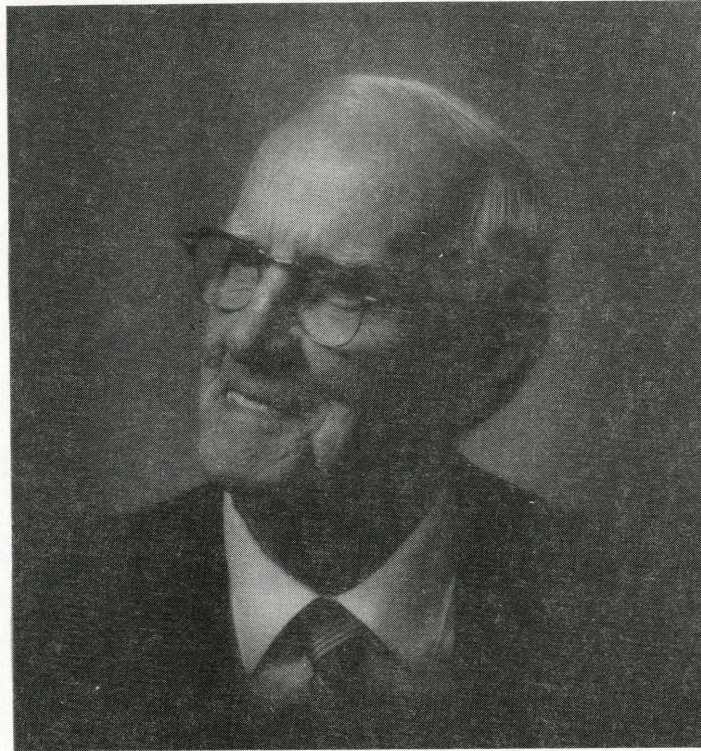

LUNIE L. PANGLE

"Uncle" Lunie Pangle was born before the turn of the century, on April 1, 1896. He is the son of Robert Lee Pangle and Sissy W. Sutton.

He married Bertha Sutton and they reared four children: Hazen, Janet P. Bryson, Raymond, and Cherrylee P. Morgan. He has 14 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren, and two great-great-grandchild.

"Uncle" Lunie has lived most of his life here in Jackson County except for a few years in Tennessee. He was a veteran of World War I. After the war, he worked for the railroad, ran a grist mill, and owned and operated both a barber shop and a carpenter/woodwork shop in Dillsboro.

"Uncle" Lunie is an ordained deacon and has also served as Superintendent and Sunday School teacher of Locust Field Baptist Church. He has taught music by shaped notes to four generations, approximately 65 years, in several churches in Western North Carolina and Eastern Tennessee.

He has been a fixture at many revivals and singings throughout Jackson County, and his songs and testimonies have touched the lives of many people throughout the years. He sings without accompaniment and by memory.

The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association dedicates its annual minutes to a man highly respected and deeply loved, "Uncle" Lunie Pangle.

Coy worked at Dayco Corporation in Waynesville. She did secretarial work at several different places as well as retail sales.

They were very active in the East Fork Baptist Church. Coy was a deacon, Sunday School Superintendent, and Choir Director. Dot was Church Clerk at East Fork for more than forty years.

They both were active in Baptist life in Jackson County and in the Tuckaseegee Association. He served as Chairman of the Pastor, Deacon and Spouse Fellowship Conference and as Music Director. She sang at numerous funerals in different churches across the county in a trio with her sisters.

They were blessed with two children, Lisa Wilson, and Rev. Eddie Deitz and four grandchildren.

They went home to be with the Lord the same year, in 1991. Dot died on April 29 and Coy died December 18.

They were well respected for their musical gifts which they dedicated to the Lord's service. They were gentle and humble people who bore strong witness of the Lord's love in their lives.

John married Frances Bryson Hyatt in November of 1952. They reared five children: John Jr.; Sharron Shearouse; Eric; James; and Charles.

John served in World War II in the US Army. After his discharge he worked in Oak Ridge, Tennessee, and then for Southern Railway. For many years he worked for the US Government as a Federal Parole Officer and retired from that position.

John was active in the First Baptist Church of Sylva. He served as Deacon Chairman, Sunday School teacher, and on various committees.

He was very active in the Tuckaseige Association having served as Sunday School Director for several years and was a past Moderator. He served as Chairman of the Search Committee in 1981. He also served on various other Associational Committees through the years.

John served on the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina as a representative of the Tuckaseige Association. He also served on the General Board as a representative of Region Ten, comprising the Cheoah, Macon, Tennessee River, Truett, and Tuckaseige Associations. He served on a number of committees for the State Convention.

John Hyatt was known for his love for the Lord and for the Lord's work. He gave of himself unselfishly to the Lord through the local church, the Baptist Association and the Baptist Denomination. He was also known for his wisdom and maturity.

John went home to be with the Lord on April 30, 1992 after a courageous battle with Cancer. His faith and positive attitude during his days of illness were an inspiration to all.

PROCEEDINGS

163rd ANNUAL SESSION

THURSDAY, OCT. 15, 1992

The One Hundred Sixty-Third Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association was held Thursday, October 15 at Greens Creek Baptist Church with 35 Churches represented by 132 messengers and 51 visitors. Friday, October 16, session was held at Yellow Mountain Church with 104 messengers from 27 churches and 27 visitors.

The Association voted to establish a five year partnership with the Ukraine in the former Soviet Union. This is in conjunction with the partnership with the North Carolina Baptist Convention and the Ukraine. Plans are being considered to send a team from Jackson County to Russia as early as Summer of 1993.

New Officers were elected. Rev. Kenneth (Joe) Pressley, Pastor of Cullowhee Valley, was elected to a second term as Moderator. Rev. Dennis Burrell Pastor of Little Savannah Baptist Church was elected Vice Moderator. Rev. Ray Houston was re-elected Associational Clerk. Mr. Jesse Flake was re-elected Associational Treasurer.

The Annual Meeting was highlighted with Special singing by the Trout Creek Choir on Thursday evening and The Willing Servants on Friday evening. Rev. Wayne Sorrells, Pastor of Buff Creek Baptist Church, brought the message Thursday, and Rev. Larry Nations brought the message on Friday evening. Rev. Harry Vance, Associational Music Director read the Scripture and led the congregational singing.

