Constitution and By-Laws Randolph Baptist Association Revised: October, 1990

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this body shall be known as the Randolph Baptist Association. It may hereafter be referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 1. This Association is a self-determining Baptist body, created and sustained by the churches affiliated with her and responsible to them through their Messengers.

Section 2. The purpose of the Randolph Baptist Association is to enable member churches, individually and together, as they endeavor to enlarge, strengthen, and enrich the fellowship of God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to foster cooperation in the programs and ministries of this Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, thereby fulfilling the Commission of Jesus Christ as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches within the area of the Association. A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an Annual Report to the Association, elects Messengers to attend the

Associational Meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.

Section 2. The Association shall be sole judge of it's membership and may receive churches, according to the Constitution and By-laws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire.

Section 3. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association over a period of two years shall be contacted by the Credentials Committee of the Association to determine the intentions of the church regarding it's desire to remain in the Association. In the event the church does not respond to the efforts of the Credentials Committee, the church will be considered as having chosen to withdraw from the Association.

Section 4. Any church that has departed from Baptist faith and practices and has failed to abide by the provision of the Constitution and By-laws of the Association, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee. Such church upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee and a vote of the Association shall be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such actions have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the Meetings of the Association.

Section 5. Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make a written request to the Credentials Committee of the Association at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October), for examination and recommendation to the Association. A church (or mission) is first received into the watch care of the Association. Upon completion of one year in watch care relationship, a church may be received into full membership of the Association by a recommendation of the Credentials Committee. There must be a vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the Associational Meeting for petitioning church (or mission) to become a regularly affiliated member church of the Association.

Section 6. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in it's own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except in an advisory nature, and this by invitation only.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

Section 1. The Associational meetings shall be composed of Messengers elected by the affiliated churches according to the plan. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) Messengers, including the pastor, and one additional Messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above one hundred in its resident membership, but not to exceed ten (10) such Messengers. The Director of Missions and General Officers shall be Messengers in all Associational Meetings.

Section 2. The Associational Meetings will be held as follows:

- (1) The Fall Meeting shall meet on two days, the week following the third Sunday in October.
- (2) The Winter Meeting shall meet in January. All Mission Performance Directors shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the Messengers at this meeting. In order for the Messengers to have

adequate time to consider the nominees for Program Directors, the Nominating Committee will mail a copy to the Messengers two weeks before the January Meeting. They shall be Director-Elect until October 1 when their tenure of service begins.

(3) The Spring Meeting shall meet in April. All General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the Messengers at this April Meeting. This will give each person selected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. In order to give Messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, a copy will be mailed to them two weeks before the Spring Meeting.

(4) The Summer Meeting shall meet in late July or early August. The Associational Budget for the new year, beginning on October 1 and ending on September 30 of the following year, shall be presented by the Finance Committee for approval by the Messengers of the Association. In order to give the Messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee shall mail copies to the Messengers two weeks before this Summer Meeting.

Section 3. Other meetings of the Association shall be held when called by the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions. Before calling a special meeting, a notice of at least two weeks shall be given to the Messengers, with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. No other business can be considered. A quorum of fifty (50) Messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three (3) trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected in the Spring Meeting in April by the Messengers of the Association. The Nominating Committee will present nominees to the Messengers with the privilege of other nominees from the body. Prior approval and consent to serve shall have been received from a prospective nominee before placing his name in nomination before the body.

Section 3. The officers of this Association shall serve from October 1 through September 30 of the following year. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall serve no more than two years in succession.

Section 4. Duties of the Officers:

(1) The Moderator shall preside over all Meetings of the Association, and fulfill such duties as required upon the presiding officer of this Associational body.

(2) The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.

(3) The Clerk-Treasurer shall fulfill the following duties:

a. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of all the Associational Meetings. The Clerk shall distribute the Uniform Church Letter forms to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. The Clerk shall compile the reports and statistics of the

churches and issue a book of minutes as soon as is practical after the Fall Meeting.

- b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at each Quarterly Meeting, plus a year end report at the Fall Meeting.
- (4) The trustees shall have the authority to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of the elected trustees shall be authorized by the Association in it's meetings.
- (5) In the event the Office of the Moderator of the Association shall become vacant, the Vice-Moderator shall immediately become the Moderator for the unexpired term of office without any further action by the Association.
- (6) The vacancies occurring in the office of Vice-Moderator and other General Officers, except Moderator, will be nominated by the Nominating Committee at the next Association Meeting.

ARTICLE VI - MISSION PERFORMANCE ORGANIZATION

Section 1. The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches for the promotion and training of the various phases of their work.

Section 2. The Directors of these organizations shall be: Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Stewardship Director, Family Ministries Director, Christian Life Director, Pastoral Ministries Director and Seminary Extension Director.

Section 3. These Organizational Directors shall be elected at the Winter Meeting, (January), or no later than the Spring Meeting (April), for a term of three years. The Directors shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The Directors shall assume their duties on Oct.1, and serve through September 30, or until their successors are elected. They will be Directors-Elect in the Winter Meeting and will have the privilege of training, planning and enlistment of their Council members until October 1.

ARTICLE VII-ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Administrative Committee is composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, Chairman of Communications, and the Director of Missions.

Section 2. If there are major decisions to be made between the Quarterly Associational Meetings, the Administrative Committee will act in behalf of the Association, and will report the actions to the next Quarterly Meeting.

Section 3. The Administrative Committee will meet as needs arise between the Quarterly Meetings.

ARTICLE VIII - ASSOCIATION COUNCIL

- Section 1. The Associational Council shall be composed of the General Directors of all Mission Performance Programs, the Associational Officers, the Associational Staff, and the Chairman of Finance, Strategy and Communication, and others deemed necessary to attend the Council in planning the work of the Association.
- Section 2. The Director of Missions will serve as the Chairman of the Council. Other officers will be elected in their meetings, such as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.
- Section 3. The Associational Council will conduct at least six meetings per year, at least once every other month. The time and place for the meetings will be set.
- Section 4. The purpose of the Council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the Association, and evaluate the progress toward fulfilling the plan. Also, the Council gives guidance to the work of the Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

- Section 1. The Association shall have the following Committees with terms of office extending three years from the time duties of the office are assumed on October 1 of each year. To be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected at the April Meeting:

- Section 2. Each Committee nominated by the Nominating Committee will begin serving on October 1, and will serve for three years with the terms rotating, so that only 1/3 of the members are elected each year.
- Section 3. Each Committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons from every area of the Association.
- Section 4. Each Committee should meet once each quarter to fulfill its duties.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended at the Fall Meeting of the Association, (October), by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present, provided the proposed Amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Fall Meeting and voted upon on the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

ARTICLE XI

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority of the Messengers present and shall supercede any and all Constitutions, By-laws and Amendments previously adopted.

BY-LAWS

BY-LAW I - PARLIAMENTARY RULES

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER, Latest, revised edition, shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting the business and assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

BY-LAW II - ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1, and close September 30.

BY-LAW III - NEW CHURCHES

Section 1. Any church or mission seeking membership in the Association shall petition the Credentials Committee at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October) of the Association. The church shall be studied for it's Church Covenant, intentions, relations to other member churches of the Association, and it's willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. The Credentials Committee shall report to the Association at the Fall Meeting it's findings and recommendations for Associational action.

Section 2. Each church or mission applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. Each church received under a watch care relationship, shall submit a Quarterly Report to the Credentials Committee of the Association, and also submit the Annual Associational Letter at the end of the year.

