Report on Foreign Mission was submitted as follows :

#### Report on Foreign Missions.

From the facts before us, it is evident that we are yet in the A B C of Foreign Missions. The Southern Baptist Convention was organized Fortynine years ago, and now numbers about a million and a half of Baptists who are organized together for work—said to be the largest body of B pitists in any one organization in the world. Last year we contributed for Foreign Missions \$179,732.41—a fraction over eleven cents per member. In the report of the committee on contributions at the last Sou hern Baptist Convention, they say about a willion and a quarter of Baptists are doing nothing at all for this object. Multitudes of men and women now stand ready to enter the foreign field, but no means are provided to send them. In China, with four-hundred millions of souls, we have only thirty-eight missionaries, with three native preachers and tonty three native helpers. In Japan, with four native helpers. In Africa, with two-hundred millions of souls, e have nine missionaries, one or dained native preacher, and sisteene mative helpers. The Lord h is opened for us, also, wide fields of labor in for zil, Italy and Mexico. From the statistics of men and money, no work pays in raturns so handsomely as Foreign Missions. It is declared that from the money expended and laborers employed, more converts are reported from the foreign, than the home work. There needs to be more vigerous efforts put forth in this department; more earnest personal appeals for aid in this great work. Respectfully submitted,

On motion, the regular order of business was suspended, and the report on State Missions was presented as follows ::

#### Report on State Missions.

State Missions include all practical efforts to give the gospel to destituteplaces in North Carolina, In the bounds of this Association, Bro. D. J. Harris has been aided by \$100,00, at Ruffin. Here, the work is hopeful, and 'he out-look for a strong self-sustaining church, in the years to come. is encouraging. At Lea Bethel, Bro. E. S. Pearce has been aided with  $\$_{50.00}$ , and the work has been faithfully done. At Semora, Bro. J. R. Jones has been aided by  $\$_{25,00}$ . This is a new work, and the prospects are good. There are other places in this Association where our cause with the mean has been and suitable definition. could be established, if the Executive Committee had the means and suita-ble men to do the work could be secured. The Committee will be glad to enlarge the work as rapidly as the means are furnished to do so. In the State at large, eighty-five missionaries have been employed, and they are preaching at more than three-hundred destitute places. Among them are some of the most consecrated and successful preachers in N.rth Carolina. They have been greatly blessed in their work, this year. We recommend that the pastors and churches undertake to do more for State Missions this year than ever before. Respectfully submitted,

# Report on Home Missions read as follows :

# Report on Home Missions.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention comprises the Southern Stales. Indian Termory, Oklahoma and the island of Cuha. From the report of the Home Board for the year ending May 1st, 1894, we gather the following statistics :

Received during the year, about \$175.000,00 ; Missionaries under the Board, 381 ; weeks of labor, 16,289 ; churches and stations occupied 1229 ; sermons and addresses, 34,024; prayer meetings, 3.917; baptisms, 4,470; received by letter, 4, 39; total additions, 8, 509; Sunday-Schools, 429; pureceived by letter, 4, 939; total additions, 9, 59; Sunday-Schools, 429; put-pils and eachers, 19,381; religious visits 52,197; churches constituted, 133; houses of worship erected, 67; Bible and Testaments distributed, 1150, tracts distributed, 390,755. Of the amount of money received, North Car-olina paid' \$3,089,00. Of this, the Beulah Assoctation paid \$67.80. Brethren, this is a great work, and while much has been and is being done, let us not be satisfied until we have done all that is possible to lift.