Thursday evening the messengers heard informative and inspiring reports from agency and institutional leaders. Rev. Jack Hinson, Chaplain at C. J. Harris reported on his work. Mr. Jess Chapman, a trustee of the Baptist Hospital, gave a report on the work of the Hospital in Winston-Salem. Rev. Winston Hardman reported on the work of the Baptist Student Union at Western Carolina University.

Rev. Tom Lolley, area Missionary for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina gave a report on Convention work and goals. Rev. Wayne Sorrells reported on the New York Partnership work with the Davis Association. Two teams have been exchanged since the partnership was established last year. Another team will go to New York next spring.

Mrs. Irene Hooper, led in a five year report on the partnership relationship with Sao Paulo, Brazil. People who had gone to Brazil assisted in the report and were: Rev. Robert Blanton, Rev. Roy and Janice Burnette, Mary Anne Frye, Mark Haskett, Shirley Kool and Virginia Haskett.

Messengers also heard from Tom Crowder, President of the Sylva Gideon's Chapter, on the work of the Gideon's. Rev. Richard Roberson of Truett Camp in Hayesville, N. C. brought the annual camp report.

Rev. John Reid brought the Annual Director of Missions report. Rev. Ray Houston gave the Digest of Letters report.

Thursday's session was concluded with a prayer of commissioning for Rev. Lewis Smith who has resigned as Pastor from the Cashier's Church and will work as Field Director for Parents Against Teen Suicide, a agency established by Mr. Fred Davis.

On Friday, the meeting was primarily local leaders and their reports.

Rev. Joe Yelton, Pastor of Cullowhee Baptist Church and Chairman of the Finance Committee, brought the Finance Committee report. Mr. Jesse Flake, Associational Treasurer, gave the financial report. A special presentation was made to Rev. John and Nelda Reid. Rev. Reid was presented a plaque commemorating ten years of service. Mrs. Reid was presented with a pewter serving set and Rev. Reid was given a very generous cash gift. Several cards and letters from Associational churches were a part of the expressions of Appreciation.

Mrs. Ada McCoy, of the Hamburg Baptist Church, presented the Nominating Committee report for officers and leaders. Rev. J.D Grant, Pastor of Lovedale, presented the Committee on Committee report.

Rev. Luther Osment, Western Area Director for the Baptist Children Home's Inc., gave a report on the Children's Homes programs. Rev. Osment is also Director of Broyhill Children's Home in Clyde.

Rev. Cecil Frady, Pastor of Tuckasegee Baptist Church, presented the Mission Development Council report.

Rev. Jack Hinson brought the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee report. Next year's meeting will be held at the Lovedale and East Sylva Baptist Churches. Rev. Scott Courtney and Rev. Ricky Campbell will bring the Annual Sermon.

Rev. Barry Almand, Pastor of Green's Creek Church, brought the Sunday School report as Associational Sunday School Director. Rev. Fred Lunsford, Area Sunday School Worker for the Baptist State Convention, presented awards to Green's Creek and Ochre Hill Baptist Churches for participation in Sunday School Growth Campaign's.

Norman Parris, Discipleship Director, brought the Discipleship report. Also he announced Associational "M" night to be held at East Sylva, November 26, with Cleve Wilkey as the guest speaker.

Ms Janice Burnette gave the WMU report.

Randy Davenport presented the Interfaith witness report and announced an Occult/Satanism workshop at the Baptist Center Monday evening, October 26, at 7:00pm.

Mrs. Kathleen Buchanan and Mrs. Virginia led in the Memorial Service for deceased members. Rev. Joe and Shirley Pressley sang and were accompanied by Linda Johnson.

The Resolution Committee presented a resolution thanking Greens Creek and Yellow Mountain Churches for hosting the meetings and Rev. JD Grant and committee for the fine work during the recent Tent meeting.

The Meeting was concluded with special singing and testimony by 96 year old Linnie Pangle, a member of Locust Field, and the oldest person present. Rev. Joe Pressley moderated the sessions.

## PROGRAM REPORTS

### DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I celebrate my tenth anniversary as Director of Missions, I want to thank the people of the churches for the prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement you have given me during these ten years. I am grateful for the many opportunities to preach, to teach and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church.

I am particularly grateful to and commend to you the officers and committees in the association who have done their work well this past year. I have high praise for their work. The Association, like the local church, is totally dependent upon volunteers to accomplish its tasks. The volunteers have contributed many hours and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

My role as Director of Missions requires tasks that are many and varied. I consider myself first and foremost a servant and a friend of the local church. My goal is to lead the association to be able to be a resource for each church to realize its potential before God. Some of the ways I have served this past year are: preaching, teaching, planning, strategizing, training, equipping, leading, encouraging and consulting in the local church. I have met with several pulpits committees in helping to train them.

Since Baptist churches are numerous and Baptist people are influential in the county, I am often called upon by different agencies or groups to give some input into their projects. I also serve as a volunteer chaplain at C.J. Harris Hospital.

The North Carolina-Sao Paulo Partnership project officially comes to a close this year. In five years thirty-one people for our association have gone to Brazil. Over one thousand professions of faith have been reported by the teams. Visits have been made to churches, homes, schools, prisons, children homes and hospitals.

This past May, I led a team of eight people from Haywood, Macon and Tuckaseegee Associations to Sao Paulo for eight days. We saw one hundred sixty-six professions of faith and two hundred forty-two rededications. I preached in the Betel Baptist Church and was hosted by Pastor Silas de Melo who spent a week in this association last year. The trip was the highlight of the year for me. A fund for the Terra Preta Mission has been established and a goal of \$4000 has been established. Mrs. Oleta Zachery has been burdened to give leadership in this effort. I encourage each church to invite her to hear her testimony and to support this project. In early March we hosted a group of Pastors from New York in our Partnership effort with the Davis Baptist Association. They were preaching and visiting in fifteen of our churches during one weekend. We held a planning meeting and discussed several things we could do in the future. In late May Dr. Phil Swanson, Pastor, Beacon Light Baptist Church, taught adult VBS at Cullowee. In early summer a youth group from First Baptist went to New York for a mission trip. More events will be planned in late fall or next year.