BY-LAW IV - ORDINATION OF NEW MINISTERS

Section 1. When a church desires to ordain a candidate for the Gospel Ministry, it may petition the Credentials Committee of the Association for an examination and approval for ordination. The Credentials Committee shall work with the requesting church concerning date, time, and other persons forming the Examining Committee.

Section 2. After the examination of the candidate has been conducted by the Examining Council, a report of it's findings shall be given the requesting church.

Section 3. Guidelines for Ordination:
(1) The Credentials Committee requests that it receive a copy of the minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the requesting church voted to request examination of the candidate.
(2) The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
(3) The Committee requests that the candidate be examined at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
(4) The Committee shall examine the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, personal and family life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.
(5) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the Gospel Ministry.
(6) In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.

Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall provide a written report of the examination of candidates to the Gospel Ministry to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

BY-LAW V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

Section 1. The Moderator will preside over the Quarterly and called meetings of the Association. As the presiding officer, the Moderator will open the Meetings punctually, at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer, according to the principles of established parliamentary usage. Robert's Rules of Order will be followed. The Moderator, if desired, appoints a parliamentarian to serve at any or all Meetings of the Association during his term of office. This person must be approved by the Messengers-in-session. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 2. It would be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. Details are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 3. The Clerk will record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association and make this information available upon request. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook. The Administrative Assistant of the Association will serve as Clerk.

Section 4. The Treasurer will receive all the funds contributed to the Association and disburse them in accordance with the Budget of the Association, or for which the funds were contributed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook. The Administrative Assistant will serve as Treasurer of the Association.

BY-LAW VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called Meetings of the Association. They will propose an order of business and enlist all program personnel, and publicize the program to the churches in advance of the Meetings. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) This Associational Meetings Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 2. COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions, and services of the Association to the churches and to the general public. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Communications Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 3. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will assist the Association in counselling churches who fail to cooperate with the Association, help churches to meet the qualifications for being properly accepted in the Associational fellowship, and assist in examination of the candidates for the Gospel Ministry upon the request of the member churches. Detailed duties are outlined in the ASSOCIATIONAL HANDBOOK. Procedure for ordination is located in BY-LAW IV.
- (2) The Credentials Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. It is suggested that three pastors and three deacons serve on this committee.

Section 4. EXTERNAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee will be responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the Association, such as the various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The External Relations Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (3) Membership will also include the Associational representatives of the various agencies, boards, foundations, and Baptist related groups. These would be eligible for re-election at the end of the three years for another term.

Section 5. FINANCE COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee assists the Association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. They shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association and report to the Quarterly Associational Meetings and a final report to the Annual Fall Meeting. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Budget will be prepared and copies mailed to the Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Summer Meeting. (July or August). The Messengers will vote on the proposed Budget during the Summer Meeting of the Association. The fiscal year of the Association will be from October 1 through September 30.
- (3) The Finance Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with terms rotating so that only two members are elected each year. The Treasurer serves as an ex officio member of the Committee.
- (4) The Finance Committee chairman will serve on the Associational Council.

Section 6. HISTORY COMMITTEE

- (1) The History Committee will gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work. The Committee will make a report at the Fall Meeting of the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

- (2) The History Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

Section 7. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- (1) The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all Association-elected leaders except paid personnel. They shall nominate a complete slate of General Officers, Mission Performance Directors, and Council members, and Committee persons. Equal representation should be given from all pastors, staff members, men and women. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The first report of the nominations will be in the January Meeting of the Association, in which Mission Performance Directors are elected for training, planning and enlistment of their council members.
- (3) The second report of nominations will be in the April Meeting of the Association, in which the General Officers, Program Council members and Committee members are elected.
- (4) The Nominating Committee will consist of six members, representing all areas of the Association, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 8. PROPERTIES COMMITTEE

- (1) The Properties Committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the Association. It will make recommendations to the Associational Meetings concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Properties Committee shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the term rotating so that only one member is elected each year.
- (3) The Committee shall give a written report to the Fall Meeting of the Association.

Section 9. SEARCH COMMITTEE

- (1) The Search Committee will serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions.
- (2) The Committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one woman, all named by the Nominating Committee, plus the Moderator, and the Chairman of Finance Committee.
- (3) The Committee will use the guidelines and duties found in the Associational Handbook for calling a Director of Missions.

Section 10. STRATEGY COMMITTEE

- (1) The Strategy Committee will assist the Association in determining its Strategic Objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. The Committee also shall be available to study change or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

- (2) This Committee will work very closely with the Associational Council. The Strategy Committee Chairman will be an active member of the Associational Council.
- (3) The Strategy Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. Also, two members from the Associational Council should serve with the Committee in determining Annual planning objectives.

Section 11. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- (1) The Personnel Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (2) The Committee will prepare and update as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, except the Director of Missions, whose responsibilities are described in BY-LAW VIII, Section 1.
- (3) The Committee will survey the need for additional staff positions, recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel with the guidance and approval of the Director of Missions; and when necessary, recommend to the Association the termination of employment of staff personnel.
- (4) Annual review will be conducted by the Director of Missions to the employees, and employees' differences and grievances may be appealed to Personnel Committee by the individual.
- (5) The Committee will review annually, salaries, benefits, and make recommendations to the Budget Committee.
- (6) Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VII - TRUSTEES

The Trustees will act as the legal agent of the Association. The duties will be to hold title to the property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association, with the Association's foreknowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution and By-laws of the body, and with state laws as they affect the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VIII - EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Section 1. DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

- (1) The Director of Missions shall be an officer of the Association. As an officer and general leader of the Association, the Director of Missions shall be an ex officio member of all Committees, Councils, and groups of the Association.
- (2) The Director of Missions shall be elected to this office upon a recommendation of the Search Committee, and by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present at a regular Meeting by the Moderator for that particular purpose. Letters of information concerning the prospective Director of Missions shall be sent out to all Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Meeting.
- (3) The time of service shall continue until terminated by the request of the Director of Missions to the

Association, or at the request of the Association, which would require a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers to the Associational Meeting. Proper notice and explanation of termination shall be provided to or by the Director of Missions and/or the Association.

(4) The Director of Missions shall promote the work and ministry of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers, and Associational Committees and organizations.

- a. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Associational Council.
- b. He shall serve as Chairman of the Associational Council, and make an annual report to the Association at the October Meeting.
- c. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to:
 - (1) Enrich Christian fellowship among the churches.
 - (2) Encourage and strengthen the ministry of the churches.
 - (3) Enhance the cooperative relationship between the churches and the Association.
- d. He shall have full responsibility for supervising all personnel employed by the Association.
- e. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

Section 2. OTHER EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Other personnel shall be employed as needed by the Association with a two-thirds majority of the votes from the Messengers in a regular Meeting of the Association. All personnel must come as a joint recommendation of the Budget and Personnel Committees.

(1) ADMINISTRATIVE ASSISTANT

- a. The Administrative Assistant shall serve primarily in a secretarial role, assisting the Director of Missions with the daily administrative matters of the Association.
- b. The Administrative Assistant shall be responsible for the media and resource center, making available materials, pamphlets, video tapes, and other equipment for individuals and churches in the Association.
- c. This person shall also serve as the Associational Clerk/Treasurer, unless Personnel Committee deems otherwise.
- d. This person shall supervise the work of office help, along with Director of Missions.
- e. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the Budget Committee salary and benefits annually.
- f. Detailed duties and benefits are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

(2) OFFICE HELP

- a. Office help shall be provided by one or more persons as needed.
- b. This individual(s) shall fill in for the Administrative Assistant during leave times, such as vacations, sickness, conferences, etc.

