#### CAROLINA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

HELD WITH

#### FLETCHER BAPTIST CHURCH

AUGUST 9, 10, 1928

The Fifty-Second Annual Session of the Carolina Association met in the auditorium of the Fletcher Baptist church at 10 o'clock this morning.

A. B. Miller led the audience in singing "Come Thou Fount" and "Higher Ground."

N. A. Melton led in prayer.

The rules having been suspended, by vote, the following officers were re-elected: Moderator, J. J. Slattery; Vice-Moderator, N. A. Melton; Clerk, A. G. Sargeant; Treasurer, Foster Bennett; Historian, A. I. Justice; Auditor, M. L. Walker.

A. B. Miller was introduced as principal of Fruitland Institute.

M. L. Lewis for the tenative program committee suggested the report on Christian Education which was presented by A. B. Miller and spoken to by N. A. Melton and A. B. Miller.

The report was adopted.

#### REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

That North Carolina Baptists believe in Christian Education is proven by the fact that we have established and are maintaining three senior colleges, Wake Forest, Meredith and Chowan, three junior colleges, Campbell, Mars Hill and Wingate, and two high schools, Boiling Springs and the school at our Orphanage. During the year 1926–72 these schools had officers and teachers 213 enrollment, including summer schools, 3965 ministerial students 230, and volunteers for special service 45. They had properties valued at \$3,792,873.23, productive endowment of \$2,691,762.45 and expended for administration and instruction \$725,734.88

Though it seems that we have done so much for our schools we have barely begun to do what needs to be done and must be done if we are to compete with the educational institutions of other denominations and state schools in the training of our young people. We are compelled to enter into this competition because neither the schools of other churches nor the schools of the state can train our leaders for us. We must either train our people or die as a denomination. Which shall it be? By the grace of God let us go forward and take care of our schools in a worthy way. The demand for Baptist schools has not passed.

We should call special attention to Fruitland Institute, one of our high schools fostered by the Home Mission Board. She has made a record to challenge the admiration even of the angels in Heaven, so glorious have been her ministrations for the past thirty years. Shall such a God-honoring institution be allowed to die or even be hindered by debts or poor equipment? No, never. Then rather let us rally to her support by paying promptly and cheerfully the pledges made in the recent campaign, by providing additional equipment, and by making it possible for the many fine young people who are insistantly knocking at her doors, to have the opportunity to study within her walls.

After singing "There is a Four ain," R. P. Corn led in the devotional exercises reading the 17th chapter of John's Gospel and led in prayer.

A program was presented by the tenative program committee and adopted.

The State Mission Report read by M. L. Lewis was adopted.

#### STATE MISSION REPORT

Our State Mission work is now in its 99th year. It has made good through all the years. Though it has met with some great struggles. We are expecting our children and grand children to reap fruit from the seed sown. The work of the Board this year is incouraging, our people are getting better acquainted with its work and are therefore co-operating better. It is true however that we are not raising as much money as in former years. But money is not all in the Kingdom's work. Take the early Churches for example, they did not have large bank accounts, but they shook the Roman Impire from center to circumference. State Missions is preparing for a great future. Think of the Sunday School work, the W.M.U. work, the B.Y.P.U. work, all of these are the agencies of State Missions. Then the Preachers' School, where we preachers can set at the feet of the best Bible teachers in the South. Then Christian Education is getting due notice by our able Secretary, Dr. Maddry. The Centinnial Movement, in my judgment, was a great success. It got people acquainted with our school work as nothing else could. Then weak churches are being helped and made to stand alone. Many others are in need of help, but the Board can only help as it is helped. If we could get all our people to pray for the work, it would be no trouble to get them to pay for the work.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

During the 83 years our Home Mission Board has been in existance it has done a great work in our Southland.

Taking up the work somewhat by departments lets notice church extension. This is a very important department of our Board. The as other departments has been seriously handicapped for lack of funds. The church building and loan fund is not in position to donate any funds for church building. Due to the greatly increased building activity it can only on long notice grant a very limited number of loans for church building. No hope soon to remedy this condition. A great work could be done in this department if only sufficient funds could be secured.

The publicity department has been greatly extended during the past year. Results are seen from this work.

The Sanatorium at El Paso, Texas is very grateful for increased patronage and usefulness. There has been marked progress toward self support. The hospital has given back \$9,000.00 to the denomination more than has been received from the Denomination in cash. They have not been able to do a tenth of the free work needed.

