S. F. Conrad offered the following resolution:

Whereas, as the statistics as given out by the Governor of our State and those as gathered from other states show without question that as a crime producer the licensed saloon is without parallel in history—and also that as a means of demoralization and as an enemy of the home we cannot unduly magnify its evils. Therefore.-

Resolved, First. That we do hereby express for it and the legalized liquor traffic our unmeasured condemnation and appeal to our people in every proper way to put themselves on record in opposition to it and to cast their suffrages for

men who will stand out against it.

Resolved. Second. That we favor the submission of a constitutional amendment abolishing the manufacture and sale of liquor in the State, to the suffrage of the people of the State.

It was unanimously adopted. On motion adjourned for dinner recess.

Report on Education was read by W. T. Bryant, Moderator, having called D. W. Thomasson to the chair. The report was discussed by Prof. F. P. Habgood and S. F. Conrad and on motion adopted.

Place and Preacher reported and report accepted. Report of the Finance Committee was called and P. M. Sommers presented the report for the committee. On motion the report was adopted.

A report from the Harrelson Estate Fund was presented and on motion accepted. The Treasurer made his report and on motion the report was adopted and the Treasurer given power to make proper appropriations and prepare a report for the committee on Digest of Letters. The Woman's Missionary Society has revealed to us the chief place of women in the Church of Christ.

In this work the devotion to the study of missions and to systematic giving have borne such fruit as to command the respect of the state at large.

The contribution during the past year was twenty-one thousand nine hundred and eighty-two dollars and seventy-seven cents.

The establishing of a Baptist Woman's Training School in

Louisville, Ky., marks a new era in our denomination.

Within the Beulah Association we have five societies with about thirty-three members, which are doing very good work, and we trust that soon there will be a society in every church.

Your board continued the mission work under instructions of the Association on the same plan as heretofore. Work has been done on all the fields with good results. Lamberth Memorial, Blanch and Thompsonville churches all have good houses of worship, without debt, except a small amount on Thompsonville. These churches should be encouraged to undertake self-support as early as possible.

It is the conviction of your board that the Association should take up some new work next year. There are points at which mis-

sion work might be done with good results.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

"God is the author of Foreign Mission." The Lord loved a lost world so much that he gave his only Son that we might be saved. The Lord Jesus bought us with his own blood. He said to his disciples: "As my Father hath sent me even so send I you." Their commission is ours. He commands us to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. This is the work to which we, as individual Christians and churches, are committed. This great work should engage our thoughts, our purposes, our plans and above all, our prayers. Our people are not interested in this work as they should be. The Lord has greatly prospered us and instead of giving less than 20 cents per member we ought to be giving far more. There are now about 500 workers on the foreign fields. The missionaries are hopeful-conditions are changing. The heathen are listening to the gospel and many are accepting it. The missionaries are begging for more laborers. The heathen are calling for some one to tell them of the Saviour Shall we not go? New missionaries are being appointed from time to time. There is great need, then, of increased efforts on our part. The Saviour made a great sacrifice for us. We ought to sacrifice for his cause.

The Foreign Mission Board recommended to the convention in Richmond that we lay out the work on a basis of 750,000, nearly 100% over last year.

This means greatly increased efforts on our part.

HOME MISSIONS.

There has been quite an advance in Home Mission work in the last year. The needs of our home land have been constantly before us. The records in gifts to Home Missions has far surpassed any year of our history, the increase being \$52,929.35 from the States and \$2.493.40 from miscellaneous sources; total increase \$55.422.73. or 31 per cent. over last year.

Our missionaries report times of refreshing. Two years ago

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we reported 10,551 baptisms; last year 15,436; this year 18,798, an

average of fifty a day.

Yet these are but a part, and a small part of those hungry, perishing multitudes, whom, with a wholly compulsion, we are to bring to the great supper from the lanes and highways and hedges. Think of the foreigners that are now flooding our country, and they are turning Southward. God is sending the foreigners to us and is challenging our loyalty to him by this unparalleled opportunity to win the nations to the service of His son. So we see that the Home board has yet a great task and opportunity before it. The work among the negroes for several years has been a great work done by the Home Board. These people are greatly impressed and show signs of advancement.

As we look back upon the year we find it one of growth, and much to praise our Lord and Master for. Seeing the great work that is now before us, may each church increase its contribution. Our purpose in this life is to be used of Christ in bringing His gospel to all men, unless we do our part as planters and waterers

God is unable to do His part in giving the increase.

