## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We have received for the work entrusted to our care for the past year (including what has been sent up to this session) \$290, of which we have expended \$282, leaving a balance of \$8 in the bands of our Treasurer

Elder J. R. Oliver has labored under our direction in Onslow County, giving his entire time to preaching and pastoral work at Union Chapel, Rose Hill and Salem Churches and Pern Bay and Half Moon Stations,

your Committee aiding in his support.

The cause was in a languishing condition when Elder Oliver removed to Onslow and began his work, but the prospects have brightened and we entertain the hope that in the near future he will reap the reward of his faithful and efficient labors. Elder Oliver is increasing in favor with the people and his influence becoming stronger constantly, and we earnestly recommend that he be continued in that field. The opposition has been very great, but is gradually wearing away. Five have been baptised

We have aided the Churches at Union, Lenoir County, and Fort Barnwell, Craven County, in sustaining Elder J. L. Britt their pastor. These are old Churches at very important points, which have been weak and unable to support pastors without aid. Elder Britt reports good congre-

unable to support pastors without and. Ender Britt reports good congregations and serious and earnest attention.

Elder W. M. Kennedy has recently occupied Burgaw, the new county site of Pender, preaching there monthly. He reports encouraging indications. This point ought to be cultivated, and the opportunity to establish a church there ought not to be lost.

Elder Geo. S. Best has been assisted in his field at Trenton Church and Nethercutts School House Station in Jones County, thereby enabling him to county, this important section and to preach for the church of the county.

## REPORT ON STATE AND HOME MISSIONS.

REPORT ON STATE AND HOME MISSIONS.

By reference to the Minutes of last year's meeting, it will appear that the Association decided that the report of the Committee on "Home Missions" should include State Missions, and that thereafter it should be called "Committee on State and Home Missions." Inasmuch as the report of your Executive Committee has given information concerning the work in our Associational bounds, it is not expected that we should specially refer to that. The State Mission Board, located at Baleigh, is earnestly engaged in the great work committed to their superintendence, and desire to enlist the sympathy and co-operation of our churches. Shall we not give it to them in some practical way?

The Home Mission Board located at Marion, Alabama, is one of the Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention. To this Board is committed the work of supplying with the gospel, the destitution in the Southern States and among the Indians. Nobly has it done the work. The showing of what has been accomplished under the auspices of our State and Domestic Boards, affords cause for gratitude to God. If so much has been wrought with so little money and effort what would be accomplished, if all our brethren and sisters, young and old, would unite to work and pray and give? In order to greater efficiency, our churches would perhaps do well to adopt some system for raising funds,—a system that will reach the entire membership. Let our pastors preach faithfully on the duty and grace and blessedness of giving to the Lord's cause, and let the Deacons and officers bring before their churches some well digested scheme for stated collections of money, and let us all pray God's blessing on our contributions, and that the Lord of the harvest will raise up and send forth more laborer's into the great field so white for the harvest.

## REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee learn that there have been some thirteen young ministers under the direction of the Board of Education during the past year, and the Board are able to state that this number have been sustained, in whole or in part, without forming any debt.

In accordance with a resolution of the Board last year presented to the Convention, and confirmed by that body, a short course of biblical instruction has been arranged at the College for those of our young ministers who may not be able to pursue a full classical course. This arrangement, it is hoped, will meet the wants of many who are already in the ministry, some who have families, and others not thus embarrassed,

but who may find it desirable to take a more thorough course. An increase of funds, of course, will be found essential in pursuing such a policy.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools submit the following: During the past year Sunday School Institutes have been held in different parts of our bounds, and we think that great good has been done by calling public atbounds, and we think that great good has been done by calling public attention to this important christian enterprise, but as we have not had access to the Church Letters, we cannot inform you whether there are more children in our Sunday Schools this year than last, or otherwise. We feel confident in saying that the work has a firmer hold upon the hearts of those engaged in it than ever before. In view of the vast field which opens before us, and of the amount of work to be done, we recommend the following: That this Association appoint a Sunday School Board, to be composed of five members, with instructions to take into consideration the propriety of putting a Sunday School Missionary and Colporteur in the field, whose duty it shall be, to visit the destitute places within our bounds and constitute Sunday Schools, and supply people with Sunday School and other religious literature; and that the Association take steps for raising the means to carry on this good work, if in the judgment of this Board it be practicable.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

It is to be regretted exceedingly that this subject does not receive that attention from our churches which its importance demands. Intemperance is an evil, a sin, which is doing more to cripple the cause of our Master, to hinder the progress of every christian enterprise than every other evil into which the christian is subject to fall. Four million dollars are spent annually in the United States for tobacco, and eight million for intoxicating liquors. Much of this amount coming from the pockets of Baptists, while the poor heathen are actually starving for the bread of life. Our missionaries lift up their voices and cry aloud to us for help, but we hear them not, our ears are deaf to all their entreaties.

