

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF RANDOLPH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I-NAME AND OBJECT

Section 1. The name of this organization shall be the Randolph Baptist Association.

Section 2. The objects of this organization shall be:

- The promotion of harmony, fellowship and cooperation among the churches of the Association.
- b. The propagation of the Gospel within the territory of the Association and to the uttermost part of the earth.

Section 3. The promotion of the missionary, educational and benevolent causes of Christ within the Association and in cooperation with the State Baptist Convention of North Carolina and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE II-MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of the Association shall consist of messengers of Baptist churches regularly affiliated with the Association. All churches desiring affiliation with the Association shall present to the Committee on Organization of New Churches proper petitions, accompanied by satisfactory evidences of doctrinal regularity and general acceptability. After one year under the watchcare of the Association the said Committee will report to the Association its recommendation. Upon a favorable vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the annual associational meeting the petitioning church may become regularly affiliated with the Association.

Section 2. (A) Fellowship may be withdrawn by the Association at any annual meeting, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee, from any church in its membership that has been found, by due investigation, to have departed from the Missionary Baptist faith and practices, or has failed to abide by the provision of this Constitution and By-Laws.

(B) Such a church may, upon recommendation of the Executive Committee and vote of the Association, be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such action have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the meetings of the Association.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish to the Association each year a letter, on the form provided by the Clerk, giving full information and statistics provided for on the form, and to send with the letter or by messenger a contribution toward the cost of printing the minutes and other expenses of the Association.

Section 4. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in its own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except of an advisory nature.

ARTICLE III-MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually on Wednesday

and Thursday following the third Sunday in October.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall be composed of messengers chosen by the respective churches of the Association from their membership. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for each fifty members, or fraction thereof, above one hundred it has enrolled. All pastors in the Association and the Associational Field Worker are messengers in all the Associational meetings, each having but one vote.

Section 3. The Association may hold a Mid-Term meeting each spring at such time and place as may be determined by the Association or its Executive Committee. The purpose of the Mid-Term meeting shall be that of information and inspiration without the transaction of business, except that urgent matters of business which cannot well be delayed until a later meeting may be considered and acted upon.

Section 4. Other meetings of the Association may be held when called by the Executive Committee.

Section 5. A church may withdraw from membership in the Association by a vote of the church according to its own by-laws, regulations or procedure.

ARTICLE IV-OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer and three Trustees.

Section 2. These officers shall be elected on the first day of the regular annual session. They shall take office at the close of the Annual Session and serve through the next Annual Session. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall not serve more than two years in succession.

Sestion 3. Duties of the officers:

- a. The Moderator shall preside over the meetings of the Association and discharge such duties as are incumbent on the presiding officer of a deliberative body.
- b. The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of or at the request of the Moderator.
- c. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of the Association, together with the reports and statistics, and have the same printed and distributed. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at the Annual Meeting.
- d. The duties of the Trustees shall be to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of said Trustees shall be authorized by the Association or its Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Association endorses the continued operation of organizations among the churches of the Association for the promotion of the various phases of their work including the Sunday School, Baptist Training Union, Baptist Brotherhood and Woman's Mission-

ary Union. The officers of the Associational Sunday School, Associational Baptist Training Union, and the Associational Baptist Brotherhood shall be nominated by their Nominating Committee and the Nominating Committee of the Association, and approved and elected by the Executive Committee of the Association, and shall serve from October 1 to September 30. The Woman's Missionary Union shall be recognized as an auxiliary organization of the Association.

ARTICLE V-EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Association shall have an Executive Committee comprised of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Trustees of the Association, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Baptist Training Union Director, Associational Baptist Brotherhood President, Associational Woman's Missionary President, the Associational Field Worker, all pastors, all church educational directors, and one member of each church in the Association desiring representation on the Committee.

Section 2.

- a. The Executive Committee shall hold meetings once each quarter during the second month of the quarter, the date to be set by the Board itself, and at such other times as may be required at the call of the Moderator, or at the call of not less than five members of the Executive Committee.
- Twenty members of the Executive Committee shall be required to be present to constitute a quorum.
- c. To act for and on behalf of the Association between sessions.
- d. To carry out the orders and resolutions of the Association pertaining to it.
- e. To superintend the Associational Mission work, employ a missionary and determine the salary to be paid.
- f. To fill vacancies which may occur during the year in the personnel of the Associational officers or workers for the remainder of such unexpired term.
- g. To investigate any report of complaint that may be brought to its attention about irregularity of doctrine, practice, or conduct on the part of any individual or group in the Association and report its finding with such recommendations as it considers advisable, to the Association in a regular meeting.
- h. To make such recommendations as it may deem wise for the strengthening and upbuilding of the churches and the work of the Association.
- The Executive Committee shall not involve the Association in debt to exceed one hundred dollars for necessary operating expenses of the Association.
- To appoint and elect the officers for the Associational organizations of the Sunday School, Baptist Training Union and Baptist Brotherhood.

