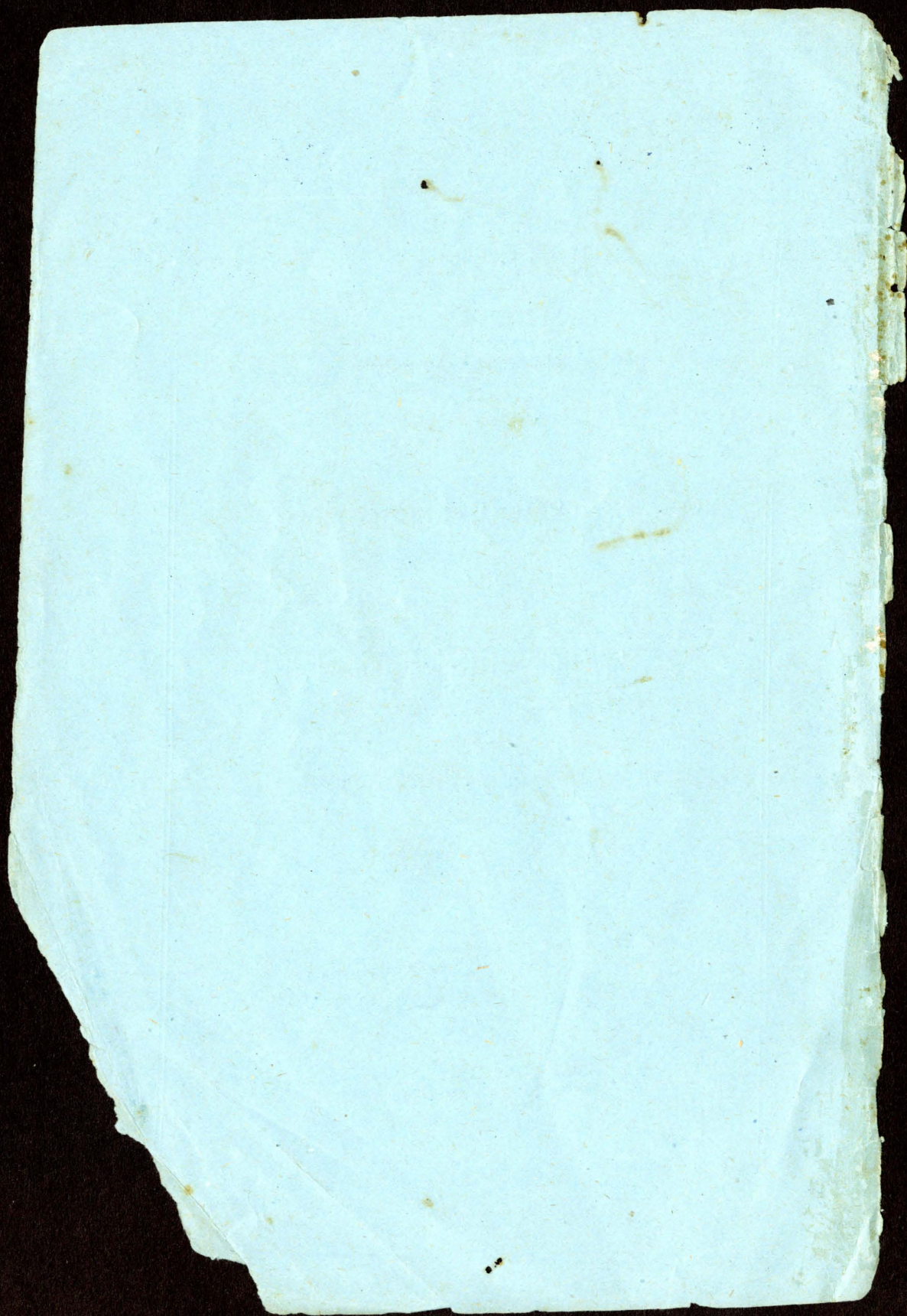

PROCEEDINGS.

