

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY-THURSDAY

September the 30th, 1909, the Liberty and Ducktown Baptist Association met according to adjournment with the church at Beaverdam, fourteen miles northwest of Murphy, N. C. The introductory sermon was preached by Elder W. D. Hogsed, followed by Elder W. A. Revis, after which a report on hospitality was read out. Adjourned until 2 o'clock for refreshments and dinner.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The body re-assembled. Scripture reading and prayer by Elder J. F. McGee. The house was called to order by the former moderator, Elder W. A. Revis. The moderator appointed Brothers U. S. G. Philips and J. T. L. Hartness reading clerks. The letters of the various churches composing the Liberty and Ducktown Association, as many as were present, were called for and read. The body went into a permanent organization by electing officers as follows: Elder W. A. Revis, Moderator; Elder J. F. McGee, Vice-moderator; D. T. McNabb, Secretary and Treasurer. On motion U. S. G. Philips was made assistant treasurer. Then gave an opportunity for membership and received a letter from the Grassy Creek church accompanied by a recommendation from the Mountaintown Baptist Association, also a letter from Bethel, a new church. Each church was heartily received as members of the body. An invitation was extended to correspondents and visitors but received none. The regular order of business was then taken up and the following committees were appointed: On preaching U. S. G. Philips, Leander McNabb, Wm. Brannon, E. Montgomery and W. L. McNabb. On state of the Church: Elder G. F. Burger, John Marrow and G. F. Rose. On duty of deacons: Elder J. M. Underwood, Elder W. H. Williams and Polie Suit. On state mission: Leander McNabb, I. P. Hawkins and J. K. Brison. On temperance: E. Montgomery, L. N. Marr and George Christopher. Adjourned to 9 o'clock tomorrow, benediction by Elder G. F. Burger. Preaching at night by Elder W. H. Williams followed by Elder T. A. Nelson.

Second Day-Friday.

The body met. Scripture reading and comment by Elder T. A. Nelson, Prayer by Elder J. F. McGee. The house was called to order by the moderator. Gave an opportunity for membership and received Macedonia church 2, a new church. Extended the invitation

to correspondents and visitors and received Elder T. A. Nelson as a visitor from the Sweetwater association and Bro. Henry Eliott from the Western North Carolina association. Took up the pending work and appointed committees as follows: On foreign mission: A. K. Dickey, Elder J. M. Underwood and Theodore Sanders. On home mission: Elder J. F. McGee, H. P. Hall and Noah Beaver. On periodicals: Henry Elliott, Elder W. D. Hogsed and Elder T. A. Nelson. On education: S. S. Ball, Elder J. M. Underwood and C. S. Jenkins. On nominations: George Christopher, John Marrow and Will Stiles. On orphanage: Elder J. F. McGee, J. R. Roberson and U. S. G. Phillips. On Sabbath schools: A. K. Dickey, Elder T. A. Nelson and J. M. Cotter. On finance: W. L. McNabb and E. M. Bryant. On deceased members; J. T. Payne, A. J. Burger and A. J. Bell. On evangelism: Elder W. D. Hogsed and Sam Rose. The report on duty of deacons was submitted and read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder G. F. Burger, I. P. Hawkins, Elder W. D. Hogsed, Elder T. A. Nelson, W. L. McNabb, H. P. Hall and C. S. Jenkins. Report adopted. See report. The report on state of the churches was submitted and read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder G. F. Burger. Suspended the regular order of business for preaching by Elder J. F. McGee. Text: "What shall the end be to them that obey not the gospel of God?" Prayer by Elder J. M. Underwood. Adjourned for dinner. Benediction by Elder G. F. Burger.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Scripture reading and prayer by the moderator. The house was called to order by the moderator. Took up the report on state of the churches. Discussed by U. S. G. Phillips, Elder J. F. McGee and Elder W. D. Hogsed. Report adopted. See report. Report on temperance read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder T. A. Nelson, G. W. Evans, Elder W. D. Hogsed, Elder G. F. Burger and H. P. Hall. Report adopted. See report. Report on state mission was read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder G. F. Burger, Elder J. F. McGee, Elder W. A. Revis and Henry Elliott. Adjourned to 9 o'clock tomorrow. Benediction by Elder J. M. Underwood. Preaching at night by Elder J. M. Underwood.

Third Day-Saturday.

The body met. Scripture reading and prayer by Elder J. M. Underwood. Took up the report on state mission. Vernon \$1.00, Notla \$1.00, Pleasanthill \$2.00, Pleasantgrove \$2.00, Shoalcreek \$2.00, Shadygrove \$1.00, Union \$1.00, Turtletown \$1.00, Zionhill \$1.00, Greasycreek \$1.00, Macedonia 2 \$1.00 Report on evangelism read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder G. F. Burger. Report adopted. See report. Report of Elder W. S. Simonds, evangelist, was read. Remarks by Elders W. S. Simonds and J. F. McGee. Report adopted. See report. Report on periodicals was read, motion to adopt, discussed by Henry Elliott and others. Report adopted. Report on education was read,