Hurricane Andrew devastated South Florida and our Association responded quickly and generously. We received over a half of a tractor and trailer load of food and over nine thousand dollars to purchase building materials and other needed items for the victims of Hurricane Andrew. Five volunteers spent a week in the Homestead area doing disaster relief work. Another trip is being planned on October 25. Volunteers are needed.

Locust Field has begun to build their church and I want to remind us that missions starts at home. It would be hypocritical for us to go a long way to do missions and overlook our own needs right here in the county. Many churches have already made a donation toward their building project. I challenge everyone to support their effort to replace their building.

Betty Grant observed her first anniversary this past May. We are grateful to her for the fine work she does here in the office. She is a friend and a prayer warrior.

I am grateful for prayers and financial support of the many listeners of the radio program. Although the Tuckaseegee Baptist Half-Hour is not officially linked with the Association, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and promotion of events in the Association. Weekly I encourage listeners to attend and to support their local church.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each Church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the Church and the Association.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. This past year I attended the State Convention Meeting in Asheville, a DCM meeting sponsored by Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary at Wake Forest, the Annual State Staff/DCM meeting at Caraway, the VBS Clinic in Asheville and board meetings for Camp Truett and for the Southwestern Area Resort Ministry (SWARM).

I also conducted two revivals and sang in the DCM quartet at a National Baptist meeting in Washington, DC. The DCM quartet sang at the recent Broyhill Children's Home Annual Barbecue and I conducted an evangelism training at Greens Creek last Spring.

The Association has taken an important step in deciding to do Associational Strategy Planning. This is a process by which an association determines its purpose, identifies its objectives and set its course of action within our county. Stated simply, it is our plan. It will consist of seven work groups: statement of Purpose Task group, publications task group, church study task group, associational organization study task group, population study task group, social systems task group, and other religious groups task group. This effort will involve a lot of people from different churches and will set the direction of the association for the next five years. It will help us see who we are and what we should be doing as we move toward the end of the century.

Our finances have not been as strong this year as in past years. While special gifts have been good, the general fund has not met the budget. It looks like the receipts will be less than the budget by around \$1,500. According to the August financial report, we are 91.67% into the year and have received 83.8% of our total budget. 36 churches have contributed approximately 73% of the total budget. I believe that the churches will have in increase their support to the General Fund in order for us to operate at full strength. The Baptist State Convention contributes 8.4% to our budget but this amount will be reduced this coming year.

Two important aspects of Associational life are strong. Our fellowship and cooperation among our churches is good. Churches are having joint services, attendance is good at meetings, and there is a good spirit in the association. May God continue to bless us as we work together.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church newsletter incorporated into the Biblical Recorder which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed.

The second meeting was held January 24, 1992 at East Sylva Baptist Church. Following the evening meal, Rev. Charles Dean gave a devotion taken from John 16: 17-23 entitled "Directions". Director of Missions John Reid, announced there would be an Executive Committee meeting February 3 at 7:30 pm to discuss repairing or replacing the heating system in the Baptist Center. Harry Vance announced there would be an Associational singing in March. The first Sunday in March was designated for offerings to the Brazilian Baptist Church and recommended the Pastors, Deacons and Spouses give \$250.00 for the treasury. Motion made and accepted. Special music was provided by the Directors of Mission Quartet. Jim Dean, Youth Director at East Sylva, presented a program on Love, using magic to emphasize his theme. John Reid closed in prayer.

Rockdale Baptist Church served as host for the third meeting held April 24, 1992. Harry Vance led the opening hymn "Victory in Jesus". Harry is serving as Interim pastor at Rockdale. His devotion was taken from 1st John Chapter 1, key verse 7 "But if we walk in the light as He is in the light, we have fellowship with one another and the blood of Jesus Christ, his Son cleanseth us from all sin". Calvin Cabe made a motion we donate \$150.00 from the treasury to Randy Brooks to help with expenses on his mission trip. Motion carried. Our last meeting of the year was held at Calvary Baptist Church beginning with a cook-out at Savannah Community Center, Friday July 24. Rev. Bill Green, the pastor, brought the devotional. He told the congregation the greatest example of love was shown by Jesus Christ when he willingly died on the cross for the sins of all mankind. Harry Vance led the singing of some old time favorites, such as "Old Time Religion". Haven Ensley, Chairman, appointed a nominating committee to select officers for the coming year. Guest speaker was Brenda Smith, a nurse at CJ Harris Community Hospital. She showed a video of a young

man with AIDS. Smith told the story of how her family reached out to the man and loved him and cared for him until he died in 1989. He was her brother, Keith Smith. Brenda said she feels that God is using her to educate people about AIDS and remove some of the fear. She closed with this statement and question: "Not if, but when someone in your family gets AIDS, what will you do?" From April 1991 to March 1992 there were 610 cases reported in North Carolina. This is a life and death issue. "How will we as Christians respond?"

#### THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

ARTICLE X. Section 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report to the next annual session of the Association.

January 6, 1992 40 members representing 23 churches met. The following business items were acted upon.

1. Motions were made and passed: a) Erection of a large sign identifying our Associational Building. b) Erection of a star over the building to be lighted during December. c) Erection of a star to be lighted during the Easter season. These were approved and the Building and Grounds Committee was instructed to study and present plans (diagrams and cost) during the April meeting. (as of September 30, no report has been given).

2. Motion to purchase a printer from Radio Shack was approved.

3. Motion from Missions Action Committee to request \$3,500.00 from the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina to assist with the Missions Director's salary for next year was approved.

4. Rev. Wayne Sorrells reported that we had seven volunteers to go to Brazil April 30-May 11. He recommended the first Sunday in March be set aside to receive a special love offering to assist with their expenses. A motion to that effect was made and passed.

February 3, 1992 Special Called Meeting: 16 present from 13 churches.

The purpose of this meeting was to authorize the spending of money to repair the Heat Pump. Since not enough money was appropriated in the annual budget to meet the cost, money was voted to be taken from the General Fund Budget to pay \$1,120.69 for the repairs.

April 6, 1992 41 members representing 24 churches were present. The following business was transacted.

