PROCEEDINGS.

GAP CREEK CHURCH, August 28, 1894.

The Three Forks Baptist Association met in its Fifty-fourth Session this day with Gap Creek Church at 11 o'clock A. M.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. C. Durham. Text, Romans viii: 18. After the sermon, adjourned till 1:15 P. M.

Reassembled at the time appointed and sang,

"Jesus lover of my soul,
Let me to thy bosom fly."

The Moderator being absent, the Association was called to order by the Clerk, with Elder David Green leading in prayer.

The letters from the different Churches were called for and received. J. J. T. Reese and L. C. Wilson were appointed Reading Clerks, by whom the letters were read.

The terms of the officers having expired, the Association proceeded to ballot for Moderator and Clerk, with C. Durham and J. C. Caddell acting as Tellers.

The ballot resulted in the election of Hon. J. F. Spainhour Moderator, and Jacob Younce Clerk.

The Association was then declared ready for further business.

A motion prevailed to invite newly constituted Churches, under which the petitions of Pleasant Valley, N. C., and Pleasant Valley, Tenn., were read, the former Church received into the Association, and the latter referred to the Committee of Arrangements, and the delegates from them seated.

SECOND DAY.—MORNING SESSION.

The Association reassembled at 9 A. M. Religious exercises was led by C. Durham. Called to order by the Moderator. Read and corrected minutes of yesterday.

Called on Committee of Arrangements to report. Report read and made favorable for the new Church (Pleasant Valley, Tenn.) On motion, the report received, and the committee discharged.

Called the roll and the absentees marked.

On motion, adopted the following

REPORT ON PASTORAL SUPPORT.

Your committee submit the following report, viz.: We learn through the reports made to the Association that our pastors are poorly supported. We, therefore, urge our Churches to a better support, feeling that while it is their duty to contribute of their means to other objects, their obligations to their pastors should first be met.

Called for report on Education. Report read and very ably discussed by C. Durham and others.

The following is the

REPORT ON GENERAL EDUCATION.

WHEREAS, The amount of money devoted to the public free schools gives a session of only about three months in each school district, and pays the teacher a monthly salary of only about twenty-two dollars; and

WHEREAS, The taxes of the people drawn from the State Treasury in 1893 and 1894 amounted to \$148,000 devoted to higher education; therefore,

Resolved 1. That the Legislature soon to be elected by the people ought to provide for a session of four months in each school district in each county of the State.

Resolved 2. That the taxes of the people ought NOT to be appropriated by the Legislature to higher education.

Resolved 3. That, in our opinion, the appropriation of the taxes of the people to higher education hinders rather than helps the educational interests of North Carolina.

We, your Committee on Education, beg to make the following report:

Wake Forest College.—This institution represents what Baptists of North Carolina have done for higher education, and we would urge upon our people of the Three Forks Association a more active interest in the

work of the college, and a more devoted loyalty to the principles of Baptist faith upon which the college is founded. There were one hundred and ninety-seven students present during the past session. Of these some forty were ministers of the Gospel, thirty-five of whom were supported by the Board of Ministerial Education. Some twenty-nine young men were graduated in June.

We would further urge that more hearty support be given to our academies. These academies should, as far as possible be under the direct control of the Associations, and should prepare young men for Wake Forest College especially.

Female Education.—We commend most heartily to our people the Baptist Female University, now founding in Raleigh, N. C. This institution will be to our young women what Wake Forest College has been to our young men.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

At no time in our history as a denomination has the necessity for our people to be informed on all departments of our work been as great as at present. And saying that much of this needed information must come through the religious press, we recommend that our people take and read as much literature as possible. We especially urge that all of our people who can do so take the *Biblical Recorder*, the organ of the Baptist State Convention, and which for the last sixty years has been the exponent of Baptist principles and Baptist progress in North Carolina. We also recommend the *North Carolina Baptist, Charity and Children*, the *Home Field*, the *Foreign Mission Journal*, the *Watchman*, published by R. L. Patton; Literature published by the Southern Baptist at Nashville, Tenn., as worthy the patronage of our people.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

greatly decreased in number, yet we are not by any means rid of the evil. We believe that a total abstinence from the use of intoxicating drinks is the only safe attitude towards intemperance. We would, therefore, ask that each member of this Association feel an individual responsibility in the suppression of this evil—by our own example as well as precept, also by seeing that the laws are enforced against this traffic. We would further invoke the enactment of just and sufficient laws to aid in the entire abolition of the liquor traffic from our beloved land.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

