



DEDICATION
Rev. Charles P. Ginn

Rev. Charles P. Ginn was born on February 2, 1917 near Commerce, Georgia. He was one of four boys and four girls born to Hamilton F. and Dovey Adams Ginn. The Ginns moved to the Sylva area in 1929.

Charles went to high school for one year at Sylva High School and one year at Webster High School. He also went to Western Carolina and graduated from Texas Western University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas.

He met and married Edna Allen Ginn in June of 1948. They have two sons, Lloyd, a Seminary Doctoral student in Chicago, and Philip, an attorney in Boone. They have four granddaughters.


After Seminary, he was appointed a Home Missionary with the Southern Baptist Convention and assigned to Cherokee. He resigned that position and accepted the call to Lovedale Baptist Church, in the Tuckaseigee Association, where he served for two years. From there he accepted the call to the Marble Baptist Church in Cherokee County.

He then received a call from the Sandy Run Baptist Church in Mooresboro where he served for ten years. Afterwards, the Cove Creek Baptist Church in the Three Forks Association near Boone called him to serve. He ministered there for eight years and also served as Vice Moderator of the Three Forks Association. He retired from the Union Baptist Church in the Theron Rankin Association in Lenoir.

When he returned to Sylva and the Allen home-place, he continued to minister in the Tuckaseigee Association. He served the New Savannah Baptist Church on two occasions and the Greens Creek Baptist Church for five years. He also supplied at the East Fork Baptist Church.

He has served for a number of years as an Associate Chaplain at the Harris Regional Hospital. Rev. Ginn served on various Associational Committees thru the years and traveled across the state earlier in his career doing Sunday School Training for the State Convention.

It is with deep gratitude for a ministry that has spanned more than forty-five years and profoundly touched many lives that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association dedicates the 1995 Annual Minutes in honor of Rev. Charles P. Ginn.



WILLARD BECK 1927-1995

Samuel Willard Beck was born on August 15, 1927 to Sam and Artie Queen Beck. He was one of five children, two boys and three girls. He is a native of Jackson County.

He was converted at Balsam Baptist Church at the age of thirteen. He and Doris McCall Beck grew up in the same community, dated, fell in love, and married on April 2, 1949.

They have six children: Elaine Sorrells and Andy of Balsam; Walter of Bay St. Louis, Mississipi; Lewis of Dicks Creek and Jane Arrington and David of Waynesville. They also have ten grandchildren.

He was employed by Western Carolina University for thirteen years and was the 1986 recipient of the University award for outstanding Support Staff. He was also an nominee for the North Carolina Governor's award for Excellence. After retiring from the University, he and "Dot" started a landscapping business that became quickly successful.

He was a deacon at Balsam Baptist for thirty years and known as a statesman. He was supportive of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association and served as the lay representative from the Balsam Church to the Association for many years.

He and the family sang in a family quartet that was very successful and widely sought after. They sung in many churches in Western North Carolina and in South Carolina and Georgia. They were know for their harmony and spiritual power.

166 ANNUAL MEETING MT. PLEASANT, OCTOBER 12, 1995 1st SESSION

- 1. Session called to order by Moderator Wayne Sorrells. He welcomed everyone.
- 2. Harry Vance led the congregation in singing "VICTORY IN JESUS".
- 3. Rev. Larry Perry, host pastor, welcomed everyone to his church. His devotion was from I Kings 19:19 on the prophet Elijah, followed by prayer.
- 4. "Sweet Hour of Prayer" and "Amazing Grace" played on the Violin was presented by the fiddling Dills sisters.
- 5. "Jesus, Sweetest Name I Know" and "One Drop He Shed for Me" was presented by the Senior Adult Choir of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.
- 6. The sermon was preached by Roy Burnette; AMBASSADORS OF GOD with scripture taken from Romans 13:12-13.
- 7. The Moderator expressed appreciation to our Host Church. Recognized new pastors and visitors. Moved and seconded received to accept business session as presented.
- 8. Barry Almand gave the Discipleship report. Moved and seconded that report be adopted.

- 32. The Moderator thanked Black Mountain for the delicious meal.
- 33. The Moderator read thanks from Willard Beck's family for the dedication of 1995 Annual.
 - 34. Roy Burnette gave the Missions Development Council report. He made a motion to withdraw from \$2000.00 from the Annie Hoyle Fund for our Director of Missions to go to South Africa, \$500.00 1000.00 for a folding machine, and \$1500.00 2000.00 for new carpet for the Baptist center. Moved and seconded and motion carried.
 - 35. Jim Sherrill gave the Finance Committee report. He then presented the proposed budget for 1996. Moved and seconded to adopt as read.
 - 36. Jesse Flake gave the treasurer's report. Moved and seconded to adopt the report.
 - 37. John Reid gave the Resolution Committee report. Moved and seconded to adopt the report.
 - 38. John Reid made a presentation to Wayne Sorrells. Presentation to Elizabeth Stillwell for 40 years perfect attendance in Sunday School and to Sterling Melton for 68 years as a pastor in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.
 - 39. Jack Hinson gave the Mission report on Haiti.
 - 40. Linda Fisher gave the report on Ukraine.
 - 41. John Reid gave a report on Brazil.
 - 42. Virginia Pangle gave a report on New York.
 - 43. Lyman Fisher gave the Brotherhood Report.
 - 44. Harry Vance led the congregation in singing "I'm going that Way".
 - 45. Nelda Reid gave the WMU report. She presented a special guest, Dr. Dellanna O'Brien, National WMU Director.