ARTICLE VI-COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees some weeks before the annual meeting of the Association. This Committee shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the annual session. The Committee shall name the following committees to report during the annual session: Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator. The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees: Committee on Ordination, Committee on Organization of new churches, Radio Committee, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Goals, Nominating Committee, Committee on Order of Business, Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Budget and Finance Committee, Missions Committee, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or by the Moderator.

Section 2. Duties of the Committees:

- a. The Committee on Place and Preacher will receive all invitations of churches which desire the Association to meet with them the next two years and will recommend to the Association the place to meet the following year, without regard to the order in which the invitations may have been received. This Committee will also recommend a preacher and an alternate for the annual sermon at the next session.
- b. The Committee on Memorials will prepare a list of those members of the churches who have died during the year and present suitable memorial resolutions for adoption by the Association.

 The Committee on Appreciation will prepare and present appropriate resolutions of appreciation.

d. The Committee on Goals will consist of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President and Superintendent or Evangelism Chairman. These officers shall be elected at the August meeting of the Executive Committee under the authority of Article 5, Section 2, Sub-Section J, and shall be authorized to act from the August meeting, and to present at the Association session in October suitable goals for the work of the Association during the ensuing year.

e. The Committee on Order of Business will prepare well in advance a suggested order of business for the annual meeting. The committee will notify those who are to make reports or have parts on the program. This suggested order of business will then be presented to the Association at its regular meeting.

f. The Nominating Committee shall nominate a complete slate

of officers for the next year, excepting the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII—ORDINATION AND CALLING OF PASTORS

Section 1. Inasmuch as the ordination of a man to the gospel ministry by any church in this Association is expected to be recognized by the denomination as a whole, the churches are counseled to be extremely careful in the matter of setting men apart for this sacred calling, ordaining only those who, by irreproachable character, piety of life, doctrinal soundness and suitable talents, give promise of honoring the name of Christ and of rendering acceptable service in the missionary Baptist ministry.

Section 2. To aid the churches in this vital matter, the Association will appoint each year a committee of five of the pastors to be called the Committee on Ordination. Any church desiring to ordain a brother to the ministry may request the said Committee to act as a presbytery for the purpose of examining the brother as to his fitness for the Baptist ministry, and, if he is found qualified, to assist in the ordination.

Section 3. The churches are urged also to exercise the utmost care and wisdom, earnestly seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in calling of their pastors, choosing only men who give evidence by their Christian character, cooperative spirit and leadership ability, that they will serve the best interests of the churches, the denomination, and the cause of Christ.

ARTICLE VIII-NEW CHURCHES

Baptist churches may be organized and established in localities within the territory of this Association when such new churches are seen to be needed. Those interested in organizing a new church may seek the counsel of the Executive Committee and the Missions Committee of the Association.

ARTICLE IX-RULES AND ORDER OF DECORUM

This Association shall be governed in its meetings by such rules and by-laws as may be adopted, amended, or set aside by a majority vote of the messengers present. Kerfoot's "Parliamentary Law" will be the guide in all parliamentary matters.

ARTICLE X-ADOPTION

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and shall supersede any and all constitutions, by-laws, and amendments previously adopted.

ARTICLE XI-AMENDMENTS

This Constitution and By-Laws may be amended at any regular annual meeting by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present, provided the proposed amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Annual Meeting. The vote on any proposed amendment so presented may be deferred until the second day if requested by a majority vote of the messengers present.

The Moderator shall appoint a Committee on Committees some weeks before the annual meeting of the Association. This Committee

shall prepare its report and shall be given the opportunity to submit its report early on the program of the first day of the annual session. The Committee shall name the following committees to report during the annual session: Committee on Memorials, Committee on Appreciation, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or Moderator. The Committee on Committees shall also name the following standing committees: Committee on Ordination, Committee on Organization of New Churches, Radio Committee, Committee on Place and Preacher, Committee on Goals, Nominating Committee, Committee on Order oif Business, Constitution and By-Laws Committee, Budget and Finance Committee, Missions Committee, and such other committees as may be requested by the Association or by the Moderator.