motion to adopt, discussed by Henry Elliott, and Elder G. F. Burger. Suspended the regular order of business for Preaching by Elder W. A. Revis. Text Philippians 2:5, after which a collection was taken to aid A. J. Roberts, Jr., in having his eyes treate; amount \$17.53. Adjourned for dinner. Benediction by Elder T. A. Nelson.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Scripture reading and prayer by Elder G. F. Burger. The house was called to order by the moderator. Extended the invitation to correspondents and visitors and received Bro. Geo. W. Kimsey as a visitor from the Western North Carolina association. The report on education was further discussed by Elder J. F. McGee. Report adopted. See report. Report on foreign mission read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder J. F. McGee. Took pledges for the foreign mission cause as follows: Bethlehem \$1, Beaverdam 1, Boonsville 1, Culberson 1, Hopewell 1, Fairview 2.50, Friendship 1.50, Minecity 3, Mt. Pleasant 1, Notla 1, Pleasanthill 1, Pleasantgrove 1, Shoalcreek 1, Shadygrove 1, Union 1. Report adopted. Report on home mission read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder J. F. McGee and others. Took pledges for home mission: Beaverdam 1, Culberson 1, Hopewell 1, Fairview 2.50, Friendship 2, Mt. Pleasant 1, Minecity 3, Pleasanthill 2, Pleasantgrove 1, Shoalcreek 1, Shadygrove 1, Union 1. Report adopted. Report on nominations read, motion to adopt, discussed by Elder T. A. Nelson and others. On motion amended the report. See report as amended. Committee on finance reported \$28.70 minute fund. On motion ordered the clerk to superintend the work of printing the minutes, and to allow him \$8.60 for his services. Report on deceased members read and adopted. Adjourned until 9 o'clock tomorrow. Benediction by Elder W. D. Hogsed. Preaching at night by H. P. Hall.

Fourth Day-October 3.

The body met. Scripture reading and comment by Elder T. A. Nelson. Prayer by Elder M. A. Hembree. The house was called to order by the moderator. Elder G. F. Burger, the missionary of the L. and D. association, submitted his report. Remarks by Elders G. F. Berger and T. A. Nelson. Took a collection for said missionary; amount \$3.25. Report adopted. Elected Elder J. C. Whitemore associational evangelist for the ensuing year. On motion made it the business of the executive committee to elect the missionary and to take the oversight of his work, then elected Elder B. M. Ledford, A. Rice and W. L. McNabb executive committee. Took up the report on orphanage. Discussed by Elder T. A. Nelson, Elder G. F. Burger, Henry Elliott and Elder W. A. Revis. Took cash collection of \$12.32 and pledges as follows: Beaverdam, 5, Culberson 1, Fairview 2.50, Friendship 2, Minecity 2, Pleasanthill 1, Mt. Pleasant 1, Pleasantgrove 2. Shoalcreek 1, Shadygrove 1, Turtletown 1, Zionhill 1, Ogreeta 1, Individual pledges: J. T. Dockery 1, C. L. Hensley 1, Margaret Miller 1, Wm. McClung 1, W. L. McNabb 50c, J. W. Brison 1, S. O. Rose 1, B. H. Brannon 1, J. K. Brison, 1, A. J. Dockery 1. Report of treasurer submitted and adopted. Appointed Elder J. F. McGee messenger to the state convention. Suspended for preaching

by Elder T. A. Nelson. Text: "What shall we say then; if God be for us who can be against us?" After the sermon a song was sung and the parting hand was given, in which the sadness of parting was expressed and the hope of some day meeting in glory was also expressed. The body adjourned to time and place mentioned in report on nominations. Benediction by Elder T. A. Nelson.

Report on Education.

We find that our people are becoming more and more interested in a christian education. We find that our people are becoming awakened to their best interests and the great need of a more thorough education to prepare them for the great work the Master has called them to, without which we believe that his children will not accomplish their mission in the world. From observation we do not believe the masses of the people will ever attain to this high standing of education without a school in our midst. To this end we recommend that the Bellview school be located at Friendship church; and we further recommend that the trustees meet Nov. 3, 1909, and consult about this matter. Brother Burger has agreed to donate 25 acres of land for said school.

Report on Foreign Missions.

We, your committee on Foreign Missions, submit the following report: We rejoice to see an increased interest in our Foreign Mission work. Even last year, a time of financial depression, our offerings from the United States and Canada increased 602,000. Our increase on the foreign field was even more remarkable. It increased 100,000. We had an increase last year of 164,000 converts, 450 per day. We have won in the last 12 years 1,000,000 souls, as many as in 100 years previous, while church members in the United States last year increased only one and one-half per cent. The increase in the membership of our American missions abroad was 12 per cent. During

last year there was an average in the United States of two members for every protestant minister while there was an average of 41 for every ordained American missionary abroad. Can these glorious results fail to stimulate us to work more zealously in this great cause.

God has graciously blessed the work done on the field for the year that has gone by; 1,066 white missionaries with eleven evangelist workers was employed by the Board last year. God has blessed the work done with 4,732 professions of faith in Christ, baptisms 24,668. Viewing the great blessing of God bestowed on the home field we should have a strong faith in God and his promises and do more to support the work.