PROGRAM REPORTS

APPALACHIAN CENTER

We began our second year of theological studies at the Appalachian Center in Murphy this fall. Through the efforts of Dr. Chester Jones, DOM, of the Truett Baptist Association and in cooperation with Macon and Tuckaseigee Associations, we are offering fully accredited courses leading to an Associate degree in Christian Studies from New Orleans Baptist Theological Center.

The future of our school is directly related to enrollment. As long as we have interested students, New Orleans Baptist theological Seminary and Tri-County Community College will assist in providing formal education for our ministers and laymen.

Seventy-five percent of the Churches of the Tuckaseigee Association are pastored by Bi-vocational pastors. In an effort to provide our pastors the opportunity for Pastoral education, we have brought this center into being. Bi-vocational pastors may now keep their jobs, pastor their flock and advance their education without moving away from home or traveling to major urban areas to take courses.

The Cooperative Program of the Southern Baptist Convention helps with student expenses. Three hour courses cost one hundred eighty-five dollars. Compared to other schools, this is a bargain for theological education.

Churches may help by encouraging their pastors to attend the school and assist them by providing scholarships. Interested laypersons are also encouraged to earn an Associate degree in Christian studies, thereby improving their reading and teaching skills.

As we study together we will enhance the mission and ministry of their local church. Let us cooperate and build a strong school.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I celebrate my thirteenth anniversary as Director of Missions, I am grateful to God and to you, the people of the churches, for the prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement you have given me during these years. I am grateful for the many opportunities to preach, to teach and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church.

Churches and Associations are called to be on Mission and do Missions. We are in the fourth year of our New York-North Carolina partnership. This year Rev. Wayne Dyer, Director of Missions, of the Davis Association visited us after Home Missions week at Ridgecrest. This was his third trip down here. The Senior Adult Choir are going on fall mission trip to New York to sing at the Davis Association Annual Meeting and two of their churches.

We are in our third year of our Ukraine Partnership. Thus far three men and one woman have gone to the Ukraine. Linda Fisher, RN of the Ochre Hill Church will present a report on her trip this past July at the Annual Meeting.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina will consider a joint partnership lasting five years with three countries from the southern part of Africa. I hope that we will vote at this annual meeting to participate in that effort.

The Cashier's Church continues to sponsor migrant Hispanic ministry at the Flat Branch in the Norton community. Yes, there are now people who speak other languages living and working in Jackson County and our ministry is to them as well.

This is the second year of the Baptist State Convention Extension Department and the Transylvania Baptist Association, and our Association to help finance ministry at Sapphire Valley. See Irene Hooper's Mission Development Council report for further details.

We continue to have some success with the Handyman project. We accomplished several small projects this year. We also participated in a wood cutting this past February that served several Jackson County elderly families.

We began a counseling center this year in cooperation with the Macon and Truett Association. It is necessary that we do our part financially with the other associations to ensure the long term success of this center. See the Counseling Report in the Book of Reports.

Last year after the annual meeting I went with the Senior Adults to Caswell on a Senior Adult Retreat.

In December Jack Hinson and I went to Hati on a food distribution project. He will present a report at the annual meeting.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. I attended the regional Vacation Bible School

Clinic, the Key Leadership Conference, and the Annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Atlanta, and the DOM Conference in Wingate. Nelda and I did a regional training meeting for the state WMU this past spring. I also served on the 75th Anniversary Committee for the Baptist Foundation of North Carolina.

Also there are numerous Associational meetings that I attend here in the county. I serve on the Board of Trustees of Truett Baptist Camp and for the Southwestern Area Resort Ministry.

I also serve as an Associate Chaplain for Harris Regional Hospital and Chairman of the board of United Christian Ministries. This year Jackson County Habitat for Humanity was started and I was invited to be a charter member of the board of directors. It is my privilege to be called upon from time to time by various groups because of my office as Director of Missions. Baptist are strong and influential in this area.

Betty Grant observed her fourth anniversary this past May 1. She has grown with the job and now is a first rate secretary. Please pray for her health.

The annual Gardner-Webb ministry day went well here this year. Four churches participated by giving young men of God who are called and are spending time studying in preparation for a life of service to have the opportunity to preach in our churches.