KERR'S CHAPEL, N. C., AUGUST 7th, 1894.

THE Beulah Baptist Association met in its Sixtieth annual session with Kerr's Chapel Baptist Church, Caswell County, N. C., Tuesday, August 7th, 1894. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder S. F. Conrad at 11 A.M. after which there was an intermission.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association reconvened at 2 P. M., and was called to order by the Moderator and lead in prayer by Dr. John Mitchell. The roll of churches was called and delegates enrolled as follows:

On motion, the Association was organized permanently, by the re-election, by acclamation, of J. R. Jones, Moderator, F. P. Tucker, Clerk, and the election of B. S. Graves, Treasurer.

Visiting brethren were invited to represent themselves, and the following were recognized:

J. C. Caddell, representing the *Biblical Recorder*; Dr. John Mitchell, the Board of Ministerial Education; Bro. Peterson, *North Carolina Baptist*; C. Durham, Cor. Sec'y, Baptist State Convention; and S. F. Conrad,

Cor. Messenger from Pilot Mountain Association.

On motion, the Pastor and Deacons of Kerr's Chapel church were appointed a Committee on Religious Exercises, during the session of the Association.

Report on Periodicals of last year was read as follows:

Report on Periodicals.

We recommend the *Biblical Recorder*, for sixty-one years the organ of the Baptists of the State, both true and true; *Charity and Children*; *Foreign Mission Journal*; *Our Home Field*; *The North Carolina Baptist*, and the Sunday-School series published by the Southern Baptist Convention.

All of these papers come to us with the best thinking and doing of the age. The news of the day brought to us from the different departments of our work is a mighty power for good. Let us use this magic power. Respectfully submitted.

Pending the motion to adopt, the subject was ably discussed by Bro. Peterson, of the *North Carolina Baptist*, J. C. Caddell, of the *Biblical Recorder*, S. F. Courad and the Moderator. Report adopted.

On motion brethren J. R. Jones, F. P. Tucker and L. E. Walker were elected delegates to the Baptist State Convention, and D. J. Harris, alternate; J. R. Jones, delegate to Southern Baptist Convention; B. S. Graves, alternate.

On motion the hours for meeting were arranged as follows, viz: Meet at 9 A. M., adjourn at 12 M. Meet at 2 P. M., adjourn at will. Adjourned with Long Metre Doxology and Benediction by Moderator.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION, Wed. Aug. 8th.

Devotional Exercises.—Singing, reading the Scriptures, and prayer by Bro. Luther S. S. "Oh! for a closer walk with God," and prayer by Bro. Tucker. Association called to order by the Moderator. Report on Foreign Mission was submitted as follows :

Report on Foreign Missions.

From the facts before us, it is evident that we are yet in the A B C of Foreign Missions. The Southern Baptist Convention was organized Forty-nine years ago, and now numbers about a million and a half of Baptists who are organized together for work—said to be the largest body of Baptists in any one organization in the world. Last year we contributed for Foreign Missions \$179,732.41—a fraction over eleven cents per member. In the report of the committee on contributions at the last Southern Baptist Convention, they say about a million and a quarter of Baptists are doing nothing at all for this object. Multitudes of men and women now stand ready to enter the foreign field, but no means are provided to send them. In China, with four-hundred millions of souls, we have only thirty-eight missionaries, with three native preachers and twenty-three native helpers. In Japan, with forty millions of souls, we have only ten young men with their wives and four native helpers. In Africa, with two-hundred millions of souls, we have nine missionaries, one ordained native preacher, and sixteen native helpers. The Lord has opened for us, also, wide fields of labor in Brazil, Italy and Mexico. From the statistics of men and money, no work pays in returns so handsomely as Foreign Missions. It is declared that from the money expended and laborers employed, more converts are reported from the foreign, than the home work. There needs to be more vigorous efforts put forth in this department; more earnest personal appeals for aid in this great work. Respectfully submitted,

Pending motion to adopt, the subject was discussed by brethren Conrad and Durham. Report adopted and pledges taken.

