

PROCEEDINGS 187th ANNUAL MEETING FIRST SESSION, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 13, 2016

- 1. Lighthouse Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 187th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 101 present: 65 Messengers and 21 visitors representing 18 churches.
- 2. Dennis Proffitt, Vice Moderator, welcomed everyone
- 3. Rev. Matthew Ledbetter, pastor of Lighthouse B.C., welcomed everyone to Lighthouse B.C. He read scripture and opened with altar prayer. Heart Strings provided special music.
- 4. Rev. Ernie Jamison, pastor of New Hope B.C. brought the message from 1 Peter 5:1-4.
- 5. The 187th Annual Meeting was called to order by Dennis Proffitt, Vice Moderator.
- 6. The agenda was approved as presented.
- 7. Rev. JD Grant, pastor of Scotts Creek B.C. and Rev. Keith Ashe of Little Savannah B.C. were recognized as pastors new to their churches in the association.
- 8. Chuck Norris, music director, led the congregation in singing, "Revive Us Again".

REPORTS

- 9. <u>Director of Missions</u> Rev. Gerald Morris gave his report as Director of Missions. It was located on page 3-5. He also added that Camp Truett's director died unexpectedly and that they were looking to replace him and hire an additional assistant and wife team also. He also drew attention to the survey that was passed out with the Book of Reports to see if the days for the annual meeting should continue to stay the same or be modified to better suit the needs of the churches. He also addressed the disaster relief going on in North Carolina due to the flooding caused by Hurricane Matthew. He said it is a work in progress that will probably continue for several years.
- 10. Music Chuck Norris gave the Music report listed on page 6.
- 11. <u>WMU</u> Lee Lillard presented the WMU report on page 7. She also encouraged churches to come together to help with the disaster relief in Eastern North Carolina and South Carolina. There are a lot of hurting people.
- 12. <u>Camp Truett</u> The report is on page 27. Ruthie Salter and Katlin Watson presented a report about their experiences this past summer. They said some of the activities included singing, sign language, acting, prayer, hand bells, instrumentals, and other team building activities. It also included Bible Study. Faith B.C. has now introduced hand bells to their church with the little children.
- 13. <u>Baptist Children's Homes of NC</u> –Rev. Lewis Smith encouraged the churches to show the Thanksgiving Offering video at their churches. He showed the 4 minute clip after speaking. He encouraged everyone to Lead all you can, Love all you can, Learn all you can and Give all you can for the children.
- 14. Chuck Norris lead the congregation in singing "Brethren We Have Met to Worship".

COMMITTEES

15. Annual Meeting Committee

Memorials - Laura Brown and Virginia Pangle said the minutes will be dedicated this year in memory of Carlin and Alice Cabe of East Fork B.C. Descriptions of these two people are at the front of this book. Laura and Virginia also read the names of members from each church that had passed away during the past year.

<u>Place and Preacher Committee</u> – Dennis Proffitt presented the Place and Preacher report for the 2017 meetings on page 14. It was voted on and approved.

- 16. <u>Nominating Committee</u> Kenny Frizzell presented their report on page 12. No further nominations were made and the Nominating Committee List was approved.
- 17. <u>Doctrinal Committee</u> Rev. Clemmey Queen read a statement presented on page 15 concerning Wilkesdale Baptist Church merging with the Sylva Assembly of God to form a non-denominational church on June 19th. They are no longer a part of the Association.
- 18. <u>Stewardship</u> Rob Sutton presented the proposed 2016-2017 budget to be voted on during the second session. The budget was on page 9-10.
- 19. <u>Miscellaneous Business</u> Gracella Morris reported there were 65 messengers and 21 visitors present representing 18 churches on Thursday.

