The Clerk of the Southern Baptist Convention re-

quests the Clerks of the Associations to arrange ministers names alphabetically and give post office. Not only does the S. B. C. desire Minutes of our Association, but many other Conventions and Societies of Baptists in the United States, for statistical information. To give the required information, I request the churches in the future to use printed blanks for their Association letters. In filling, their attention will, at the proper places, be called to all needed information. A great many things are omitted in the written letters, and the Clerks have no way, very often, of supplying the lack—as in case of South Fork Church. The letter reports one ordained minister, but omits his name. We are stronger numerically and financially than our statistics show. While I trust we would prefer meekness to vanity, yet it is due the denomination that it be presented in its true colors. In regard to numbers, I would say that most of the churches, if not all, do not report in their Association letters those lettered from their churches, which I think should be done as long as they hold such letters, for they are certainly under the discipline of that church till joined to another. Then it becomes the duty of the latter church to notify the former of the act. In the last year's Minutes we see Dismissed by letter 125; received by letter 68—a discrepancy of 57 holding their letters and not reported. Likewise our financial table does not report perhaps more than one-half the means contributed to the cause. But I would apologize for these suggestions, fearing there may be objections.

HE THREE FORKS ASSOCIATION OF BAPtist convened in its forty-seventh anniversary in Beaverdam Church house, Watauga county, N. C., September 13, 1887.

The annual sermon was delivered by Elder J. M.

Harmon, from 2nd Cor. 10 chapter 4 verse.

After an intermission of half an hour, the Messengers were called to order by Elder A. C. Farthing, Moderator of last year.

Prayer was offered by Elder E. F. Jones. Appointed I. W. Thomas and W. W. Presnell to read the letters from the churches, and enroll the names of messengers. (See statistical table.)

Officers were chosen for the ensuing year by ballot, viz: Elder A. C. Farthing, Moderator; J. J. T. Reese, Clerk; S. M. Callis and D. W. Thomason, acting as tellers.

On motion invited correspondents and visiting ministers to seats, whereupon Elder S. M. Callis and John A. Miller from the Mitchell County Association, accepted.

Adjourned to meet at 9 o'clock to-morrow morning, and spend half an hour in devotional exercises, to be conducted by I. W. Thomas.

The Committee on Arrangements to which the papers of newly constituted Churches were referred having reported favorably, on motion, received Cool Spring and Elk Valley churches into this Association, and invited Messengers to seats in the body.

On motion, this Association unanimously withdrew fellowship from Mt. Zion Church No. 2, because it declared non-fellowship with us by going off to the Anti-missionaries.

Invited Rev. E. D. Wells from the Eastern Association to a seat.

The propriety of the Association attaching itself to the State Constitution referred to the churches last year, was now considered. A motion to attach this Association with same, prevailed.

Adjourned till I o'clock for refreshments and to hear the sermon at the stand.

EVENING SESSION.

Met at the hour of adjournment. Adopted the following report on

EDUCATION:

We your committee would say that all people should feel an interest on the subject of education, which in this age of progress and enlightenment is indispensable to the highest measure of success in any laudable pursuit or occupation of life. Education in the true acceptation of the term means the development of the intellectual powers, and this object can be best subserved by patronizing schools of high grade. We would especially advise our Baptist brethren to give their children the best mental training possible, that they may be qualified for positions of usefulness and honor. We would also urge upon our young ministers the importance of securing an education that they may be prepared to advocate. maintain and defend our distinctive doctrines against a gainsaying world, and make themselves "workmen that need not be ashamed, rightly divining the word of truth."

We regret that our people do not take an interest as they should in our denominational papers. The Biblical Recorder has been recommended year after year in the meetings of our Association; and also the Western N. C. Baptist, has been recommended in high terms to our people, and yet there is not more than one copy of these papers taken and read where there should be twenty. We recommend that the Pastors of the churches take this matter in hand at once and place a copy of the Recorder or W. N. C. Baptist in every family in our Association. This is necessary to the success of our Mission,

Sunday-school and Educational work. We cordially recommend to our Sunday-schools of this Association, the literature published by the American Baptist Publication Society; believing that the so-called union helps used by some schools as a neutralizing influence to induce those of different persuasions to attend, is doing more harm than good.