To amend Section 2 of Article VI as follows:

Sub-Section A, add the word "two" immediately after the word "next" in Line 2 of Sub-Section A, and add the letter "s" to the word "year" in line 2. Add the words "the following year" immediately after the word "meet" in the third line of Sub-Section A.

Amend Section D to read as follows:

The Committee on Goals will consist of the Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, W. M. U. President, and Superintendent or Evangelism Chairman. These officers shall be elected at the August meeting of the Executive Committee under the authority of Article 5, Section 2, Sub-Section J, and shall be authorized to act from the August meeting, and to present at the Association session in October suitable goals for the work of the Association during the ensuing year.

BAPTIST LITERATURE REPORT

Have you ever stopped to think that God chose to use writing as His means of self-revelation to the world? He made known His nature and will to men through writing. Where would the world be today were it not for the divinely-written relevation, the Bible? Since God Himself saw fit to use literature to reveal His will, as Christians it is obvious that we have a divine plan to follow.

Since 1833, the news media for North Carolina Baptists has been the *Biblical Recorder*. It is the connecting link among Baptists and it strives to convey its message in an attractive, pleasing manner. It gives complete coverage of Baptist work, and its circulation is the highest in its history. This summer at a Southern Baptist Editors' workshop at Syracuse University, the *Recorder* received high recognition for its pleasing appearance and good content. The covers and large picture content were especially praised.

In the Randolph Baptist Association, 18 churches with 1400 subscribers use the Every-Member plan. Six churches with approximately 126 subscribers use the Club plan. These 24 churches using either the Every-family plan or Club plan represent a high percentage of churches in the Randolph Association, but we should not be satisfied until every church is using the family plan so that Randolph Baptists may be the best informed Baptists in the State.

Besides the Every-family plan and Club plan, the Recorder is sent free to every pastor and Sunday School Superintendent. This service is paid for and sent to each under a special arrangement.

The Recorder in the Every-family plan represents an expenditure of about 4¢ per family per week. Where else can we buy so much for so little?

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

State Missions is the organized effort of the Missionary Baptist Churches of North Carolina to win all this state for Jesus Christ. Plans, programs, and procedures are necessary for the task; yet, they are but tools, implements in the hands of people, for the sake of helping other people. Missionary enterprise has ever been a prime concern of our State Baptist Convention.

Guided and quickened by the Holy Spirit, and led and directed by spirit filled men, our denomination has made giant strides in evangelism, education and training, care and conservation, and aid to churches and pastors. The past year has seen significant advances, as a new ministry was begun with Japanese-related people, new missions and churches were established, and other phases of the State

Mission program were broadened and strengthened.

Blessed by God, Baptists have come a long way in North Carolina. Of more than four and a half million people, Baptists number about one fourth the total population and one half the church membership. However, we have not arrived; our goal is not even near. Thousands of our members are lost to the service of our Lord, two million of our citizens are out of the fold of Christ, and six hundred communities are without preaching or Bible teaching. Thus, the "Thirty Thousand Movement" is perhaps the most challenging matter confronting us today. We need to do much more in this matter of establishing missions and organizing new churches. This is our most effective outreach for Christ, as new churches win more people per capita than old established ones. Let us pray sincerely, let us give unselfishly that all the people of this state may be personally confronted with the claims of Jesus Christ.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

Home Missions is now serving in all of the states of the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, and in Cuba, Panama, and the Canal Zone. About fifteen new associations are being organized annually, and an average of 48 missionaries were appointed monthly in 1960.

The Board is seeking to work with other State Conventions, and has agreed with 23 states for work in 1961—a gain of seven over the previous year. There are many new projects of the Home Mission Board such as co-operation with the state of Hawaii in the field of evangelism.

There are now three Southern Baptist Churches in Puerto Rico that are affiliated with the Florida State Convention.

Language work begun in the Great Lakes Area and in New York and the Northeast Association. The development of a Literacy Ministry in Mountain and isolated areas has met with enthusiastic support. It is anticipated the Board will render some assistance with church loans for National Baptist Churches in certain areas where the needs are urgent.

The lack of desirable church sites is hindering the 30,000 movement. More funds are needed, and to this end the upper bracket of the 1961 Annie Armstrong Offering, and any overage that may come from that offering, will be used to augment the church site fund of the Home Mission Board.