I am grateful for the prayers and financial support of the many listeners of the radio program. Although the Tuckaseigee Baptist half-Hour is not officially linked with the Association, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and promotion of events in the Association.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the church and the Association.

Some of my most important work is done in confidential relationships

with churches that are having problems. I have counseled with leaders and pastors and attended meetings by invitation of the leadership to assist in delicate situations.

I am very grateful and commend to you the officers, program leaders, committee members and others who volunteer your services and talents. I have high praise and great respect for your work. The Association, like the local church, is totally dependent upon volunteers to accomplish its tasks. Volunteers have contributed many hours and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

Churches continue to be generous in their support of Associational Missions. There is both an understanding and an appreciation among many of the churches that our call is to minister first here in Jackson County and then to reach out beyond. See the stewardship report for a detailed look of Associational giving.

Two important aspects of Associational life are strong. Our fellowship and cooperation among our churches is good. Churches are having joint services, attendance is good at meetings, and there is a good spirit in the churches. May God continue to bless us as we work together.

CHAPLAINCY REPORT

Due to extensive building renovation and expansion of food services by the hospital, the Chaplaincy Ministry has a new home. Among the improvements the new quarters are a chapel, a conference room, and chaplain's office plus desk with telephone for use by pastors and a designated place for tracks and devotional helps. We are pleased to announce that 27 churches, businesses, and individuals gave more than \$2000 toward furnishings for the new rooms. appreciation is expressed to all donors.

We are fortunate to have a group of dedicated pastors to serve as chaplain Associates. They take on-call duty about two evenings per month. During the month of May, they participated in a 10-hour course of study entitled "HOW TO HELP HURTING PEOPLE". Discerning the will of the creator in understanding and counseling people who have lost loved ones or people who are facing crises is what the Chaplaincy Ministry is about.

The work at Mountain Trace consists of several areas of ministry. First The residents truly enjoy this time of of all is weekly Bible Study. attendance is eighteen. fellowship and study. Average visitation with residents. All residents are visited, but a decided effort is made to visit new residents shortly after admission. This is a life and lifestyle changing event. A pastoral visit at this time can help ease the transition for the resident as well as for the staff. Thirdly, there is the monthly family support group. Family members need ministry as much as residents. This group meets the first Sunday of the month at 1:30 pm. Fourth, pastoral counseling is available. This is open to residents, families and staff. Fifth, the Lord's Supper, Communion is served quarterly to any resident willing to participate. This is usually done in connection with the weekly Bible Study but is served individually for those who are homebound. It is also served for residents and their families on request. Along with these main functions are hospital visits, funerals and memorial services. Mountain Trace Nursing Center now has capacity for 100 residents. The Dolphin Friendship Ministry provides for residents to have at least one visit per week. More people are needed to make these rewarding visits. experience is necessary--only a love for people and a desire to express care

to persons at Mountain trace. Please contact Barry Almand to get in on this blessing.

Missions Development Council

Among the many mission efforts, helping to meet needs, are the following:

In February several Baptist men gathered for a Woodcutting Day. Eleven loads were delivered to those in need of wood for fuel. Approximately twenty more loads are ready for delivery as the need arises.

A fund of \$500.00 was collected and sent to hurricane victims in Georgia.

Approximately \$1800.00 was given by individuals, schools and churches to help three families of Cagle Branch Road, Sylva, who suffered losses due to the hurricane-like storm that swept through their area.

\$ 1,976.00 was collected and sent to the victims of the Oklahoma Bombing.

In July, the Tuckaseigee, Transylvania Associations and the State Convention exerted much effort to start an interdenominational mission church in Sapphire Valley. The personnel was available, however, no suitable building could be located.

There is definitely need of a witness there. Its reported that in a ten mile area of about 13,000 homeowners, there is only one church, (non Baptist). It has been estimated that between 40 to 50 thousand summer residents and visitors pass through this area in the summertime.

In early September, the N.C. Missions Offering was promoted in various ways. Rev Reid devoted a portion of his Sunday morning Radio Program to this by having Irene Hooper, N.C. Missions Development Consultant speak.

A small luncheon was served for about 10 key church leaders where a video was presented. It portrayed the many needs here in N.C. of reaching people for Christ. The luncheon was given by Irene and Rev. Reid.

On September 10th, Irene was invited to speak on the subject- the N.C. Mission Offering at the Garden Creek Baptist Church, Marion, N.C.

This past year we have had the following persons journey to foreign countries to share the gospel: Rev Jack Hinson and Rev John Reid went to Haiti, Linda Fisher took a trip to the Ukraine and Oleta Zachary and John Reid were invited recently to return to Brazil. There Oleta was the honored guest at the dedication of the Mission Chruch which she was instrumental in raising funds to build. The WMU group there has the name of the Oleta Zachary WMU. Rev. Reid went as a Revival speaker.

