PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 22, 1985, EVENING SESSION

The 51st Annual Session of the Randolph Baptist Association was called to order on Tuesday evening, October 22, 1985 at 7:00 P.M. at Huldah Baptist Church.

1. Carl King led the association in the singing of "Savior, Like A Shepherd Lead Us."

2. Carl Zeigler, vice moderator, recognized host pastor, Wayne Vuncannon for the reading of scripture and prayer. From the scriptures, Rev. Vuncannon spoke to us on the need for us to join together for the same purpose: that of serving our Lord here in Randolph Association. Rev. Vuncannon also issued a welcome to everyone while here at Huldah.

3. The 51st session of the Randolph Baptist Association was duly constituted by the Clerk, Mrs. Pat Smith, proclaiming that those already registered and those that will register from our member churches later, constitute the 51st session.

4. Chairman of the Program Committee, James Cain, presented the program for approval.

5. Don McIntyre was recognized. He promoted the upcoming film "Cry From the Mountain." Training for counseling concerning the film will be held at Balfour Church on October 27-28.

6. New pastors were presented to the association by Director of Missions, Judson Rotan.

7. Executive Committee report was given by Mrs. Pat Smith. She spoke to the association on the need for each church to elect a representative. Each church needs to be at each meeting as business is transacted between sessions. The report was approved.

8. Kermit Gray presented the report on Committee on Committees. He moved for the adoption of the report and it was approved as presented.

9. Mrs. Pat Smith gave the Treasurer's report. It was approved. She took this time to express thanks to the 10 churches that increased their giving to associational missions for 1984-85 year.

10. The chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee, Alton Cook, presented the budget for 1985-86. Time was allowed for discussion before voting to adopt the budget. It was approved as presented.

11. Mrs. Pat Smith recognized the top 5 clerks for sending in their UCL first. They are: 1. Ramseur, First — Mrs. Kathryn Bray; 2. Randleman, First — Mrs. Dottie Cross; 3. Union Grove — Bobby Stutts; 4. Riverside — Mrs. Vallen Maness; 5. Gravel Hill — Mrs. Barbara Bean.

12. Director of Missions presented his report for approval. It was approved. He expressed his appreciation for the support of the association. He shared the highlights of this year. Two that we remember the most were: 1. ACTS/BTN becoming a reality. 2. The Commissioning Service for the Connells and

Roberts. He expressed appreciation to Mrs. Pat Smith, office secretary, for her 10 years of service to the association.

13. Emphasis for "GOOD NEWS AMERICA, GOD LOVES YOU" Crusades was presented. The following spoke concerning their area of involvement: EVANGELISM — Carl King; PEOPLE SEARCH/SCRIPTURE DISTRIBUTION — Gene Hopkins; PASTORS' FELLOWSHIP — Larry Pugh; SPIRITUAL PREPARATION — Bob Blanton; and PROMOTION — Roger Pritchard.

14. Evangelism Report was presented by Carl King, Chairman. It was approved.

15. Concerning Missions, the Director of Missions introduced Mark Spain who is working as a mission pastor in Morgantown, West Virginia. At present we have eight churches giving on a monthly basis to this mission in West Virginia. Mark has worked in pioneer missions and as a US-2er. Mark spoke briefly of his work in West Virginia and the 81% that are unchurched in Morgantown.

16. During the 1985-86 associational year, we hope to do some survey work in the Level Cross/Providence area for the possibility of establishing a mission church. The Director of Missions gave a progress report of Cedar Grove Baptist Mission. They have purchased land and are anticipating building soon. They have 45 members with an average attendance of 35 weekly.

17. Victory Baptist Church, being under watchcare for one year, was unanimously accepted as a member of Randolph Baptist Association. Johnny Henderson was recognized as pastor. The vice moderator welcomed all members of Victory as new members to our association. Rev. Henderson spoke on looking forward to working together with all our churches and being a part of Randolph Association.

18. Congregation sang, "At The Cross" led by Carl King. Mrs. Malcolm Strider was at the piano.

19. Tim Strider, pastor of Clear View Church, prepared us for worship by the reading of Luke 4:18-19. He then led in prayer.

20. Special music was presented by the choir of Asheboro, First Baptist Church led by David Thomas.

21. Vice Moderator, Carl Zeigler, introduced Dr. Alton Cook, pastor of Mt. Pleasant Church as being our speaker for this session. Dr. Cook shared with us the need for all of us to tell others that Jesus Christ loves us. Nothing can take precedence over that. We must set our priorities. It must be God first, people second. We must all have one plan: GO AND TELL.

22. It was reported that 246 were registered as messengers for the 51st annual session.

23. Rev. Vuncannon invited all to the fellowship area for refreshments.

24. Prayer was requested for 3 of our pastors in Chile on a preaching mission, especially for Rod Beale. His father died and he is on his way home. Gene Hopkins was asked to dismiss us with prayer.

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1985, MORNING SESSION

25. The morning session of the 51st Annual Session was called to order by our Vice-Moderator, Carl Zeigler.

26. Leverette Strider, Music Director of host church, led in the singing of "When We All Get To Heaven." Mrs. Wanda Brown was at the piano.