In connection with church extension the Board hopes to find funds in 1962 to implement one or more "Big City" programs. Also a special emphasis is being placed on Down-Town missions centers in the deteriorating urban areas.

Despite political conflicts in Cuba, Southern Baptist work is prospering very well. It is not known what the future holds in Cuba, but Baptists can rejoice over the progress that has been made in the past year.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

At the beginning of 1961 there were 1,480 missionaries under

appointment for service in 45 countries. The object of the Foreign Mission Board is to have under appointment by the close of 1964, a minimum of 2,000 missionaries. The present objective is to appoint 160 additional missionaries in 1961.

As you can readily see, the advancement in enlarging the Foreign Mission Boards efforts calls for an expanding budget and greater provisions for capital needs. Baker J. Cauthen is quoted as saying, "In financing the work of foreign missions, there are three main divisions of responsibility. First, missionaries must be sent and supported. Second, funds must be provided to cultivate developing programs of work on mission fields. Third, resources must be made available for capital expenditures.

"The urgency of the missionary task across the world increases every day. We must bring to this enterprise not only resources in terms of lives and money, but increasing spiritual power through prayer and faith. Work must be extended into many lands we have not yet entered, and work which has begun in many fields we are now serving must be strengthened and expanded."

With this statement in mind, let us, the Churches of the Randolph Association, promote a stewardship emphasis among our people as we give to the Foreign Mission Board through the Cooperative Program

and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The Training Union is a tremendous power in the lives of Christian people throughout the world. From churches with Training Unions come 95% of our soul-winners, more than 90% of our Missionaries, and

over 90% of our Mission gifts. This is another assurance that the Word of God is "Quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword." Heb. 4:12. With such a weapon in our hands, we ought to train ourselves in its use.

Our theme for the year was based on Revelation 2:10, "Be thou faithful unto Death, and I will give thee a crown of life." These are the words of our Lord to the church at Smyrna, and to us. We have sought to encourage and promote faithfulness in every area

of our lives and work.

During the year we have had all 12 regular meetings—4 Executive, 4 Conference, and 4 Mass Meetings. The Executive Committee has had several special meetings. Only two things kept us from reaching the Standard of Excellence this year—the number of Unions in our Association, and the required number of officers. We have the required officers for next year, and with the cooperation of the churches that do not have Training Unions, we can become Standard.

In addition to the monthly meetings, our Training Union sponsored "M" Night, tournaments for Juniors, Intermediates, Young People, and Adults; Youth Week, Youth Night, Study Courses, and cooperated with other organizations in special activities and programs. In March our officers taught a Study Course at the Union Grove Church and organized a new Union, which is now one of the strongest in the Association.

The Bible instructs us to "Desire the sincere milk of the Word that we may grow," and to "Grow in Grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ."—1 Peter 2:2 and 2 Peter 3:18. This should be a challenge to us to build more and stronger Training Unions. We could, thereby, make good church members of our new converts, better church members of our older members, and soul-winners of all members.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The decade of the 1960's promises to be a period of major emphasis on education. One can hardly study the progress of our denominational program without realizing the absolute necessity for adequate Christian Education. "The Thirty Thousand Movement" will require and is requiring Christian leadership in proportions heretofore unrealized. The goal of two thousand missionaries under appointment by our Foreign Mission Board by 1964 will obviously demand a tremendous amount of new Christian leadership. The expression of our Baptist colleges in our own state has already placed demands for Christian leadership adequately trained and prepared beyond our supply. In the light of our expansion of the Kingdom's work throughout the world the emphasis on Christian education becomes a matter of "do or die."

As young people proceed from their home churches to the colleges of our state it is absolutely essential that they be provided with the finest education possible in the most consecrated Christian environment. Such educational institutions are possible only when every church from the smallest to the greatest is aware of the need and dedicated wholeheartedly in interest and concern to the task of Christian education which has been set before us. This must be an interest and concern which leads to constructive action rather than destructive criticism. It has been the conviction from earliest time among Baptists that the church-sponsored and controlled schools is the foundation of strength for our society, and it must ever be that way. Our seven colleges must be securely lashed to Christ and His way for only thus can they continue to make their contribution to our churches, our denomination, our society, and the work of our Lord all over the world.

All of our churches are urged to observe this day with this special offering.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

God, no doubt, has entrusted Baptist churches with the responsibility of caring for our pastors and their families in the days of

need and anxiety. The Lord has led Southern Baptists to entrust the Annuity Board with a practical program that will aid our Baptist churches in this matter. This program of protection is called the Southern Baptist Protection Plan. Each and every Baptist church is invited to protect their pastor and his family through this plan.