- c. Personnel Committee shall recommend to the Budget Committee, salaries and benefits.
- d. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

(3) CUSTODIAL SERVICES

- a. Custodial services shall be provided by one or more persons in order to keep the associational properties in clean and acceptable condition.
- b. This person(s) shall be recommended by the Properties Committee to the Personnel Committee who shall consider the selection, and upon approval, shall present the person(s) to the Association for final approval.
- c. The Properties and Personnel Committees will recommend to the Budget Committee salaries and benefits for service rendered.
- d. The Properties Committee and the Director of Missions shall jointly supervise the custodial services personnel.
- e. Detailed duties are outlined in Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW IX - ANNUAL REPORTS

Persons preparing reports for the Annual Meeting of the Association in October, shall present the same in writing for inclusion in the printed Book of Reports two weeks before the Fall Meeting. These reports are to be limited to 300 words each.

BY-LAW X - AMENDMENTS

Amendments to the By-laws may be made at any Session of the October Meeting of the Association when presented in writing and approved by a majority of the Messengers present and voting.

The Meeting was Called to Order by Rev. Richard Fisher, Moderator. The Hymn "Stand Up For Jesus" was led by Judson Rotan. Kenneth McNeill, pastor at Franklinville First Baptist gave the devotional with the theme "Preparing to Reach People". This theme goes with our upcoming "Here's Hope Revivals". How can we prepare for these revivals? Matthew 6:36-38 shows that compassion is needed. This passage shows that Jesus was moved with pity which is compassion on a really deep level. Compassion is real and experiential, but not always explainable. Seeds have been planted and cultivated by many out of compassion. Prayer is also needed to provide laborers and show them where to go. Pre-registration for the Track Meet is necessary. A good time was had by all at the NC Baptist Men's Convention. A new concept of each one reaching one unchurched person was learned in Raleigh. Sometime around the first of May, a RA Camp out is being planned.

Our MAP budget is now \$15,000.00 per year and it is more difficult to meet this demand in December like we have done in the past. This motion was approved as printed in the packet.

The Family Life Report was given by Kenneth Tucker. Donnie McNeill, the Associational Singles' Leader was introduced. Donnie is from Victory Baptist Church. The Singles' Ministry seeks to bring people together to minister to each other and grow in the Lord. Kenneth mentioned that a Family Life Conference is still scheduled for May and will be a major event with several different areas highlighted. The Singles' Brunch in January had 39 present from several different churches and denominations. The Singles' Banquet in February had 41 people present. A Senior Adult Rally is planned for March 28 at Seagrove First Baptist with David Moore from the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs in Cary.

Wally Jarrell gave the report from the History Committee. The 60th Anniversary Books are now available for \$7.00 each. Although we do not want to dwell on the past, we can look to the future by building on our past.

The Nominating Committee Report was presented by Judson Rotan in the absence of Jimmy Honeycutt. This report was printed in the packet and was approved as presented.

Judson Rotan led in a special prayer time for John Mangum who has been quite ill and for Jimmy and Margaret Honeycutt who are recovering after a car accident in January.

Judson welcomed Joseph Edwards, the new pastor at Mt Lebanon and mentioned that Russells Grove also has a new pastor, Brough Fox.

Judson gave the Here's Hope Challenge and mentioned that 466 people were baptized in 1970, our highest number here in the association. Our present Sunday School enrollment is 6,800 and if just 680

(10 %) shared their faith in the 60 days of witnessing, there would be a total of 40,800 presentations. About 20 of our churches have voted to participate and it is hoped that more will do so. If we join together results will occur. We need to keep 2 Chronicles 7:14 in mind, bring them in, build them up, and disciple them. Will this be a reality in each of our lives?

Amos Garner, pastor at Calvary gave a warm welcome and gave directions to the Fellowship Hall for refreshments.

Mike Eller closed the meeting with prayer.

Bobby Blanton gave the report on our "Here's Hope Revivals" by stating that 28 churches officially participated and then asking for testimonies. The Clerk's Report was given by Mrs. Retta Plunkett as presented on page 5 in the Book of Reports. Appreciation was given to all Church Clerks and a special notice was given that 25 of our churches had their Annual Church Profiles in on or before the deadline. Mention was also made that an up-to-date listing of our Media/Resource Center and would be sent to all churches soon. This report was approved as presented.

Hymn "Here Am I, Send Me Lord" was led by David Thomas.
Judson Rotan gave the list of Missions Awareness Events as printed on page 6 in the Book of Reports and highlighted our special emphasis. Judson then talked about our plans for a World Missions Conference in October of 1996. The specific plans for this are listed on pages 12 and 13 of the Book of Reports.
Andi Wilson gave a brief report on the Fall Festival Booth and expressed appreciation to her husband for his help in this effort. More about this booth will be mentioned in the CCM report given Wednesday morning.
The Apostoloi Team is sponsored by the Baptist State Convention and is made up of college students that will work for 10 weeks in our association during the summer of 1996. Andi and Judson will interview students in February to make the final decision about which ones will come. These students will be at a different church each week and will do a variety of things as decided by the church. The forms necessary to apply for this team to come to the church are available and need to be turned in to Andi by January 31, 1996. O.D. Martin, from the Baptist State Convention, talked about the 15 years of partnerships that we have enjoyed both in the USA and overseas. HISTORY OF FOREST PARK BAPTIST CHURCH RANDLEMAN, NORTH CAROLINA

In the early weeks of 1959, the Mission Board of the Baptist State Convention sent a survey team to the area south of Randleman to determine if there was enough interest there to establish a new Baptist Church.

The outcome of the survey team was most favorable, and with the aid of Balfour Baptist Church in north Asheboro, it was decided to form a Baptist Mission for the area. The first service was conducted on May 3, 1959, in a rented four room housing, facing Randolph Memorial Park Cemetery. Delivering the first sermon for the fledgling mission was the Rev. Talmage Smith, field worker for Randolph Baptist Association.

The Balfour Baptist Church worked through a Mission Board composed of Carl King, Chairman; Wade Snider; and A.G. Memory. The State Mission Board contributed \$1,000.00 to help purchase the land on which the present church building now stands. A building committee was appointed, composed of John Harris, Chairman; J.C. Pearce, Carl King, Wade Snider, and Gilbert Underwood. On April 2, 1961, Balfour Baptist Mission moved into it's new home, consisting of an auditorium and seven classrooms.

The Rev. Mr. Smith preached during the first few months of the life of Balfour Baptist Mission. Then Balfour Baptist called the Rev. B.L. Gupton, a retired

Army chaplain, as Mission Pastor. He served during 1960 and into 1961, when the Rev. Doyle Moore was called as Mission Pastor. He resigned in 1963 to return to Southwestern Seminary to continue his education.

The Rev. John I. Kiser was called as Mission pastor in the early part of October, 1963, and it was during his pastorate that Balfour Baptist Mission became Forest Park Baptist Church. Forest Park was constituted as an independent Baptist church on October 4, 1964, with approximately 114 charter members. Approximately one-half of these were former members of Balfour Baptist Church and on-half were either confirmed or transferred from other churches of the county.

Forest Park was organized as part of the "30,000 Movement" of the Southern Baptist Association under the presidency of Dr. C.C. Warren. It was his goal to establish 30,000 preaching missions or churches during his tenure. Dr. Warren came to Forest Park to preach on the day the church was constituted.

In 1965, Forest Park undertook another building program and constructed four more classrooms for it's growing congregation.