27. Kenneth Warner, pastor of host church, welcomed the association to Center Cross. He read from John 4:28-35 reminding us that many people are ready to be harvested for Jesus Christ. Mrs. Susan Warner presented us with special music.

28. Nominating Committee report was presented by Wayne Vuncannon. It was approved. Rev. Vuncannon spoke of the need for all areas to be filled. There are several vacancies of positions that need to be filled.

29. The report of the Time, Place, and Preacher report was given by Bill Barnes. It was approved as presented.

30. In the absence of Marvin Caviness, chairman of Building and Grounds Committee, this report was presented for approval by Judson Rotan. It was approved.

31. Hansel Neatherly presented the Historical Report.

32. Visitors Recognized: Jim Sauls — Retirement Homes; Tiny Ingalls — Hospital; Max Evans — Children's Homes; Joe Clontz — Baptist Student Unions; and Mrs. Cleo Perry — Meredith College.

33. Grady Blakely reported that the Homes for Aging report is in the Book of Reports and asked that it be accepted as presented. It was accepted.

34. Jim Sauls spoke on the progress of the Homes for the Aging. He reported that 60 cents of every dollar goes to benevolent care. As of November 1, Bill Stillerman will be the new President of Baptist Retirement Homes for N.C.

35. Wayne Vuncannon presented the Baptist Hospital report. It was approved.

36. Tiny Ingalls from the Baptist Hospital reported that we could be proud of our Baptist Hospital heritage and our association with it. We try to deal with the whole person during their stay there. Our association is seen as a ministry.

37. The Children's Home report can be found in the Book of Reports.

38. Max Evans of the Children's Homes shared with us the needs of the children that come to the Homes. They have emotional and spiritual needs. Through continued ministry of N.C. Baptists many children have accepted Christ as Savior. Mr. Evans also told of their plans to celebrate their 100th birthday.

39. Under "Good News for Organizational Leadership" the Sunday School report was presented for approval by Kenneth Warner.

40. Church Training also was presented for approval by Judson Rotan.

41. Mrs. Nancy King, Associational WMU Director, gave the WMU report and shared of upcoming plans and needs with the WMU organization. Her report was accepted.

42. Brotherhood report was presented by Bobby Poole. Report was moved for adoption. It was accepted as presented.

43. The Director of Missions recognized our vice-moderator, Carl Zeigler, as having a birthday today. "Happy Birthday" was sung to him.

44. Leverette Strider led the association in singing "Love Lifted Me." Mrs. Wanda Brown was at the piano.

45. The adoption of Christian Education report was requested by Reginald Dawkins. It was approved.

46. Joe Clontz who represented North Carolina Baptist Student Unions spoke to us. Volunteers are essential for the continuance of this program.

47. Mrs. Cleo Perry also spoke at this time of our Baptist colleges and their influence on our young people's lives. She represented Meredith College.

48. Mark Spain was introduced by Judson Rotan as being mission pastor to Morgantown, West Virginia. Mark spoke on "birthing a church." He read from Acts 11 and 13. Mark also shared his slides of areas of his work in West Virginia.

49. Stan Haywood led the association in a time of prayer for the upcoming crusades in March, 1986. "We must pray revival if we want 'GOOD NEWS AMERICA, GOD LOVES YOU' to become a reality."

50. Christian Life and Public Affairs report was presented by Bob Pratt. Rev. Pratt spoke briefly of our need to support the efforts of this agency as we try to meet the needs of the times in which we're living. He moved for the adoption of this report and it was approved.

51. Annuity report was given by Justus McKeel. Rev. McKeel spoke of the Board's open invitation to join the Life Insurance and Health Care plan for pastors. The report was adopted.

52. Cooperative Program report was presented by Carl King and it was approved.

53. Mrs. Ruth Hopkins read the Appreciation Report and expressed appreciation to both Huldah and Center Cross for their hospitality to the association.

54. Hansel Neatherly presented the Christian Literature report and it was approved.

55. Leverette Strider led the congregation in singing "Near The Cross."

56. R. T. Smith and W. E. Eaton presented the Memorial service. The names of the deceased were read. Rev. Smith said that "a memorial service for a Christian should not be a sad affair but a time of celebration and joy."

57. It was declared that 196 were registered as messengers for the second day of the 51st Annual Session.

58. The Director of Missions gave an up-to-date progress report of ACTS/BTN. He reported that soon ACTS will be here and be on Channel 25 on your cable stations. Five churches have formed the ACTS Board. They are Asheboro, First; Balfour, Cross Road, Greystone, and Ramseur, First. BTN is very alive and meeting the needs of many of our churches. It is keeping the office very busy just to keep the taping done. We see this as an effective tool of training and inspiration for our churches.

59. Rev. Rotan took this time for promoting the Associational Priorities Goals for 1986. Three areas of planning must take place if we do not want our people to perish from no vision. 1) Reaching People, 2) Develop and Strengthen Believers, and 3) Fellowship. Communication is one way we seek to provide a sense of unity among the association.

