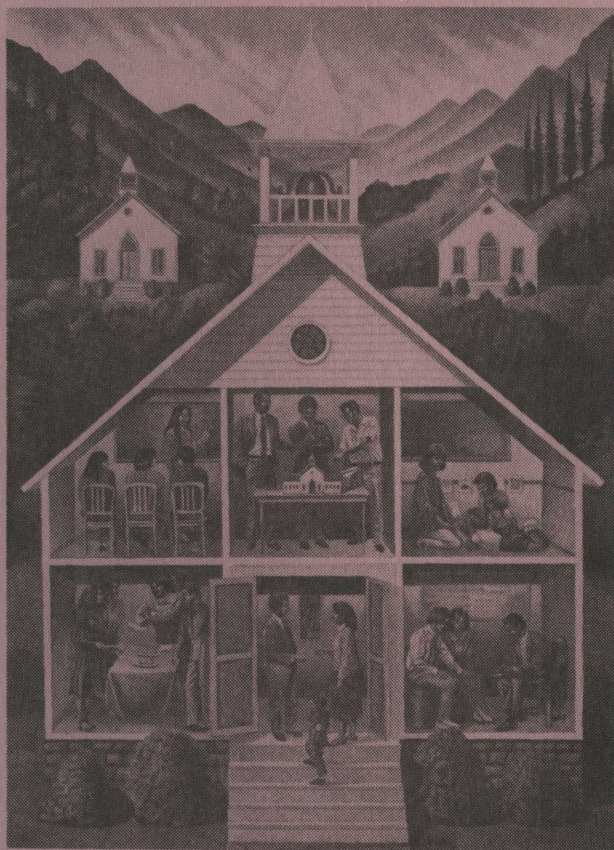

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I — NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The name of the organization shall be the Randolph Baptist Association.

Section 2. The purpose of this organization shall be:

- a. The promotion of harmony, fellowship and cooperation among the churches of the Association.
- b. The propagation of the Gospel within the territory of the Association and to the uttermost part of the earth.
- c. The promotion of the missionary, education and benevolent causes of Christ within the Association and in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II — MEMBERSHIP

Section 1.

- a. The membership of the Association shall consist of messengers of Baptist churches regularly affiliated with the Association. All churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall present to the Missions Committee proper petitions, accompanied by satisfactory evidences of doctrinal regularity and general acceptability. After one year under the watchcare of the Association, the said Committee will report to the Association its recommendation. Upon a favorable vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the annual associational meeting, the petitioning church may become regularly affiliated with the Association.
- b. "Fellowship may be withdrawn by the Association at any annual meeting upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, from any church in its membership that has been found, by due investigation, to have departed from the Missionary Baptist faith and practices, or has failed to abide by the provision of this Constitution and By-Laws, or has failed to either have its pastor or lay member or both in attendance in one or more of the four regular meetings of the Executive Committee, or has failed to make a contribution to the expenses of the Association in addition to the cost of Association minutes, or has failed to properly prepare and return to the Association office a copy of the associational letter, or has failed to send one or more messengers to the annual session of the Association."

Section 2. Such a church may, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and vote of the Association, be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such action have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish to the Association each year a letter, on the form provided by the Clerk, giving full information and statistics provided for on the form, and to send with the letter or by messenger a contribution toward the cost of printing the minutes and other expenses of the Association.

Section 4. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except of an advisory nature.

Section 5. A church may withdraw from membership in the Association by a vote of the church according to its own by-laws, regulations and procedure.

ARTICLE III — MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually on two days during the week following the Third Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall be composed of messengers chosen by the respective churches of the Association from their membership. *Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above one hundred it has enrolled, but not to exceed ten such messengers.* All pastors in the Association and the Director of Missions are messengers in all the Associational Meetings, each having but one vote.

Section 3. The Association may hold a Mid-Term meeting each spring at such time and place as may be determined by the Association or its Executive Committee. The purpose of the Mid-Term meeting shall be that of information and inspiration without the transaction of business, except that urgent matters of business which cannot well be delayed until a later meeting may be considered and acted upon.

Section 4. Other meetings of the Association may be held when called by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE IV — OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three Trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected on the first day of the regular annual session. The prior approval and consent to serve, if elected, shall have been secured from a prospective nominee prior to placing his name in nomination for any one of the several associational elective offices. They shall take office at the close of the Annual Session and serve through the next Annual Session. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall not serve more than two years in succession.

Section 3. Duties of the Officers:

- a. The Moderator shall preside over all meetings of the Association and discharge such duties as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body.
- b. The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of or at the request of the Moderator.
- c. The Clerk and Treasurer position shall be fulfilled by the office secretary unless otherwise recommended by the Executive Committee.
 - (1) The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of the association, together with the reports and statistics, and have the same printed and distributed.
 - (2) The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at the Annual Meeting.

- d. The duties of the Trustees shall be to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of said Trustees shall be authorized by the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 4. "The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches of the Association for the promotion of the various phases of their work involving Sunday School, Church Training, Baptist Brotherhood, and Woman's Missionary Union. The Directors of the Associational Sunday School, Associational Church Training, and Associational Baptist Brotherhood shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee of the Association, and approved and elected by the Executive Committee of the Association in the May meeting, and shall serve officially from October 1 to September 30. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary organization of the Association. These officers are elected in the WMU Annual Meeting in the spring."

