#### REPORT OF HOME MISSIONS

All mission work is essentially the same in spirit. The field is the world The gospel is the good tidings of great joy delivered to the world. The gospel must be carried to the world. The duty is laid upon us as servants of Christ to carry or send it Expediency has divided our mission work into State, Home, and Foreign missions. The work done by the Home Board last year far exceeds any previous year.

There were 865 workers, supplying 3128, baptized<sup>a</sup> 18798 or 50 for each day during the year; 14207 members were received by letter. 207 churches and 703 Sunday schools were organized, and 309 houses of worship were built The contribution were 50,000 dollars more than last year, a gain of thirty per cent. Under the wise supervision of Rev A. E. Brown, great progress has been made in our mountain school work Improvements have been added to the amount of \$55,000, and 228 students were converted. The Home Mission Board hopes soon to have a building and loan fund of \$500,000.

There are now 3000 churches west of the Mississippi, within the territory of our Southern Baptist Convention. In five years there will be 2500 rail-road towns needing Baptist churches. Six Baptist chapels are needed in Cuba at once Three in Panama, and two among the Indian tribes. \$500,000 is the amount set for this years work. More and more our people see the importance of taking care of our Home Field. Many churches, a few years ago feeble and fostered by the Home Board, are now large and self supporting, and send large contributions to the general fund. Many new features tend to make our Home Mission work of more importance. One feature is the large foreign element coming into the country. In many of our cities the work assumes the form of Foreign Mission work. Take New York, its population has passed four million and will in a few years have passed that of London. Eighty per cent of its population or four out of five is foreign. "New York city, says a prominent Baptist preacher of that city, is the greatest Foreign Mission territory according to area on the globe. Ninety per cent of Chicago is foreign. Chicago has more Germans than any other city in the world except Berlin, more Poles than any other city in the world There are more than 300 distinct religious bodies in America today.

The great question before us is, shall we Christianize them or they paganize us. We must either take America for Christ or through our neglect it will be taken by the devil. Again, there is a growing conviction among those who know the situation, that the greater part of bringing Foreign nations to Christ must be done by the foreigner. How could this be done better than by Christianizing the foreigners in our midst and then send them back to their own country to tell of the Christ who saves? 8

When we consider that one and a half million of people come into this great country of ours every year, we will readily see the vital importance of our taking hold of this great work The tide of emigration is turning southward rapidly. More than half the people of Tampa, Flä., speak Spanish or Italian. May God help us to rally to the support of the Home Board in this all important work.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ORPHANAGE

All the reports from our orphanage at Thomasville are most encouraging. The infirmary building is now being rebuilt

The Watson building, a dormitory, has just been remodeled and changed from a one to a two story building.

Recently a new domitory called the Aydlette building has been completed and other improvements have been made There are about 350 orphans cared for at the home. Here at a cost of five or six dollars little children are fed, clothed and given schooling The cost of living is greater than it was a few years ago therefore the contributrons made by our churches should be increased every year. It is hard to conceive of a more benificient work than the feeding, clothing and educating of these fatherless and motherless children. Surely if Jesus were on earth such work would receive his highest commendation. We are sure that His all-seeing eye does not fail to note this good work, and it receives His favor and blessings. Without this home many of our little ones would live lives of hardships and privations, and many would grow up to lives of crime, misery and shame. As it is they receive more careful training, counting their educational and religious culture, than children do in the average home of today. If anything would appeal to our sympathy and open our purses, it surely is the thought of these helpless children.

Let us remember that many destitute and homeless wanderers find a safe place of refuge, here. Oh! think of the many more helpless ones who have no home of peace and plenty and comfort. Oh think of the many little hearts that are made old and hard while young in years for the lack of the love and sympathy of father and mother. Surely we will not fail to rally to the support of this institution.

Your committee recommend that every church take up a

collection each month for the orphanage. Another important work is to hunt up the orphans and assist them to get a place in our "childrens home." Pure religion and undefiled before God and the Father is this, to visit the fatherless and the widow in their affliction.

1st. By attempting the establishment of Pastorates, or the grouping of the churches in such way as to include the strong and the weak and destitute places in groups together.

2nd. By the voluntary services of Revs. J. L. McCarson and T. A Drake, who preached a number of times at different destitute places

3rd By the employment of Rev. W. A. Morris, as Missionary, to employ one half of his time, taking the field and his churches for his salary of \$300 00, and pledging the Association for any deficit in said salary to an amount not exceeding \$50 00 should brother Morris fail to collect his salary from his churches and the field of the Carolina Association, \$6.00 of which pledge was advanced by Revs. G. S. Jones and T. H. Posey.

The committee recommends that the Association employ a regular Missionary, to give his full time to the work within the bounds of the Association, employing the best man, and at the best salary the Association is able to pay. And further, that hereafter the Association have but one committee, and that the Executive Committee, which shall have charge of, and manage the business of the Association, during the Associational year, and make full report at the next session.