By no means least in importance is the work being done in Mexico, Cuba, Panama and among the emigrant population of our coast cities. Our work too among the Indians is worth notice.

Never in all history has the need been greater and more vital in our homeland. In sixty-seven large centers of Mexican population nothing is being done to win them to Christ.

City wide, associational and even state wide campaigns in evangelism conducted regularly. These have been very successful. It is hoped funds may be had for greatly enlarging this work. Possibly the most important of our boards work is evangelism. This department under the supervision of Rev. Ellis A. Fuller. This fills a great need in our churches. Home Board evangelists have led many to Christ adding during the past year 5,517 to our churches.

Our mountain mission school work is so well known and covered by other reports that it is scarcely necessary to mention it here. Our Association could never have kept Fruitland going had it not been for the assistance rendered by this department of our Board.

Work among soldiers, sailors, deaf mutes and has been active for the past year. Lack of space prevents a more extended report of all these departments.

The Home Board as well as all other departments of our work has felt the decrease in donations to our general work. It is to be hoped that, with return of our usual prosperity throughout the country, work that is so much needed may be done here in our homeland.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our Foreign Mission Board is located at Richmond, Va. and has been in operation for 83 years.

The cause of foreign missions has always been dear to the hearts of true Southern Baptists.

The wonderful manifestation of the blessings of our Lord upon this work has been a source of joy untold to us. We have on our foreign work more than 500 American missionaries and more than 2,000 native helpers. There are 1,275 churches connected with our work abroad, 959 of them own their own houses of worship. Their grand total of membership reaches 146,072.

There were reported last year to the Board 12,542 baptisms as a result of the labors of these missionaries. There are more than 2,000 outstations in which the Gospel is preached, and by this means multitudes hear the good news that would not otherwise have that opportunity.

For all these evidences of divine blessings upon our work we thank God and take courage.

One of the most heartning things of the last year occured in Roumania on February 1, 1928. The Roumanian Government granted Baptist full liberty of teaching and placed them on equal footing with all Roumanian citizens. Up to that time our Brethren in that country had been suffering that most shameful persecution.

On May the news flashed out over the wire that the beloved secretary of our Foreign Mission Board. Dr. J. H. Love, had passed away. This while it was not unexpected, cast a gloom over our Southland and over the Mission Fields to the ends of the earth. God takes the workers but the work goes on.

Foreign Missions is the great objective in which our Lord Himself is interested.

If Southern Baptists would pay only one dollar each to this object for the ensueing year it would wipe out every dollar of debt we owe and keep our promised work going.

Brethren as preachers, churches and individuals let us see to it that we do our full part in this great work.

It is published in the interest of our Baptist work, and at the expense of the stockholders, for the past six years the paper has been a liability. The Recorder promotes the things that shall win. It seeks to aid in bringing in the certain reign of Christ. The readers of the Recorder are its best assets and in North Carolina the Kingdom's best friends.

The best is none too good for our North Carolina Baptist homes. The future homes depends on the Christian culture of the homes of this generation.

People are largely influenced by what they read. The Biblical Recorder seeks to bring weekly a summary of our Baptist news, local and general to our people. It seeks to give a Christian Baptist interpretation to the events of the day. It seeks to give the achievements among our schools, our churches, our Sunday Schools, B. Y. P. Our people should read Charity and Children so as to know our duty towards our State Orphanage at Thomasville, N. C. Pastors should urge upon their members to patronize these religious papers and read them as they give information about the Baptist work in North Carolina.

#### REPORT ON CHURCH MUSIC

Since the music has such an important place in church worship, it is necessary that we have good music. The church should not allow any questionable music to be used in any of its worship.

There is some music in use today that is not fit for spiritual worshipers because it has such a movement to it that it puts more "glory in the heels than in the soul."

As a committee to report on the subject, and having some experience in leading the music for church worship, I advise all churches to provide good church hymnals for your singing in all church worship.

I hope this will cause much interest and attention to the music department of every church, and we will have better music in all our churches in the future than we have had in the past.

There are at present 616 children in the main plant at Thomasville, and the branch at the orphanage farm near Kinston. Furthermore 70 worthy widowed mothers are helped by the orphanage. These mothers are enabled to keep their homes together, thus caring for 300 children.

Most of the 50 to 100 applications received each month are turned away because of the lack of room.

The Sunday Schools are the chief source of income for the orphanage, and we urge that once each month an offering be taken in every Sunday School in the Association for the orphanage.