ARTICLE V — EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Committee comprised of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Trustees of the Association, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Baptist Brotherhood Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, the Associational Director of Missions, all pastors, all church educational directors, and one member of each church in the Association desiring representation on the Committee.

Section 2.

- a. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings once each quarter during the second month of the quarter, the date to be set by the Board itself, and at such other times as may be required at the call of the Moderator, or at the call of not less than five members of the Executive Committee.
- b. Twenty members of the Executive Committee shall be required to be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. To act for and on behalf of the Association between sessions.
- d. To carry out the orders and resolutions of the Association pertaining to it.
- e. To superintend the Associational Mission work, employ a missionary and determine the salary to be paid.
- f. To fill vacancies which may occur during the year in the personnel of the Associational officers or workers for the remainder of such unexpired term.
- g. To investigate any report of complaint that may be brought to its attention about irregularity of doctrine, practice, or conduct on the part of any individual or group in the Association and report its finding with such recommendations as it considers advisable, to the Association in a regular meeting.
- h. To make such recommendations as it may deem wise for the strengthening and upbuilding of the churches and the work of the Association.
- i. The Executive Committee shall not involve the Association in debt to exceed one hundred dollars for necessary operating expenses of the Association.
- j. To appoint and elect the officers for the Associational organizations of the Sunday School, Church Training, and Baptist Brotherhood.

ARTICLE VI — ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

Section 1.

- a. The Associational Council shall be composed of the following Associational officers: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, Associational Sunday School Director, Associational Church Training Director, Associational Woman's Missionary Union Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Associational Music Director, Chairman of the Evangelism Committee, Chairman of the Budget Committee, Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Director of Missions, and others deemed necessary by the Moderator to carry on the work of the Association.
- b. The Moderator shall serve as Chairman of the Council, the Vice-Moderator as vice-chairman, and the clerk as secretary.

Section 2.

- a. The Associational Council shall hold meetings once each month and at such other times as deemed necessary by the Chairman, Director of Missions or at the call of not less than 5 members of the Council.
- b. Seven members of the Council shall be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. The duties of the Associational Council shall be:
 - (1) To plan the general work of the Association.
 - (2) To assign responsibility of the implementation of proposed plans.
 - (3) To receive and help correlate into a general associational program the proposed plans of the individual organizations.
- d. The Council shall give a quarterly report to the Associational Executive Committee along with any recommendations it may have.

ARTICLE VII — COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees at the August Executive Committee Meeting, before the Annual session of the Association. This committee shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the Annual Session.

The committee shall name the following committees to report during the Annual Sessions.

Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees:

Nominating, Budget and Finance, Missions, Evangelism, Constitution and By-Laws, Ordination, Time, Place and Preacher, Order of Business, Christian Life and Public Affairs and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator.

This committee will continue to function to replace vacancies that occur during the year.

Section 2. Duties of Committees for Annual Session:

- (1) Memorials: This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare a list of those members of the churches who have died during the year and present suitable memorial resolutions for adoption by the Association in the annual session.

- (2) Appreciation: This committee will be composed of two members. They will prepare and present appropriate resolutions of appreciation and concern to the annual session.

Section 3. Standing Committees Membership and Duties:

A. Term of Service

Each standing committee will have members who will serve on a rotating basis: three (3) years, two (2) years, and one (1) year, with the term of office being from the close of the Annual Session through the following Annual Session. It is suggested that each committee meet once each quarter or as often as needed.

Each committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay persons with every area of the association represented.

B. Duties of Standing Committees.

a. *Nominating Committee*: The nominating committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The nominating committee shall nominate a complete slate of officers for the next year. Their first report would be to the May Executive Committee meeting, in which the Sunday School Director, Church Training Director and Baptist Brotherhood Director would be presented and elected. These Directors would make suggestions concerning leaders in their organizations to be presented at the Annual Session for election and approval.

b. *Budget and Finances*: The Budget and Finance Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years and two serving one year. The Budget and Finance Committee shall study the association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the association for the following year, devise plans for securing the cooperation of the churches in raising funds to meet the budget, and make a written report to the quarterly Executive Committee and a final report to the Annual Session.

The Committee shall be prepared to assist any church within the association, upon request, with the stewardship program offered by the Baptist State Convention or Southern Baptist Convention. The Committee should meet once each quarter to review financial affairs of the association, or as often as is needed.

c. *Missions Committee*: The Missions Committee shall be composed of six (6) members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. Also WMU Director and Brotherhood Director shall serve as Ex-officio members. This committee shall meet at least once each quarter or as often as is needed. Guiding Principles for the Work of the Missions Committee of the Randolph Association:

1. The Committee is to seek to discover areas where new work is needed and to lead in the sponsorship or establishment of new work to meet present need or the securing of property by a local church and/or the Association in the anticipation of future need.
2. All new work does not necessarily need to be nor should be intended to become an organized or constituted church. New work may be started and maintained on the basis of a mission to meet particular needs. (This provides for institutional missions such as jails, prisons, rest homes, etc.)