State Missions has been defined by the Convention to include all practical efforts to give the Gospel to the destitute places in the State. Our fathers wisely determined to give the Gospel to all our people. We are now building on this foundation. This year there are eighty-seven missionaries under appointment of the Board preaching at more than three hundred destitute places. Among these are some of the most successful and consecrated preachers in the State. They have been greatly prospered by the Lord in this work this year. If the Board had the means and could send the men six hundred destitute places could be given the Gospel next year. This is foundation work. It aids all other departments. From it comes largely our pastors and our missionaries. We recommend that all of our Churches undertake to do more for State Missions than ever before in their history. Our Lord's command to give the Gospel to every creature should certainly stimulate and guide us in giving the Gospel to the people of our State.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located in Atlanta, Ga., is doing a large and successful work in many special departments.

1. The work among the Indians. There are now about one hundred Indian Baptist preachers, fourteen Associations and about 15,000 members.

2. Foreign population. In many of the States the foreign population is large, and the work is important and successful.

3. Negroes. The work among the Negroes is being successfully done in the States further south.

4. The native white people in Texas and the States west should have the Gospel as rapidly as the country is filled up by them.

5. In Cuba the work has been greatly prospered. There are now more than 2,000 Baptist believers on the island of Cuba, and the prospects were never more hopeful. What the State Mission work is to North Carolina, the Home Mission work is to all the destitute sections of the South.

Resolved, That each pastor and Church in this Association be urged to inform themselves about the history and the needs of this work, and to take at least one collection during this year for it.

6. The Board publishes the *Home Field*, a monthly mission journal, for twenty-five cents per year. We urge our people to take this paper.

THIRD DAY.—MORNING SESSION.

The Association assembled at 9 A. M. L. C. Wilson read the Forty-sixth Psalm, then led the religious exercises. Then called to order by the Moderator. Read and approved minutes of yesterday.

The following is the

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee, upon examination of the Church letters, find that of the thirty-one Churches embraced in the Three Forks Association twenty-two report working Sunday Schools, leaving eight having no schools. The number of officers and teachers in these schools is 152; number of scholars, 1,261, making a total of 1,413 officers, teachers and scholars reported from all the Churches enrolled in the Association. These scholars are taking 1,005 Quarterlies and papers per quarter, which cost the schools \$80.05. These figures, we are pleased to note, show an increase of over sixteen per cent. over same report for last year, which should greatly encourage our Sunday School workers. But the same statistics show also that the membership of the Churches are not taking the interest in Sunday Schools that should be taken, from the fact that the total enrollment of the schools is less than sixty per cent. of the total church membership of the Association. Hence we see plainly that our schools are not near what they might be made if we would all take an active part in building them up. So we appeal to our people to rouse ourselves and give more attention and energy to the Sunday School work than ever before. And urge every minister of the Gospel and lay member of this Association to use his influence to make the Sunday School what it should be, the Church at work, by regular attendance and participation in the work, and active efforts to bring every soul possible within its influence.

REPORT OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

That we as an Association believe in the Foreign Mission work. But the Scriptures teach that faith is dead being alone, or without works. "Shew me your faith without works, and I will shew you my faith by my works." To say that we believe in Foreign Missions, and then do nothing for the work, is to say one thing and do another. If we love Jesus or love His Word, He says, "Go preach the Gospel to every creature." This is His last command. Can any one who feels that Jesus has saved him do less than He commands. Pray over this. We have twelve in the foreign field who are not backed by any board, who having faith in God's promise and in the Churches have gone forth to do the work for the Churches. Let us pray for them, and support them while they are doing the Lord's work.

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one only true and living God—Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and that these three are one.
2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God and the only rule of faith and practice.
3. We believe in the doctrine of Election by Grace.
4. We believe in the doctrine of Original Sin, and in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature by his own free will and ability.
5. We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
6. We believe that sinners are called, converted, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Spirit, and all who are thus regenerated are born again by the Holy Spirit of God shall never fall finally away.
7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ, and that true believers are the subjects of these ordinances, and that no action is baptism but immersion.
8. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and a general judgment, and that the joys of the righteous and the torments of the wicked will both be eternal.

We believe that no minister has a right to administer these ordinances except such as are regularly called and come under the imposition of hands by the Presbytery.