PASTORAL COUNSELING CENTER

At our April Executive Committee the Association voted to participate with sister associations in Region 10 in the establishment of a Regional Pastoral Counseling Center.

Baptist Hospital and the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina have worked closely with regional leadership in each step of the development of this ministry.

Presently we have received forty thousand dollars from Baptist Hospital and the Baptist State Convention. This money will enable us to spend the fall months encouraging our churches to support the ministry, train our board members and begin to build a client assistance fund so that solid Christian counseling may be affordable for everyone.

We have secured the services of Dr. Chuck Wyatt as our resident counselor. Chuck has an earned Doctorate from the Chandler School of Theology, Emory University and is a member of the American Association of Pastoral Counselors and certified by the Pastoral Counseling Association of North Carolina. He has a two year advanced residency in Pastoral Counseling

and Pscho/Therapy and has worked for seven years with Georgia Baptist Medical Center in Atlanta. Dr. Wyatt's office is presently located in Franklin, NC. His phone number is 704-524-3040.

Our Association will need to commit about twelve thousand dollars per year for this work. If forty-nine churches contributed \$250 per year or approximately \$40 per month, then we can more than meet our portion of the costs. As is true in the local church, not every member contributes. Some churches are challenged to give more than \$250 per year to make up the difference for those churches who do not make contributions.

Please give prayerful consideration concerning this ministry. Together we can help restore relationships, strengthen families and give direction to confused individuals. As we join our efforts I believe God will use us to bring healing to many hurting people.

SENIOR ADULTS

Our Senior Adult program is doing very well, although I would like to get more churches involved. We now have about 25 members in our choir and usually have 12 to 14 church represented. We meet every 4th Sunday at 2:30 at the Baptist Center for practice.

Last October 17-20 we made a trip to Fort Caswell Baptist Retreat, which we enjoyed very much. We had 12 members go on the trip.

We were invited to sing at several churches this past year. October 23, 1994, Locust Field Church, 16 member present and 11 churches represented. October 30, Buff Creek Church, with 15 members and 9 churches represented. November 12, Jarrett Memorial Church for revival services. November 13, Speedwell Church for their Homecoming.

March 26 sung at Wilkesdale Church, 18 members present, 11 churches represented. April 30, sung at Shoal Creek Church 5th Sunday Night Singing, 10 churches represented. May 5, Mothers Day luncheon at Baptist Center. 15 present, 11 churches represented. Kim Mathis & Shirley Beasley provided special music.

July 7, sang at Skyland Care Center. 23 members present. Wayne Dyer, DOM from New York was visiting with us that night. August 27, sang at Mtn Trace Nursing Home, 24 members present, representing 14 churches. September 7, sung at Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville. 15 members present, 9 churches represented. September 14, 13 choir members went to Ray Parkers home to sing and have prayer. September 24, invited to sing at Webster Church for their homecoming. We have a mission trip planned for October 4-10 to New York State to sing in some of their churches.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

I want to thank the finance committee of the Association for the hard work they put into producing this budget. I believe it is an obtainable budget. Also I want to thank the churches in the Association that are faithful in your giving to Associational Missions.

I want to share three belief's about churches. First, the local church is the local expression of the Body of Christ. This means that we are to worship Christ and to minister to each other and those around us in the name of Jesus Christ.

Secondly, I believe in missions. This is actually how we minister in Christ's Name. I believe the Bible teaches that we are to minister through missions in our own community first. Then we are to minister in our county, our state, our nation, and the world. I do not believe that a church that leaves any of these areas out of its mission effort is completely faithful to the Bible. Thirdly, I believe in churches working together. Cooperation means not having everything completely my way, but working together when and where we can to advance the kingdom dream and accomplish the mission of the church beyond our own community. Baptist have historically cooperated with each other.

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association is one way that your church can join together with other Baptist Churches in this county to strength our own churches and minister here in Jackson County. We are strong when we stand together. We are weak when we stand alone.

One measure of your spiritual commitment to serving the Lord in Jackson County and beyond is the level of your giving to Associational missions through the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

II Corinthians 9:7 says, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Missions is at the heart of the Southern Baptist denomination and WMU helps to teach missions and helps to get churches involved in missions. This year's theme or emphasis "A Time to Grow" challenged us to grow spiritually and to reach out to help others grow closer to God.

Several activities were held throughout the year with this emphasis in mind. Girls in Action sponsored an overnight fall festival "Missions Around the World." Two missionaries spoke to the GAs. Also, an associational Foreign Mission study was held for all Girls in Action. A co-ed Foreign Mission study and a Home Mission study were sponsored by the Acteens. 1995 Report: Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina

Michael C. Blackwell, President H. Lee Davis, Jr. Chairman of Trustees

For six-year-old Malinda, darkness brought sleepless nights listening to her mother's boyfriend beat her brother and sister – and praying she wouldn't be next, watching her mom choose her lover's whims over her children's needs, and finally, being abandoned on Christmas Eve in pouring rain on a dirt road.