Rev. Kiser's health required that he resign as pastor on June 30, 1968. He was elected by the congregation as "pastor emeritus" in appreciation for his six years of service. Rev. Harley Rumpfelt was called as pastor in January 1969, and served until November 27, 1971.

During the spring of 1975, the third and final phase of the building plan was put into action. A building contract was awarded to J&L Builders for a cost not to exceed \$90,000. On October 5, 1975, the dedication service for the new sanctuary and fellowship hall was held. During the summer of 1992, A Capital Improvements Committee was elected by the church to look into enlarging the present fellowship hall. At this time, September 1994, the committee, backed by the church, is beginning to put the plans into action.

Forest Park has grown in ways of the Spirit as well as physically. On January 5, 1969, Mr. Larry Freeman was the first person to be ordained to preach by Forest Park. In June of 1969, the church voted to give Mr. Harry Harris a letter of recommendation to enter Southeastern Seminary. In June of 1974, Mr. Larry McElreath and Mr. Mark McMasters were called to be summer youth workers. Both young men became dedicated members of Forest Park, and on May 5, 1979, the church licensed Mark McMasters the preach the gospel. Then in 1979 Larry McElreath, who had been serving as youth director, resigned to continue his education and was ordained as a minister in 1982. The church has had nine pastors during it's history and six interim pastors. The present pastor is Rev. Mike Staton.





The Personnel Committee Report was given by Justus McKeel as outlined on page 41 of the Book of Reports.

Judson Rotan gave the Properties Report in the absence of Carl Zeigler. The Associational Building was renovated this last year in agreement of the Properties Committee and the Finance Committee. Eight churches and 30 volunteers did the labor involved in this undertaking. A new roof is needed on the building and volunteers are doing this. The windows will need to be repainted or replaced in the near future.

After a reminder to turn in committee or organizational reports to the Clerk, a motion and second were given to approve the reports as presented. The motion carried.

Judson Rotan presented the DOM Report as printed on pages 32-34 for adoption by the association. This carried. New pastor, Bill Arbo of Glenola, was introduced and welcomed into RBA.

Judson Rotan began his DOM Message by challenging us to look forward. He reminded us that the association is here to assist churches to carry out the Kingdom of God. Andi Wilson gave the Discipleship Training Report in the absence of Wayne VunCannon. Andi stressed the fact that the idea is no longer to have a lot of structured workshops for everyone, but to work with individual churches to assess their needs and then find the materials and the best way to help them meet their goals.

Andi also gave the VBS Report, saying that this year there was just one clinic conducted and only 51 people attended, including 9 conference leaders. This next year there will be a special conference for those not using SBC literature, zeroing in on how to work with different age levels, approaches, etc.

The WMU Report was given by Barbara Dawkins. Women on Mission is the new organization for women and will have more options and flexibility to help women meet missions needs. Appreciation was shown for Judson Rotan and his willingness to work with our WMU. He was recently spotlighted in the Tar Heel Leader. More 100th Anniversary NC paintings are still available on a first come first serve basis.

Bobby Poole gave the Brotherhood Report, emphasizing the importance of our RA/GA programs, as mentioned so frequently by missionaries that had the first seeds of mission service planted there. November 4 is Baptist Day at Wake Forest and applications must be sent immediately.

Evangelism was spotlighted by Bobby Blanton. Our main emphasis this year was Here's Hope. We are not sure just how many of our churches participated in this. It is hoped that this will not just be a one time event, but will be ongoing.

Mike Eller gave the Missions Development Report mentioning that most of the emphasis has been on MAP this past year. Mike brought a motion from the Missions Development Council to enter into the South African Partnership, pending approval by the Baptist State Convention. This was seconded and the motion was carried. A second motion was made from the Council to accept the MAP goals as outlined on page 14 of the Book of Reports. This motion was seconded and also carried. Mike also mentioned that the Missions Development Council and the Associational Staff are looking at the process for Habitat for Humanity and the possibility of a church in the Level Cross area.

Kenneth Tucker gave the report from the Family Ministries Council as outlined on pages 39-40 in the Book of Reports. The Promise Keepers Conference in Atlanta in 1996 is a good way to show appreciation for your pastor and the registration fee is \$95.00.

The special offering for the Home Missionary in the Ukraine was again taken with \$190.00 being received at this time and the total being \$615.00 for both sessions.

Hymn "Abide With Me" was led by David Thomas.

Rev. Koy Lee Haywood led our Memorial Service and read the names of those in our churches that passed away this past year.

Andi Wilson gave our CCM Report and gave an update on some of the Hope for Hurting Humanity projects that were conducted this past summer. The Fall Festival Booth was in a good location this year. 2,200 cups of water (95 gallons) were given out Saturday and 1,400 cups (65 gallons) were given out Sunday. Styrofoam cups with the Roman Road were used and it is hoped that a lasting impression was made with some of those. Appreciation was expressed to those volunteers who worked there and included all age groups. If your community has a Fall Festival and you want to do the same thing, check with Andi and she can look into that possibility.

Some activities that are being planned for this next year include helping the WMU with the prison packets again, having another youth rally, having the Fall Festival Booth again, another association wide youth mission trip like the one this year to Atlanta, and a basketball camp for underprivileged kids. Other possibilities are working with Brotherhood on Camp Angel Tree, participating in Make A Difference Day, working with the Greensboro Crisis Pregnancy Center to possibly establish a satellite center here. Churches are encouraged to do CCM work and to call on Andi if there are any questions about what or where to find a need.

Dan Wood gave the Life Way Counselling Center report and reminded us that the relationship with emotional well being is often related to spirituality.

Richard Fisher mentioned that Steve and Bonnie Davenport have both been sick and we had a moment of prayer for them.

Dale Morgan gave the Disaster Recovery Report and mentioned that the Unit was available at that time for viewing. Almost 20,000 miles have been travelled in a year to several places. Training for Disaster Recovery will be available later in the Fall and appreciation was expressed to all that have participated so far. Dale reminded everyone that work would be done on the roof at RBA on the 21st of October, weather permitting.

Hymn "Send the Light" was led by Boyd Ammerman.

Boyd Ammerman brought our special music entitled "O Lord, You're Beautiful".

Dr. Ray Benfield, recently retired missionary from Denmark gave the message entitled "Going the Distance in Missions" and used Romans 10:9-15 as the text. He gave illustrations from not only their ministry in Denmark, but also in Austria and Greece.

Richard Fisher, Moderator, closed the meeting.

Host Pastor, Wayne Vuncannon, gave instructions for lunch and then the closing prayer.

HISTORY OF HULDAH BAPTIST CHURCH SEAGROVE, N.C.

The seed beginnings of Huldah Baptist Church date back as far as April, 1896, in the hearts of neighbors of Rock Springs School District, who asked Rev. Marvin J. Leach to preach once a month in the school house. Soon as Sunday School was formed and began to progress rapidly.

In the fall of 1896, the people requested that Rev. Leach conduct a series of meetings "under the brush arbor." Many were converted, and as a result, on the second Sunday in November, 1896, Huldah Baptist Church was organized with 11 charter members. Taking part in the service on the first Sunday, along with Rev. Leach, were Jefferson Lannings and John Summey, with Rev. Summey preaching the introductory sermon.

The church name came from Huldah J. Staley, an elderly lady living near the church, who requested that the church be named after her.

Huldah Baptist Church is located three miles north of Seagrove. The land on which the building was erected was presented by John Presnell. The first trustees were G.H. Bean, Alvius Bean, and Elias Moore.

After having served the congregation for many years, the first church building was replaced by a newer one in 1954. Many wonderful years of worship were observed in the second auditorium.