60. Bob Loman, representative from Wingate College, briefly spoke of the fact that North Carolina has the strongest Christian education system in the United States.

61. "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus" was sung by the association with Leverette Strider directing and Mrs. Wanda Brown at the piano.

62. Special music was presented by a group from the host church.

63. Bob Blanton, Jr., pastor of Balfour Church, spoke to the association on "The Sin of Silence." Reading from 2 Kings 7, he said that to all problems God has a solution. God uses people to help meet the needs of our problems. God uses common people; courageous people; convinced people; contented people; and convicted people.

64. Host pastor extended an invitation for lunch to everyone.

65. Vice Moderator asked R. L. Hughes to dismiss with prayer.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee is to act for and on behalf of the association between sessions, carrying out the objectives and mission of the association. It is very important that every church in the association be represented at each meeting and participate in the affairs of the association. The committee is composed of the officers of the association plus the Director of the association, the pastor, and one lay-person from each cooperating church.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

This has been a year of opportunity for service to many of our churches through pulpit supply, teaching and training opportunities. For all of this I am grateful to you and to God. There have been many rewarding experiences and some disappointments. Some of our hopes, such as our plans for the Deacons Training Conference did not work out because of weather and sickness; but we shall continue to plan for this area of training in the months and years ahead.

Your Director of Missions has had a busy year and we are very conscious of the Lord's blessings on us and the evidence of the Holy Spirit among us. We have tried to visit the churches as time permitted and enjoyed the wonderful fellowship with the fine people of our Baptist churches. During this year I have been in 31 of our 42 churches.

Many hours have been spent with pastor selection committees (or the pulpit committee) in trying to assist churches in finding the shepherd God would have them to have as a pastor. Part of my work has been spent trying to keep churches from finding the wrong one. There are many wolves in sheep's clothing. I can truthfully say our churches have called some fine men of God as pastors which is a credit to them and a great asset to the association. Many of our churches have learned not to be in a hurry and to be more selective and careful in the calling of a pastor.

It is heartening to see churches in our association broadening their vision and looking out unto the fields that are white unto harvest and are doing something about it. The churches that are reaching out are the ones that God is abundantly blessing. We are praying and hoping for a great increase in baptisms and in Sunday School enrollments during this past year.

This has been a good year with good attendance in our conferences and workshops but we still hope for better participation. Not for the sake of attending a meeting but to train our people to be better servants of our Lord. Over 75 persons were in attendance for our Key Leadership Conference in September. These are our key leaders for our churches. We believe that this is a significant meeting.

Several outstanding events took place during the year that we must never forget. First, the installation of BTN - Baptist Telecommunication Network in our associational office. The network is offering **information** and **training** and **inspiration** to our church leadership. Most of our churches participated in raising around \$5,000 of the total cost of \$9,000 during April, May, and June of this year. I, along with our Moderator, Vernon McDaniel, attended the National Conference in Atlanta, Georgia on ACTS/BTN in April. This was a great help in starting BTN in our association. Around 10-12 of our churches are using the video tapes in their churches with the training of Sunday School teachers with Sunday School lessons and with the Mission Update and various other training tapes. It has become an exciting tool for our churches in training. Many more of our churches will begin using BTN during this next year. It has kept us busy in the associational office taping and reproducing the

tapes for our churches. It was an open door of opportunity that our association accepted.

Also five of our churches have purchased ACTS - The American Christian Television System - for our local cable company. This network is produced by The Radio and Television Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention. There have been several delays in starting date because of equipment needed at the local cable company. But we are hopeful that soon the network will be on channel 25. Yes, this too is an open door of opportunity to share the gospel of Jesus Christ and some good clean entertainment for our community. I believe God will truly bless our witness and ministry through ACTS.

A second event that was outstanding this past year was the Missionary Commissioning Service that we had for two of our pastors and their families who followed God's call to foreign missions. They were Dennis Connell, pastor of Shady Grove Church going to Japan and Rob Roberts, pastor of Oakhurst Church going to Uruguay. This service was conducted at First Baptist Church, Asheboro with the auditorium filled with persons from our churches. It was a great service of worship, testimonies from these pastors and commitment of our support and prayers. This was a historical occasion for our association with two pastors and their families being appointed by the Foreign Missions Board at the same time in May. We thank God for this challenging experience in the life of our association.

A third outstanding event and ministry is the new work that has been started in our association. God has blessed in a great way the Cedar Grove Mission that has been meeting in our associational office since last January. During this past year they have purchased land out on Old Hwy. 49 toward Farmer and plan to begin construction of the first unit next year. Also the new church at Seagrove, Victory Baptist Church has seen great growth as it is now building their new building on Hwy. 220 near Seagrove. Each of these new works has given a new witness to new persons in these areas. To God be praised. It is said and it is a fact that new work grows and reaches more people than old works.