We return thanks to God for His blessings upon the work during the past year, and may His spirit come upon us, so that we will stand as His witnesses, reaching out with eager hearts to those in our own land, and to the uttermost parts of the earth.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Many of us do not realize the importance of State Missions. Because our Baptist cause seems so strong at many places, some forget that at other places there is great destitution. We are thankful that the Baptist cause is so strong in many parts of our State, but, let us remember that at many other places our cause is very weak, not being self-supporting and that in some parts of our State our cause is not represented at all.

Nearly all of our strong churches, at the present time, were once aided by the State Mission Board. Let us remember that we

have freely received and now let us freely give.

It seems that God has given to us, as a special trust, the preaching of the gospel to all the people of our State. Erom many points in our State it is many miles to the nearest place where our cause is represented. Let us, as Baptists, endeavor to place the gospel within the reach of every man, woman, boy and girl in North Carolina. As His disciples were commanded by our Saviour to preach the gospel "among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem," so let us strive to carry on "The Great Commission," not neglecting the cause in North Carolina.

We are working on a basis of forty thousand dollars for State Missions in North Carolina this year, but we are yet far from the goal. We must go forward with a strong effort for State Missions, being strengthened by our Saviour's loving words: "Lo,

I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

For 22 years we have had an Orphanage at Thomasville. Since its beginning we have cared for more than a thousand children.

There has from the beginning been a gradual growth in enlargement and equipment, and today we have present 343 children. During the past year there were sheltered and fed 373. Eighteen went home to live with their mothers or near relatives, six ran away, two have take positions of employment, two have been put into homes, one entered a preparatory school and one died.

Two new buildings were completed during the year and 56 children were received. Many improvements are being made: fifteen acres were added to the land in cultivation; a laundry has been installed; brick is being put on the ground for the Noah Richardson Library. The new water tank has been completed. The Davie Tabernacle was finished and used at the annual meeting. An addition was made to the Simons Nursery; a basement added to the dining room; about \$700 was expended for plumbing on the new buildings and repairs and improvements on others. Three thousand dollars in cash is in hand for the Infirmary. Altogether the outlook was never more cheering and hopeful than now. Our people are learning to contribute as regularly and feel it as much an obligation to support the Orphanage as they do their pastors. In a little while we will have the best equipped Orphanage in the southland and its marvelous growth and success shall be a cause for profound gratitude to God.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School is the church engaged in studying and teaching the Scripures. The duty of the church to the Sunday school may be outlined as follows: Concern about it, consideration for it, confidence in it, control of it, contribution to it, cooperation with it, culture in it and conquest through it.

We are glad to report that each church in our Association has a Sunday School and that there are two branch schools. While our Sunday school condition is gratifying in some respects there is much to be done. We urge that all our Sunday schools be kept open all the year and that in every way possible they be improved in attendance, equipment, organization, teaching power and spirit-

ual results

Our work in the State is progressing finely. We now have roundly 1500 Sunday schools with 10,000 officers and teachers, and an enrollment of 120,000. We are gaining rapidly but we ought to have at least 2,000 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 250,000. As an agency working for Sunday school progress in the State the S. S. Department of our State Convention is commended and in order to its support we urge each of our Sunday schools to make at least one offering a year for "Sunday School Missions" and forward same to the Treasurer of the Convention.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We, your committee, beg leave to report that Wake Forest College, The Baptist Female University, Oxford Female Seminary, Chowan Baptist Female Institute, all report the most prosperous session in their history. Dr. Lyman Abbot said in a recent number of the Outlook that "the advancement made in education during the past forty years by the South is without a parallel in history," and he mentions our beloved college, Wake Forest, as one of the factors in this advancement in our State.

Realizing the great importance of developing to its utmost capacity the brain and heart of our people, it behooves every Baptist in our State to stand loyally by our educational institutions. Wake Forest is asking of the Baptists of our State this year one hundred and twelve thousand five hundred dollars for increased endowment, and she must have it. Let every Baptist give what he can, whether the amount be large or small and success will be assured.

Ministerial education ought to have a more prominent place in our contributions. The demand today for ministers is greater than the supply; and we ought to see that every deserving young man who feels called of God to preach the gospel should have the very best possible training for his life work.

HIGH SCHOOLS. We have about 20 high schools in the State, and we ought never rest satisfied until we have one in the bounds of each association; these high schools are great feeders for our Colleges and University.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS. Let us, as Baptist, strive to increase the efficiency of the public schools, remembering that our State is making giant strides in the production of wealth. We must keep to the very front with public education.