God abundantly blessed Huldah and once again the congregation felt the need for a new auditorium. The pastor at that time, Tom Walker, called a business meeting after the morning worship service on June 6, 1976, and the church voted to let Fritchard Construction Company build the proposed sanctuary which will seat about 450 people. The building committee for this construction were Cicero Bennett, Vernon Brown, William Moran, Lewis Thomas, and Robert Yates.

Today, the church has a total membership of 248 and an average Sunday School attendance of 60. Rev. Wayne Vuncannon has served as pastor for the past ten years.

EVANGELISM REPORT

This has been a busy year in Evangelism for North Carolina Baptists. Our "Here's Hope, Share Jesus Now" emphasis was supported well in our Randolph Baptist Association and across the state.

Statewide, our "Here's Hope" emphasis was supported by 662 churches (according to 32 of 79 associations reporting), with 726 professions of faith reported. Our entire baptism total for 1994 in North Carolina was 2,451. Both North Carolina and the SBC reflected a 1% increase in baptisms for 1994. (Our statewide Super Summer Youth event at Carowinds in July saw nearly 30,000 attend the two day event and recorded 239 professions of faith.)

In our association there were 24 churches that participated in our "Here's Hope" revivals April 2-9. We had a witness training session January (Roman Road Witnessing materials), a "60 Days of Soul-winning" emphasis in January, and a well attended Prayer Breakfast in March. Although church reporting has been a problem, we are hopeful that each church saw an increase in evangelism participation, professions of faith, and church additions during this emphasis.

Currently, we are working on an evangelism project for 1997 that may be used as a pilot project for our State Convention. We are working through the details of planning an Evangelism emphasis similar in format to our World Missions Conferences. Much work remains in developing this project.

Looking ahead to 1996, our Statewide emphasis will be "People Sharing Jesus". More information will be forthcoming. Also, plans are being developed to sponsor a Billy Graham Crusade in Charlotte for 1996.

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WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCES

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

MILES TRAVELED: 12,970 (Kept daily log of travel)

WORK IN OFFICE: Attended 24 committee and council meetings, 12 group conferences. There were many telephone conferences and conversations. Our secretary, Retta Plunkett, prepared and mailed around 14,300 "Randolph Baptist" monthly newsletter to our pastors, church leaders and others. Many events and activities emphasizes, promotional letters and posters are produced and mailed from the associational office monthly. Our associational building is a RESOURCE CENTER as well as offices for personnel and a place for fellowship and training. Over 500 videos are in our RESOURCE CENTER. Many are for state, home and foreign missions. Also organizations have several training videos. There are children and youth videos and several series, such as "Turn Your Heart Toward Home" by James Dobson, "Children At Risk" by Dobson and Bauer, and "The Search For Significance" by Robert McGee. Our Administrative Assistant, Retta Plunkett, is preparing a catalog for the churches and church leaders about the names of videos we have in the RESOURCE CENTER. This will be available soon.

WORK IN AND AMONG THE CHURCHES: Out of our 43 churches, I had the privilege to visit 20 of them this year. This has been a year of transition. At one time we had as many as 9 churches without pastors. I have spent much of my time on Sundays and Wednesday nights with five of our churches without pastors, preaching and working with them for several Sundays. Through the year, I have preached in several of our churches for pulpit supply, homecoming, deacon and minister ordination. I have conducted deacon conferences, taught mission studies, lead Sunday School Workers workshop and was an evangelist in one of our churches for "Here's Hope" revivals. There has been around 55 personal conferences with pastors, church leaders, and search committees.

OTHER AREAS OF MINISTRY: Worked with Andi Wilson, our CCM Director, helping to plan and promote Church and Community projects, activities and events. I visited in the hospitals and conducted devotions at Cross Road Retirement Center. Planned and conducted a foreign missions rally with Dr. Samuel James, Vice President of Foreign Mission Board, traveled to Long Island, N. Y. for partnership planning and helped to plan the "Here's Hope" revivals among 24 of our churches in April, 1995.

MEETINGS ATTENDED OUTSIDE THE ASSOCIATION: I have attended the Baptist State Convention, Evangelism Conference, both in Winston-Salem, Convention Staff / DOM meeting at Caraway, Jericho Missions Week at Ridgecrest, and a conference on "Transforming Ministry for the Future" in Winston-Salem. Also it was a wonderful privilege to conduct a "Here's Hope" revival in a church in South Carolina and go on a mission trip with First Baptist Church, Asheboro, for two weeks in June to the Ukraine

for a church construction project.

THANKS: I am grateful for the 24 churches who wholehearted participated in the "Here's Hope" revivals. It is reported that around 60 decisions were made for Christ. Also I am grateful for the Properties and Finance Committees working together for the renovation of the associational building last fall. Eight churches had volunteers to paint or help fix-up the building. Mrs. Beulah Tote, Chair person for Finance Committee, gave her leadership for this project. I am deeply grateful for her efforts. The building has new carpet, furniture for the reception area, window blinds and kitchen equipment, along with new painted rooms. It is a new and different place to work.

CHALLENGE: I am happy to report that the State of the Association is in good health. The State of the Association is a look at the present and our past accomplishment, the facts and figures which we use as a benchmark. But to me, the most exciting thing about Randolph Association is where we are going. As we face 1996 and the year 2000, there is excitement about our future in ministry and work as Randolph Baptists.

This past year, there were new and exciting ministries among us, Spanish Mission, Life Way Counseling Center, Disaster Recovery Unit, CCM projects and events, Coleridge Apartment ministries, and many other mission endeavors. Most of the organizations had increased interest and attendance at their events. The spirit of the association has been high all year long. We have enjoyed an excellent year in associational missions.

In financial matters, our churches gave \$103,116.64 this year, 1994-95. This is \$5,239.64 over our budget for the year. This is history making for our association.

If financial data are vital statistics, then the contributions the association receives from the churches are the life-blood of our work and ministry. I am happy to report that our churches contributed 6% more this past year than the previous year. We are very grateful for the increase.

If we are going to maintain a vital ministry to our churches, their communities, and to the world; our churches must be encouraged to give 5% of their undesignated offerings to the associational budget. Let's teach ourselves TO THINK 5%.

1994-95 was a banner year for our association. So it is a time to rejoice and give praise to God for our accomplishments, our growth. But IT IS NOT TIME to be satisfied with our growth and forget our mission from our Lord to win and disciple persons.

-We must remind ourselves that 7 out of 10 persons in this county are unreached for the cause of Christ.

-We must remind ourselves that we must disciple those we win to be Christ-like in their daily life-style.

-We must continue to urge our church membership to be on mission for our Lord.

-We must cooperate together to meet the needs of hurting humanity who are poor, divorce, single, abused and drug afflicted without Christ's love and grace.

So our mission is never completed. It is a daily commitment to greater objective and goals each day and each year. This coming year 1995-96 is a Year of Missions Awareness and Involvement. Several missions events will be conducted, with a climax of a World Missions Conference, October 6 - 13, 1996.

I challenge us to be people on mission for our Lord, not people on issues. Thank you for a great year of ministry and work. Again it has been my joy to serve you as your Director of Missions. I appreciate your continuous prayers and support for the days to come.

WORLD MISSIONS CONFERENCE

I. WHAT?

A World Missions Conference is a mission education project in which the church hears messages from missionaries around the world.

Since 1944, World Missions Conferences have helped Southern Baptist missions agencies, state conventions and associations personalize their work in churches across the convention. Each year, 200 associations sponsor these meetings annually, providing a meeting place for missionaries to tell their stories to Southern Baptists and to encourage those who hear to pray, to give, and to become missionaries where they are.

