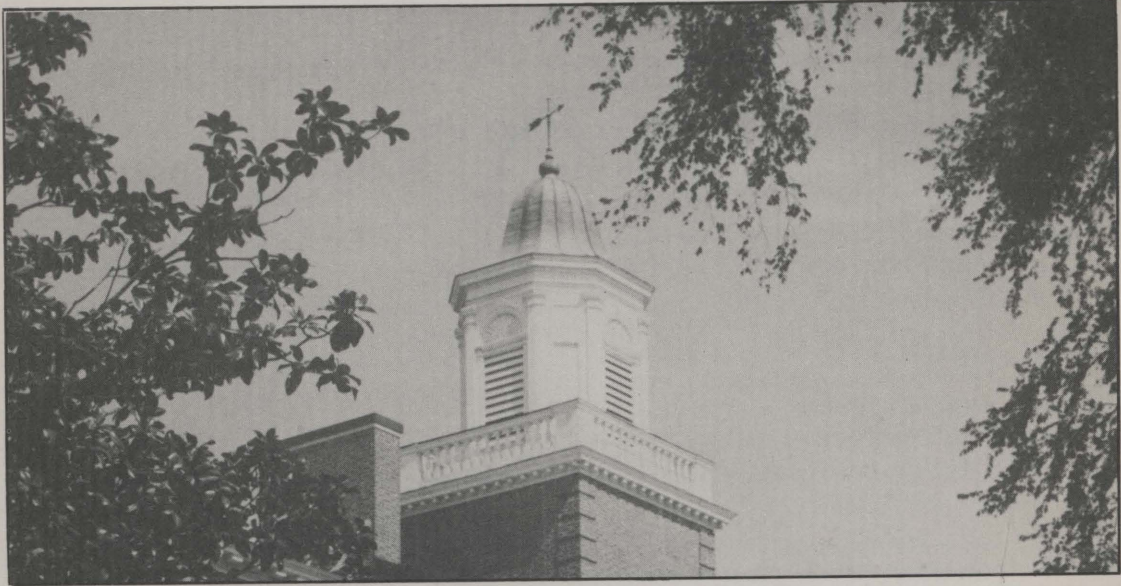

ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and by the Southeastern Association of Colleges and Schools.

CURRICULUM*

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div., M.A.C.E. and M.A.C.M. programs, or entering candidates for those degrees. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-degree studies.

The maximum course load permitted per term is four semester hours, H 2324s and M 4231s excepted. Students who elect language study may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion during the summer of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1987-89, p. 107. In order for credit to be received, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M 4360s-M 4361s).

ADMISSION

Currently enrolled students need only to register on the designated days.

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1987-89, pp. 25f, and register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to the summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina 27587.

*Except where otherwise cited, Catalog pre-requisites for summer school courses are waived. Students are encouraged to consider carefully their level of proficiency when selecting electives in areas where no formal study has been done.

REGISTRATION

First Term: On Monday June 6, 1988, orientation activities will be held for entering students. Classes begin on Tuesday, June 7. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 8.

Second Term: On Tuesday, July 5, 1988, orientation activities will be held for entering students. Classes begin on Wednesday, July 6. Enrollment closes at 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, July 7.

WITHDRAWAL

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:30 p.m., June 10 in the first term and until 4:30 p.m., July 12 in the second term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance. A student enrolled for only one course who withdraws from that course must complete the process for withdrawal from enrollment.

COSTS

The matriculation fee for summer school is \$70.00 per term. This fee is not refundable after 4:30 p.m. on June 10 for the first term or after 4:30 p.m. on July 12 for the second term. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken. In addition to the matriculation fee, each summer school student will be charged a Summer School Student Services Fee of \$8.00. (See page 30 of 1987-89 Catalog.)

HOUSING

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing. Dormitory rental rates are \$65.00 for double occupancy for men, \$70.00 for women in the Women's Dormitory, \$65.00 for women in Simmons. Duplex Apartments are \$185.00 a month for a one-bedroom apartment and \$195.00 a month for two bedrooms. The Townhouse Apartments are \$240.00 a month for two bedrooms and \$255.00 a month for three bedrooms.

RECREATION

The Town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. Tennis courts are also available.

H 2150 Church History Study Tour

Mr. Halbrooks

A guided tour of the countries of Church History. England. 4 semester hours. May 9-22, 1988. Permission of instructor required.

H 2324s Practicum in Home Missions

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. 12 weeks summer practicum or one semester, open to middlers, seniors and graduate students. 8 semester hours. June 1-August 8, 1988. Permission of instructor required.

H 2450 Practicum in Urban Evangelism

Mr. Miles

A combination of academic study and field experience conducted in selected urban settings in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. 2 semester hours.

Limited enrollment. (Winston-Salem) Permission of instructor required. May 21-27, 1988.

T 3323 The Church and Social Change

Mr. Hewitt

A study of selected ecumenical, denominational and church models for social change with special attention to the church's social strategy and the theological justification for programs of social reform. May require off-campus travel (Americus, Georgia). 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: T 3300 and permission of instructor required. May 12-21, 1988.