1) Jesse Flake, Associational Treasurer, recommended that a Reserve Emergency Building and Grounds Account be set up. His recommendation was as follows:

a) Transfer the sum of \$2,000 from the current cash balance to set up a reserve fund for repairs and replacements.

b) Invest these funds in a Money Market type account.

c) Encourage churches to contribute to this fund just as they had to the Building fund in the past.

d) Transfer at the end of the fiscal year the excess of actual general fund receipts over the actual budget expenditures to the Reserve Fund until such a time that the Executive Committee members or messengers to the Annual Meeting determine that a sufficient reserve has been established.

e) Consider special projects recommended by the building and grounds and/or Finance Committee to raise additional funds for the Reserve Funds.

f) Disburse funds from the Reserve Fund upon approval by the Finance Committees recommended by the Building and Grounds Committee.

After appropriate discussion, items a, b, c, d, and f were approved. Item e will be considered later if needed.

2) At the close of the meeting a Commissioning Service for the seven Missionaries going to Brazil was held.

July 13, 1992 27 present from 17 churches. The following business was transacted.

1) Joe Yelton, Finance Chairman, made a motion to increase Budget Items: Postage \$300, Office Supplies \$300, and decrease Youth \$200.00, RA's \$200.00, Missions Council \$100.00, Associational Leadership Training \$100. Motion carried.

2) Two resolutions addressing the Matter of Olin t. Binkley Memorial Baptist Church in Chapel Hill ordaining an admitted lesbian, and Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh uniting two homosexuals in marriage were presented. In each case these were members of their respective churches.

Since the Raleigh Baptist Association, The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention had acted by withdrawing fellowship from these churches, the following substitute motion was approved.

Joe Yelton made the motion and several seconded it that we send the following letter to the churches named above.

Dear Friends:

We are certain that the last few months have been most difficult for you as you struggled with the volatile issue of relating to homosexuals. Your decision has brought a firestorm of reaction. No doubt, some of the reactions you have received have been from hearts angered and not bathed in prayer. Many of those reacting have done so out of the depths of love and concern. It is in this latter vein that we extend the following.

We, the Executive Committee of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, wish to express our concern with the potentially devastating signal your actions have given our world. It is one thing to love and minister to homosexuals, and quite another to give credence to their lifestyle.

Though we affirm fully your decision to exercise your autonomous character and ministry, in this instance, we believe you have broken Scripture and sent a confusing signal to the many homosexuals who presently feel the compulsion to leave their lifestyle.

We do not intend to send our action to any newspaper or media expression. We wish to approach you, as caring brothers and sisters in faith, and work to redeem our fellowship and co-ministry.

May we suggest that as the dust begins to settle, and open discussion with brothers and sisters in faith and let us hear why this decision became necessary for you, and then hear why so many feel so offended. Perhaps in such dialogue, the log jam of combat can give way to the free expression of individual faith.

It is wonderful that you have chosen to minister to the sizable homosexual population so many of our churches have avoided. Your public condoning of the homosexual lifestyle steps beyond the bounds of caring for the sinner while deploring the sin.

Please, don't stop thinking now! How can our association help in redemption of our fellowship?

When the Associational Interfaith Witness Programs was first started, there was no idea of the interest people have in cults and world religions. Most of the contacts were people interested in beliefs of other kinds and how to witness to people involved in cults.

I have attended an Interfaith Witness Training seminar on the New Age Movements. I also attended the Mind, Body Soul Expo (New Age Expo) in Asheville, NC. Christian tracts were not allowed.

I have spoken to the Cullowhee United Methodist youth group on New Age with 15 youth and 6 adults present. At Speedwell Baptist Church, an Overview of cults was presented. A "Reaching the Cults" Workshop sponsored by the Association brought out 28 people interested in witnessing to people involved in the New Age Movements and Jehovah's Witness. I spoke to a small group who has been contacted by the Kingdom Bible Study which combines New Age and Jehovah's Witness beliefs.

Upcoming events include a "Reaching the Cults" Workshop on Occult and Mormonism on October 26, at 6:30. Two churches would like for me to conduct workshops on Jehovah's Witness, and 1 church is interested in a New Age workshop.

Please pray as this new program grows and matures.

In an exhausting year for staff and a myriad of volunteers, BCH successfully concluded its first statewide fund-raising campaign, received its first Thanksgiving Offering since 1979, dedicated expansion of Cameron Boys Camp, broke ground for the new Fleshman-Pratt Education Center in Thomasville, inaugurated an innovative Bible study program at Mills Home, installed two new pastors at campus churches and solidified programs that have placed it among child care leaders for decades.

These efforts enabled BCH to serve more than 1,600 children and families at 13 facilities statewide, including Chris, named All-Conference nose guard for 2A state champion Thomasville Bulldogs; Sandi, who has enrolled at Gardner-Webb College; Deborah, named outstanding Freshman at Thomasville High after enduring a court battle that sent her father to prison for abuse; Jennifer, who married on the Broyhill campus where she'd lived for seven years; Kathy, who will continue to live at Broyhill while she attends college; and a host of others who are making life-changing commitments because they've received a second chance at Baptist Children's Homes.

In April, BCH successfully concluded its "Give a child a chance!" financial campaign by gaining three-year commitments for \$11.2 million, topping the \$7.5 million goal, and the challenge goal of \$11 million. Significant priorities accomplished in the campaign are: expansion and relocation of Cameron Boys Camp to a more secluded site on its 903-acres of wilderness; ground-breaking for the Fleshman-Pratt Education Center, a model day care facility for infants, toddlers and two-year-olds; a unique Staff Training Institute for child care workers and social workers; and more than \$2.7 million committed for permanent endowment.

And, the first Thanksgiving Offering for BCH since 1979 raised \$510,000, a sum more than \$100,000 greater than that realized through the combined offering with Baptist Hospital and Baptist Retirement Homes. BCH sent \$1,000 from the Thanksgiving Offering to the Baptist Children's Homes of Sao Paulo, Brazil as fulfillment of a promise to donate 10 percent of everything received over the goal to our partners in the south.

In addition, BCH maintained the partnership with our Brazilian counterparts by sending three training teams to Brazil, and hosting a group of Brazilian pastors in Thomasville.