MISSIONS

- 20. <u>Faith</u>—Ruthie Salter and Katlin Watson presented a report about their experiences in Shelby, NC with Deep Impact. They worked on a construction team. They really enjoyed the worship and devotionals presented each night.
- 21. **KY Raceway Ministry** Wendy Buchanan from New Hope B.C. spoke about the 3-day Associational mission trip to KY. Wendy's husband, Steve and two daughters, Laura and Tuck Brown from Calvary B.C., Rev. Gerald, Gracella, and Will Morris from Ochre Hill B.C. went. They lodged at Gracella's sister's house. They spent two days at the track passing out Bibles and other materials in the campgrounds.
- 22. <u>Vermont</u> Elizabeth Buchanan from Long Branch B.C. spoke about the Associational mission trip to Vermont June 24-July 2. Rev. Gerald, Gracella, and Will Morris from Ochre Hill B.C., Dianne Cochran from Scotts Creek B.C. and Garlene Haley from Mt. Zion B.C., Dry Ridge, KY went. She reported that they worshiped with a church named the Bridge that was started in the Mustard Seed Soup Kitchen and had grown and moved to the movie theatre down the street. Everyone worked in the Soup Kitchen and the thrift store. This year the mission team was even more involved in preparing the meals served on Tuesday and Thursday. She reported it was a beautiful town in need of our precious Savior.
- 23. Rev. Scott Carter from Webster B.C. reported about their mission work done in Nicaragua. They have going for six years. They are now going about twice a year to do a Backyard Bible School and Bible Studies. The communities they go to are extremely poor and the religion that is there is very legalistic and performance based.
- 24. Russell Salter led the benediction prayer.

SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 14, 2016

- 1. Ochre Hill Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 187th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 65 present: 47 Messengers and 18 visitors representing 14 churches. There was a total of 19 churches represented for both nights.
- 2. Rev. Gerald Morris, Director of Missions, welcomed everyone and called for a motion to elect Chuck Norris as *Moderator Pro Tem* for the Friday meeting since both moderator and vice-moderator could not be present. Donal Shuler moved that this be done with a second from Rev. Clemmey Queen. It was approved.
- 3. Mike Parks welcomed everyone to Ochre Hill Baptist Church and asked Rev. Keith Ashe to lead an altar prayer.
- 4. Chuck Norris lead the congregation in singing "Blessed Assurance".

REPORTS

- 5. Fruitland Baptist Bible College Dr. David Horton (President) said they have a near record enrollment this year of students. It includes six refugees from the country of Miramar. They are serving middle aged students and 18-19 year olds right out of high school. One student, Porter Jennings, is 75 years old. David said everyone can sharpen your tools to give your best to the Lord. They offer two-year degrees by site-based classes or through online classes. They also work very well with Southeastern Seminary to transfer credits. He requested that we pray for them, continue to support the cooperative program (1/2 of their operating funds come through this), and to send students. They are committed to teaching the Living Word of God.
- 6. <u>The Gideon's International</u> Kenny Frizzell presented a Gideon's report that are included at the end of the 2016 Annual Minutes.
- 7. Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary Casey Evans encouraged people to continue to give to the Cooperative Program because for every \$1 given, 8 cents is divided between the seminaries. They offer many types of programs: certificate programs, online programs, and free courses. They are an entity to serve the churches.
- 8. Chuck Norris led the congregation in singing, "Brethren We Have Met to Worship".
- 9. Gracella Morris reported that there were 46 messengers, 17 visitors and 14 churches represented on Friday.

MISSIONS

- 10. <u>Romania</u> Grace Morris said that eight people from Cashiers and Ochre Hill B.C. went to Romania June 27-July 7. They were able to do a 2-day Vacation Bible School in three churches. One VBS was in a church that Cashiers B.C. had helped build on a previous mission trip. They also reached out to the people who live in the "Dump" through distributing fruit and sandwiches to the children. She presented prayer requests for the churches, the pastor who works in the Dump and the leader of the Dump who is not Christian.
- 11. Ochre Hill Mike Parks said that 21 people went to Whitley City, KY to work in the poorest county in the USA. They had three teams. The construction team replaced two doors and painted at the Lord's Café. One team served and cleaned at the Lord's Café. The other team worked at the Learning Center with their day camp doing Bible studies. On Friday all teams worked to give away the many pallets of food that was being distributed to the people in that county. They went to spread God's love and let others hear about Jesus Christ.
- 12. <u>Mexico</u> Rev. Felix Villarreal shared that seven people from Hamburg B.C., Lighthouse B.C., Robbinsville and La Primera Iglesia Bautista de Amor shared the Gospel in Mexico from

September 23rd-October 4th. There were 90 people saved and 50 rededications. He emphasized that when God tells you to do something, do it. He'll give you the words to say.