Her darkness, more than just a light switch clicked off, swirled with pain, fear, confusion and despair. Today, a bright-eyed teenager living at Broyhill Home, one of four Baptist Children's Homes residential campuses, Malinda finally sees light. After becoming a Christian in 1992, she can forgive her mom and let go of her painful past. "Learning to deal with my issues is a lot easier since I became a Christian," said Malinda. "I'm happy here at Broyhill. The people believe in me, support me and are here for me."

Believing in children and families, offering light to pierce their darkness has been Baptist Children's

Homes' goal since its beginning 110 years ago.

Serving 1,513 children and families in 1993-94 in 12 facilities across the state, BCH provides intentionalized programs of residential group care, emergency care, therapeutic camping, maternity care, teenage mother/babies, model day care and behavioral change for girls. Gaston County emergency care cottages in Dallas, operated on a yearly contract basis, were not renewed with BCH following Gaston County's decision to change the facilities' direction to a level of service BCH doesn't provide.

Commemorating 110 years of ministry, BCH published *Intent to Serve*, a history depicting the last decade of BCH's child-centered, family-focused services. Each church was to receive a complimentary copy in the

Fall of 1995.

Founded in 1970, the Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville celebrated in October 25 years serving over 900 young, unmarried, pregnant women who were given a quiet, supportive atmosphere to make decisions about their future.

A chapter of BCH life closed with the death of alumni, employee and friend Bill Sisk. Investing 52 years of himself, Sisk, who came to Mills Home at age 8 and returned to work on staff 42 years, died May 21, 1995. "An era has passed," said BCH President Michael C. Blackwell. "It's extremely unlikely Baptist Children's Homes will ever see another individual who invests himself so fully in this place as did my friend Bill Sisk."

Adding to the light, Baptist churches, through the Cooperative Program, designated gifts and the Thanksgiving Offering funded about one-fourth of BCH's \$12 million budget with gifts totaling \$2,934,304.

Trustee Jim Goldston held his sixth annual Goldston's Carnival for Children raising \$28,633 and providing two fun-packed days of rides, games, entertainment and food for children and area residents. "There is nothing more important in this life than children," said Goldston. "This is just one thing we can do to show our commitment, to put our feet to our prayers."

Putting words into action described numerous individuals who gave time and effort with special campus

work projects.

This year, the Friends of Children committee added a twist to their annual spring bus tour by pulling on gioves and work clothes to help beautify Odum Home in Pembroke and Cameron Boys Camp near Southern Pines.

A team of volunteers from Denver Baptist Church worked at Broyhill Home clearing brush, painting inside a cottage and building a storage shed; and at Kennedy Home tearing down an old gym built in the 1930's, restructuring an old picnic shelter into an arts and crafts center, removing old heating equipment from Biggs cottage and renovating family conference rooms in the new gym.

"We pray about these kids, and we pray that we will be an example," said Allen Holmes, Denver Baptist's mission trip coordinator. "This is more important than any building or construction work."

Trustees, intent on strengthening BCH's leadership position and continuing its tradition of giving light to families and children, approved a \$10.1 million campaign, "Light Their Way," to raise money for special projects, operational needs and endowment. The campaign will run September 1995 - May 1997.

Many children, like Malinda, suffer in darkness. Many families linger in pain waiting for answers, waiting for help. Because of Baptists' support, BCH is able to "Light Their Way," offering hope, security and

love.

Baptist College/University Report 1995

The Baptist State Convention is 165 years old. For 161 of those years the Convention has been in the business of founding, adopting, supporting and nurturing Baptist colleges and universities. North Carolina Baptists are known for their broad and deep commitment to Christian higher education. Our seven Convention-related education institutions are: Campbell University, Chowan College, Gardner-Webb University, Mars Hill College, Meredith College, Wingate University and Wake Forest University.

For 1995 the Convention's Christian higher education budget is \$6,000,540, or 20.41 per cent of the total. These funds are divided among six colleges. Wake Forest is not in the budget, but receives designated gifts from churches and shares in student financial aid funding through the State Missions Offering.

The 1994 enrollment in North Carolina Baptist colleges and universities was 22,473, with 4,075 graduates. Approximately 476 students were enrolled in church-related vocation studies.

1995 ANNUAL REPORT

The messengers present at the Baptist State Convention meeting 75 years ago, when the establishment of the Baptist Foundation was approved, believed that the services to be provided by the Foundation could benefit both the individuals who would use its services as well as Christian purposes for which the Convention had organized many years earlier.

With a well trained and dedicated staff, the Baptist Foundation is now in position to assist any Baptist church member who has a desire to preserve their estate for their families and provide greater financial service to their church, association, missions, Baptist institutions or the Convention in its program of work.