On motion, the regular order of business was suspended, and the report on State Missions was presented as follows :

Report on State Missions.

State Missions include all practical efforts to give the gospel to destitute places in North Carolina. In the bounds of this Association, Bro. D. J. Harris has been aided by \$100.00, at Ruffin. Here, the work is hopeful, and the out-look for a strong self-sustaining church, in the years to come,

is encouraging. At Lea Bethel, Bro. E. S. Pearce has been aided with \$50.00, and the work has been faithfully done. At Semora, Bro. J. R. Jones has been aided by \$25.00. This is a new work, and the prospects are good. There are other places in this Association where our cause could be established, if the Executive Committee had the means and suitable men to do the work could be secured. The Committee will be glad to enlarge the work as rapidly as the means are furnished to do so. In the State at large, eighty-five missionaries have been employed, and they are preaching at more than three-hundred destitute places. Among them are some of the most consecrated and successful preachers in North Carolina. They have been greatly blessed in their work, this year. We recommend that the pastors and churches undertake to do more for State Missions this year than ever before. Respectfully submitted,

Pending motion to adopt the report, Bro. Harris spoke in the interest and future prospects of the work at Ruffin. Bro. Pearce represented the work at Lea Bethel as being very promising, and requested the prayers of the churches in behalf of the cause there. Bro. Jones made encouraging statements as to the future outlook at Semora. Bro. Durham presented a strong plea for the general work of State Missions. Public collection was taken for this object. Report adopted and pledges taken.

Bro. Conrad made a statement in reference to the debt on Ruffin church and Bro. D. J. Harris offered the following resolution:

Whereas, Bro. S. F. Conrad, has done a good work for the cause of the Master and Baptists in building a good house of worship at Ruffin, and

Whereas, he has assumed, in the building of this house, the entire financial responsibility, having paid the contractors in full for the work, thus assuming HIMSELF, an indebtedness of \$800.00; and,

Whereas, this is as much our work as his, therefore

Resolved, That this Association undertake to raise \$300.00 of this debt, and that pastors and delegates be called upon to designate such amounts as they will try to pay by May 1st, 1895.

Prof. F. P. Hobgood, of Oxford Female Seminary, was recognized, and invited to a seat in the Association. Rev. M. A. Adams, the new pastor of the Reidsville church, was introduced to the Association, and invited to take part in the proceedings. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

SINGING — "In the Sweet Bye-and-Bye." Prayer, by brother M. A. Adams. Association called to order by the Moderator.

Report on Education offered as follows:

Report on Education.

Resolved, 1st, That we recommend that our people shall seek to the fullest extent possible to educate their children in common and private schools, in academies and in male and female colleges.

2nd, That we recommend that our Baptist people shall patronize their own institutions as far as is practicable.

3rd, That we recommend that every pastor in the Association preach at least one sermon during the coming year on the duty of parents to educate their children.

4th, That we commend to the confidence of the churches the work of the Board of Education of our Convention.

Pending motion to adopt, Dr. Mitchell and Bro. M. A. Adams addressed the Association in the interest of Ministerial Education. Pledges taken.

The subject of general education was discussed by Bro. Durham in a strong speech, in which he showed the present policy of the State with reference to higher education,

to be injurious both to the denominational colleges and the common schools. Report adopted.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 9TH.—MORNING SESSION.

Devotional Exercises.—Singing, and prayer by Brother Durham. Minutes read and approved.