- 13. <u>Stewardship Committee</u> Rob Sutton moved that the 2016-2017 budget on page 9 and 10 presented the previous session be approved. It was approved.
- 14. **Resolutions Committee** Rev. Keith Ashe presented the following resolution:

Executive Committee Report, Gracella Morris, Clerk

October 5, 2015 - The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Chuck Norris, Moderator. It was held at the Baptist Center. There were 22 executive committee members and one visitor with 14 churches represented. Rev. Dennis Burrell led the group in an opening prayer. Grace Morris led the group in singing "Count Your Blessings". Rev. Mike Gunter of Moses Creek Baptist Church had the devotion. No new members were present. The July 13, 2015 executive committee minutes were presented in the Book of Reports and approved. The October 2014 through September 30, 2015 financial statement was presented in the Book of Reports and approved.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. He said that a laminating machine has been donated to the association. Also some 1979 church history books were available to take. This quarter has, once again, been a busy one. The churches of the association has continued to come together to do the work of our Lord. We have come together to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ here in Jackson County and beyond.

Here in our "Jerusalem" several churches came together on July 18th in the Cullowhee Recreation Park to provide a Backyard Bible Club/Vacation Bible School to the kids in the multi-housing units in the county. Many other churches helped out beforehand by providing supplies and funds. Others also helped in the distribution of flyers to the trailer parks and apartments in the county. There were more than 200 people registered who heard the Gospel proclaimed because churches came together and got outside the walls.

A little further from home, eleven people from two churches traveled to Northern Kentucky July 9th through 11th to the Kentucky Speedway. We joined over 200 Christians in sharing the Gospel to over 100,000 NASCAR fans. We worked in the Kids' Zone and in distributing New Testaments throughout the fan zone area just outside of the track. Plans are being made to return next year. Even further from home, seven people from four churches traveled July 24 through August 1 to work in "The Mustard Seed" soup kitchen and thrift store. We also helped encourage a local pastor and the church planter. The church planter is working to start a church "The Bridge" in St. Johnsbury. This church is needed because there are long distances between Baptist churches and the number of Christians is extremely low (~4%) in the whole state. Plans are being made to return next year.

Casting our eyes overseas, we are in the planning stage to send some of our own to Romania next summer to hold Vacation Bible Schools in several towns. We also held a multiday, multi-church Missions Conference. The Missions Conference was hosted by Faith, Lovedale, Hyatt's Chapel, Buff Creek, Scotts Creek and Cashiers Baptist Churches. The missionaries (one couple from Peru, one couple from Chili and a couple and single missionary from East Asia) rotated around to each of the churches sharing what God is doing through the International Missions Board.

At least 90 people from the churches of the Association came together for our annual day of prayer for our schools. As we have in the past, concerned Christians gathered at the entrance to each school in the county to pray for the faculty, staff and students. Another repeat event that is always well attended is the Children's Rally. Scotts Creek hosted the rally and Cashier's puppet team, "Mouths of the South", entertained children and adults and promoted doing missions. I provided a short devotion.

As you can see, the churches of the Association continue to come together to do more for God than we ever could apart. It is a joy to see how the fellowship and cooperation between the churches is increasing every year. Gerald had 11 visits, Preached 12 times and attended 8 meetings this past quarter.

Mrs. Lee Lillard was unable to present her WMU report this quarter due to a funeral visitation.

Old Business:

- The 2016 Ministry Partnership Agreements had \$2,200 approved collectively.
- The following amounts were spent for the approved associational mission trips: KY Book Link \$350, KY Raceway \$475 and Vermont \$1,095.82
- No monies from the Annie Hoyle Endowment Fund were needed for the Backyard Bible Club at the Cullowhee Recreation Park in July 2015.