Most BCH residents come from dysfunctional families where a single parent, most often a mother, is unable to care for her children. Her frustration with life, often due to alcohol or drug abuse, or having been abused herself, leads to limitless freedom for the children, which leads to troubling behavior. Physical abuse, divorce, alcohol, drugs and truancy mark their young lives. Behavioral problems make it impossible for the child to continue to live at home.

Baptist Children's Homes provides a safe environment where children learn to name their problems and set goals to overcome them, which leads to behavior change and often. At the same time, willing family members also are addressing their problems with the help of BCH social workers. In many cases, children and families are restored.

BCH enjoyed a year of tremendous successes, in human terms and in institutional terms, which will allow it to continue to affect change in lives. Success in the "Give a child a chance!" Campaign will help provide a margin of excellence in the future when the pledges are paid. Already, the enthusiasm engendered by the effort have lifted the spirits of staff across the state.

Still, the Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from Cooperative Program receipts each year. This is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program dollars to Baptist Children's Homes would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

An increasingly important aspect of our support comes from estate gifts and bequests. More and more people who want their resources to provide new life for children include BCH in their wills.

When Sandi, and Kathy, and Chris, and Barbara come to us, full of potential and hope, we want to be able to continue to tell them North Carolina Baptists care enough to give them a chance!

Your Baptist Colleges and Universities are concerned about college expenses families must pay. Administrators and trustees must also be concerned about operating costs on each campus. The figures above give the latest data for Cooperative Program support and financial aid to students in N.C. Baptist Colleges.

The Institutions Relationship Study Committee, appointed in 1991, will report to the Baptist State Convention in November, 1992. Baptist colleges are a significant part of that study. The Council on Christian Higher Education requests the prayerful support of N.C. Baptists for the Committee, and for the colleges.

Baptist Hospital utilized the skills and training of more than 5,700 employees to provide outstanding health care in settings as varied as the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Trauma Center, and the J. Paul Sticht Center on aging and Rehabilitation. Last year, the Joint Committee on the Accreditation of Health Care Organizations said that Baptist Hospital ranks in the top 10 percent of all hospitals in the nation.

During the past year, the hospital admitted 24,000 patients. It performed 16,662 surgical procedures, including 1,020 open heart operations, 29 kidney transplants and 80 bone marrow transplants. The AirCare helicopter flew 742 missions.

Total revenue of the hospital during the year was \$407,280,000. Cooperative Program gifts from the churches were \$656,180, which was applied to the budget of the Department of Pastoral Care. The Mother's Day Offering and other special gifts from the churches totaled \$424,406 and was used for benevolent care for patients who had no other means of paying their hospital bills.

The Pastoral Care Department, which is funded in part through the Cooperative Program, provided clinical pastoral education to 55,000 students during the past year. The Pastoral Care staff provided more than 53,000 specific ministries to hospital patients, family members, and staff. And, the counseling division provided over 24,000 counseling sessions. The professional staff of the Pastoral Care Department continues to respond to requests for help from churches in conflict, from pastors and their families across the state.


The various services of the hospital are readily accessible to all North Carolina Baptists and others. A telephone call to the Health-On-Call Office (919-716-2255) can secure and outpatient appointment with any one of the various specialists on the staff or can begin the process of gaining admission to the hospital if that need is indicated.

Charges for the hospital services compare very favorably with those in other hospitals of the state. Reports from the North Carolina Medical Database Commission indicate that Baptist Hospital's charges are lower than the average in other hospitals which provide similar services and are considerably lower than in the other teaching hospitals. Our hospital did not have an increase in its rates for the current fiscal year of July 1, 1992 - June 30, 1993.

The hospital's physical plant continues to expand. A new 840-space parking deck was opened in January. A new Emergency Department/Dietary building which will also make possible more private patient rooms is under construction now. Construction will begin soon on the 170-bed skilled and intermediate care nursing facility and on the J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation. This expansion will make it possible not only to serve more people, but to serve them better.

The staff and the patients of Baptist Hospital are grateful to North Carolina Baptists for the heritage they have given the institution and for the moral and financial support they continue to give to its ministry.

## 1992: MAKING LIFE FOR OLDER ADULTS THE BEST OF TIMES

One of the greatest needs facing North Carolina Baptists as they move into 1993 is the ability to provide affordable quality long-term care services to the "Aged Saints" of our Convention.

The fastest growing segment of North Carolina Baptist life are those individuals in the age category of 85 and older. That age group is growing at five times the rate of any other population segment in Baptist life. The 85 and older age group is also that age group most likely to need the services provided by a long-term care institution like Baptist Retirement Homes. Unfortunately in 1992 in our State, there were not enough nursing care beds to meet the needs of the growing number of Older Adults who were functionally impaired and needed the services of a long-term care provider. Complicating the shortage problem was the fact that the cost of those beds was high (more than the average North Carolina Baptist Older Adult could pay). And to make matters even worse, in spite of the high cost of those beds, often the quality of care provided through those beds was fair at best. In other words, the greatest problem facing North Carolina Baptist Older Adults in 1992 was the fact that there were simply not enough affordable quality nursing care beds available for use by people like you and me and our Older Adult family members.

Having become aware some years ago of the above mentioned problem, Baptist Retirement Homes (for the last five year period) has been working to develop a system of affordable

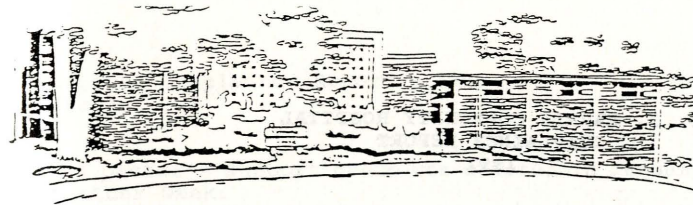
quality nursing care beds throughout the State for use by North Carolina Baptist Older Adults. New nursing care beds became available in the Piedmont area of our State in 1989 (through the opening of the Brookridge Retirement Community). In 1992, affordable quality nursing care will become available to Western North Carolina Baptist Older Adults through the new Rickman Nursing Care Center being built on Richmond Hill in Northwest Asheville. It is our institution's hope that by 1994 affordable quality nursing care will also be available to Eastern North Carolina Baptist Older Adults as well. Your support has made the above possible.