3. The location of missions or new churches shall be determined by the need revealed in an adequate survey conducted by the Missions Committee and local interested groups or churches.
 4. Any church, committee, group or individuals considering beginning new work, acting with or without church sponsorship, should approach the Missions Committee for guidance before having any service or choosing a temporary or permanent location.
 5. The Missions Committee shall institute basic, understandable operational procedures and practices for a mission that leads in establishing and strongly urges that each church establishing a mission does the same. The guidance of missions by the Missions Committee shall continue until a cooperating church or churches can be led to accept the responsibility of sponsorship.
 6. A mission organized or assisted by the Missions Committee shall accept the recognized principles and practices of a church cooperating with the Randolph Association, the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention.
 7. The Missions Committee shall plan and develop special associational projects and make the churches aware of these mission opportunities to participate.
- d. *Order of Business:* The Order of Business Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee will prepare well in advance a suggested order of business for the annual session. The committee will notify those who are to make reports or have a part on the program. The program for the annual session of the association shall be sent to all persons on the program and to all pastors at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting. The Moderator, Clerk, and Music Director shall be Ex-officio members of the committee.

This committee will be also responsible for promoting the annual session through the various news media.

- e. *Evangelism:* The Evangelism Committee shall be composed of six members, two serving three (3) years, two serving two (2) years, and two serving one year. The committee shall promote the work of evangelism in the churches and the association in cooperation with the State Department of Evangelism. The committee shall plan and promote annual programs or clinics for persons to be trained and motivated to witness for Christ. The committee shall meet at least once each quarter and report its activities to the Executive Committee. The committee will give a written report to the annual session.
- f. *Ordinations:* The Ordination Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. Also the Director of Missions, the pastor and deacons of the home and requesting churches, shall, when requested, assist with the examination and ordination of a candidate of the Gospel ministry.

Guidelines:

- (1) The committee requires that it receive a copy of that portion of minutes, signed by the Clerk, of the church conference at which the home church voted to request examination of the candidate.
- (2) The committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.

- (3) The chairman shall notify the candidate of the time, place and procedure.
- (4) The committee suggests that the candidate be questioned at least two weeks prior to his ordination.
- (5) The committee shall question the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, and his personal life. The committee may also counsel the candidate.
- (6) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the committee regarding any area of the ministry.
- (7) In every instance, the committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7 and Titus 1:5-9. The Ordination Committee shall give written notice to the home church as to whether or not it recommends that the church proceed with the ordination.

The chairman shall report the committee's activities to the Executive Committee and provide a written report for the annual session.

- g. *Place, Time, and Preacher:* This committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee will receive invitations from the churches which desire the association to meet with them the next year. It will recommend to the association in its annual session the time and place of the annual session the following year. This committee will also recommend a preacher and an alternate for the annual sermon.
- h. *Constitution:* The Constitution Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The clerk of the association shall also serve on the committee. This committee shall be available to study changes or revisions in the Constitution, and to make recommendations as needed. The committee shall meet at least twice a year, once in the winter and once in the summer.
- i. *Building and Grounds:* The Building and Grounds Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the association. It will make recommendations to the Executive Committee concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. The committee should meet at least once each quarter. It shall give a written report to the annual session of its work.
- j. *Seminary Extension:* The Seminary Extension Committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall publicize study courses and programs that are available, and shall plan, provide and promote Seminary Extension classes for pastors and lay persons as they may be desired. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee its activities and make a written report to the annual session.
- k. *Historical:* The Historical Committee shall be composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. It shall be the duty of the committee to collect, compile, and preserve all materials of interest to the association and member churches. It shall make its report at the Annual Session.

1. *Christian Life and Public Affairs:* This committee is composed of three members, one serving three (3) years, one serving two (2) years, and one serving one year. The committee shall recommend ways in which the association can work for the promotion of civic righteousness and social uplift. It will inform the churches of current issues of Christian response. The committee shall also commend those persons and institutions that uphold Christian virtue, and shall support the churches in the teaching of Christian personal and social righteousness. The committee shall report to the Executive Committee and Annual Session when needed.

ARTICLE VIII — ORDINATION AND CALLING OF PASTORS

Section 1. Inasmuch as the ordination of a man to the gospel ministry by any church in this Association is expected to be recognized by the denomination as a whole, the churches are counseled to be extremely careful in the matter of setting men apart for this sacred calling, ordaining only those who, by irreproachable character, piety of life, doctrinal soundness and suitable talents, give promise of honoring the name of Christ and of rendering acceptable service in the Missionary Baptist ministry.

Section 2. To aid the churches in this vital matter, the Association will appoint each year a committee of five of the pastors to be called the Committee on Ordination. Any church desiring to ordain a brother to the ministry may request the Ordination Committee to act as a presbytery for the purpose of examining the brother according to the guidelines found under Duties of Ordination Committee.

Section 3. The churches are urged also to exercise the utmost care and wisdom, earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in calling of their pastors, choosing only men who give evidence by their Christian character, cooperative spirit and leadership ability, that they will serve the best interests of the churches, the denomination, and the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE IX — NEW CHURCHES

Baptist churches may be organized and established in localities within the territory of this Association when such new churches are seen to be needed. Those interested in organizing a new church may seek the Counsel of the Executive Committee and the Missions Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE X — RULES AND ORDER OF DECORUM

This Association shall be governed in its meetings by such rules and by-laws as may be adopted, amended, or set aside by a majority vote of the messengers present. *Robert's Rules of Order* will be the guide in all parliamentary matters.