New Business:

- The 2015 Book of Reports for the annual meeting was presented.
- The Nominating Committee moved that Rev. Dennis Burrell replace Rev. Joshua Blythe as a trustee. It was unanimously approved.
- It was moved by Rev. Gerald Morris that the attached Resolution concerning the Trustees and the sale of the James L. Wall property located at 862 E. Main St., Sylva, North Carolina be approved. It was unanimously approved.
- Rev. Mike Farmer moved that half of the offerings collected at the Associational Fall and Spring Singings be sent to the Baptist Children's Homes and the other half be kept for Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. This was unanimously approved.
- Raymond Dietz asked the association to sponsor two people from Faith for a trip to Honduras. This was referred to the Missions Committee.

Rev. Avery Brown led the group in closing prayer after prayer requests.

January 4, 2016 - The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Rev. Mike Moore, Moderator. It was held at the Baptist Center. There were 14 executive committee members and two visitors with ten churches represented. Rev. Mike Moore led the group in an opening prayer. Chuck Norris led the group in singing "Love Lifted Me". Randy Brooks, retired IMB missionary from Jackson County, had the devotion. New members recognized were Michael Farmer of Faith Baptist and Ron Gass of Lovedale Baptist. Michael Moore was also recognized as a visitor. The October 5, 2015 executive committee minutes and the October 2015 through December 31, 2015 financial statement was presented at the beginning of the meeting and approved.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. He is busy "dreaming" and preparing for the new year to come and all of the services that the association will provide in 2016. This will include training, missions, times of fellowship and worship.

In October the Wall Estate on NC 107 finally sold. The sale price for the property ended up being \$100,000 (divided between the association, Jewell Brown and Speedwell UMC). The buyer paid \$50,000 now and will pay the rest each year over the next 5 years.

Unfortunately at this time we have had several pastors resign from their pastorates in the Association in the last few months. He encouraged people to pray for those churches and said he was available to help during times of transition.

On Tuesday, January 05, 2016, Gerald will be meeting with the Executive Committee of the Tennessee River Baptist Association in Swain County about the possibility of working on a part time basis as their Interim Director. The plan is for him to work there on Thursdays and Fridays.

Gerald had 11 visits, Preached 14 times and attended 8 meetings this past quarter.

Old Business:

• At the October 15, 2015 Annual Meeting it was approved to send \$500 each to Michael Farmer and Michelle Pippio of Faith Baptist Church for a medical missionary trip in November 2015 upon the recommendation of the Missions/Evangelism Committee.

New Business:

- Gerald presented a motion from the Missions/Evangelism Committee to accept the Missions Scholarship Guidelines and Missions Funds application for anyone interested in receiving Annie Hoyle Endowment funds. This was approved.
- It was moved that Tuckaseigee Baptist Association accept designated funds for the purpose of constructing a church building for La Primera Iglesia Bautista de Amor. It was approved after discussion. Rev. Felix Villarreal said they have purchased land in Cashiers and will build a 30 x 30 building with a basement. They need donated funds for building supplies.

Don Shuler led the group in closing prayer after prayer requests.

April 4, 2016 - The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Rev. Mike Moore, Moderator. It was held at the Baptist Center. There were 16 executive committee members and one visitor with ten churches represented. Rev. Mike Moore led the group in an opening prayer. Chuck Norris led the group in singing "Down at the Cross". Rev. Shane Danner, pastor of Cullowhee Valley Baptist Church, had the devotion. New members recognized were Rev. Shane Danner and Ronnie Robinson of Cullowhee Valley Baptist Church. The January 4, 2016 executive committee minutes and the October 2015 through March 31, 2016 financial statement was presented at the beginning of the meeting and approved.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. This quarter had been busy working with the committees of the Association to plan several training, worship and fellowship events and mission opportunities that will occur this year. He reported that he has been busy getting his bearings in Swain County as the interim Director of Missions for the Tennessee River Baptist Association (TRBA). God is moving in Swain County and He is starting to unite the churches to serve and glorify Him. He has been focused on making first contact with the churches of the TRBA. After he has finished his first round of visits in TRBA, he will work on a rotation of churches in both associations. Another reason the number of visits to churches is down is that he has been busy preaching in churches that are currently without a pastor. Please continue to pray for the 8 churches that are looking for the man that God has planned for them. We need to also always be in prayer for all of our sister churches so that we can see revival move across our Association and country.