Several years ago the theme of the Week of Prayer for Associational Missions Week was "THE ASSOCIATION, A FAMILY OF CHURCHES". We are a family of churches on mission for Christ in our setting - RANDOLPH COUNTY. Central to the making of a good association in fellowship, cooperation, unity, and ministry. Let us continue during this next year to work on Bold Mission goals through 1990 as we will be seeing to emphasize and set goals to (1) reach people (2) develop believers and (3) strengthen missions. We hope to proclaim the gospel to every person in all the world by the end of the century. I believe it can be done if every Christian would take this seriously.

My deepest thanks and appreciation goes to the wonderful people in our churches and to the splendid pastors who make up our association. I am indebted to your prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement in our work among you. I love serving the Lord in Randolph Association. Also my deepest thanks is expressed to our loyal and faithful office secretary, Mrs. Pat Smith, whose help, support, and encouragement has enabled us to make this work more effective. This year she completes ten years of service to the Randolph Baptist Association.

The challenge is before us as Christians today are probably the greatest opportunities ever. Let us commit ourselves to our Lord and the work He has

MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Missions Committee has met four (4) times during the year to fulfill our responsibilities. The committee was concerned with three areas this year; new work, volunteers in missions; and mission endeavors outside the association.

We had a request from the Calvary Baptist Church in Morgantown, West Virginia to help in Pastoral Assistance. So this past year we have tried to get individuals, churches or mission groups to help support Mark Spain who has been called as the mission pastor in Morgantown, West Virginia. Our goal was to send at least \$300.00 a month to the mission for this support. We have been unsuccessful in reaching our goal thus far. We have been collecting around \$125.00 each month. Because of the MAP program and persons participating in giving to MAP, we have been able to send \$250.00 each month. The following churches or groups have participated in giving toward this pastoral assistance: BALFOUR - CEDAR GROVE - SEAGROVE, FIRST - RAMSEUR, FIRST - HULDAH - GLENOLA - OAKWOOD PARK - CENTER CROSS. We would urge other churches to join us this year in giving \$10-\$15-\$25 per month toward the pastoral assistance in Morgantown, West Virginia.

We were not able to get anything started on the ZOO AREA MINISTRY this year. Because of legislation concerning religious groups on state property, we had to discontinue our work and ministry at the Zoo. We are hoping to find some means of ministry next year. We pray for doors to be opened so that we as a committee can function in more areas.

There are still several areas in the county where new work could be begun. The committee will seek to survey these areas possibly during the next year. It is hoped that next summer we would be able to get a summer worker to do, among other things, some survey work around the Level Cross-Providence Township area. This is the area with the most potential for a new work.

The two church missions have progressed greatly during the past year. The Cedar Grove Mission, with a sponsoring church of First Baptist, Asheboro, have purchased property at the corner of Old 49 and Brickyard Road and will hopefully build this coming year the first unit. They are presently meeting in the associational building with around 35-40 on an average Sunday.

The Victory Baptist Church has grown rapidly this past year and are in the midst of building their new facility on Hwy. 220 near Seagrove. The Missions Committee has received excellent reports from their ministry and mission work. We would recommend tonight that the Victory Baptist Church, which has been under watchcare for one year, be accepted into the Randolph Baptist Association. The following is a report of their work during the past year:

- Baptized six people and presently have 11 awaiting baptism.
- Met a Lottie Moon goal of \$4,000.00. Contributed \$2,000.00 to the Cooperative Program. Gave \$400.00 to Associational Missions.
- Assisted local efforts by contribution of \$500.00 to the Freddie Gage Crusade and \$200.00 to Concerned Citizens of Asheboro. It was our pleasure to work and support these endeavors.
- Participated in a successful church bond sale of \$350,000.00 in 90 hours.
- Awarded a \$363,000.00 building contract to Colin Cheek Construction Building Company. Building is presently under construction and completion date should be February 15, 1986.
- Church sponsored pastor, John Henderson, in a foreign mission preaching tour to Indian Ocean Island of Mauritius. While there the pastor worked closely with Southern Baptist Convention missionaries.
- Recently voted to begin WMU, Brotherhood, and all age-level mission organizations.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Nineteen hundred eighty-four will go down in Annuity Board annals as a good year of growth, response, planning and achievement. It dawns as a year brimming with ongoing opportunities of ministry to churches and agencies. The following report gives the highlights of last year's financial success.

1. A 10 percent 13th Check was mailed to annuitants who retired before 1980. Those annuitants who retired in 1980-84 received their 13th Check bonus in their monthly checks.

2. A total of \$36,212,973 was paid in retirement benefits.

3. Total assets administered by the board as of Dec. 31, 1984 was \$1,430,966,407 compared to \$1,251,643,084 on Dec. 31, 1983.

4. Relief funds from the Cooperative Program totalled \$493,354.

5. A record 14,011 annuitants received benefits from the Annuity Board in 1984.

6. Earnings on retirement and related funds for 1984 totalled \$115,374,232.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Baptist Hospital is committed to making available to its patients the most advanced medical technology in an atmosphere of Christian caring.

