THE VIOLENCE OF NON-VIOLENCE

I knew Dr. John Burder Hipps in the late afternoon of his life. When I came to the Faculty in 1956 Dr. Hipps was in his last year as a teacher and was teaching only part-time. I soon became aware, however, from which he would never retire. To the end Dr. Hipps maintained a wholesome interest in the persons and purposes identified with Southeastern Seminary.

Dr. Hip s, a devote Baptist, was an ecumenical Christian. A loyal American citizen, his perspectives and commitments were world-wide. In his understanding of the Christian faith and life, and in politics, race relations and economic philosophy, J. R. Hipps was large-minded and liberalspirited. He eschewed narrowness and littleness, dogmatism and party spirit in seminary, church and community. An indication of his single minded devotion to these ideals was his steadfast faith and integrity to the conclusion of his pilgrimage.

Dr. Martin Luther King, after months of playing second filldle to the Carmichaels and Browns in the press, has finally stepped forward to announce that he is still the bellwether of the law-breakers. No Unthat his love for this school was something cle Tom he. Next month the Nobel Prize winner is going to show us how to shut down the nation's capital -- non-violently!

A veritable bundle of contridictions, Dr King can preach the gospel of non-violence on the one hand and state, on the other hand, that his purpose is to provoke violence by his opponents. But provocation to violence isn't the only evidence of the hypocracy of his avowed non-violent intentions. The Peace Prize recipient's methods rely upon the terror inspired by mobs to destroy the processes of constitutional government. He substitutes force and the threat of force for the more rational and legal channels of petition and appeal to the courts.

The present crisis of lawlessness in urban areas can largely be credited to Dr. King's sowing the seeds of disrespect for local and national laws. And, unfortunately, much of King's success is to the discredit of that portion of the clergy (including some Southern Daptists) who aid and abet his criminal endeavors.