As he stated above, we have been busy working out the details of several events in the Association. The Youth Picnic will be a great time to bring the youth of your church so that they can play, eat and worship together with others their age. We are asking any youth that plays an instrument to bring it and we will have a "Jam Session" led by Jason Watson. He would also like to point out the Global Missions Conference that is planned for September. The format will be the same as last year's, four days of special services in which missionaries will speak about their work around the world to share Christ with a lost world. He is looking for churches that would be interested in hosting all five services (two Sunday and one each of the other days) or partnering with another church in your area to co-host the services.

Just like last year, we also have several great mission opportunities planned for this summer. The first two are here in our Jerusalem. The WMU is planning a Backyard Bible School again this year at the Cullowhee Recreation Park to reach children in the trailer parks and apartments in the county. We are also working hard to reestablish our work in the migrant camps to reach the field workers that come through our area later in the year. There is much to do and many ways for your church to help.

We also have mission trips further afield. We are planning a nine day trip to Vermont to, once again, work in St. Johnsbury to help a soup kitchen and new church plant to reach a hurting

town with the Gospel of Christ. In early July, we will be headed to the Kentucky Speedway for three days to help reach the 100,000 race fans with the Gospel. At the end of July we will be making our seventh trip to BookLink in Eubank, Ky to help prepare Christian literature to be sent to believers in countries overseas.

Gerald had 5 visits, Preached 11 times at 4 churches and attended 10 meetings this past quarter.

Mrs. Lee Lillard presented her WMU report that included a lot of Upcoming opportunities and events for all the churches to participate in and share the Gospel and love of Jesus with our community. They are having their annual meeting on April 7th at New Hope Baptist Church. On April 12th they are having a planning meeting at the Baptist Center for the Backyard Bible School which is going to be on June 4th at the Cullowhee Recreation Center. They are also planning a 1-day Women's Conference with Allison Speer to be hosted by Lovedale Baptist Church. This year they also have a goal to collect 500 tooth brushes for Operation Red Box. She especially requests prayer for their Migrant Camp Ministry Opportunity. They have been asked to help collect items for hygiene kits that are given to the 700 migrant farm workers in our area between May and October.

Old Business:

• Rev. Felix Villarreal requested prayers for their church as they seek approval for their blueprints and funds to help with the cost of materials to construct their church building starting in May.

New Business:

- Mrs. Lee Lillard presented a motion concerning the Backyard Bible School. It is a multichurch outreach to the lower income housing areas. Expenses could be as much as \$1,000 and she requested that whatever was not covered by the churches be taken out of the Annie Hoyle Endowment funds. Then it was approved by the Association that up to \$1,000 of Annie Hoyle Funds be used as needed for the Backyard Bible School on June 4th.
- Gracella Morris presented a motion that the Duke Energy Bill be paid by automatic monthly bank draft. It was approved.
- Gerald presented a motion from the Missions/Evangelism Committee to provide \$1,500 to the team from Cashiers Baptist for their mission trip to Romania to help build churches. This was approved.
- Gerald presented a motion from the Missions/Evangelism Committee to provide \$1,500 to the team from Cashiers Baptist for their mission trip to Romania to teach Bible School in three churches and at the Dump. This was approved.
- It was approved to spend up to \$390 of Annie Hoyle Funds on transportation costs for an Associational mission trip to Vermont.
- It was approved to spend up to \$385 of Annie Hoyle Funds on transportation costs for an Associational mission trip to work with the Kentucky Raceway Ministries on July 7-9.
- It was approved to spend up to \$285 of Annie Hoyle Funds on transportation costs for an Associational mission trip to Book Link International in Kentucky.
- It was approved to send in 4 Strategic Partnership Requests for money from the Baptist State Convention of NC: Youth Discipleship, Senior Adults, Global Mission Conference, and Director of Missions.

Rev. Peter Mudge led the group in closing prayer after announcements and prayer requests.

Rev. Gerald Morris, Director of Missions Gracella Morris, Clerk July 11, 2016 - The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Rev. Mike Moore, Moderator. It was held at the Baptist Center. There were 15 executive committee members and three visitors with nine churches represented. Rev. Mike Moore led the group in an opening prayer. Chuck Norris led the group in singing "There is Power in the Blood". Rev. Kent Lowdermilk had the devotion. No new members were recognized.