New technology brought into service during the past year includes a magnetic resonance scanner which uses a strong magnetic field, radio waves, and computer techniques to obtain images of the body's organs and tissues without using ionizing radiation. During the past year, the hospital also introduced a procedure to remove kidney stones by passing a large needle into the kidney and then breaking up the stones with ultrasound or snaring them with a tiny basket. Medical Center cardiologists have helped to develop a dual-chamber pacemaker which helps to regulate the pace of an ailing heart so that its function is more similar to that of a healthier heart. Also, cardiologists are now using streptokinase to effectively dissolve clots in the coronary arteries. In another development, many cancer patients are now benefiting from a new device which makes intravenous injections of drugs unnecessary. Our Medical Center surgeons helped develop this device called a Port-A-Cath. One other seemingly small development this year, but with important consequences, is the discovery by pediatricians that partial bathing of babies in the intensive care nursery rather than total bathing allows the body temperature to remain constant instead of dropping.

These new discoveries help assure Baptist Hospital patients of a high quality of professional care. Equally important, however, is the emotional and spiritual environment in which this care is provided. Through department staff meetings, through staff education programs, through an ongoing program of new employee orientation, the hospital seeks to preserve an atmosphere of Christian caring and concern. The specific functions of the Pastoral Care Department and the Patient Relations Department contribute to the hospital's effort to minister "with skill and understanding."

During the past year, our hospital admitted 25,140 patients for a total of 213,038 days of care. Ambulatory patient visits including the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics totalled 243,096. The hospital has 701 licensed beds, employs 3,537 persons and has an operating budget of \$124,187,316. The Department of Pastoral Care made 57,849 visits with patients, family members, and employees and provided 21,194 hours of counseling through the Winston-Salem center and the various satellites.

Last year, North Carolina Baptists gave their hospital \$541,255.16 in

financial support through the Cooperative Program and \$367,712.33 through the North Carolina Missions offering. The hospital staff and the patients are deeply grateful for this continuing support.

The hospital is currently involved in another expansion program which will include new parking areas, a new inpatient tower, a clinical services building, and additions to the power plant as well as renovation and alterations of existing space. The total cost of this project is estimated at \$86,344.00.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES' REPORT

The mission of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina, Inc. is to care for dependent, neglected and homeless children; emotionally disturbed children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives. The broad purpose of the Institution embraces services directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, whenever possible, the placement of the child away from home.

During this our 100th year of quality child care, the Trustees, staff and President Michael C. Blackwell, pledge anew our commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this Christian institution of caring as we enter our second century of service. In our Centennial year we served 1,517 children and 1,167 families.

With the Governor's proclamation of May 19, 1985 as "Baptist Children's Homes Day", the centennial celebration was well on its way. Phil Young of Henderson, was commissioned to write "Praise Book," a musical about children and families. The musical was performed by adult and children's choirs in 11 Baptist churches across the state. Dr. Alan Keigh-Lucas wrote, *A Hundred Years of Caring*, an updated history of the Homes. Baptists from across the state submitted their favorite recipes for a cookbook to be released this fall. In cooperation with the Convention's Communication Department a new video, "100 Years of Caring", was released in February. Both the book and the video were underwritten by the Broyhill Foundation. During May, June and July a 1,500 mile relay marathon, the longest in the history of North Carolina, allowed hundreds of people to participate and celebrate the spirit of caring for children.

One of the final events of the Centennial will take place on November 12, 1985 at the Baptist State Convention in Charlotte. The combined voices of our children in care, along with other special features, will be an exciting entrance into our second hundred years of quality child care. We hope you will join us at the Charlotte Coliseum for an evening of celebration, praise and thanksgiving.

BAPTIST RETIREMENT HOMES REPORT

For over 34 years, N.C. Baptists have been ministering with older adults through the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina. The Homes' ministry is one that works — providing security and hope in the midst of sincere concern and love — bringing about the possibility for abundant life — one with a plus. This is all happening in the name of North Carolina Baptists through the "Baptist" Retirement Homes.

The following facts and information will give an overview of the Retirement Homes' ministry from August, 1984 - June, 1985:

- The Retirement Homes had an average daily occupancy of 244 residents in the five group Homes, Nursing Care Unit and apartments.
- Over 30 new residents were admitted to the Homes and Nursing Care.
- Group Home fees for care were not raised. Cost containment and budget controls made this possible.
- Over \$100,000 of benevolent care was provided monthly to Home residents.
- Sixty cents of each benevolent care dollar was provided through Cooperative Program and North Carolina Missions Offering gifts.
- "Heart to Heart" Christmas gifts from friends of the Retirement Homes provided each resident with a \$20 gift.
- The Homes' Nursing Care Unit, Winston-Salem, can now care for 85 persons. Conversion of eleven Hayes Home rooms made this increase possible.
- The Nursing Care Unit is operating at 95% plus occupancy.
- Apartment policies have been revised. Plans are being formulated to build another duplex unit on the Hayes Home Campus.
- A 20-minute video tape "Not An Ordinary Person" has been produced to be used in communicating the Retirement Homes' ministry.
- The Retirement Homes do have vacancies. Please request admissions information from Mr. Jackson S. Hoyle, Administrative Offices, Winston-Salem, NC.
- After more than 24 years of service to North Carolina Baptists and the Retirement Homes, Homes' President Bill Poole retired. A trustee Search Committee is actively seeking the person to become the third President of the Baptist Retirement Homes of N.C. Jackson Hoyle is serving as Interim Director.
- The first meeting of the Retirement Homes' "Heritage Club" was held. The club members have included the Homes in their estate planning. Last year, through bequests, trusts, etc., over \$400,000 was given to support the Retirement Homes' ministry. Information about the Heritage Club is available from the Administrative Offices, Winston-Salem, N.C.
- The fiscal year ending September 30, closed in the black, largely due to special gifts.