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan provides financial help in the time of death, disability, and retirement. The Board is there to serve in time of sorrow, if the church is in the Protection Plan. In case of the pastor's death, his widow would receive an income from the Board as long as she lived or until she remarried. In case of disability, the pastor would receive a monthly check from the Board as long as he is disabled. At the age 65, the pastor can receive his regular annuity as long as he lives.

We urge all churches to contribute to the work of the Annuity Board. Every church would do well to investigate this plan. At present the following churches of the Randolph Baptist Association are active in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan: Randleman, Asheboro First, Liberty First, Balfour, Beulah. Franklinville, Fayetteville Street, Mt. Pleasant, Oakhurst, Randolph Baptist Association, and Ramseur.

We also suggest that one of monthly Associational Meetings be given to the discussion of this phase of our denominational work. Churches desiring information should contact members of the Annuity Committee, the Associational Missionary, or Tom Greene, Baptist Building, 301 Hillsboro Street, Raleigh, N. C., who is the Director of the Annuity Board work in North Carolina. He will be happy to present this matter to any local church desiring help. We further urge you to discuss this matter with pastors who are in the plan and also with their churches.

EVANGELISM REPORT

These are tremendous days in which we live. The number of hopeless people, hopeless because they do not know Christ, grows daily. Many of these lost people live in the territory of our Association. They live near our churches. Surely this is the time for total dedication to Christ in His purpose of winning the Multitudes to God.

To move forward we must start from where we are. Our Association is the best launching place for new frontiers in evangelism and missions. Therefore, we would remind you of the program of Evangelism adopted by our Association last year:

1. That every church engage in two revivals each year, 1961-1964.

2. That our Association participate in the Baptist Jubilee Revivals, 1962-1964.

That at least 80% of churches observing same dates with two consecutive weeks of evangelistic preaching. Our dates as

follows:

1962—April 1-15 1963— 1964—March 8-22

- That all churches make full use of the Revival Plan Book for 1961-1964, supplied free to all pastors by the Division of Evangelism, Raleigh.
- That our Association recognize the elected Associational officers as the Evangelism Committee, the Chairman of Evangelism to be Chairman.

This year, in addition to the above recommendations adopted last year, we recommend further:

- That all of our churches participate in an Associational Central Revival at Asheboro, July 7-21, 1963.
- That our Association each year, 1962-64, have an Evangelistic Clinic following the suggested program supplied by the Division of Evangelism.
 The date for 1962 be on February 2.
- That our Association send the Chairman of Evangelism to Ridgecrest for the annual conference on Evangelism during Home Mission Week.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES

North Carolina Baptists can be justly grateful for their Christian ministry to 125 residents in their three Homes-Resthaven and the Hayes Home in Winston-Salem, and the Albemarle Home in Albemarle. With 130 people waiting for admission at the present time, lack of rooms is one of the most acute problems. North Carolina Baptists, however, are definitely doing something about this situation. The Hamilton Home, now under construction in Martin County, is proof-positive. This, our fourth Home, will provide for 30 additional residents. It is hoped that the Hamilton Home will be ready for occupancy no later than the first of January, 1962. A debt of \$275,000.00 has been assumed on this Home, and for the purpose of completing the liquidation of the indebtedness on the new infirmary at Winston-Salem. There is no further expansion of desperately needed additional facilities anticipated until the major portion of this debt is paid. Special Day Offerings and gifts from the churches should, therefore, be increased greatly in order that we may go on in the great task which is

ours, and that we might meet the ever-increasing demands of the

aging among us as quickly as possible.

We are now in the eleventh year of operation, and the past year has been a great one and a good one. Twenty-six new residents have been received and are finding happiness in their new home. The Special Day Offerings and special gifts are running 5% ahead of last year's contributions, and we are grateful to each church and each individual for the liberal support they give.

The appointment of Mr. C. O. Weaver of Greensboro, N. C., as Business Administrator of the Homes has proven to be one of the greatest blessings of the past year. This dedicated layman is serving

with unusual ability and insight.

The average age of our residents is around 80, and we rejoice in the fact that the life-span is increasing for them, by the loving kindness of North Carolina Baptists through the tender care of our Homes.

