CONSTITUTION OF THE ATLANTIC BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

1. This Association shall be known as the "Atlantic Baptist Association."

2. It shall be composed of the pastors and of the delegates elected by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates unless the membership shall exceed fifty, and then there shall be an additional delegate for every twenty-five members.

3. Its object shall be the promotion of the Redeemer's Kingdom, by securing the co-operation of its churches for their edification and for the spread of the gospel according to our faith and order.

4. The "New Hampshire Declaration of Faith" shall be the summary of Divine Truth for determining questions of faith or order in this body; and churches desiring to be received must signify their acceptance of it, in substance, together with the covenant herewith submitted, and this Constitution.

5. This Association shall not annul the discipline of a church, or exercise authority over it. But it may advise, and it may sever from its connection any church that neglects to preserve gospel order, or that treats with contempt the objects or advice of the Association.

6. Each church shall send to the Association, at its annual session, a statement of (1) its locality; (2) the name of its pastor, clerk, clerk's post-office, delegates and ministers other than the pastor; (3) the Sunday or Sundays of regular service; (4) the church statistics; (5) Sunday School statistics; (6) contributions to pastor's salary; church expenses, Associational Missions, Home Missions, State Missions, Foreign Missions, Ministerial Education, Baptist Orphanage, Minute Fund, other objects.

7. Whenever a church shall not represent itself at an annual session of the Association, either by delegate or letter, or whenever a church shall not report something contributed for missions, inquiry shall be made for the cause; effort shall be made to revive the church and induce it to do its duty, and this effort shall be continued till the church be recovered or dropped from this Association.

8. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, elected annually by ballot from among its members, to serve until their successors shall have been elected, and to perform the duties usual to such officers, the Moderator in presiding, the Clerk in recording and preserving minutes and other papers belonging to the body, and the Treasurer in receiving and disbursing according to its will all funds belonging to or entrusted to the body.

9. The Association shall appoint annually an Executive Board of seven, of whom the Treasurer shall be one, to whom shall be entrusted the prosecution of the Associational Missions, and any other work which this body may refer to them, and who shall, as far as practicable, co-operate with the State Mission Board in supplying the destitution in our territory, and between the meetings of the Association take such action as may seem to them advisable for the advancements of its objects.

The Board shall present to the Association at its annual meeting a report of all its proceedings, with the Treasurer's report of all receipts and disbursements, and with the names of its missionaries, time of service and details of their work.

10. The annual session of the Association shall begin on Tuesday after the 2nd Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen, and an Introductory sermon shall be delivered on the first day of the session. Representatives from a majority of the churches shall constitute a quorum.

11. This Constitution may be amended at any Annual Session by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

1. The daily sessions of the Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Delegates shall be recognized by letters from their churches, designating them as such.
3. The Moderator shall recognize corresponding messengers or the delegates of newly received churches by extending to them his right hand.
4. The Clerk shall record and read the proceedings when called for, superintend the publication and distribution of the minutes, preserve a file of them, and have it present at each annual session, and deliver to his successor all papers belonging to the body.
5. Members desiring to speak, shall first rise and address the Moderator; shall use the term "brother," in speaking to each other; shall not speak on the same subject more than twice without permission, and shall observe the courtesy that becomes Christians.
6. Members shall not absent themselves from the session without permission.
7. The roll of members shall be called at least once, and absentees marked.
8. Corresponding messengers and visiting brethren shall be invited to seats, with privilege of speaking, but not of voting.
9. A copy of the minutes shall be sent to the Secretary of the State Mission Board, also one to the Secretary of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one to the American Baptist Publication Society, 1429 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia.
10. All questions of order not herein provided shall be decided by "Mell's Parliamentary Practice."
11. The Report of the Executive Board, and the Missionary work of the Association, shall take precedence of all other business during the morning session of the second day of the annual session.
12. The General Order of Business shall be:
 1. Reading church letters and enrollment of delegates.
 2. Election of officers.
 3. Petitionary letters.
 4. Appointment of committees for this session.
 5. Appointment of standing committees.
 6. Reports of committees on churches delinquent at the previous session.
 7. Reports of standing committees.
 8. Reports of other committees.
 9. Miscellaneous business.

On motion, it was ordered by the Association, that the Clerk should cast the vote of the Association for Rev. J. T. Albritton as Moderator. It was done accordingly.

Moved, That Rev. C. Durham be allowed to take up a collection after the Introductory Sermon to-night, to pay the debt now resting on this church.

The Committee on Devotional Exercises reported as follows: That the Association meet at 9:30 a. m. for prayer and praise to continue until 10 a. m. Adjourn at 12:30. Meet in afternoon at 2 p. m. and adjourn at pleasure. Meet at night at 7:30, and adjourn at will.

Visiting brethren: J. B. Brewer (West Chowan Association), E. J. Edwards (Orphanage), F. P. Hobgood and F. W. Hancock (Flat River Association), and W. T. Jones (Sandy Creek) were cordially invited by the Moderator to participate in the proceedings of the Association.

Your Committee would recommend that the pastors of this Association be requested to give their Churches an opportunity of contributing to this work at least once a year.