The Baptist Retirement Homes' mission is to continue providing the most important dimension to meeting the needs of older adults — Christian compassion. The Retirement Homes provide care beyond the required minimums. Thanks to your mission support, care of which we know you would be proud is provided.

Most of our churches have seen the value of this method and have been committed to being a team member. Each month or throughout the year they set aside a certain percentage or amount to go through the churches to the Cooperative Program and trusting our denomination to divide it wisely according to the needs.

This endeavor, through the Cooperative Program, means the local Baptist church is a vital team member in getting the gospel of Christ to a lost and dying world. Also, we see the State Convention and Southern Baptist Convention as a vital team member in sending the gospel around the world. This team ministry is a trust and love relationship. The churches give out of love of Christ and the convention then takes that love and determines how much will stay in the states and help in many ministries and how much will go to the work of the Southern Baptist Convention through our Home and Foreign Missions Boards and agencies. This team concept is a biblical mandate given to us by Jesus at the close of his ministry as he spoke to his disciples when he said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit; Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen."

We would encourage you and your church to be a vital member of the team in carrying the gospel to all the world. We urge all churches to give a percentage of their offering through the Cooperative Program. Materials are available through the associational office as well as through the Baptist State Convention to interpret and give you a picture where all the monies go. Let us remember that the fields are white already unto harvest but the laborers are few. We must be the laborers through our gifts, prayers, and ministry.

CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS REPORT

This has been an extremely busy year for the Council on Christian Life and Public Affairs. Through its three departments, it has provided a variety of field service events and educational resources for North Carolina Baptists. Associational Christian Life committee members were trained and guidance on a wide range of social and ethical issues was furnished to churches and associations. June was promoted as World Hunger Month and our churches increased their giving significantly over that of 1984. The Council made available bulletin inserts, posters, world hunger calendars, and hunger banks, in addition to free offering envelopes.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

A wide range of family life events was led by the department's director. Included were six associational or church-wide Family Enrichment Conferences; three marriage enrichment retreats in addition to sponsoring the annual three-day Clergy Couples Retreat in January and the four-day Basic MER Leadership Training Conference in August; two area-wide single adult seminars and an associational single adult event. The Director also spoke at two Better Homes Clubs, and one church nightly family emphases on topics such as "Ten Commandments for a Good Marriage." He also led three Family Life Revivals, preached in three churches on a Christian family emphasis, spoke to two Baptist associations on ministering to families and divorce in the pastorate, and conducted three parenting workshops. Slide presentations on Togo and Baptist distinctives were presented in two churches.

Two major foci of the department this year were making available four Domestic Violence Conferences in which the Director offered leadership; also three Divorce Adjustment Workshops were led by Dr. Roger Crook, family life specialist in the area. These were held in each area of the state under the department's sponsorship.

Two planning meetings of the Family Ministry Department, Sunday School

Board, were attended in Nashville and Houston. The Southern Baptist Association of Family Ministry was also attended.

Consultations by the director assisting churches, associations, and pastors in their crucial task of strengthening family life were offered. Two conferences for pastor's wives were underwritten by the department.

DEPARTMENT OF AGING

Ministry with Senior Adults in North Carolina has experienced significant growth this year. Churches are becoming increasingly aware of the potential for ministry among older persons. Senior adult leaders received training in several workshops across the state and a number from North Carolina attended the National Seminar on Aging in Atlanta, Georgia in January. In addition, more than 100 pastors participated in the "Pastoring Older Individuals and Their Families" seminars held in April in four locations in the state.

Six conferences/retreats for senior adults were held at Caraway Baptist Conference Center with more than 800 persons in attendance. The department continues to cooperate with the Christian Family Life Department in family enrichment conferences with sections for older persons. Many churches observed senior adult emphasis day.

DEPARTMENT OF CHRISTIAN CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION

The work of Christian Citizenship Education has focused on the 1985 session of the General Assembly, which convened in February and ran into July. As usual, money matters took center stage, with much time going into the preparation of the state's budget and into debate regarding tax reductions. In addition, the legislature dealt with significant issues affecting the environment, education, alcohol abuse, pornography, gambling, and day care.

The Department continued to make legislative news available to Baptists through the Legislative Information Network, made up of nearly 900 people who received regular updates on issues facing the General Assembly. For the first time, summaries of L.I.N. materials were prepared and mailed to all pastors through the Pastor's Monthly Mailing. Some associations took advantage of the opportunity to have an Associational Day at the General Assembly, bringing a group of interested church members to Raleigh to see first-hand the work of the legislature.