OBJECTIVES:

1. Stress the Biblical basis of missions.
2. Expand local missions involvement.
3. Increase giving to missions through the Cooperative Program and special missions offerings.
4. Inspire prayer for missionaries.
5. Accelerate missions awareness through Brotherhood and WMU.
6. Secure life commitments in response to God's call.
7. Teach more about the Southern Baptist way of doing missions.

II. WHEN?

October 6 - 10, 1996
Sunday morning through Thursday

III. WHERE?

At least in thirty (30) churches in the Randolph Baptist Association.

IV. HOW?

1. Missions dinner on Saturday night, October 5, 1996 at Caraway Conference Center, 6:00 P. M.
2. Each church will hear two (2) foreign missionaries, two (2) home missionaries, one (1) state missionary, and one (1) associational missionary.

3. There will be morning meetings for pastors and lay-persons on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday at Caraway Conference Center.
4. There will be youth, single adults, and senior adults events during the week.
5. Each church is asked to contribute \$400.00 to the association for the expenses of the week. This is for travel, lodging, meals and promotional materials.

V. WHY?

* Kenny Rains, Coordinator for World Missions Conference, Brotherhood Commission, SBC, says, "Southern Baptists are a mission people, and they want to see how their missions dollars are spent. Through World Missions Conferences they can. As World Missions Conferences enhance missions awareness, they challenge people to action and enable Southern Baptists to see a cross section of missionaries".

* Myra Book, Director of Deputation Services at the Home Mission Board, says, "World Missions Conferences are the best tool we have to get home and foreign missionaries into churches that otherwise might never hear their stories".

* Paul and Barnabas shared of their work to the people who sent them out. (Acts 14:26-28)

* Three (3) words characterize the World Missions Conference:

1. **INFORMATION:** "They...reported all things that God had done".
2. **CHALLENGE:** "The fields are white unto harvest".
3. **INVOLVEMENT:** "Ye are my witnesses".

I really appreciate the willingness of our churches to get involved in the variety of ministries that we have offered. It would not be possible to touch so many lives without the many volunteers who give of their time, talents & finances! THANK YOU & GOD BLESS YOU for giving of yourself for the sake of Jesus Christ.

HIGHLIGHTS OF CCM

Community Needs Assessment ~ September 1994. Approximately 22 volunteers helped conduct the needs assessment. The information was compiled & put into the book: *A Guide to Community Resources & Mission Action*. These books were distributed to every church.

Fall Festival Booth ~ October 1-2, 1994. Approximately 1000 cups of water were distributed by 30 volunteers.

Literacy Training ~ April 21-22, 1995. 13 volunteers received training in leading ESL classes sponsored by the RBA & held at the Spanish Mission.

Festival at Coleridge Apartments ~ May 20, 1995. Approximately 200 residents (adults & children) attended the festival. 11 Churches helped with games, food, & entertainment.

Hope for Hurting Humanity ~ Training for conducting community mission projects was held on May 30th. Training for 10 different projects was offered. *3 churches indicated that they did a HHH project this summer:*

Oakhurst ~ collected diapers for the Family Crisis Center & adult diapers for Hospice. A total of 1224 diapers (29 packs) were collected & delivered.

FBC, Seagrove ~ Began collecting items for the Family Crisis Center in August & will continue this project throughout the year.

Greystone ~ Made toy favors, booklets, & fathers day cards for the children on the pediatric floor of Randolph Hospital.

Backyard Bible Clubs ~ Training was offered on May 30, 1995 with 14 in attendance. Eight (8) BBCs were conducted this summer.

Association-Wide Mission Trip ~ July 16-21, 1995. 21 adults & students went to Atlanta, GA to conduct Backyard Bible Clubs, help clean & repair a mission church, & provide fellowship opportunities for the residents in the community.

Association-Wide Youth Rally ~ August 10, 1995. Approximately 250 people attended the rally. "Witness", the student evangelism/music team lead the rally. A Love Offering of \$175.00 was given for the members of "Witness".

Fall Festival Booth ~ October 7-8, 1995.

LIFEWAY COUNSELING CENTER

Now well into its second year of ministry, the LifeWay Counseling Center continues to expand its ministry. LifeWay Counseling Center is a partnership ministry of Randolph Baptist and LifeWay Mental Health Associates of Graham.

Our three counselors, Larry C. Willet, Ph.D., Kathryn Kirkpatrick, Psy.D., and Carson Sarvis, M.Ed. have been well accepted by the community. We are truly blest to have Christian counselors who know how to blend the best counseling techniques and Christian theology thus providing a wholistic ministry.

We were saddened in July at the death of Kathy Hunt our center volunteer. The center really benefitted from her presence and service. The volunteer receptionist position is still open.

This year the center has averaged 108 counseling sessions per month. Some of these were individuals and some were couples. Almost one half of our client load is children and teenagers.


Giving from our churches continues to pay a portion of the rent and utilities. But, most importantly, giving from Randolph Baptists enable those without insurance or other financial means to receive help from the center at a reduced rate. On average, three persons a month receive support from Randolph Baptist.

We continue to encourage Christians to use this valuable resource. Our counselors seek God's direction for each session and are experienced in dealing with the following concerns: depression, anxiety, emotional difficulties, grief, physical and sexual abuse, parenting and adolescent problems, eating disorders, work and career issues, substance abuse, group counseling, as well as psychological and personality testing.

Thank you Randolph Baptists for making a quality counseling ministry possible.



MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT REPORT

During the past year most of the Missions Development Council attention has gone to the Mission Action Projects(MAP) of our Association. Through this fund we have been able to participate in the following:

1. Church and Community Ministries under the leadership of Andi Wilson has been the catalyst for much of the mission work of our Association. Through her coordination of Backyard Bible Clubs, Summer Youth Rally, Coleridge Road Apartments Street Festival, sponsoring a booth at the Fall Festival, and several other events and ministries our churches have been better able to realize what missions at home is all about.

2. The Spanish Mission is another way the AMDC has been able to assist the churches to serve the people of Randolph County. This mission, started in 1993, serves a population that might otherwise go untouched by the traditional church. We are now in the process of calling a permanent pastor for this area of ministry.

3. Disaster Relief is another project of the AMDC that is funded through the gifts of the churches to MAP.

These, along with some emphasis for New York Partnership, Multi-Housing Ministry, and other special mission projects have been funded through our MAP account. Thanks to Randolph Baptists for making it possible to conduct these and other mission assignments during the past year.

As we have already started planning for a new year we are narrowing our focus somewhat. The AMDC will focus on three primary areas in the coming year. They are:

Church and Community Ministries: The mission work done here through both training for missions and implementing missions will require much attention from the AMDC, Associational staff, and the churches of RBA in 1995-96.

Apostolic Team: This is a group of four college students who will work with our churches next summer. They will be assisting churches all over the Association in accomplishing our task of missions at home.

South African Partnership: You will hear about and have opportunity to vote on a partnership that will enable us to be "stretched" further towards the "ends of the earth".

These areas of missions will require the efforts of us banding together to accomplish the task of carrying the gospel to people everywhere.

Making Life for Older Adults . . .

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE ASSOCIATIONS

1995

This year has been a significant one for the Christian Action League of N. C. as we gave leadership and support to local communities in their battle against the proliferation of alcohol, provided a voice for Christian morals and ethics in the halls of the legislature and continued our battle against on-going legislation concerning the lottery and other anti-family issues.