Those who have become involved with the Foundation thus far, many of whom no longer are alive today are providing critically needed resources for either their family members and/or the Christian causes they dearly love. In many instances their use of a trust or endowment fund has helped reduce income and/or estate taxes and increased the value of assets they left for their families at their death. In addition, they continue to provide for sharing the Gospel with the income from endowment funds they created while they were living.

Many North Carolina Baptists are today enjoying the benefit of increased retirement income through the creation of an annuity trust with the transfer of property or other assets which the Foundation sold and invested under guidance of professional managers. When these trusts were created, the individuals were provided tax benefits which enhanced their estates. In most cases, the income they now receive is greater than that received prior to starting the trust. At some future date of their choosing, the assets in trust will serve the Lord in ways chosen by the donors.

During the past year, an area manager was employed to serve the western portion of the state. A twelve-minute video, "Pillars of the Church", was prepared which shares through personal example how the Foundation can serve every church member. A copy of this video is available by request in writing to 201 Convention Drive, Cary, North Carolina 27511. Personal and confidential assistance is available by calling our office at 919-380-7334 or written request directed to the above address.

The total assets under management by the Foundation at the end of 1994 were \$47,312,575. A total of \$1,241,756 was paid to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes during 1994. The amount paid to individuals from trusts, which will eventually pay to Baptist causes, was \$1,499,098 during the year. During the first six months of 1995, the total performance of the charitable endowment funds under management was 15.3% (annualized).

Meeting the Challenges of Health Care

Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our *beritage* while providing quality bealth care at affordable prices.

"THE BAPTIST"

Affectionately known to many simply as "The Baptist", our hospital now employs 5,544 members who comprise our healing team. We are joined with Bowman Gray School of Medicine and thus The Medical Center has over 9,000 employees making us the largest employer in Forsyth County. In fiscal year 1994-'95, our 806-bed facility provided care for 23,712 inpatient admissions. Our rapidly growing Outpatient Department provided care for 557,511 patient visitors.

A NEW DIVISION: PASTORAL CARE AND CHURCH RELATIONS

In May restructuring created a new division with the consolidation of the departments of Pastoral Care and Church/Community Relations. This division consists of four ministry components which are listed below with a brief ministry synopsis:

DEPARTMENT OF CHAPLAINCY AND PASTORAL EDUCATION

Through spiritual and emotional healing to patients, families and staff, approximately 55,000 ministries were provided by our chaplains.

THE CENTER FOR CONGREGATIONAL HEALTH

This rapidly expanding ministry to churches, pastors and staff, and congregational leaders also enables the training of intentional interim pastors. Also, training is provided for leadership and church consultants. Workshops and other events are held as well.

DEPARTMENT OF CHURCH AND DENOMINATIONAL RELATIONS

This department serves as the liaison between Baptist Hospital and the churches, associations, and convention, as well as other church groups. By facilitating appointments, policy interpretation, understanding of our health care services, this function helps keep our vital bond with North Carolina Baptists strong. Mission dollars for benevolent care through this department in excess of \$452,000 were given by Baptists to the Mother's Day Offering. This mission effort helps relieve the financial burdens of patients who have little or no healthcare insurance. This is truly a ministry of renewing hope in their lives and is a source of great joy for us.

PASTORAL COUNSELING

With increasing requests from churches and associations across the state, this ministry continues to expand. Our thirteen strategically located counseling centers provided 27,000 ministry hours last year.

POINTS OF EXCELLENCE AND PROGRESS

- FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP Annually Baptist Hospital's rate increases consistently are less than both the medical consumer price index for hospitals and general inflation. The most recent North Carolina Database Commission report comparing the average of charges at other instate academic medical centers for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21% lower. For all hospitals statewide we are 7.7% lower on those same charges, despite treating the most critically ill patients from across the state.
- QualChoice OF NORTH CAROLINA A managed care plan providing quality healthcare and patient physician choice. Established by The North Carolina Baptist Hospitals, Incorporated and Bowman Gray School of Medicine and Wake Forest University, QualChoice is now expanding to employers in our region.
- ACCREDITATION WITH COMMENDATION This distinction was awarded us by the Joint Commission of Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. With a grade of 96 we earned the distinction as one of America's most highly rated hospitals.
- EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT/DIETARY BUILDING With a Fall 1995 opening date this 300,000 square foot facility will expand our Emergency Department capacity to 70,000 visitors annually. It will also house a 35-bed Day Hospital, as well as a 900-seat cafeteria, and will double the proportion of private beds available to patients.
- COMPREHENSIVE OUTPATIENT REHABILITATION FACILITY A 64,000 square foot facility scheduled for completion in the Summer of 1996.
- STICHT CENTER ON AGING AND REHABILITATION Housing a geriatric research and education center, geriatric day hospital and inpatient acute rehab beds, geropsychiatry, and adult acute psychiatry, a planned completion and opening date for this center is the Spring of 1996.
- HOME HEALTH SOLUTIONS AND HOME HEALTH SPECIALISTS Specialists provide at home care such as intravenous chemotherapy, pain management, nursing care, and physical and occupational therapy.
- COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ASSISTANCE Baptist Hospital continues to develop relationships with hospitals and physicians in other communities inviting them to join our expanding healthcare delivery system.