World hunger continued to be a matter of great concern to many Baptists. The ongoing crisis of famine in Africa has stirred new awareness of the problems and new generosity in response. In 1984, for the first time, North Carolina Baptists gave a little more than one million dollars through Baptist channels to fight hunger. In 1985 giving is running ahead of 1984. Yet so much remains to be done. While millions face death in Ethiopia, Sudan, Mali, Mozambique, Chad, Niger, and Burkina Faso, our gifts still average less than one dollar per Baptist per year. Please be in prayer

- for the millions facing hunger and starvation,
- for rain to relieve the African drought,
- for caregivers (missionaries and others) who seek to help,
- for ourselves, that our compassion may lead us to greater generosity.

CHRISTIAN LITERATURE REPORT

During the year 1983-84 most of our Baptist literature continued to be published by our Sunday School Board by its various agencies. The office of Publishing and Distribution reports that Baptist book stores generated sales of \$54,445,676. In the meantime, Broadman Publishing released 571 new products. A new Sunday School Board program statement for Bible publishing was recommended to and approved by the Southern Baptist Convention 1984, adding the strategy of mass distribution of inexpensive, at-cost copies of scripture.

Baptist Telecommunication Network was launched at the convention in Kansas City 1984 in a joint session with ACTS; BTN messages are being produced, edited, and transmitted daily to more than 200 church, associational, and agency subscribers.

A new quarterly publication, *Helps for Outreach and Witness*, was introduced in October 1983 to support the Department Enrollment Goal, the goal on evangelistic visitation, and the goal on training workers in personal witnessing. This new periodical may be ordered separately, but also is inserted in Adult Bible Study, Young Adult Study, and Senior Adult Bible Study in the Life and Work Series. The total circulation of "Helps for Outreach and Witness" to date is more than 1,400,00 per quarter.

Other new products designed to support the Sunday emphasis for 1983-85 include: *How to Develop a Caring Sunday School*, *How to Select and Use Sunday*

School Records, How to Make Your Sunday School Evangelistic, and How to Create Excitement for Bible Study. Youth curriculum material during the past year has given special attention to evangelism and weekly visitation. Both Bible Story Time for preschool work and Children's Bible Study increased in circulation some 30.8 percent since October 1983.

Baptist Doctrine Studies in 1985 have been designed to emphasize the Doctrine of Christ. Baptist Doctrine studies in 1986 will emphasize the Doctrine of the Laity. A major emphasis on developing believers will be highlighted in 1985-86.

There is also in circulation a number of Family Ministry periodicals such as *Home Life, Mature Living, Christian Single, Living with Preschoolers, Living with Children* and *Living with Teenagers*.

We must not overlook the great variety of literature that Broadman Publishing has produced in the past year. Their 571 new products of the year includes 97 books, 2 motion pictures, 18 film strips, 7 videotapes, 37 audio cassettes, 6 audio cassette albums, 6 tape tracks, 6 recordings, 7 choral or vocal collections, 4 choral works, 39 octavos, 6 instrumental parts, 16 instrumental collections, 15 cassettes, 18 handbell pieces, 195 new church supply items, and 92 Spanish items. During the same period, 455 old products were dropped by being declared out of print.

Another agency of our Baptist people in North Carolina that deserves high commendation is our state paper, the *Biblical Recorder*. It is now reported that non-church membership in N.C. is greater than church membership of all churches. Hence, our evangelism burden to win the lost and our ministry obligations to all people are the greatest in all our history.

The record gladly and gratefully assumes its role in this great ministry. It seeks to inform, indoctrinate, enlist, inspire and provide a forum for Baptist thought and action as we work together to achieve God's purpose for us.

Let us pray together for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom. Please pray for the paper, its ministry, staff and contribution to the Lord's work.

EVANGELISM REPORT

We are told that only three percent of all the lost people come to our churches on their own. This means that 97 percent are out there lost without help, without hope, without strength. These people will die and go to hell unless we go to where they are and share Jesus with them. It is absolutely

imperative that our church people come out of the beautiful church buildings into the market place and share with lost humanity the "Good News" of Jesus.

All Baptists are urged to participate in the "Good News America, God Loves You" revival in March and April 1986. The dates for the areas are: Eastern, March 9-16; Piedmont, March 23-30; and Western, April 6-13, 1986. Every church is encouraged to plan a revival meeting during one of these suggested dates. Let us pray daily that every unsaved person in North Carolina will have the opportunity to hear the gospel of Christ by the end of 1986.

Churches are urged to have a CWT or Lay Evangelism School training in preparation for the "Good News America" revivals. Bible distribution and a people search will be emphasized during October 1985.