The request of Reidsville Church for a letter of dismissal from the Association was, on motion, granted. A similar request from Greensboro Church was granted on condition embodied in the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Greensboro Church has failed to comply with the instructions of the last Association, to pay all State Mission funds into the hands of the Associational Executive Committee, to be by them applied at their discretion; and

Whereas, The Executive Committee has incurred obligations to the missionaries on the basis of the pledges of the churches to State Missions, therefore,

Resolved, That the Clerk be, and is hereby instructed to grant Greensboro church a letter of dismissal on the condition that the church pay into the hands of the Treasurer of the Executive Committee of the Beulah Association, at least half the funds shown by church letter to the Association to have been collected for State Missions during the year just closed.

The Committee to nominate a new Executive Committee reported the following:

F. P. Tucker, Wm. M. Faulkner, E. G. Covington, Wm. Lea and C. J. Yarbrough.

Report on Home Missions read as follows :

Report on Home Missions.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention comprises the Southern States, Indian Territory, Oklahoma and the island of Cuba. From the report of the Home Board for the year ending May 1st, 1894, we gather the following statistics :

Received during the year, about \$175,000.00 ; Missionaries under the Board, 381 ; weeks of labor, 16,289 ; churches and stations occupied 1229 ; sermons and addresses, 34,024 ; prayer meetings, 3,917 ; baptisms, 4,470 ; received by letter, 4,039 ; total additions, 8,509 ; Sunday-Schools, 429 ; pupils and teachers, 19,381 ; religious visits 52,197 ; churches constituted, 133 ; houses of worship erected, 67 ; Bible and Testaments distributed, 1150 ; tracts distributed, 390,755. Of the amount of money received, North Carolina paid \$3,089.00. Of this, the Beulah Association paid \$67.80.

Brethren, this is a great work, and while much has been and is being done, let us not be satisfied until we have done all that is possible to lift our fallen brotherhood up to God. Respectfully submitted,

Pending adoption, the Association was spoken to by Bro. Durlam, who called special attention to the work among the Indians, the foreign population in the West and the success of the work in Cuba.

Report on Sunday-Schools of last year was offered as follows :

Report on Sunday-Schools.

We should have a ' Sunday School in every church ; the best possible Sunday-School in every church ' within the bounds of the Beulah Association. There are many destitute places, more or less distant from our churches, where the brethren should also establish a Sabbath School. We can scarcely estimate the influence of Sunday-School work in every kind of Christian enterprise. Respectfully submitted!

Pending motion to adopt, Bro. Thos. Slade spoke with special reference to the necessity of organizing Sunday-Schools in destitute communities. A very interesting discussion was had, embracing every phase of Sunday-School work ; brethren Harris, Rominger, Adams, Pearce and Profs Poteat and Hobgood, participating. Report adopted. Adjourned, with the benediction.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Devotional Exercises. Association called to order by the Moderator.

Report of Treasurer read and adopted.

On motion, a committee was appointed to report at the next session on Ministerial Relief, and the pastors and churches were urged to take collection for this object, this year.

On motion, the churches were instructed to pay their State Mission funds into the hands of the Executive Committee, to be applied at their discretion.

The claims of the Thomasville Orphanage upon all the churches for support were clearly presented and the following resolutions adopted:

Resolved, 1st. That the pastors and churches in this Association be urged to give each congregation an opportunity during this year to contribute to the support of the Orphanage at Thomasville.

Resolved, 2nd. That all the Sunday-Schools be requested to take at least one collection a month for this work.

The Executive Committee settled in part with the missions by paying out all funds in hand, as follows:

D. J. Harris, Ruffin, \$53.40; E. S. Pearce, Lea Bethel, \$25.00; J. K. Howell, Lea Bethel, (last year,) \$12.50, and J. R. Jones, Semora, \$12.00.

Resolution of Thanks.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association are hereby tendered to the citizens of this community and members of this church for the hospitable manner in which they have entertained this body during its session in their midst.

Adopted by standing vote.

By special request, Dr. John Mitchell lead the Association in prayer in behalf of Bro. C. J. Yarbrough and sister Lea, who were unable to be present on account of sickness.
