### "RIDERS ON THE EARTH TOGETHER"

"Riders on the Earth Together" will be the theme of the Student Conference on Mission and Ministry at Southeastern on February 13-15.

The featured speakers on the program will be Carlyle Marney, Director of the Interpreter's House at Lake Junaluska, N. C.; William M. Dyal, Jr., Regional Director for the Peace Corps in North Africa, the Near East, and South Asia; and Howard Fuller, Chairman at Malcolm X University, Durham, N. C.

Other distinguished guests of the Seminary for the Conference will be W. W. Finlator, Pastor of Pullen Memorial Baptist Church in Raleigh; Cecil Etheridge from the Home Mission Board; William Jessup, Director of the Community Relations Council in Raleigh; and Max Smith, Associate Professor of Church Music at Appalation State University in Boone, and former Southeastern faculty member.

Bob Vance is General Chairman of the Planning Committee for the Conference, and Dr. George Shriver is serving as faculty advisor. The Housing Committee Chairman is Doug Sturgill.

Special interest seminars will be held during the three-day Conference on issues of special importance to those engaged in mission and ministry in our modern world.

Some of the topics are "Black Power,"
"Race Relations", and "Ministry to Hippies". Also, other seminars will be on
"Ecumenical Ministry," "New Forms of Student Ministry", and "Ministry to Secular Man".

The visiting students will stay in campus housing during the Conference. Southeastern students are invited to take part in all the activities.

## TO FEAR OR NOT TO FEAR.....

Scripture Reading: Be not afraid of (evil men)...but...fear him who...hath power to cast into hell. (Luke 12:4,5)

In my boyhood I remember hearing by radio President Franklin D. Roosevelt tell the American people, "We have nothing to fear but fear itself."

This striking statement is not totally accurate, but it did contain an element of truth needed at that time. For unnecessary panic was paralyzing the nation and keeping it from needed action.

Fear distorts, for a frightened person seldom sees things as they really are. Children know the story of Chicken Little who was terror-stricken when a leaf fell on his head. He thought the sky was falling:

Excitedly he spread the news to Henny Penny, Turkey Lurkey, and others. They in turn all became senseless with anxiety and finally provided a meal for the cool-minded Foxey Loxey.

In the spiritual realm, fear not only paralyzes and distorts but also dishonors the Lord. To be afraid of men who can kill only the body shows a lack of faith.