We plead the excuse of poverty and consume our means upon our own lust. Brethren these things ought not so to be. Jesus says, "Greater love hath no man than this, that a man should lay down his life for his friends." But mark well the distinction. "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you." Hence, "Deny thyself, take up thy cross and follow me" "Hating ever the garments spotted by the flesh" "Shun every appearance of evil." "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches."

We do earnestly recommend and insist that our ministers give more

We do earnestly recommend and insist that our ministers give more attention to this subject in their respective fields and thereby correct and if possible remove an evil which must otherwise bring reproach and disgrace upon the cause of Him whom we profess to love.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee, for want of opportunity to compare the contributions of the present year with those of the past year, are unable to say whether there is increase or diminution of interest in the Foreign Mission work. We are assured, however, that the interest manifested by our churches generally in this department of Christian labor is by no means commensurate with its needs and great importance. It is a matter of profound regret that many of our churches are without both the information needed to engender zeal, and practicable plans for raising funds, in the behalf of Foreign Missions.

We believe that a wider circulation of the Foreign Mission Journal, which gives the needed information, would bring about a deeper interest in this great work and the adoption of plans by which our contributions would be largely increased. The reports from our missionaries are encouraging. Brother Taylor reports baptisms at several of the stations occupied by our missionaries in Italy.

At some of them baptism is administered almost every week. Brother Taylor has encountered most determined opposition in his efforts to build the Rome Chapel. With the blessing of God, the work will be carried on to completion. About \$4,000 more must be raised for this build-

#### OBITUARY OF BROTHER FRANCIS SAVAGE.

The Association will be pained to hear of the death of our venerable and much beloved Brother, Deacon Francis Savage. Brother Savage was born in Duplin County, in the year of our Lord 1809. He united with the Church at Island Creek and was baptized on the fifth Sabbath in April, 1843, in behalf of the church at this place, which was then about to be constituted. He was chosen Deacon of this Church soon after and continued to make a faithful and efficient officer until his death. He died Nov. 11th, 1877, after a lingering illness of several months.

The writer can bear witness that he bore his affliction with patient resignation and christian fortitude. Deacon Savage has left a record very rarely seen. As father, husband and grandfather, his example was all that the most exacting could desire. While as a member of Society and as a devoted member of the Church, he has in all his acts and in his noble christian life left with his bereaved widow, children and sincere friends, memories deeply hallowed and affectionately cherished.

In his last sickness he received all the attention, which devoted children, kind friends and medical aid could bestow, but all in vain; the shadow of the death angel's wing was early seen upon his brow, and soon the lineaments, which had carried joy and comfort so often to his household, were stilled in the calm repose of death.

## Constitution of the Eastern Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1—This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3—This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

ART. 4—The delegates from each church shall bear a letter, certifying their appointment, and communicating information relative to the state of the church; *Provided*, *however*, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be annually chosen from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6—It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7—It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9—The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have the power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ART. 10—The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of her churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11—The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them all the privileges of the body except that of voting.

ART. 12—The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13—By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

## Rules of Order.

1.—On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceeding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence, a chairman *pro tem.*, shall be elected.

2.—Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3.—At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily sessions read.

4.—The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes christians.

5.—Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6.—No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7.—All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8.—No motion shall be withdrawn after its discussion.

9.—When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, or postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10.—After a motion is decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11.—No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12.—All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13.—The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14.—The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority of votes.

#### Rules of Pecorum for the Churches.

1.—We will hold at least four Conference meetings in the year for the transaction of business, also special meetings whenever requisite.

2.—The names of the members shall be called at every regular meeting, and there shall be due notice taken of the absence of those who discover a disposition to absent themselves.

3.—At every Conference, the pastor, in his right of office, shall preside as Moderator, and in case of his absence, the Conference shall appoint a Moderator pro tem., who shall open Conference by devotional exercises.

4.—The Clerk shall keep a Church book, in which all the proceedings of the Conference shall be faithfully transcribed, and at every regular meeting the minutes of the preceeding meeting shall be read immediately after the names are called.

5—An invitation shall be given to brethren of our faith and order to sit with us in Conference, who shall enjoy all the privileges of the meeting except that of voting.

6.—Every subject for the consideration of the Conference shall be introduced by a motion, which when seconded, shall be debated and acted upon, unless withdrawn by the mover.

7.—Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother, and shall confine his remarks to the subject under debate and shall not be allowed to speak more than twice on one subject unless by permission of the Church.

8.—No member shall withdraw from the Conference without the permission of the Moderator.

9.—It shall be required that in matters of difference between members, before complaint is made to the Church, the aggrieved party shall have attended to the instructions of the Lord, Matt. 18th chapter, 16th, 17th and 18th verses, and public offences or such as operate against the peace of the Church, shall be the subject of discipline.

10.—All questions submitted to the Conference shall be decided by a majority of votes, except receiving members to fellowship; and any question may be reconsidered upon the motion of any who may vote in the affirmative.

11—The Moderator shall propound all questions for vote—shall keep the speakers to the subject under debate—may express his own views, after others are done speaking and see that these rules are faithfully observed.

12.—These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the whole Church.

Resolved, That this Association recommend the adoption of the foregoing rules to all the Churches that comprise this body.