1. Legislative Issues:

A. Alcohol

The alcohol industry sought to implement state-wide Liquor-By-the-Drink and beer/wine sales through legislative action. House Bill 599 would have implemented LBD without a vote of the people. The Christian Action League prompted churches to action and strong opposition developed from across the state, the bill was withdrawn and died in committee.

B. Lottery

In the 1995 Session of the General Assembly, there were four lottery bills introduced. Several times in the past decade, gambling forces were able to secure the passage of a lottery measure in the Senate, but not in 1995. Lottery legislation was defeated in the Senate by a 28-20 vote. In the House, HB 838 (Lottery for School Buildings) was brought out of committee by an unusual parliamentary move and placed on the House calendar. Calls and Prayers from CAL members and the Christian community were honored when the measure was sent back to committee where it remained until the end of session.

We praise the Lord for this victory and for the fact that N. C. remains the largest state in the nation that has no state-sponsored lottery. However, we request your prayers as the Christian Action League will continue to be on the front-line fighting this battle again in 1996.

C. Abortion

The Christian Action League and other Christian organizations have continuously lobbied for abolition of the state abortion fund. House Bill 229 has passed and will cut the abortion funding from \$1.2 million to \$50,000 and then to be used only in cases of rape or incest.

For many years we have been working for legislation requiring **Parental Consent** before a minor can obtain an abortion. House Bill 481 was adopted this year providing this "common sense" legislation.

D. Abstinence Education


Another proposal that the Christian Action League has been working on became law this year. House Bill 834 (Teaching Abstinence Until Marriage) is pro-family and supports biblical and moral values. This bill requires schools to offer a program encouraging abstinence until marriage and also provides for parental review of teaching materials before comprehensive sex education instruction can be implemented.

2. League Leadership:


Reverend Johnny R. Henderson became the League's Executive Director in July upon the retirement of Coy C. Privette. Johnny brings a wealth of experience to this position. A trustee since 1977, he is the North Carolina Baptist Men's Correctional Ministries Coordinator and serves on the Executive Committee of Prison Fellowship of North Carolina. Also, his church was featured on ABC News last year for its outstanding prison ministry.

We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association. May others join you as we seek to be the "Salt and Light" in a world hostile to Biblical ethics and morality.

The Best of Times

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1995 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the forty-four year history of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. The following are some highlights from the year:

In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired Luther Osment of Sylva, North Carolina as its first full-time Chaplain. Reverend Osment's work responsibilities include ministry to the residents of the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem and the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step up" for Older Adults, the final phase of the renovation of The Taylor House Facility in Albemarle was completed in the Fall of 1995. The renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was also begun in 1995 and hopefully will be completed by year end. When the renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home is completed, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "state-of-the-art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some

form of dementia), the Young Solarium addition was completed in the Fall of 1995. The Young Solarium will house a new small-group program designed to enhance the quality of life experienced by institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults who may not need institutionalized care, the Baptist Retirement Homes developed a new home and community based service program, In Home Care, Inc. . . . the new service designed primarily to extend the amount of time that frail Baptist Older Adults can remain in the home environment.

1995 Report: Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina

For six-year-old Malinda, darkness brought sleepless nights listening to her mother's boyfriend beat her brother and sister - and praying she wouldn't be next, watching her mom choose her lover's whims over her children's needs, and finally, being abandoned on Christmas Eve in pouring rain on a dirt road.

Her darkness, more than just a light switch clicked off, swirled with pain, fear, confusion and despair.

Today, a bright-eyed teenager living at Broyhill Home, one of four Baptist Children's Homes residential campuses, Malinda finally sees light. After becoming a Christian in 1992, she can forgive her mom and let go of her painful past. "Learning to deal with my issues is a lot easier since I became a Christian," said Malinda. "I'm happy here at Broyhill. The people believe in me, support me and are here for me."

Believing in children and families, offering light to pierce their darkness has been Baptist Children's Homes' goal since its beginning 110 years ago.

Serving 1,513 children and families in 1993-94 in 12 facilities across the state, BCH provides intentionalized programs of residential group care, emergency care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, teenage mother/babies, model day care and behavioral change for girls. Gaston County emergency care cottages in Dallas, operated on a yearly contract basis, were not renewed with BCH following Gaston County's decision to change the facilities' direction to a level of service BCH doesn't provide.

Commemorating 110 years of ministry, BCH published *Intent to Serve*, a history depicting the last decade of BCH's child-centered, family-focused services. Each church was to receive a complimentary copy in the Fall of 1995.

Founded in 1970, the Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville celebrated in October 25 years serving over 900 young, unmarried, pregnant women who were given a quiet, supportive atmosphere to make decisions about their future.

A chapter of BCH life closed with the death of alumni, employee and friend Bill Sisk. Investing 52 years of himself, Sisk, who came to Mills Home at age 8 and returned to work on staff 42 years, died May 21, 1995. "An era has passed," said BCH President Michael C. Blackwell. "It's extremely unlikely Baptist Children's Homes will ever see another individual who invests himself so fully in this place as did my friend Bill Sisk."

Adding to the light, Baptist churches, through the Cooperative Program, designated gifts and the Thanksgiving Offering funded about one-fourth of BCH's \$12 million budget with gifts totaling \$2,934,304.

Trustee Jim Goldston held his sixth annual Goldston's Carnival for Children raising \$28,633 and providing two fun-packed days of rides, games, entertainment and food for children and area residents. "There is nothing more important in this life than children," said Goldston. "This is just one thing we can do to show our commitment, to put our feet to our prayers."

Putting words into action described numerous individuals who gave time and effort with special campus work projects.

This year, the Friends of Children committee added a twist to their annual spring bus tour by pulling on gloves and work clothes to help beautify Odum Home in Pembroke and Cameron Boys Camp near Southern Pines.

A team of volunteers from Denver Baptist Church worked at Broyhill Home clearing brush, painting inside a cottage and building a storage shed; and at Kennedy Home tearing down an old gym built in the 1930's, restructuring an old picnic shelter into an arts and crafts center, removing old heating equipment from Biggs cottage and renovating family conference rooms in the new gym.

"We pray about these kids, and we pray that we will be an example," said Allen Holmes, Denver Baptist's mission trip coordinator. "This is more important than any building or construction work."

Trustees, intent on strengthening BCH's leadership position and continuing its tradition of giving light to families and children, approved a \$10.1 million campaign, "Light Their Way," to raise money for special projects, operational needs and endowment. The campaign will run September 1995 - May 1997.

Many children, like Malinda, suffer in darkness. Many families linger in pain waiting for answers, waiting for help. Because of Baptists' support, BCH is able to "Light Their Way," offering hope, security and love.

HOME MISSION BOARD, SBC

Christ for Our Nation

1994 ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHTS

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1994, there were 4,913 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. This is only 87 short of the Bold Mission Thrust (BMT) goal of 5,000 home missionaries. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,300 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,000 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields, exceeding another BMT goal six years early. During the year there were nearly 1,300 church starts. Southern Baptist churches baptized 378,463 people in 1994, an increase of nearly 30,000 over 1993.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1994, gifts to the offering totaled \$37,177,500, about 2 percent more than the 1993 total and the second largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1995 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$50 million, in commemoration of the HMB's 150th Anniversary. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1994:

Chaplaincy Ministries—The 2,364 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 24,000 professions of faith.

Church Loans—The Church Loans Division closed 107 church loans totaling \$21.5 million, including \$3.9 million of refinancing.