ARTICLE XI — ADOPTION

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and shall supersede any and all constitutions, by-laws and amendments previously adopted.

ARTICLE XII — AMENDMENTS

The Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Annual Meeting. The vote on any proposed amendment so presented should be deferred until the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the messengers present.

A BRIEF HISTORY

SOPHIA BAPTIST CHURCH Sophia, N. C.

Sophia Baptist Church was organized in July, 1959, with the first service being held on August 2, 1959. Reverend and Mrs. W. D. Bennett and seven others purchased an old church building on Highway 311 in Sophia. The Reverend Bennett served the church through January, 1960. Reverend Ollie Brim of Asheboro was called and served through June, 1962. Reverend Robert Brown of Glenola served through 1967. Reverend Bill Barnes served as supply pastor from January, 1968 until the church called him as Pastor in March, 1968. Land was purchased across the highway and a new church was built with the first service being held on Sunday, October 3, 1971. In 1974, a new addition was made to the church. On October 3, 1972, a note-burning was held with the loan having been paid twelve years early. The church has 225 members with 205 on Sunday School roll, and an average attendance of 150. Reverend Bill Barnes still serves as Pastor. On March 6, 1988, Reverend Barnes celebrated 20 years of continuous service as Pastor of Sophia Baptist. The church honored and surprised Rev. and Mrs. Barnes by having them picked up for Sunday School and Worship in a limousine. Deacons held the morning service, paying tribute to Bill and Bea's service and love to the congregation. A love gift of money was presented to the Barnes family. In 1987, a 10,000 square foot Family Life Center was built, with kitchen, meeting room and gymnasium. In appreciation to the pastor and his service, the church voted to put the floor covering in the new building.

A BRIEF HISTORY

OAKHURST BAPTIST CHURCH Asheboro, N. C.

In 1941, three servants of our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, saw the need of a house of God in a growing community in Asheboro. These men were Reverend Frank Burkehead, Reverend W. P. Donwell, and Mr. Rufus Smith. They leased property from Randolph County, formerly used as a repair garage for school buses, for the sum of \$1.00 per year. Called Macedonia, the church was built on the concrete floor of the old building. Two years later, residents of South Asheboro voted that the denomination of the church would be Baptist, and the church became New Macedonia, with Reverend William Cates serving as Pastor. Reverend Cates had a part in the formation of Randolph Baptist Association. In 1946, under the leadership of a new Pastor, Reverend Robert L. Hughes, the people voted to change the name to Oakhurst. The church was one building, with curtains to be drawn for classrooms until 1948 when a new addition was made. In 1955, another addition was made consisting of the sanctuary and more new classrooms. In 1957, a pastorium and hut were constructed. Reverend Hughes resigned as Pastor in 1973. Reverend Cecil Baughman was called as Pastor in 1973, and served until 1980. Reverend Rob Roberts accepted the call to Oakhurst as interim in the fall of 1980, and accepted the call as Pastor in 1981. In February of 1985, Randall Sherron was called as Associate/Youth Pastor. Randy completed seminary in December of 1988, and was ordained by Oakhurst on April 16, 1989. Assuming full-time duties, he

became the Associate Minister/Minister of Education. The present Minister of Music, Ryan Haywood, began serving in October of 1986. Dr. Richard Crider, present Pastor, began serving Oakhurst in March, 1987. In January, 1988, Oakhurst approved the architect's plans for a new sanctuary complex. Construction began in May of 1988, and culminated with dedication services on Homecoming Sunday, April 23, 1989.

Charles Dickens in his novel, A Tale of Two Cities, began it with the phrase: "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times. . ." That phrase is a good description of this associational year. There have been good days and weeks that the work has gone well and days and weeks that it has been low.

Overall, the year has been good and busy. It is uplifting to remind myself that the wonderful thing about the association is- it is a fellowship of churches working together on mission in our area of the state. Every church is unique and different, offering to us their skills and abilities. God unites us as a local body of believers to accomplish His great task in church development, evangelism, and missions.

As to my personal accounting to the association, I have had the privilege of preaching and teaching in many of our churches. I have preached or visited in 26 of our churches during the year, conducted one revival, spoke at three homecomings, and brought missionary messages at five of our churches. I have attended or taught in training conferences for Sunday School, Key Leadership, WMU, Pastors' Conference, V. B. S., and mission rallies. I have taught mission study in four of our churches concerning home or foreign missions. My travels have carried me over 10,000 miles across this

association for events and activities with pastors and church leaders.

6. Key Leadership Conference, Ridgecrest in May
- 7- Southern Baptist Convention, Las Vegas, Nevada, in June
- 8- State Director of Missions Conference, Wingate College, in June
- 9- Jericho Missions week, Ridgecrest in July
- 10- National Convocation on the Baptist Association, Ridgecrest in August
- 11- Participated in a World Mission Conference, Alexander Association, in September

Much of this year has been involved in Strategy Planning Process for our Association. A Steering Committee of six persons across this county has worked faithfully in selecting seven task groups with around fifty-five persons involved to to an in-depth study of the work and needs of this Association. Many hours of meetings were conducted and many visits to institutions and agencies in our county were scheduled. I have been thrilled and challenged by the findings and the recommendations that this process has produced.