M 4232 Workshop on Urban Studies

Mr. Bland

A workshop designed for Baptist church, associational and denominational leaders, treating Christian mission and ministries in urban settings, with special attention to the work of the association and mission strategy. New York City. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: Special application required. May 14-20, 1988.

B 1400s Elementary Greek Mr. Cook

The elements of Koine Greek for beginners in the Greek New Testament. Credit will be given only if both B 1400 and B 1401 are completed satisfactorily. 3 semester hours.

M 4231s Seminar on Urban Studies Mr. Bland

A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. 6 semester hours. Monday-Friday. Special application required.

B 1620s The Gospel of Matthew Mr. Tolbert

A critical study of the Gospel of Matthew based on the English text. 2 semester hours.

M 5020s Music in Worship Mr. Hawn

An historical study of music in the structure of corporate worship. 2 semester hours.

***AT 3056s Eschatology** Mr. Ashcraft

The Christian doctrine of last things considered from the perspectives of biblical, historical and systematic theology. The course will examine various eschatological systems and will treat such issues as the Christian hope (this-worldly and other-worldly), death, resurrection, parousia, the last judgment and final destiny. 2 semester hours.

B 1227s The Wisdom Movement and Israel Mr. Rogers

Attention is given to the ancient Near Eastern background of this movement as well as the biblical texts. Wisdom materials are examined throughout the Old Testament with special emphasis being given to the book of Proverbs. 2 semester hours.

M 4950s Present Issues in Christian Education Mr. Poerschke

A review and appraisal of some contemporary issues in Christian education in the world today, including technological, behavioral, denominational and cultural factors. 2 semester hours.

T 3022s The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit Mr. Eddins

A survey of the biblical teaching and doctrinal development of the Spirit of God. Attention will be given to fundamental theological problems of the doctrine of the Spirit. 2 semester hours.

***AB 1347s The Book of Ezekiel** Mr. Wiles

A study of the English text of Ezekiel, with special attention to its composition, its historical background, and its religious insights. 2 semester hours.

H 2335s Current Topics in Home Missions: Metropolitan Missions Mr. Allen

An intensive study of selected current issues in missions within the United States. 2 semester hours.

T 3020s The Doctrine of the Church Mr. Culpepper

The nature and function of the church as begun in the first century and developed in history. 2 semester hours.

M 4923s Theory and Practice in Educational Administration Mr. Powers

An integrative study of local church and denominational administration of selected church programs. The relationship between theory and practice will be examined during seminar and workshop sessions conducted in local churches/denominational offices. 2 semester hours. Permission of Instructor required by May 13, 1988.

BHTM 0410s Colloquium: Theological Method for Ministry Mr. Dale

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. 4 semester hours.
(Open only to D.Min. students.)

BHTM 0411s Colloquium: Action Research

Approaches to Ministry Mr. Meiburg

An interdisciplinary investigation of several of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. 4 semester hours.
(Open only to D.Min. students.)

B 1401s Elementary Greek Mr. Cook

A continuation of B 1400. Careful reading of I John. 3 semester hours.

The Reformation Mr. Halbrooks

A historical and critical study of selected aspects of the Protestant Reformation. 2 semester hours.

M 4939s Group Skills for Educational Leadership Mr. Clemmons

A course dealing with the theoretical and practical experiences necessary to guide learning in group settings, the facilitation of the work of administrative committees in the church, and the creation of support groups for growth and ministry. 2 semester hours.

***AB 1632s The Thessalonian Correspondence** Mr. Spencer

A critical interpretation of the Thessalonian Correspondence. 2 semester hours.

B 1347s The Book of Ezekiel Mr. Wiles

A study of the English text of Ezekiel, with special attention to its composition, its historical

background, and its religious insights. 2 semester hours.

M 4025s Preaching on Biblical Characters Mr. De Brand

A study of the biographical sermon as a form of biblical preaching. Includes principles and methods for developing biographical sermons and series. Students may study significant biographical preachers, construct sermons on Bible characters, and prepare resources for their own future use. 2 semester hours.

M 4964s Practicum with the Adult Mr. Powers

Planning, executing and evaluating a special program or project with adults in selected settings. 2 semester hours.

Permission of Instructor required by May 13.

***AM 4220s Christian Family Life** Mr. Hewitt

A study of American marriage and family relationships with attention to the role of the church in the conservation of family values. 2 semester hours.

A critical interpretation of the Thessalonian Correspondence. 2 semester hours.

H 2335s Current Topics in Home Missions: Associational Mission and Pastoral Involvement Mr. Watson

An intensive study of selected current issues in missions within the United States. 2 semester hours.

T 3331s Alcohol and Drug Abuse Mr. Hewitt

A study of the nature, causes, extent and possible treatment of problems related to the use of alcohol and other drugs in the light of biblical, theological and scientific perspectives. 2 semester hours.

M 4350s Issues In Psychology and Religion: Anxiety Mr. Hester

Intensive study of particular issues in psychology and religion. 2 semester hours.