In 1992, North Carolina Baptists through their gifts to the Cooperative Program and North Carolina Offering for Older Adults made it possible for Baptist Retirement Homes to provide financial assistance to more than 60% of all the Older Adults living in its health care related facilities. In addition, Western North Carolina Baptists contributed more than \$2.5 million toward the construction of the new Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville . . . a new facility that will enable Baptist Retirement Homes to make life for many Western North Carolina Baptists truly . . . the Best of Times.

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for your support. Please continue to pray for our ministry and its ability to meet the ever growing needs of the Older Adults of our Convention.

Problems, sickness, disease, aging are spiritual matters that must be addressed by a spiritual approach. It is a joy to bring spiritual hope, encouragement, faith and love to people who hurt.

Patients are traveling further to receive treatment at C. J. Harris. Over half of our patients come from outside Jackson County. This means that pastors are not able to visit as frequently, and in some cases, the pastor cannot visit at all. But because of your loyalty, prayers, and financial support, people find hope and the grace of the Lord through the Chaplaincy Ministry. I thank God for your vision and concrete expression of love as you give to support the Lord's mission through the Chaplaincy program.

**October 25, 1992, is our annual HOSPITAL CHAPLAINCY SUNDAY.** Please pray, promote and provide time to receive an offering during your church service on that day.

**Friends of the Chaplaincy** is a group of lay people with a representative from each church who help promote the work. They have brochures and offering envelopes for your church, or you may call the hospital for further information at 586-7145.

Chaplain Webb expresses appreciation to everyone who helps with the Sunday afternoon worship services at Mountain Trace. It may seem like a small thing to the people from the churches, but it is a major event in the life of the residents. Also, communion is offered to the residents once each quarter. They appreciate being included in this symbolic presence of the Lord's blood and body.

Let me site a calendar of happenings:

- 1) The Joint Commission on Accreditation of Pastoral Services met with us last October. We received a glowing report with a few deficiencies. We were the first hospital in North Carolina to apply for accreditation. We expect to complete requirements next year.
- 2) Chaplain Hinson is taking further training in Clinical Pastoral Education at the Patrick B. Harris Psychiatric Hospital in Anderson, SC. He attends classes every Monday (September - May).
- 3) A workshop on HELPING PEOPLE FACE CANCER for pastors and spouses was conducted in April by the Chaplaincy Ministry.

4) A pastor's support group was started in January. It meets every other week.

5) Chaplain Hinson spoke in twelve different churches in the area.

He also spoke at the World Mission Conference in Rainsville, Alabama.

He conducted a Humor Conference at St. Joseph's Hospital in Asheville, in Sylva for nursing home workers in Western North Carolina, and at the Elderhostel at Montreat-Anderson College.

## AGENCY REPORTS

### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

In 1991 the American Bible Society celebrated 175 years of outreach to people around the world, sharing the Word of God in the languages and formats they could most easily understand. And this anniversary year also turned out to be one of momentous opportunity, challenge and achievement. The war in the Persian Gulf at the beginning of the year offered an unprecedented opportunity to reach men and women in the Armed Forces while they were serving the cause of peace in the Middle East. More than 300,000 Bibles with special camouflage covers and over 100,000 New Testaments were shared with those involved in Desert Storm.

The American Bible Society throughout 1991 was the largest non-profit publisher of Scriptures in the United States and pressed forward in its efforts to make God's Word easily available to everyone in the country. The ABS continued with its outreach to individuals, churches, correctional institutions, schools, hospitals and nursing homes, community organizations and other Christian ministry agencies. In addition, special Portion and Selection formats were created for those with special needs, such as troubled youth, alcoholics and drug abusers, the homeless and those suffering from Aids, etc. The ABS also continued to increase its channels of distribution in 1991 in order to reach people in every area of life. Direct marketing campaigns, radio and television announcements, media tours by its new president, and a corps of volunteers numbering over 7,000 all contributed toward promoting the work and mission of the American Bible Society and increasing the influence of the Scriptures in all segments of American society.

The year 1991 constituted an important year for Archives & Library Services. Several major long-term projects were completed, special demands placed upon the department owing to the 175th anniversary celebration were attended to, and new initiatives were instituted which will significantly improve services to all ABS departments. While not neglecting outside scholars and visitors who use the collections, the staff spent considerable time and effort this year in attempting to better define and fulfill its role within the Society.

Complete books of the Bible have been published by various agencies and copies received and registered by the United Bible Societies in 1,978 different languages and dialects. Of these, thirty-two were first recorded during 1991. Complete Bibles are now reported for the first time in four additional languages and the New Testament in thirty-six, including six which are the first recorded Scripture publications. In thirty-six languages which do not yet have either an Old or New Testament and fifteen which have the New Testament but not the Old, additional portions were registered during 1991. In forty-five other languages in which translations and publication had previously taken place, new or revised versions of Portions, Testaments, or Bibles have now appeared.

People in more than 200 countries and territories throughout the world received a total of 640,755,135 Bibles, New Testaments, Portions and Selections of Scriptures in 1991 in hundreds of languages and dialects from member Societies and National Offices of the United Bible Societies.

*The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, is committed under the guidance of the Holy Spirit in serving North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian estate stewardship principals as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis.*

*Assets are managed under the direction of the Foundation Board of Directors with interest income being paid either in perpetuity to Baptist causes named by the donor or to the donor (or heirs) for their lifetime (or specific period of time) before the income is then paid in perpetuity to the named Baptist causes.*

*Earned income distributed and paid to Baptist churches, institutions & mission causes during fiscal year 1991:* \$ 1,100,606

*Earned income distributed and paid to individuals (with Baptist causes named as future beneficiaries) during the fiscal year 1991:* \$ 1,062,643

*Total market value of Foundation assets, December 31, 1991:* \$36,283,384

*During 1991, the Board of Directors, with the assistance of a nationally recognized investment consulting firm, adopted a detailed Investment Policy to govern the types of investments that its fiscal agents may make in keeping with the Christian commitment of the Foundation, as well as attempt to insure that the future spending value of the invested trust fund dollar will keep up with inflation. A study revealed that during the past five years the fiscal agents managing the Foundation assets ranked near the top nationally with other investment managers who operate under investment guidelines similar to the ones provided by the Foundation Board.*