I pray for the vision and wisdom and commitment for our Association to fulfill these goals and actions. It has been a time for me to redream the dream for our Association, and lead our Strategy Planning Committee to do also. Three other Associations - Montgomery, Sandy Creek, and Sandhills, has teamed up with us for this mission project. I am very excited about this.

My deepest thanks go to the wonderful people in our churches and to the faithful pastors who make up this Association. I am indebted to the prayers, support, and

cooperation you have given me throughout this year. I believe some of our greatest days are ahead of us in the 1990's. Let us encourage one another and support one another as we seek out God's purpose throughout this county.

BRAZIL PARTNERSHIP

- WHAT?** Randolph Baptist Association voted last year in its Annual Meeting to participate in the partnership of missions and evangelism with an association in Sao Paulo, Brazil, South America. We are teamed with the Sandhills, Sandy Creek and Montgomery Associations for this project. The association in Sao Paulo that we are teamed with, is Alta Sorocabana Association, located on the Western border of the State of Sao Paulo. The first team will be going October 25 for two weeks of evangelistic visitation and study of the area for future work. The link between our association and the Alta Sorocabana Association in Brazil is a segment of a larger partnership between the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Mission Board in the State of Sao Paulo. This will be a three year project.
- WHEN?** Plans are to develop two trips a year over the next three years. The first trip for 1990 will be May 2 through May 16, 1990. Thirteen churches and missions are asking for teams of two or three to come and assist them in the evangelization of their area. This means we need thirteen preacher/evangelists and twenty-six lay-persons for personal witnessing. A total of thirty-nine persons.
- WHO?** Any Randolph Baptist, age 21 or older, may apply for this project. Pastors and lay-persons. Randolph Association is responsible to provide four teams - twelve persons.
- COST?** The total cost per person for each trip is around \$1,500. This includes air and ground transportation, food, lodging, insurance, airport taxes, and all other travel expenses. The individual is encouraged to take \$200.00 for personal expenses. There will be two meals you must buy, around \$10.00 per day.
- ACTIVITY?** EVANGELISM: Persons will be expected to witness alongside a Brazilian Baptist, as an interpreter in the communities, schools, businesses, and churches.



MISSIONS COMMITTEE
October 18, 1989

This year has been an exciting and active year for your Missions Committee. Some of our long range projects were completed during the year, and new ones were launched. Those most notable are as follows:

1. WEST VIRGINIA PROJECT - We closed out a very rewarding project with the Cheat Lake Baptist Church. In July, 1989, the church purchased three acres of land for the construction of a new building to be built at a later date. At last report, their Sunday School enrollment was around ninety (90) with an average attendance of sixty (60). At their invitation, our Director of Missions, Judson Rotan, conducted a revival services week-end at the end of April. We will continue to be in touch with them for possible future mission trips.
2. CEDAR GROVE MISSION - On September 10, the Cedar Grove Mission was constituted as the Cedar Grove Baptist Church. Their charter membership at that time was 43 members, they now have 45 members. They have also applied for membership in the Randolph Baptist Association.
3. BRAZIL PARTNERSHIP - The Brazil Partnership is now a reality. On October 25, eleven (11) persons from the Randolph, Sandhills, and Sandy Creek Associations will leave for Sao Paulo, Brazil for two weeks of Evangelistic Visitation in the City of Presidente Epitacio. Those going from the Randolph Association are: Ronald Chaney, Pastor-Gravel Hill; Jerry Glenn and John Dortch, lay-persons from Cross Road; Mrs. Estelle Hackney, lay-person from Asheboro First; and Rev. Judson Rotan, Director of Missions. The entire Mission team will be commissioned on October 17, at the Oakhurst Baptist Church.
4. MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM - The chairman attended the Key Leadership held at Ridgecrest, May 15-16. The training sessions were designed to help the Association make the transition from the present Mission Committee structure to a Mission Development Program. These recommendations will be made at a later date.
5. COOPERATIVE PROGRAM DAY - On September 17, eighteen (18) of our churches in the Association participated in the Cooperative Program Day by having a State Missions speaker for their Sunday morning service.

3. And since the Cedar Grove Mission has constituted as a church on September 10, 1989, with 43 charter members,
4. The Missions Committee recommends that Cedar Grove Baptist Church become a full-fledged member of Randolph Baptist Association following the guidelines for participation as a member.

5. Organizational reports were given.
6. Reginald Dawkins, Budget/Finance Chairman, challenged the Association on the Emphasis for Capital Improvements Day on May 28, 1989, and presented the needs of the association.
7. Mark Sink, gave a report on the plans for "Here's Hope, Jesus Cares For You" revival.
8. The Director of Missions presented a "State of the Association" address
9. A recommendation was made that officers be nominated at Semi-Annual Meeting, and Directors be elected in preparation for getting training. Motion: Carl King, 2nd and approved.
10. Special music was presented by Martha Lassiter, Organist, Judy Mabe, Pianist and Soloist.

Dennis Connell, Missionary to Japan, brought the inspirational message.

Meeting was adjourned to fellowship time.

AUGUST 14, 1989: ASSOCIATIONAL BUILDING:

1. Bobby Blanton, Moderator, called the meeting to order at 7:30 P.M. He then read portions of scripture from

Hebrews, called for prayer requests, then had a period of intercessory prayer. David Williams, Pastor, Maple Springs, led in prayer.