According to previous motion, Dr. Durham presented the claims of this Church and took up a collection for the same amounting to \$70.36.

The following visiting brethren, viz: E. E. Hilliard, representing Wake Forest College; J. C. Caddell, the *Recorder*; B. S. Peterson, *N. C. Baptist*; C. Durham and J. H. Mills, the Orphanage, were cordially invited by the Moderator to participate in the business of the Association.

Moved, That Ministerial and General Education be made the special order for to-night.

The Report of the Executive Board was read by J. C. Whitty and that of State or Associational Missions by J. H. Vernon. After the reading of these reports it was moved, That the pledges of the Churches be now taken for State or Associational Missions, and that Bro. J. C. Whitty, chairman of the Executive Board, be authorized to visit the Churches in the Association in behalf of our mission work, defraying his expenses out of the funds of the Board. After being discussed by brethren Whitty, Durham, Ford, Ward and Rose the reports and the resolution were adopted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE BOARD.

During the past year the Board has had the services of the following Missionaries, viz: Rev. G. L. Finch in Lenoir and Wayne counties; Rev. R. D. Carroll in Pitt and Craven; Rev. J. H. Heldrich in Pamlico up to

June, since then Rev. C. S. Burgess; Rev. J. H. Vernon in Jones county; Revs. B. Ward, J. W. Nobles, D. F. Aman in Onslow county; and the Rev. B. H. Matthews in the territory East of Beaufort.

So far as the reports have come to this Board, the work of these brethren have been satisfactory; they have been faithful and self-sacrificing. We feel the need of keeping, so far as possible, these brethren at work in our Association, but in order to do this, we need, at least, \$1200, and to secure this we must depend upon the hearty co-operation of the individual members of the Churches of our Association. What we need is to be thoroughly organized, every Church and every individual doing their full duty and taking a personal interest in the matter. It should be a source of gratification to those whose hearts are in the work to know that new Churches are being organized and houses of worship are being built and as these developments show themselves, we are reminded that there are other destitute places crying for help. Let us go to our respective homes determined to get more of the Missionary spirit disseminated among the brethren, feeling assured that God is ever ready to bless such efforts.

REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

One hundred and twenty Orphans are in the Orphan Houses at Thomasville. They are dependent on the Baptist people of North Carolina for food, clothing and instruction. Whatever you would have done for your orphans, you ought to do for these. Respectfully submitted,

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

The powers of darkness have always attempted to offset and to overcome the forces of truth. As light had come into the world, the agencies for evil have been the more employed for the continuation of darkness.

Among the great forces that make against the truth, is that of evil literature. The ingenious seductiveness of bad literature is appalling to the thoughtful. It comes often in the garb of religion. As disseminators of truth, we must see to it that wholesome reading matter is put into the hands of those over whom we exercise care.

The Biblical Recorder, one of the great light bearers, is the organ of our North Carolina Baptists. No other paper can take its place. No North Carolina Baptist can afford to be without it.

NIGHT SESSION—WEDNESDAY.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 7:30 p. m.

The Report on Ministerial Education was read by Rev. Rufus Ford, and after being discussed by brethren Ford and Caddell was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee to whom was referred the Report on Ministerial Education submit the following:

We believe in a divine call to the gospel ministry. No man takes this office upon himself, but as Paul says, Christ Jesus *puts* him into the ministry.

Once a man is called by The Spirit into this work, we believe that he should study to show himself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of Truth.

In order that our young men who say they are called of God to this work, and who are approved by their respective Churches, may cultivate their minds, we, as a denomination, have organized an Educational Board whose duty it is to receive such brethren at Wake Forest College and help them in the matter of their education.

This Board has an history which we ask our brethren and sisters to examine and study. At present this Board is supporting thirty-five young brethren, and the only source of help to which it can look in order to carry on this work is the money sent in by the churches.

The present need is very great—the most pressing since 1861. In the judgment of your Committee, if this work of Ministerial Education is allowed to suffer then we shall feel it in every department of our denominational work. We do not believe in an educational qualification for the Ministry, but we do believe in an Educated Ministry. If we are to hold our present exalted position among Christian denominations and keep pace with the sweeping progress of events then we must educate our young men or perish in our own prosperity. Financially, times are hard, but, denominationally, times will be harder if we neglect this all important work.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12, 1893.

Religious exercises were conducted by Rev. J. D. Moore from 9:30 to 10 a. m.

The Moderator called the Association to order at 10 a. m.

The Report on Temperance was read by Rev. Benj. Ward, and adopted as follows :

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Intemperance is a great evil. Even the moderate use of intoxicants by our members, prevents a bright Christian light from shining. It kills our Christian influence; it is a curse to the Church, and a stumbling block to the world. We, your Committee, therefore, earnestly recommend that some steps be taken by the pastors and Churches of this Association to prohibit even the moderate use of liquor among our brethren.