In February, in the midst of an ice storm, the Statewide Evangelism Conference was held at War Memorial Auditorium and Coliseum, Greensboro. Jo Ann Shelton and Loeen Bushman led the Music and Dr. John Sullivan, Dr. John Bisagno, Dr. Bill Jones, Dr. James Pleitz, Dr. William Tanner, and Dr. Charles Page preached to the twenty-five hundred in attendance. On February 3-4, 1986 the 40th Conference will be held in Greensboro Coliseum with Dr. George Harris, Dr. Frank Crumpler, Dr. Leonard Sanderson, Dr. Frederick Sampson, and Dr. Jim Henry bringing the messages.

Super Summer '85 was held in July this year at Wake Forest University July 10-12, with the Crusade on Friday night in Greensboro with almost ten thousand young people in attendance.

The Evangelism Division sponsored 15 regional meetings in October designed for pastors and staff. These meetings will be held each year to inform and educate the staff on coming evangelism events and programs. The meetings begin at 10:00 a.m. and last until noon with lunch being served. This year the emphasis will be on the "Good News America" revivals.

The second Mountain Pastors Evangelism Conference was held at Ridgecrest and was such a success the 1985 conference is already on the agenda. Designed for the mountain pastor and his wife, the conference begins on Friday afternoon and concludes at 2:00 p.m.

Again, one of the hits of the year was the Single Adult Evangelism retreat. This is the third year for this retreat and it along with the vacational evangelists retreat are always well attended.

With baptisms down this year, let's pray God will use each of us to win one in 1985-86.

YOUTH AND CAMPUS MINISTRIES

One of the most exciting and challenging ministries of North Carolina Baptist churches through our Convention is that done by the Division of Youth and Campus Ministries. Our task on behalf of junior and senior high school students is to provide leadership training for adult and youth leaders to coordinate the Convention's several programs which include youth, and to project the Convention's Youth Weeks at the Assembly. Rick Traylor does an exceptional job in that area.

You have assigned to us your primary ministry with students. We have BSU or some organized group work on 43 campuses. More than thirty volunteers work alongside some twenty full-time campus ministers and four other staff persons in your ministry to students. We as campus ministers are committed to serving consistently as resource persons for church workers with college students in all North Carolina Baptist congregations. We guide in local emphases which include evangelism, missions experience and education, Bible study, worship, integration of faith and education and decision making as part of Christian discipleships. Over \$40,000 has been contributed by North Carolina BSUs this year toward a state-level missions program which witnesses around the world. Additional money and time are invested as students find ways to serve in local communities, usually alongside their older Christian brothers and sisters.

Our BSUs from Cullowhee to Greenville and Murfreesboro have teams of students who are prepared to preach, teach, sing and share with those in Baptist churches nearby. Puppet and clown teams, in addition, present the Gospel in unique but effective ways to children, senior citizens and everyone in between!

In seven locations — Cullowhee, Boone, Greensboro, Chapel Hill, Raleigh, Greenville and Pembroke — the Convention owns student centers, facilities especially dedicated to ministry with persons in the academic communities.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF HULDAH BAPTIST CHURCH

The seed beginnings of Huldah Baptist Church date back as far as April 1896 in the hearts of neighbors of Rock Springs School District, who asked Rev. Marvin J. Leach to preach once a month in the school house. Soon a Sunday

School was formed and began to progress rapidly. In the fall of 1896 the people requested Rev. Leach to conduct a series of meetings "under a brush arbor." Many were converted and as a result on the second Sunday in November, 1896, Huldah Baptist Church was organized with eleven chartered members.

The church name came from Huldah J. Staley, an elderly lady living near the church, who requested that the church be named after her.

Huldah Baptist Church is located three miles north of Seagrove, N.C. The land on which the first building was erected was presented by John Presnell.

After having served the congregation for many long years, the first church building was replaced by a newer one in 1954. Many wonderful years of worship were observed in the second auditorium. God abundantly blessed Huldah and once again the congregation felt the need for a new auditorium. On April 24, 1977, a dedication service was held. At present Wayne Vuncannon is pastor; they have a membership of 233 with 112 being enrolled in Sunday School.

A BRIEF HISTORY OF CENTER CROSS BAPTIST CHURCH

In 1892 a group of people began meeting in a brush arbor. The group was organized into a Baptist organization. Then in 1898, John Cole and Willy Russell each gave the organization one acre of land so there would be enough land to build a church sanctuary and have a cemetery. The church which was built on this land was named Center Cross Baptist Church.

Kerosene lamps were used to light the first church building with an aladdin lamp being added later over the pedal organ. A three-eye stove fired with wood was used to heat the first church building. In 1940 there were five Sunday School rooms, a heating system, and a side-wing added to the original frame structure. In 1957 a pastor's study, restrooms, two more Sunday School rooms, a small basement, and air conditioning was added. In 1977 the existing basement section was made into two Sunday School rooms being built above the fellowship hall. At the end of 1983 and the beginning of 1984, the original building portion of the church was torn down and replaced by a new sanctuary with a seating capacity of approximately 250. The new sanctuary also included a choir loft and a baptistry.

The congregation has grown to a present Sunday School enrollment of 186 with an average attendance of 130. Kenneth Warner is the present pastor. They have recently organized WMU in the church.