A CLOSING WORD

Historical methods of delivering healthcare are changing in significant ways. We are constantly seeking to position ourselves to develop the methodologies, services, and delivery systems to meet these challenges. In the midst of the multiplicity of changes remain several treasured, time tested constants. Among these are our commitment to excellence and compassion in providing care, the demonstrated support of North Carolina Baptists, and most significantly, the providence of our Lord. Trusting in these, we move forward boldly and confidently into the future.

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1995 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the forty-four year history of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. The following are some highlights from the year:

In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired Luther Osment of Sylva, North Carolina as its first full-time Chaplain. Reverend Osment's work responsibilities include ministry to the residents of the Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem and the Western North Carolina Baptist Home in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step up" for Older Adults, the final phase of the renovation of The Taylor House Facility in Albemarle was completed in the Fall of 1995. The renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was also begun in 1995 and hopefully will be completed by year end. When the renovation of The Hamilton Baptist Home is completed, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "state-of-the-art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some

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form of dementia), the Young Solarium addition was completed in the Fall of 1995. The Young Solarium will house a new smallgroup program designed to enhance the quality of life experienced by institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults who may not need institutionalized care, the Baptist Retirement Homes developed a new home and community based service program, In Home Care, Inc. . . . the new service designed primarily to extend the amount of time that frail Baptist Older Adults can remain in the home environment.

The headlines each day--Bosnia, O.J. Simpson, interest rates, tax overhaul, etc.--often include Southern Baptists. The secular media show special interest in our conflicts but all too often do not tell the whole story of the good things Baptists are doing. The <u>Biblical Recorder</u> tells the whole story--the many positive things people are doing in their churches along with the negative issues which cannot be concealed and ignored if we honor our heritage from yesterday and fulfill our mission for tomorrow.

There is no way to address these issues without correct and reliable information. The Biblical Recorder was born and continues to serve for that purpose. In the 162 years of state Baptist papers in North Carolina, never was the Recorder more needed than now for people to have the truth.

People are reading less than any time in recent history. It is true of secular publications, it is true of wholesome books from respected libraries, it is true of religious publications. We live in an electronic age where many think they know the answers to the issues only to discover they do not. It is impossible to know in depth what is happening when we depend on "60-second sound bites" of news on television or radio.

An informed Baptist is a better Baptist; an uninformed Baptist may be an uninvolved or disruptive Baptist. No democracy, including our local churches, can survive long without an informed, involved constituency which makes decisions based upon accurate information from reliable sources.

The $\underline{\mbox{Biblical}}$ Recorder should be in every Baptist home in North Carolina. Your support as a subscriber and reader, coupled with your encouragement to others, will enable the paper to better serve the constituency with accurate and helpful information.

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the <u>Recorder</u>, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. This system lets any congregation have their church news incorporated into the <u>Biblical Recorder</u> which saves staff time, postage and printing costs. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Recent and anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1995-96 than when it was started in 1990.

The paper focuses more and more attention on North Carolina Baptists with news, features and inspirational articles which will encourage individuals and churches in their witness and ministry. One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed. With all the stress and disturbance in the world, "The North Carolina Baptist Way" has become even more important to us than ever before.

CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE

This year has been a significant one for the Christian Action League of NC as we gave leadership and support to local communities in their battle against the proliferation of alcohol, provided a voice for Christian morals and ethics in the halls of the legislature and continued our battle against on-going legislation concerning the lottery and other anti-family issues.

We were concerned in three areas. The alcohol industry sought to implement state-wide Liquor-by-the Drink and beer/wine sales through legislative action. House Bill 599 would have implemented LBD without a vote of the people. The Christian Action League prompted churches to action and strong opposition developed from across the state, the bill was withdrawn and died in committee.

Secondly, in the 1995 session of the General Assembly, there were four lottery bills introduced. Several times in the past decade, gambling forces were able to secure the passage of a lottery measure in the Senate, but not in 1995. Lottery legislation was defeated in the Senate by a 28-20 vote and it appears at this time the House lottery bills will not be voted on during this session. North Carolina remains the largest state in the nation that has no state-sponsored lottery. However, we request your prayers as the Christian Action League will continue to be on the front-line fighting this battle again in 1996.

Thirdly, the Christian Action League and other Christian organizations have continuously lobbied for abolition of the state abortion fund. House Bill 229 has passed and will cut the abortion funding from \$1.2 million to \$50,000 and then to be used only in cases of rape or incest.

