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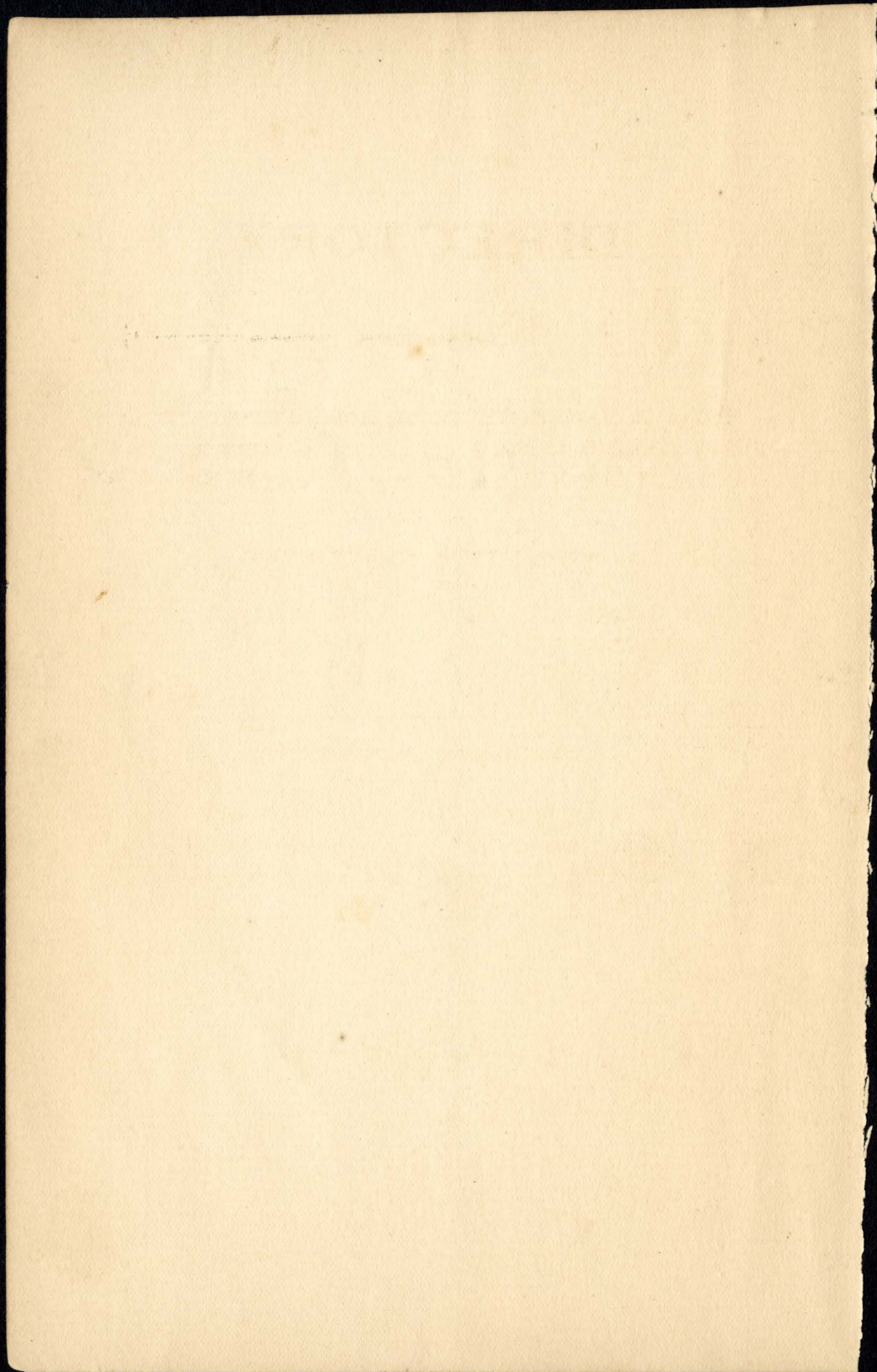

REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE.

(READ BY ARCHIE JOHNSTON.)