One of the most wonderful gifts ever made to the Homes is now coming to fruition. It is the handsome duplex apartment, made possible through the generosity of Miss Roxie Sides of Winston-Salem. This new facility, now under construction on the Reynolds Park Road site in Winston-Salem, will be occupied in the fall, we hope, and will open an avenue for four additional residents.

Along with our many blessings have been moments of bereavement. During the past year 14 persons have been called to the Heavenly Home, but we have soon been lifted up in the knowledge

that God has called His own unto Himself.

The happiest times in the Homes are when friends and members of our North Carolina Baptist Churches visit us. We extend a cordial welcome to come and see first-hand the things of great Christian significance that are being experienced daily in our Homes and that can never adequately be described on the printed page.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Our Baptist Hospital continues to try to serve our people in the fullest measure possible. Last year it provided its largest number of days of hospital care and saw the largest number of patients in the Clinics—78,000 visits to the Out-Patient Clinics, from 96 of the 100 counties in the State, and 75,000 Private Clinic visits.

SOME OF THE NEWER SERVICES: The New Progressive Care Unit was opened in March, providing 80 beds for patients who do not require the more expensive and intensive care of the regular hospital. This is a new and advanced step in hospitalization and pa-

tients are highly pleased with it. The Hospital's one regret is that at the present time it does not have money necessary to open it to Service Patients.

A new type of unit for the sterilization of surgical and other equipment by gas was recently installed. This is more effective than the older methods used in the fight against infection, which is a constant problem in all hospitals. In the X-Ray Department a rapid film developer is now in use which greatly speeds the preparation of x-ray films.

THE MOST URGENT NEEDS: Among the many needs at our Baptist Hospital, there are some which are acute. One of the most pressing needs is a building to provide classrooms and other facilities for the eight schools operated by the Hospital. These schools are training urgently needed medical personnel and Christian workers in addition to doctors. They are badly limited and handicapped for lack of room.

The need for enlargement of the overcrowded and seriously limited out-Patient Department, Children's Center, and Psychiatry section of the Hospital is urgent. The need is far beyond the present facilities in each of these departments.

The constant need for Mother's Day Funds for helping Service Patients bear the cost of their hospitalization grows more and more acute. We cannot emphasize too strongly the importance of this Fund and the need for our churches greatly to enlarge their Mother's Day Offerings.

A new opportunity to help meet this need is now open in the Service Patient Endowment Fund. This is a permanent endowment invested by the Hospital's Trustees with all of its proceeds being used for the help of Service Patients. Gifts in any amount can be made at any time. A gift can be made in one's own name, in memory of a friend, as a memorial to a loved one, or the Endowment can be placed in one's will. All gifts will be gratefully received, appropriately acknowledged, and a permanent record kept of each one. We hope you will think and pray about this and that many will take advantage of this opportunity.

Our Christian heart beats with compassion for those in need. We would like to be of service, but our hands and minds lack the skill. Is there no way for us to express our desires? By providing those who know how, we become in a small way the hands of Jesus reaching out to those who need Him. Our hospital is worthy of our support, and we look forward with anticipated joy to the words of our Lord, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

The Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a Christian agency providing love and care for more than 800 deserving boys and girls annually. These are dependent and neglected children who, for some reason, have found it necessary to live away from their homes.

Your child care ministry is child centered, Christ centered and church centered. It is based on the redemptive plan of God. These children have lost their parents through a number of ways. Workers use all the skills available, plus the help of God, to establish in these

children trust in adults, trust in self and trust in God.

Boys and girls live at Mills Home, Kennedy Home, and Odum Home. One hundred twenty-five children live in Christian Foster Homes throughout the state. Some mothers who have lost husband and father receive financial grants in the home which enables them to keep and care for their own children. Well trained case workers are spending an increasing amount of time working with and strengthening families.

It became necessary during the past year to reduce the number of children in Foster Home care by 35 boys and girls. At one time we were caring for 162 children in Foster Homes. We now have 127. This trend can be changed only as we have additional income. Many types of service to children in need are being delayed for lack of money.

Financial support for this year has come from the following

sources:

Thanksgiving Offering	33	percent
Cooperative Program	32	percent
Once a Month Offerings	18	percent
Special Gifts and Endowment	17	percent

One third of our support comes at Thanksgiving time. The Thanksgiving offering goal for 1961 is \$400,000.00. Help this to become a reality!

You may stay informed about the child care program throughout the year by reading *Charity and Children*. This newspaper is published each week by the Baptist Children's Homes. It is now in its 75th year and circulation is higher than ever before—well over 52,000. Every family in every church should receive this Christian newspaper.