For many years we have been working for legislation requiring parental consent before a minor can obtain an abortion. We are pleased to report that this measure was adopted this year.

Finally, Reverend Johnny R. Henderson became the League's Executive Director in July upon the retirement of Coy C. Privette. Johnny brings a wealth of experience to this position. A trustee since 1977, he is the North Carolina Baptist Men's Correctional Ministries Coordinator and serves on the Executive Committee of Prison Fellowship of North Carolina. Also, his church was featured on ABC News last year for its outstanding prison ministry.

We are grateful to God for the prayer and financial support that the League receives from the churches of your association. May others join you as we seek to be the "Salt and Light" in a world hostile to Biblical ethics and morality.

ANNUAL REPORT 1994-95

Jackson County Gideon Camp, for inclusion in The Book of Reports

The Gideon Organization, known as The Gideons International, is composed of over 129,000 Christian professional and business men in 172 countries. The Auxiliary is numbered at over 73,000 women, (wives and widows of Gideons). With the help of local churches here and throughout the 172 countries, The Gideons are placing an average of one million Scriptures every 9 days. Funding to purchase the Scriptures come from three main sources: 1) Local church love offerings; 2) Memorial Bible donations; 3) The Faith Fund, (donations by individual Gideon members). All monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures. Administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members through their annual dues.

North Carolina has **4,342** Gideons and **2,361** Auxiliary members. The Jackson county Camp, one of **146** camps in North Carolina was started in 1982. The present membership is **21** Gideons and **17** Auxiliary. It has been the Camp's pleasure to share a Gideon report in numerous churches in Jackson County this past year. A total of **2,748** Scriptures were distributed or placed during the year and Jackson County Camp received **\$16,833** from Christians and friends of Jackson County for the purchase of Scriptures.

John 20:21 tells us "...so send I you."

Jeffrey Matthews, of Marianna, Florida, praises God that he was arrested, convicted and is serving time in prison. He serving three life sentences in the federal System and 205 years in the Florida State system. He praises God for it was in prison that he learned of Jesus Christ. It was in a jail cell on his knees that he gave his life to Jesus. He had to go to prison and be locked up in a cell, with nothing to read - except a Bible placed by the Gideons in his cell - to find out about Jesus.

He responded that the DEA office in Ft. Myers Florida had been bombed. Jeffrey was arrested and convicted of that crime. He was also arrested and convicted for contract murders, drug dealing and conspiracy. He sits in prison but rejoices because he is FREE!

His testimony is, "I would rather live the rest of my life in prison with Jesus Christ as my Saviour than outside without Him. If God can change my life, He can change anyone's."

This "fruit of another soul" was made possible only because faithful church members gave to purchase the Bible. A faithful Gideon placed it in the cell. The Holy Spirit worked through God's Holy Word. All had a part in one coming to Christ. God's Word tells us in Isalah 55:11 "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth; it shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

We claim His promise!

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HOME MISSION BOARD, SBC Christ for Our Nation

1994 ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHTS

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). With national offices in the Atlanta, Georgia area, the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

As of December 31, 1994, there were 4,913 missions personnel serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. This is only 87 short of the Bold Mission Thrust (BMT) goal of 5,000 home missionaries. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,300 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 2,000 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields, exceeding another BMT goal six years early. During the year there were nearly 1,300 church starts. Southern Baptist churches baptized 378,463 people in 1994, an increase of nearly 30,000 over 1993.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1994, gifts to the offering totaled \$37,177,500, about 2 percent more than the 1993 total and the second largest in HMB history. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1995 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$50 million, in commemoration of the HMB's 150th Anniversary. About 35 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1994:

Chaplaincy Ministries--The 2,364 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 24,000 professions of faith.

Church Loans—The Church Loans Division closed 107 church loans totaling \$21.5 million, including \$3.9 million of refinancing.

Language Missions--Home missionaries in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups and 97 American Indian tribes, using 102 languages and dialects, in addition to sign language.

Volunteers—Volunteers continue to serve in record numbers and represent more than \$100 million in value to the HMB. In 1994, nearly 80,000 persons served as volunteers, about 5,000 more than in 1993. Mission Service Corps missionaries, numbering 2,016, and serving in 1,385 locations, represent a cadre of committed people responding to God's call to be personally involved in home missions.

Christian Social Ministries—More than 2,500 volunteers were trained to teach English as a second language, tutor children and youth, and assist adult non-readers.

Church Extension--Through Praxis, 47 men and 31 women from six Southern Baptist seminaries participated in church planting during the summer.

Special Ministries—International ministries were conducted at the United Nations, in Washington, D.C., in 40 port cities, and among international students.

Prayer and Spiritual Awakening--The Home Missions Intercessory Prayerline received 82,000 calls in 1994.