2. Minutes were read and treasurer's report were approved.
3. Missions and Evangelism Committee reports were given by Ron Chaney and Wendell Holland.
4. First time representatives were introduced; Rev. Richard Fisher, Pastor, Center Cross; Ronald Hester, Pastor, Clear View; Larry Lambert, representative of Clear View.
5. Moderator presented the following names for Committee on Committees: Carl King, John Mangum, Bob Hughes, and Mildred Denson, with permission from the executive committee to appoint the remaining committee members.
6. Judson Rotan, for the Nominating Committee Chairman, Carl King, presented the name of Mike Eller for Church Training Director. Motion: David Williams, 2nd Ron Chaney, approved.
7. In the absence of Grady Blakely, Chairman of Order of Business, Judson Rotan presented the Proposed Program for the Annual Session.
8. We received \$4,609.09 for Capital Improvements. Recommendation from the Budget Committee: \$3,226.80 for office equipment; \$921.80 for painting inside building; \$460.90 for improvement of video and resource centers. This was approved.
9. Recommendation from Missions Committee: The \$1,600 received from State Convention, be used for Mr. Rotan's trip to Brazil. Motion: Wendell Holland, 2nd Ron Chaney, Approved.
10. The Director of Missions presented his report.

Meeting adjourned: 26 in attendance, representing 16 churches.

STRATEGY PLANNING RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Strategy Planning Steering Committee recommends the following to implement the work of our Association for the future.

1. We recommend that our Associational year begin on October 1, and end on September 30 each year for all activities and programs. Through the years this has been accepted as the rule for the Association, but has not been stated in the constitution.
2. We recommend that a new organization chart be adopted as designed for our Association by the Strategy Planning process, using the model suggested by the Associational Division of the Home Mission Board.
3. We recommend that the Association meet quarterly with messengers elected in October, to receive information and reports and to transact the business of the Association. The Organizational Study Group looked at several associations that are using this approach and find it to be very acceptable.

The meetings would be held as follows:

- (1) Fall Meeting (October)
- (2) Winter Meeting (January)
- (3) Spring Meeting (April)
- (4) Summer Meeting (July)

The meetings in January, April, and July would be night

meetings, probably held on the third Monday night in these months. The October meeting would be the Annual Meeting, held on two days following the third Sunday.

It is suggested that Key Leaders in the churches be elected as messengers according to the guidelines of the constitution. This would help the Key Leaders to know more about the work and ministry of the Association.

The Associational Meeting Committee would be in charge of planning the programs and scheduling the location of each meeting. The present Order of Business Committee, and the Time, Place, and Preacher Committee would be replaced by this Committee.

4. We recommend that the Association abolish the Executive Committee and accept the Quarterly Associational Meetings recommendation. There would be no need for another governing body, such as the Executive Committee if messengers meet quarterly.

If there are major decisions to be made between Quarterly Associational Meetings, the Administrative Committee would act in behalf of the Association, and would report its actions to the next Quarterly Meeting. The Administrative Committee would be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, and Chairman of Communications Committee, plus the Director of Missions. They would meet as needs arise between Quarterly Meetings.

5. ADVANTAGES TO QUARTERLY MEETINGS

- A. Currently there are five governing level meetings of the Association each year: four (4) Executive Committee meetings plus the Annual Meeting. The Annual Meeting and the November Executive Committee meetings are only a month apart. Going to a quarterly system of meetings would reduce the five meetings to four and distribute the meetings equally throughout the year. In addition, the two governing bodies would become one, which should reduce confusion as to who governs the Association.
 - B. It would give more people a greater voice throughout the whole year than a voice just once a year.
 - C. It would cause less confusion for the churches, because instead of electing members for the Executive Committee, plus messengers to the Annual Meeting, only messengers would need to be elected once. The messengers would represent the churches all year and would be better informed to report to the churches.
 - D. The work of the Association could be managed more timely and effectively, with major committees presenting their reports throughout the year, as in the following recommendations.
6. To help the Association do its work well and to manage its business affairs more timely and effectively, the following actions are recommended:
- (1) That all Mission Performance Program Directors be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at the January Meeting of the Association. This would give leaders adequate time for training planning, and would avoid sending unapproved leaders to training events, such as Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest in May. They would be Director-elect until October 1, when their tenure of service would begin.
 - (2) That all General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the messengers at

the April meeting of the Association. This would give each person elected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. They will be leaders "elect" until October 1, when their tenure of service would begin.