The Baptist Orphanage was never in better condition, nor have its prospects ever been so bright. We have 170 children gathered from every portion of the state. The work the institution is doing is bearing rich fruit. The children are surrounded by the most helpful influence that Christian hearts can throw around them. However, the expenses of maintaining the Orphanage are constantly increasing because of the increasing number of children there. The average cost of caring for a child, and this includes board, tuition, books, clothing and everything else, is \$4.66 per month. This showing is not surpassed by any other institution of the kind in the country. The management of our Orphanage is in every way excellent. Bro Boone has directed affairs most wisely, and he has surrounded himself with capable and trustful co-workers. The Orphanage is a great blessing to our people, and we earnestly commend it as worthy of the love and sympathy of the Beulah Association. It is more blessed to give

than to receive, and great as the blessings have been that our people have bestowed upon the orphans of our dead brethren, the blessings that have flowed from it into our denominational life have been greater still. Our Sunday schools are especially urged to take a part in the support of the Orphanage, and we would recommend that in each of our Sunday schools in this Association a collection be taken once a month for the benefit of the Orphanage.

Charity and Children, the organ of the institution, should be found in every Baptist home, and we hope our people will subscribe for and read the paper.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee rejoices to report that the work of State Missions last year resulted in 1,400 baptisms on mission fields, in the organization of 32 churches, in the building of 46 houses of worship, and the organization of 69 new Sunday schools. The work during the present year promises even greater results.

We have 103 regular missionaries preaching the gospel and building up the Baptist cause. The blessings which are coming to individuals, churches and whole communities through their labors, are incalculable.

table. In a true sense the work of missions in North Carolina is worth more to the real welfare of our State, and viewed from the standpoint of patriotism, is more truly patriotic than commercial or political enterprise among us

The destitution is still large. There are whole counties with only one Baptist preacher. The State Mission Board is forced every year to decline to help hundreds of places which are in sore need. Our ability is limited by the liberality of the churches.

There are signs in many sections of the breaking away of opposition and error. We need to press the work now as has never been before.

In addition to our force of 103 regular missionaries, who are in the destitute fields all the year, we have 90 volunteer missionaries organized under the name of the Volunteer Mission Corps. These men have enlisted for four years in this glorious work, to go anywhere they may be sent to tell the destitute of the gospel. Our churches should remember to pray for the blessings of God upon their labors.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

In preparing and submitting this annual report on our educational interests to the Beulah Association of 1898, we view our work from the following standpoints:

First. We should feel compelled to go forward in this sphere of our denominational work, because we have everywhere at hand much material needing to be educated. Every child, young woman and young man certainly in any way connected with our Baptist interests, and they are many, composing the great bulk of material for us, need to be developed and utilized in furthering the welfare of humanity and the cause of our Master.

Second. We are now better equipped for educating our young people than we have ever been in our history. We have wide-open, with excellent teachers, well located, at astonishingly-low rates for board and tuition, many preparatory schools, academies and colleges

With the public schools for starting, Bethel Hill for higher work and collegiate instruction, Wake Forest for young men, Oxford, Murfreesboro and by next fall year the Baptist Female University for young women, all in easy reach, we are well prepared to do our great work of educating the youth committed to us.

Third. We need, as much as we do anything else, educated workers. We need them in family, social, political, school, church and all business life. Intelligence will show its touch, attract and command respect and admiration everywhere. A need so perceptibly easily supplied and helpful should be looked after.

Fourth. We believe it to be the duty of all people to educate and thus develop and utilize the powers with which they are endowed for the glory of their Creator and the good of the race everywhere. With these facts before us, so many to be trained and we well prepared for the work, good workers needed, and in doing it we discharge a felt duty, let us cheerfully, prayerfully and bravely go forward on this noble mission.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Lord has not commanded us to preach His gospel in any particular part of the world, but in all the world. China and Africa are as important as North Carolina. No man, who is not wilfully blind, who reads his Bible, can fail to see Foreign Missions on every page. One soul is as precious in the sight of God as another. North Carolina has one and a-half millions of people, while China has four hundred and fifty millions, and we are commanded to preach the gospel to every creature.

North Carolina has been asked to give \$9,000 to the Foreign Mission work. This is a shamefully small amount for 150,000 members to contribute, and yet there is danger that we will fail to raise it.

Our Foreign Mission Board located at Richmond, Va, conducts its business with great economy, having consumed in expenses last year, only 13 per cent. of the money that came into their hands.

The Lord has greatly honored North Carolina in calling her sons and daughters into the foreign field. This is a loud call to us to sacrifice in sending the gospel abroad. Respectfully submitted.

the States of Louisiana, Arkansas, Texas and Indian Territory owe their existence to the Home Board, it is doing and has done a great work in our own State Many of our churches used to lean upon her for support.