*The Foundation staff and operations are housed in a building adjacent to the Baptist State Convention Building in Cary. Individuals and church groups are invited to call and arrange a visit of their Trust Agency's office building.*

*The significance of the Foundation services was illustrated in a recent experience that staff members had while eating in a fast food restaurant in Durham. In taking a seat adjacent to a table occupied by a young black police officer, we observed the enthusiasm of a white lad of about 4 years of age as he stood talking to the officer. As the mother and a younger child, coming from another area of the restaurant, called for the lad to join them, he walked away from the table 6 to 8 feet, turned around and said to the officer, who was now standing and preparing to leave, "Can I give you a hug?" After an affirmative answer from the officer, the child walked over to the officer, reached around his legs and gave him a hug. The officer confirmed to us that he wished the world was filled with people like this child. The example corresponds to what so many already have done through the Foundation. As they approach the time of leaving this earthly life, they look back affectionately on what the Lord has done for them during their life and decide that they want to leave an expression of their love through an enduring and lasting gift (a "hug", if you please) that will serve the Lord until His return.*

For the 10th consecutive year, the gambling industry has not been able to secure passage of any gambling legislation such as a lottery or pari-mutuel betting (horse and dog racing).

The industry made its biggest push ever during the 1991-1992 legislative session. They secured 14 of the most effective and best known lobbyists that money can buy to push for their cause, but to no avail. When the legislature adjourned on July 24th, the gambling industry threw in the towel realizing that they did not have the votes in the N.C. House to pass their state-sponsored gambling bill, the lottery.

What made the difference? People like you did. You secured the commitments from your legislators that the role of government is not to exploit their weakest citizens, but to appeal to their strengths. Gambling violates that age-old principle.

There is one thing for sure. The pro-gambling forces will be back. However, the issue will be decided on November 3rd at the General Election. If you elect legislators who are opposed to state-sponsored gambling, it will not make any difference how many lobbyists the gambling industry employs. The decision is in your hands. How do the candidates from your area stand on this issue?

There are other very important moral issues that you need to discuss with your legislative candidates. Some of them are:

1. SEX EDUCATION...Are our young people being deceived into believing that "safe sex" outside of marriage is possible and okay? The current rise in venereal diseases and teenage pregnancies, and the related emotional problems tells us we must focus attention on this issue.
2. Abortion...The Supreme Court ruling regarding the abortion law of the state of Pennsylvania opens the door for further restrictions and conditions under which abortions can be performed--leaving this up to the states. This year we have worked on trying to get legislation passed requiring parental consent for abortion on minors, and reducing abortion funding. Both of these measures passed in the House but died in the Senate.
3. Alcohol/Drug Issues...It is so important that we continue to address problems related to alcohol use and abuse. Reducing the blood alcohol standard for DWI from .10 to

.08 was one of our targets this year, but it also failed to pass in the Senate after passing in the House.

We cannot overemphasize the importance of getting to know who your candidates are and how they stand on these key issues. Plato put it so well: "The price that good people pay for not being involved in politics is to be governed by people worse than themselves."

Thank you for standing with us in the cause of applied Christianity.

## FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

As another year passes by, we are able to see the outstanding work that the Foreign Mission Board and our missionaries have done.

The outreach done by the 3,900 missionaries during 1991 contributed to the 233,334 baptisms on land overseas. The finances during this year continued to grow, contributions came in through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering. Through both programs the Southern Baptist gave \$148,74 million in funds.

One of the strongest worked areas overseas was in Ethiopia, since the collapse of the communist government in May '91, Christians have enjoyed the freedom that once was unimaginable.

Also during 1991, the Foreign Mission Board established the Green Task Force (an extraordinary emphasis to reach people in an area of tremendous change). This group began to focus on new opportunities in the former Soviet Union. The task force stressed that the success of this plan depends on the prayers from all people. Let us also remember the Bold Mission Thrust which is still very active in ministering the gospel to every person in the world by the year 2000.

## HOME MISSIONS REPORT

The Home Mission Board gave an encouraging report to the Annual meeting of The Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Indianapolis, Indiana, June 9 - 11, 1992.

Baptisms Up - 1991 baptisms were 390,800 up 1.5% over 1990. 15,000 Campaign Started - The number of new Churches needed by 2,000 A.D. to meet Bold Mission Thrust goals.

Record Number of Missionaries - Missionary personnel figures reached and all time height of 4,922, on target for a goal of 5,000 by 2,000 A.D.

Purchase of Property - The Board of Directors approved the purchase of 34 acres of land in Alpharetta, Ga., 22 miles north of Atlanta at a cost of 1.3 million raised from the sale of present property and hopes to move into a new building there debt free by 1995.

Annie Armstrong Offering - This years offering was \$35,522,891.96 all of which goes to evangelism, Church starts, Church growth and Ministry work.

Churches were challenged to increase promotion of The Annie Armstrong Offering with President, Morris Chapman, already leading First Baptist, Wichita Falls, Texas, to give double their present offering.

# FINANCIAL REPORTS

## STEWARDSHIP REPORT

II Corinthians 9:7 says, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Every stewardship message and report begins with God being the owner and giver of all we have. We are the managers or stewards. Two things are important: (1) our motives and (2) our record. No one can read motives nor should they assign motives. That is God's business. Only He can really see what is in our hearts and minds.

What about the record? Each of our churches are on record with respect to associational financial support. The following is our Associational record of General Fund giving comparing August 1988-1992.

Fourteen (14) churches increased their giving from 1991 to 1992. Ten (10) churches decreased their giving from 1991 to 1992. Twenty-four (24) were unchanged in their giving patterns to the Association. Of this number eleven to twelve churches historically do not contribute to the General Fund of the Association.

Over \$11,000 was received for the Hurricane Andrew relief fund and almost \$15,000 was contributed to Brazil Mission project. Some churches contributed to these specially designated offerings that were not included in the above tables.

At 91.67% of the budget year we are behind of the amount required to meet the budget for the year. We expect to be about 4.5% short of our budget when the year ends. When we consider the \$26,000 dollars received for the Brazil Project and the Hurricane Andrew relief, we have great reason to celebrate the generosity of our people and our churches. We are grateful for the generosity of the churches in making this possible. Also we have been careful not to spend more than we have received.