- (3) That the Associational budget be presented at the July meeting for approval by the messengers of the Association. The budget would begin on October 1, and end on September 30 the following year.
 - (4) That the Associational Council present the forthcoming year's Calendar of Activities for October through September, to the messengers for a vote at the July Meeting of the Association.
7. FURTHER ACTIONS TO CONSIDER:
- (1) That the Constitution Committee be asked to update the current Constitution and By-laws, based upon the recommendations presented by the Strategy Planning Steering Committee, and to present a revised Constitution and By-laws at the 1990 Annual Meeting of the Association in October.
 - (2) That the Strategy Committee be asked when elected and organized, to prepare a job description manual for every office, committee, and council in the Association, plus the paid personnel. This manual would be presented to the Annual Meeting in October, 1991.
 - (3) That these changes in organizational and operational function would not take effect until October 1, 1990. This would give the Association one year to make necessary changes and set in motion the organizational structure for greater effectiveness in our work and ministry.
8. Suggestions to implement the Organizational Chart and operational changes during 1990.
- (1) That the Mission Performance Directors be presented in Semi-Annual Meeting in April, 1990, by the Nominating Committee and the Committee on Committees.
 - (2) That all of the Council members and the Committee members be presented by the Nominating Committee at the July or August Meeting of the Executive Committee. Also, the budget for 1990-91, and the Calendar of Activities would be presented for approval.
 - (3) The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk/Treasurer would be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the messengers in the Annual Meeting, October 1990.
 - (4) That all of the other necessary details to implement the organizational and operational changes would be worked out and presented at the Executive Committee meetings in January and July, and the Semi-Annual Meeting in April, 1990.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT
1989

The Annuity Board continues to blaze trails in its effort to "serve those who serve the Lord". The effort put into planning and promoting the Expanded Church Annuity Plan continues to bear amazing results which will multiply manifold through the years. Goals set by the Annuity Board trustees for 1989 include:

Developing a long term care plan suitable to Southern Baptist ministers and their families;

Working through the Church Alliance to provide an approved IRA or to restore the tax deductible option of the Voluntary Annuity Plan;

Providing more choices for ministers seeking to meet the needs for family insurance protection;

Continuing to work hard to control health care costs;

Developing materials on financial planning;

Continuing to make churches and ministers aware of retirement and insurance plans.

It is astounding to see the growth of the Annuity Board and its ministry to ministers across the Southern Baptist Convention. There were, at the end of March 1989, 19,972 annuitants who received \$20,246,625. There were 472 recipients of Adopt-An-Annuitant grants, totaling \$67,775, and 409 monthly relief grants and 180 monthly expense grants, receiving a total of \$142,914. The AB assets at the end of March were \$2,460,709,118, most of which belongs to Southern Baptist ministers who participate in the retirement plans.

We have 151 churches that have signed the Cooperative Agreement, but still make no contribution.

We have 437 churches that are making contributions, but still have not signed the Cooperative Agreement.

There is still a great challenge before us to help ministers prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL
1989

The past year at Baptist Hospital has been characterized by growth in facilities and personnel, advancement in medical technology and continuation of the spirit of personal concern which springs from the hospital's Christian heritage and its denominational tie.

Occupation of the new North Tower is almost complete, increasing the hospital's bed capacity to 806. Construction of the Clinical Sciences Building is expected to be completed by 1990. The Medical Center Boulevard is currently being moved to make ready for expansion of the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Two new helicopter pads, one for the AirCare helicopter and a second for helicopters from other medical centers, will be located on top of the parking deck. The J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging will be built on the approximate site of the current helicopter pad. These new facilities will make it possible not only for our hospital to serve more people, but to serve them better.

A neonatal ambulance for critically ill infants has been added to the helicopter service. A CommView Computer Service stores large volumes of data and transmits the images via fiberoptic cable through the Medical Center and via satellite to other hospitals without any x-ray film. Some brain tumors can now be successfully treated by implanting a tiny radioactive pellet directly into the tumor. A technique called Mohs Micrographic Surgery allows the removal of skin cancer with minimal damage to normal skin.

Last year the 22,100 persons admitted to Baptist Hospital came from almost every county in North Carolina, from thirty-five states, and from eight foreign countries.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues its ministries to: the patient in the hospital; the family and friends of patients; the medical staff who minister to the patient; the person requesting counseling in our centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Morganton, Charlotte, Rockingham, North Wilkesboro; the ministers who seek our courses in clinical instruction, equipping them for specialized and pastoral ministries.

Added to these are our "Pastors' Sabbath" and "Interim Church" programs, as we work closely with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention in addressing the needs of pastors and churches.

During the past fiscal year Baptist Hospital received \$668,937.39 through the Cooperative Program and \$303,133.07 through the Homes and Hospital Offering, including church gifts directly to the hospital. The hospital staff and patients are grateful for the services made possible by these gifts.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.
1989

Like salmon, Baptist Children's Homes this year struggled upstream to get ahead of the problems that plague America's children and families.

While maintaining group care services in place since 1885, BCH also inaugurated two innovative services in Care House, the first home for teen-age mothers and their babies we know of anywhere and the Philpott Parent Aide Program.

Care House where five teen-age mothers will learn to parent their babies, was dedicated June 4 during services at Lenoir's Lower Creek Baptist Church. Also dedicated then was the Marguerite Noel Home for Girls, our second behavior change home.

Until Care House, a young girl who had a child often could not return home. If she wanted to bear her child and keep it, the child had to go to one foster home and the young mother to another until she was of age. The Noel Home, like Moody Home in Franklin, cares for girls whose difficult behavior problems prohibits them from living at home or in traditional group care settings.

On June 21 BCH dedicated the Philpott Parent Aide Program in Davidson County. Trained volunteers will establish relationships with homes labeled "at risk" for child abuse. The volunteer will be counselor and friend, critic and confidant to help families spot and correct areas that lead to child abuse or neglect.

Charles Tanner and Bill Morrow will arrange speakers from BCH for your church and help your members with estate planning.

