

Some Archival Materials and Means of Collecting and Using THE MICROFILM VIEWER and PRINT-OUT

When The Primitive Baptist Library was established in 1950, its announced purpose was to provide a safe, dry place for housing and preserving Primitive Baptist literature. That in fulfillment of this general purpose provisions would be made for the collecting and filing of old periodicals, minutes, church records and similar materials, church histories and sound grace literature, biography, etc., to catalog this for reference purposes; to provide suitable rooms for reading and research work. The library has already gone a long way in fulfilling these purposes.

Most of the materials collected are not replaceable, such as records, manuscripts and papers of only one original item, the older and out-of-print books are becoming more scarce, and some older periodicals are not to be found. Besides many books printed prior to 1900 being preserved by The Primitive Baptist Library, are smaller works, pamphlets, often containing all the information now available on a given subject. There are several means of obtaining and making these materials accessible. One of the best methods is the microfilm. Entire volumes may be contained in one small roll of microfilm. For example the entire Bible in large print may be contained in one small roll of microfilm which may take up no more space than three fingers. By this process original and very rare works, owned by one person or institution, are now made available.

Country Line Baptist Association Minutes, 1816-1906. Flat River Baptist Association Minutes (N. C.) 1811-1859 A Study of Benjamin Lloyd's Primitive Hymns.

In order to make full use of the information on these microfilms, it is necessary to have a Microfilm Viewer. The library has purchased a machine which enlarges the copy from the microfilm to a readable size on a screen. The same machine will also print any desired page or pages.

The cost of this machine is \$1500.00. Contributions for this purchase are appreciated. This microfilm Viewer, with the increasing microfilm service, will be a very valuable addition to the present services of The Primitive Baptist - Library and Archives.

Over twenty Old School or Primitive Baptist Periodicals are received regularly; also Strict and Particular Baptist periodicals. During the current year these periodicals are kept on the Display Rack, then permanently filed.

THE PRIMITIVE BAPTIST

CHURCH RECORDS, HISTORIES, PICTURES, ETC.

The Primitive Baptist Library receives and files Church Records, histories and pictures of Ministers, congregations, meeting houses, etc.

The following information should always be given.

Full name of object on picture, if building, its location in the county and state, date constituted (if known) with any other necessary information to properly identify it.

The information should be on back of picture, or may be attached to it. Do not give just a name like Beulah, Mt. Zion, etc, which is insufficient information by itself.

Pictures of ministers should have the full name, date of birth and death (if deceased), address; if a pastor, give 'the name of church served, etc.

REMEMBER this is a historical record, and therefore should be accurate and as complete as possible.

If not typed, should be plainly written with dark ink on white paper, $8\frac{1}{2}x11$.



NEWSPAPER AND MAGAZINE CLIPPINGS

The library receives newspaper and magazine clippings on churches and persons, etc. These "write-ups" are not always accurate in every detail, but are a valuable source, and often the only source available.

The clipping should show the name and date-line of the paper. Do not trim too close to the print. Re-check all names and dates carefully.