The Report on Foreign Missions was read by Rev. A. L. Stough, and after being discussed by brethren Stough, Ford, and Whitty was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The subject of Foreign Missions is well worthy, in itself, of our serious consideration, and especially appropriate to the occasion which assembles us here. We are here in the interest of the Church which has enlisted the noblest attributes of God himself, and cost the greatest sacrifice that heav-

en could make. The Church that was instituted among men and designed for the conversion of the world. This is the great object of her establishment, the first and leading business of her organization Matt. 28:19-20.

The Apostles were Missionaries, and the Church as a Missionary Institution prayed for their success, supported them, and had the Church continued in this good work, the banner of the gospel would now be waving triumphantly over the entire habitable globe. How strange after the lapse of so many years since the Church was organized to find so many of our people have yet to learn that the heathen are lost without the gospel, and that the obligation to give the gospel to the heathen is laid upon us, by the command of the Lord Jesus Christ. Perhaps what is needed more than anything else, is *faith*.—Faith in God—Faith in his promises—Faith in the great Head of the Church. Faith in Missions—faith in our Boards of Missions.

How can we be so faithless? Why we have everything to encourage and urge us on in the work of Missions. The wants of a dying world, the nature of the gospel, the principle of benevolence, the pledge of success, the seal of God upon all past efforts, and the cheering aspect of enterprise that honors God, and blesses man, an enterprise in which Angels might wish to bear an humble part, the progress of which is intensely engaged upon all the good on earth, and all the perfected in glory, and the completion of which will fill the world with songs of blessedness, and heaven with shouts of triumph. Then let us stand up like men, upon whom the vows of God rest, to whom the eyes of perishing millions are directed, and whose hearts have taken hold on the interests of eternity, and then do as Christ's Conscience would have us, then shall our fervent spirits enjoy communion with the Father of Spirits, and prepare us to join the general assembly of the saved, where they shall be gathered together in glory from the North, from the South, from the East and the West, from the four winds of heaven.

The Report on Home Missions was read by C. A. Jenkins and after being discussed by brethren E. E. Hilliard and C. A. Jenkins was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The work of the Home Mission Board embraces all the territory occupied by the Southern Baptist Convention, and the Island of Cuba besides. In this vast field, there are more than 20,000,000 people. In round numbers, 7,000,000 of these are negroes, 1,500,000 Cubans, and 60,000 Indians.

As facts are said to be the fingers of God, the following statistics are submitted, taken from the last report of the Board, showing the work of the Board for the past Conventional year.

The Board has paid the debt with which it began the year, \$22,854.39 on the house of worship in Havana, has increased its Mission work, and reports a balance of \$2,784.41 in its treasury. Its total cash receipts for the year have been \$106,989.58, of which \$29,373.40 have been expended in Church buildings.

The work among the colored people has been most encouraging, while that in Cuba has been phenomenal.

Among the white people, embracing an ever increasing foreign population, the beneficent fruits of the Board have been felt in all the States. Perhaps no field on earth more loudly calls for our prayers and our means, and none that promises a richer harvest. Persons who desire literature on the subject, will find *Our Home Field*, published by the Board at Atlanta, Ga., and the minutes of the S. B. Convention suited to their purposes.

The Report on Sunday Schools was read by Bro. C. J. Rivenbark and after being discussed by him was adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee is delighted to report that within the past year renewed energy has come into this branch of the ministry of the Word. The people as they have obeyed the word and teachings of the *Holy Spirit* have aroused us to the importance of this work. From the annexed comparative table 1875 to 1893 it will be observed that North Carolina stands third in attendance upon S. S. Delaware and Florida taking the lead. This is encouraging to us as North Carolinians, but when we take into considerations that within our borders there is quite four hundred thousand children between the ages of six and twenty that do not attend our Schools, the situation is appalling and calls for the best efforts of our most consecrated

people. Visit our Sunday Schools and as you look into the faces of those gathered there we fail to see the boys and girls of 16 to 25 and the men and women of 30 to 60—where are they and why are they not there? The boys and girls of 16 to 25 have gone to the *world* because they were not led to God earlier and the men and women of mature years have grown too old to teach and disciple the nations, but are not themselves too old to go to Heaven. Awake thou that sleepest and be converted; there is a work for you to do. In this work there are three things that confront us; viz. First, Is it well with the child? Second, What manner of child shall this child be? Third, Is the young Absolem safe?

The Sunday School like the prayer meeting is no side issue, but is or should be the life of the Church. The Lord puts good timber into our hands, and we need, as officers and teachers, men and women who love and fear God; men and women who are believers and not professors only; men and women that are indeed alive to the welfare of souls. We would recommend that every Sunday School organize a Teachers' meeting for we need to heed Paul's injunction to Timothy, "Study to show thyself approved unto God. A workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." 2 Tim. 2:15. We would further recommend that the Sunday School be made an object of special prayer at the Church services and around the family altar and that our pastors take a greater interest in this work of saving souls. Help us, Deut; 31:12 "Gather the people together, men, and women, and children, and thy stranger that is within thy gates, that they may hear, and that they may learn, and fear the Lord your God, and (observe) to do all the words of this law; and that their children, (which have not known anything) may hear, and learn to fear the Lord your God."

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