BCH continues to implement "intentionalized services" according to the long-range plan adopted in April, 1988. Peer culture therapy is being utilized on children at Odum Home and Noel Home is being phased in at Mills Home. This program makes the children more responsible, both for themselves and others in their cottage.

BCH continues to garner popular support with North Carolina Baptists who contributed \$1.52 million through the Cooperative program last year. In the 1988-89 fiscal year, more that \$1 million has been received in bequests.

The executive committee of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina this year declined to adopt a report of a special study committee that would have drastically reduced BCH's share of the Cooperative Program. The committee recommended, and the General Board supported, a return of individual special offerings to Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes and Baptist Hospital. All three social services agencies support such a move, which would eliminate the Homes and Hospital Offering they share. BCH, which began in 1885, as an orphanage in Thomasville, operates four group care campuses, eight emergency care homes, a home for unwed mothers, a teen mother/baby home, two behavior change homes for girls, therapeutic camping and a model child development center. It has work in 17 locations across the state, serving more than 1,000 children and families each year. All campuses and facilities welcome involvement by local churches, RAs, GAs, WMUs and Sunday School departments. Baptist support is strong for children and families and we pray it will continue to strengthen as needs grow every day.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION
ANNUAL REPORT - 1989

"Strengthening for Greater Service" had a special meaning for the trust agency of the Convention during the past year. Noting the progress made during its 69 year history in undergirding the financial support for the Convention, its churches, institutions, and mission causes, the Foundation recommitted itself to greater service to those causes. With concern that it performs its mission efficiently and that it involves more Baptists effectively in supporting the cause of Christ, the Foundation carefully embarked upon a capital campaign to secure funds for the construction of its own building to house its development and administrative offices. Since its staffing in the early 1950s, space for the Foundation has been provided in the Baptist Building. With the consistent rapid growth in assets managed and services provided by the Foundation, the current space has become inadequate to properly perform the on-going work of the agency. We are pleased to report that the majority of the funds necessary to build have been secured. The new building will be erected beside the Baptist Building in Cary, and hopefully be ready by the end of this year. During this project, it has been of utmost importance to our Board of Directors and Staff that the on-going responsibilities of the Foundation not be neglected during the campaign. The need for increased financial support for Baptist institutions, missions, and other ministries has not diminished, and has remained our first priority. It is essential that more individual Baptists become aware of the possibility of sharing the message of Christ beyond their lifetime. Seeking to fill this role, the Baptist Foundation is the only entity which receives endowment gifts for any and every Baptist cause. Through trust and endowment funds, the principal is invested and income is paid regularly and perpetually to the cause or causes named by the donor. Total assets of the Foundation is now approaching \$17 million, of which \$3.8 million was added in 1988 alone, making this the greatest year of growth in the Foundation's history. Last year, \$1,258,775 was paid to Baptist work and to individuals designated to charitable remainder-type trusts. This agreement provides for income to be paid to the donor for a specific period of time and then to charitable causes thereafter. Through this method, heirs are not neglected and Christian causes will eventually benefit from the estate. We welcome the opportunity to serve.

BROTHERHOOD COMMISSION REPORT
1988-89

The Brotherhood Commission continues to feel the effects of its 1987 program changes that produced a comprehensive missions education package aimed at helping churches involve men and boys in missions.

In October 1988, James H. Smith, Brotherhood Commission president, presented a plan of financial austerity following the production of 31 new books in 1987 and 1988. The production costs had drained the agency's reserves. Smith set a goal of earning \$240,000 over expenses in 1988-89. At the April trustees' meeting, Smith reported that income was already \$177,000 ahead of expenses.

Located in Memphis, Tennessee, the Brotherhood Commission is pioneering several new aspects of missions education. In May, the first RA University, an in-depth national training event for Royal Ambassador counselors, directors, and committeemen, was held at Rhodes College in Memphis. More than 300 people from across the country attended.

In April the National Fellowship of Baptist Men a ministry of the Brotherhood Commission's adult division, announced the expansion of its concert series, which will endorse up to 200 concert artists to present the story of Southern Baptist missions and recruit volunteers.

The second annual High School Baptist Young Men's Rallies were held in Gatlinburg, Tenn. and Arlington, Texas, with more than 500 attending. High School Baptist Young Men were also represented on the second National Baptist Young Men's Overseas Work Project in Chile during Christmas break. Seven Baptist Young Men from the United States and Canada participated.

Baptist Men served more than 95,000 meals in Mexico following Hurricane Gilbert's destruction. In Jamaica, Baptist Men worked jointly with the Foreign Mission Board to rebuild churches. More than 700 volunteers participated in this nine-month project.

World Missions Conferences were attended by 1.15 million people; 374 volunteered for missions service and 395 made professions of faith. WMCs are administered by the Brotherhood Commission and sponsored by the Home and Foreign Mission Boards, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood Commission.

Perhaps the greatest effect of the Brotherhood Commission felt by the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention has again been the regular activities of Baptist Men and Royal Ambassadors. Through church and associational Brotherhoods men and boys have been involved in missions by actually doing missions activities, learning about missions, praying and giving to missions, and developing their own personal ministries. These actions have helped churches maintain integrity as God's people for God's world and have helped believing men grow in relationship to Christ.