Language Missions—Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups and 97 American Indian tribes, using 102 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers—Volunteers continue to serve in record numbers and represent more than \$100 million in value to the HMB. In 1994, nearly 80,000 persons served as volunteers, about 5,000 more than in 1993. Mission Service Corps missionaries, numbering 2,016, and serving in 1,385 locations, represent a cadre of committed people responding to God's call to be personally involved in home missions.

Christian Social Ministries—More than 2,500 volunteers were trained to teach English as a second language, tutor children and youth, and assist adult non-readers.

Church Extension—Through Praxis, 47 men and 31 women from six Southern Baptist seminaries participated in church planting during the summer.

Special Ministries—International ministries were conducted at the United Nations, in Washington, D.C., in 40 port cities, and among international students.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening—The Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1994.

BAPTIST COLLEGE/UNIVERSITY REPORT 1995

The Baptist State Convention is 165 years old. For 161 of those years the Convention has been in the business of founding, adopting, supporting and nurturing Baptist colleges and universities. North Carolina Baptists are known for their broad and deep commitment to Christian higher education. Our seven Convention-related education institutions are: Campbell University, Chowan College, Gardner-Webb University, Mars Hill College, Meredith College, Wingate University and Wake Forest University.

For 1995 the Convention's Christian higher education budget is \$6,000,540, or 20.41 per cent of the total. These funds are divided among six colleges. Wake Forest is not in the budget, but receives designated gifts from churches and shares in student financial aid funding through the State Missions Offering.

The 1994 enrollment in North Carolina Baptist colleges and universities was 22,473, with 4,075 graduates. Approximately 476 students were enrolled in church-related vocation studies.



1995 ANNUAL REPORT

The messengers present at the Baptist State Convention meeting 75 years ago, when the establishment of the Baptist Foundation was approved, believed that the services to be provided by the Foundation could benefit both the individuals who would use its services as well as Christian purposes for which the Convention had organized many years earlier.

With a well trained and dedicated staff, the Baptist Foundation is now in position to assist any Baptist church member who has a desire to preserve their estate for their families and provide greater financial service to their church, association, missions, Baptist institutions or the Convention in its program of work.

Those who have become involved with the Foundation thus far, many of whom no longer are alive today are providing critically needed resources for either their family members and/or the Christian causes they dearly love. In many instances their use of a trust or endowment fund has helped reduce income and/or estate taxes and increased the value of assets they left for their families at their death. In addition, they continue to provide for sharing the Gospel with the income from endowment funds they created while they were living.

Many North Carolina Baptists are today enjoying the benefit of increased retirement income through the creation of an annuity trust with the transfer of property or other assets which the Foundation sold and invested under guidance of professional managers. When these trusts were created, the individuals were provided tax benefits which enhanced their estates. In most cases, the income they now receive is greater than that received prior to starting the trust. At some future date of their choosing, the assets in trust will serve the Lord in ways chosen by the donors.

During the past year, an area manager was employed to serve the western portion of the state. A twelve-minute video, "Pillars of the Church", was prepared which shares through personal example how the Foundation can serve every church member. A copy of this video is available by request in writing to 201 Convention Drive, Cary, North Carolina 27511. The total assets under management by the Foundation at the end of 1994 were \$47,312,575. A total of \$1,241,756 was paid to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes during 1994. The amount paid to individuals from trusts, which will eventually pay to Baptist causes, was \$1,499,098 during the year. During the first six months of 1995, the total performance of the charitable endowment funds under management was 15.3% (annualized).

The Biblical Recorder should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Your support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the Recorder, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the Biblical Recorder which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1995-96 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed. With all the stress and disturbance in the world, "The North Carolina Baptist Way" has become even more important to us than ever before.

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

"THE BAPTIST"

Affectionately known to many simply as "The Baptist", our hospital now employs 5,544 members who comprise our healing team. We are joined with Bowman Gray School of Medicine and thus The Medical Center has over 9,000 employees making us the largest employer in Forsyth County. In fiscal year 1994-'95, our 806-bed facility provided care for 23,712 inpatient admissions. Our rapidly growing Outpatient Department provided care for 557,511 patient visitors.

A NEW DIVISION: PASTORAL CARE AND CHURCH RELATIONS

In May restructuring created a new division with the consolidation of the departments of Pastoral Care and Church/Community Relations. This division consists of four ministry components which are listed below with a brief ministry synopsis:

DEPARTMENT OF CHAPLAINCY AND PASTORAL EDUCATION

Through spiritual and emotional healing to patients, families and staff, approximately 55,000 ministries were provided by our chaplains.

THE CENTER FOR CONGREGATIONAL HEALTH

This rapidly expanding ministry to churches, pastors and staff, and congregational leaders also enables the training of intentional interim pastors. Also, training is provided for leadership and church consultants. Workshops and other events are held as well.


DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH AND DENOMINATIONAL RELATIONS

This department serves as the liaison between Baptist Hospital and the churches, associations, and convention, as well as other church groups. By facilitating appointments, policy interpretation, understanding of our health care services, this function helps keep our vital bond with North Carolina Baptists strong. Mission dollars for benevolent care through this department in excess of \$452,000 were given by Baptists to the Mother's Day Offering. This mission effort helps relieve the financial burdens of patients who have little or no healthcare insurance. This is truly a ministry of renewing hope in their lives and is a source of great joy for us.

PASTORAL COUNSELING

With increasing requests from churches and associations across the state, this ministry continues to expand. Our thirteen strategically located counseling centers provided 27,000 ministry hours last year.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE AND PROGRESS

- **FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP** - Annually Baptist Hospital's rate increases consistently are less than both the medical consumer price index for hospitals and general inflation. The most recent North Carolina Database Commission report comparing the average of charges at other in-state academic medical centers for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21% lower. For all hospitals statewide we are 7.7% lower on those same charges, despite treating the most critically ill patients from across the state.
- **QualChoice OF NORTH CAROLINA** - A managed care plan providing quality health care and patient physician choice. Established by The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated and Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Wake Forest University, QualChoice is now expanding to employers in our region.
- **ACCREDITATION WITH COMMENDATION** - This distinction was awarded us by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. With a grade of 96 we earned the distinction as one of America's most highly rated hospitals.
- **EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT/DIETARY BUILDING** - With a Fall 1995 opening date this 300,000 square foot facility will expand our Emergency Department capacity to 70,000 visitors annually. It will also house a 35-bed Day Hospital, as well as a 900-seat cafeteria, and will double the proportion of private beds available to patients.
- **COMPREHENSIVE OUTPATIENT REHABILITATION FACILITY** - A 64,000 square foot facility scheduled for completion in the Summer of 1996.
- **STICHT CENTER ON AGING AND REHABILITATION** - Housing a geriatric research and education center, geriatric day hospital and inpatient acute rehab beds, geropsychiatry, and adult acute psychiatry, a planned completion and opening date for this center is the Spring of 1996.
- **HOME HEALTH SOLUTIONS AND HOME HEALTH SPECIALISTS** - Specialists provide at home care such as intravenous chemotherapy, pain management, nursing care and physical and occupational therapy.
- **COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ASSISTANCE** - Baptist Hospital continues to develop relationships with hospitals and physicians in other communities inviting them to join our expanding healthcare delivery system.

A CLOSING WORD

Historical methods of delivering healthcare are changing in significant ways. We are constantly seeking to position ourselves to develop the methodologies, services, and delivery systems to meet these challenges. In the midst of the multiplicity of change remain several treasured, time tested constants. Among these are our commitment to excellence and compassion in providing care, the demonstrated support of North Carolina Baptists, and most significantly, the providence of our Lord. Trusting in these, we move forward boldly and confidently into the future.