I am particularly grateful to Jesse Flake for the outstanding job he does as our Associational Treasurer.

At the writing of this report, churches have one month left to make their contribution to Associational work. Every church is challenged to intentionally develop their stewardship responsibility in mission giving and to include the Association in its missions gifts.

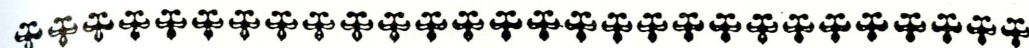

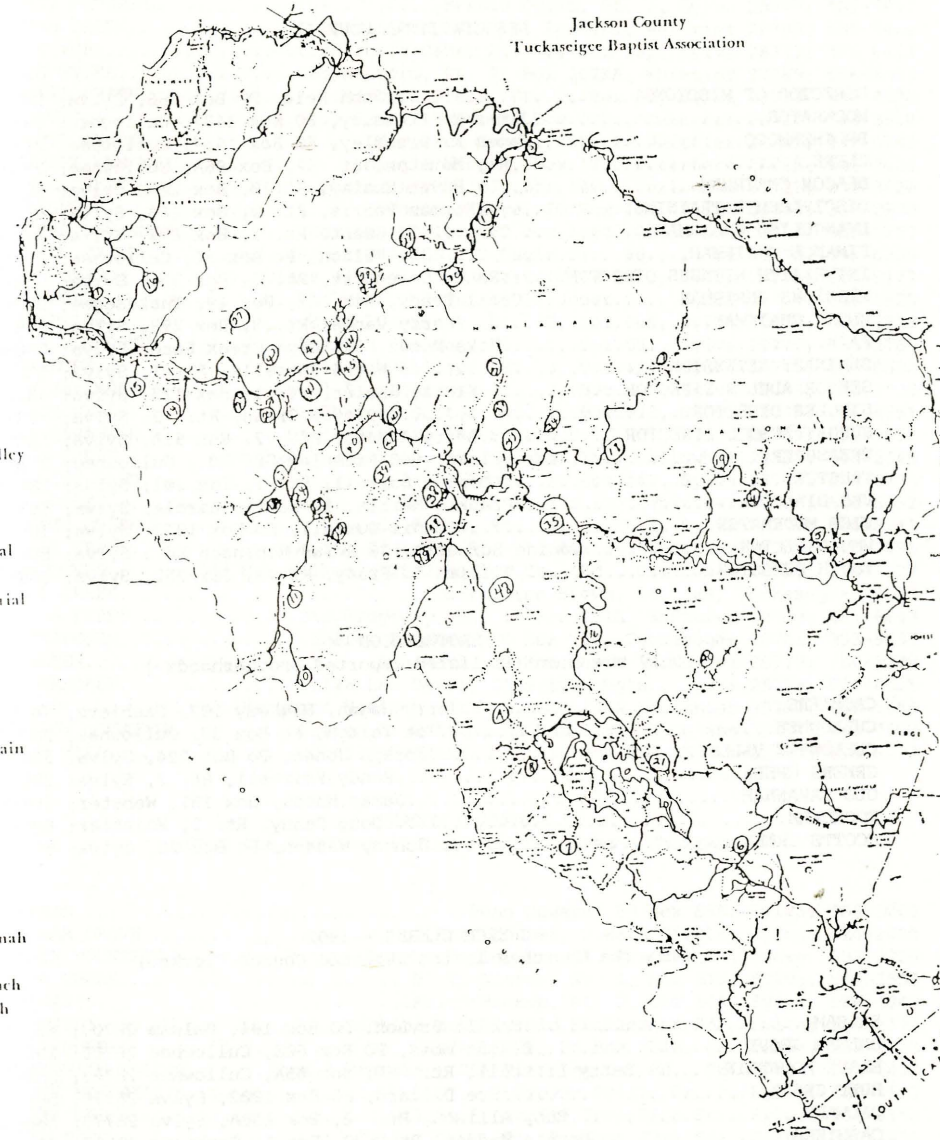

## CONSTITUTION

With changes through 1992

### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II-OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

### ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

### ARTICLE IV-MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the Association for

one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

### ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

### ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General Officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5)

Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

SECTION 3. The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within ten days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The called shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

#### ARTICLE VII-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make

a complete report at the Annual Meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding Officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational committees, officers and Churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the Association as set forth in Article II.

The Director shall serve as ex-officio member of all committees of the Association. The Director shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association, and are not personally bound by signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

#### ARTICLE VIII-RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

#### ARTICLE IX-QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member Churches.

#### ARTICLE X-THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each Church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the

Executive Committee, from representing the Church or Churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the Churches.

SECTION 3. All Vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

#### ARTICLE XI-ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at Annual Session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of Churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the Association. It shall counsel with Churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following Annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the Annual Associational Meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the Annual Meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last Annual Meeting and shall lead a Memorial Service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the Finances and Financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the

direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the Church from which the member is seeking Ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the Church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of Ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each Church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight(8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees; and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, and Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational Offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

#### SECTION 15. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

a. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.

b. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the association.

c. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the association's staff personnel.

d. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.

e. Develop policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other associational staff.

f. When a staff vacancy occurs, they shall serve as the search committee.

The Director of Missions shall be called by a special called meeting of the Tuckasee Baptist Association provided the Association is not scheduled to meet within 30 days. In that event the Association shall consider the calling of a Director of Missions at its regularly scheduled Associational Meeting.

g. The initial committee shall be recommended at the January 4, 1993 Executive Committee meeting and present items b through e by the April 1993 Executive Committee and no later than the July 1993 Executive Committee meeting.

#### ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Director, Woman's Missionary Union, The Brotherhood Director, the Chairman of Deacons, the Missions Development Director, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

#### ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

#### ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as WMU, Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and SBC agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) VBS planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10)

Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc; (16) Church-community surveys, etc; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work. In the associational office: a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work. b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc. c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

#### SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include
  - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
  - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and SBC agencies.
  - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
  - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
  - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas December 25 and 26.
4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

#### ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