The helps furnished by Kind Words Publication, Atlanta, Georgia, under the direction of the Southern Baptist Convention, are sound in doctrine and well worthy our patronage.

visit the sick and comfort the dying. In fact we do not think a pastor can fully discharge his duty to the church without visiting every family in his church at least once in every year. We believe it to be his duty to preach occasional sermons on the distinctive principles which separate us from other denominations; say once a year. To do all this he should give himself entirely to the work.

The church should esteem its pastor very highly for his work's sake. All the members of the church should contribute liberally of their means, for their pastor's support. They should always be ready to join him in every good word or work for the advancement of Christ's cause. And they should be very careful of his reputation and be always ready to defend his character against any and all reproaches that might injure the cause of Christ.

We are glad to note the increasing success of the Home and State Mission work.

The Baptist State Convention was organized in 1830; since then the work has been wonderfully blessed. From a small beginning it has grown and extended until now, with a few exceptions, the Missionary Baptist preach the Gospel in every settlement in the State. But the work is not finished, and we should do our duty in this part of our Lord's vineyard with more energy and zeal than we have ever done.

The Home Mission Board has been at work something more than forty years, and has accomplished much good.

We feel that the work is an important one, and that we should freely encourage and push it with all possible speed, inasmuch as the territory embraces some of the largest cities that are almost in heathen darkness.

We are glad to report that the blessings of Almighty

God are unmistakably resting upon the Foreign Mission work, and that the good work is prospering in all the fields of labor in foreign lands beyond our most hopeful expectations. North Carolina has five Missionaries, with their wives in foreign lands: Brethren Yates, Bryen and Herring, with their wives in China, and Brethren Baldwin and Powell, with their wives in Algiers, Northern Africa. We would tenderly and lovingly urge every church, and every brother and sister in the Three Forks Association, to contribute liberally to the support of our Missionaries in foreign fields.

We do not claim that money ever has, or ever will convert a soul. We ask for money that the Missionaries may be clothed and fed while they preach Jesus and him crucified to the heathen.

The heathen must be converted just as we have been, by the agency of the Holy Spirit and the word of God. Paul says, Romans x. 13-15, "For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord, shall be saved. How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed; and how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they hear without a preacher, and how shall they preach except they be sent?" Again says the same apostle, I. Cor. ix. 14, "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel, shall live of the gospel." Missions are either right or wrong. If wrong we sin by engaging in the work; if right we sin by not engaging in the work.

Jesus was a Missionary sent from Heaven to this sincursed earth and went about doing good, and received precious and costly gifts from the wise men who came to worship him in the manger, and Paul says, Romans viii. 9, "If any man have not the spirit of Christ, he is none of his."

The last words that fell from the lips of our glorified and ascending Saviour, were: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel unto every creature." If we cannot go ourselves, have we not grace and religion enough, and do not our poor hearts burn for the salvation of the souls of all men enough to prompt us to help with the means God has given us those whom God has called to go?

How can we think of meeting in the great Judgment

Day the heathen whom we have refused the bread of life? Let us beware of covetousness, for says the apostle Paul, in Col. iii. 5, "That covetousness is idolatry." Paul says, "The Lord loveth a cheerful giver," and "The liberal soul shall be made fat." Jesus said in Luke vi. 38, "Give, and it shall be given unto you." Paul says, "Remember the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, how he said 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.' "

Hodges, about the year 1851, at the request of the church, where he remained a member until the constitution of Bethel church, when he was constituted into this church where his membership remained until Jesus said come up to the Church Triumphant.

He preached the Gospel of Jesus for thirty-seven years. His labors were abundantly blessed of God in the salvation of many souls, and the upbuilding of many churches. As a pastor he was faithful; always at his post of duty. He was Moderator of this Association twenty-one years, but he is gone from us now, to the far off home of the soul, to welcome his friends into glory as they come, one by one. Still he liveth it the hearts of his brethren. May we also live as to meet him again in that great Association above.