Karen Burnette-McCracken presented the WMU report. She reported that Virginia Pangle had led a group to plant donated flowers at Camp Truett. She asked that each church give \$20 to support the associational WMU. Calvary, New Hope and East Sylva have already contributed. She also announced that Lovedale Baptist Church is hosting a Women's Retreat with Allison Speer as speaker/singer. Only 50 tickets remaining. Tuckaseigee will be collecting toothbrushes for the Red Box Prison Ministry this year. 500 individually wrapped toothbrushes are needed.

The April 4, 2016 executive committee minutes and the October 2015 through June, 2016 financial statement were presented and approved.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his quarterly Director of Missions report. This quarter he has been busy working with the churches of the Association to share the light of Jesus with those around them. Some of the Worship events included the Spring Worship Rally with Dr. David Horton, the president of Fruitland Baptist Bible College speaking. It was held at East Fork Baptist Church. A Youth Worship Rally was held at the East LaPorte Park that included a picnic with games and speaker, Randy Shepherd of Crossfire Ministries speaking. Faith Baptist Church's Praise Team led the singing. Gerald also attended a joint service of the area Hispanic churches as they ordained one of their men to plant a church in Buncombe area.

Several churches participated in the Operation Inasmuch project to serve their own community. In June several churches came together to provide a Backyard Bible School in the Cullowhee Recreation Park. It was a task bigger than any one church could have undertaken, but it was easily managed by all of the churches working together.

Another way the churches came together to fulfill the Great Commission was in the form of two mission trips. The first was a return trip to St. Johnsbury, Vermont. We took six people from four different churches for a week of service in a soup kitchen and thrift store. One of our group even helped out in VBS at a local church. We are finding that we are also serving by just listening and encouraging the believers in the area. The number of Christians are very low (around 3%) and fellowship with others that believe is difficult to find.

The second mission trip involved nine people from three churches going to the KY Speedway for the NASCAR race weekend. We helped out in many ways in the campground ministry of the KY Raceway ministry (food prep., entertaining children, etc.) But the most important was was talking to those that came by the tent about Jesus. We also went out into the campgrounds themselves to witness to the campers. We passed out literature with the plan of salvation, balloon animals, New Testaments and other items to gain the right to share the Gospel with the people at their campsites. We had a great opportunity to witness to well over 100 people in two short half days.

A third way that the churches in the association have come together is through discipleship. In May Lovedale Baptist Church hosted a Sunday School/Church Leadership training. It included a session about church security.

In April food and supplies were collected for Broyhill Children's Homes.

On a sad note, Gerald reported that Wilkesdale Baptist Church is no longer a part of the association. The few remaining members voted to merge with the Sylva Assembly of God Church to form a new non-denominational church on June 19th. Since they are no longer a Baptist Church they are no longer eligible to be a member of the Association.

Gerald is now excited about the upcoming Missions Conference in September. He also requested prayer for all the pastors. He has been doing a lot of counseling lately.

Gerald had 11 visits, Preached 14 times at 8 churches and attended 8 meetings this past quarter.

- We have received preliminary approval for the following funds in 2017 from the Baptist State Convention of NC: \$250 for Senior Adults, \$750 for Global Mission Conference, and \$1,200 for Director of Missions Salary

New Business:

• Gracella Morris presented a motion that the Frontier (Telephone/Internet Bill) be paid by automatic monthly bank draft. It was approved.

2016 Director of Missions' Annual Report, Gerald Morris

As the 2015-2016 Associational year comes to a close, it is time to take a look back at how God has been working. As I have in the past, I want to look at the worship, evangelism and discipleship that the Association was involved in this past year.

Worship

The fellowship of the churches of the Association continues to grow with each passing year. It is always a pleasure to be a part of the Spring Singing and Fall Singing. God is pleased when His people come together to praise Him. Gracella and I love to hear the reports of the great fellowship and worship at these events.

In addition to planning the singings, it is an honor to be able to be a part in arranging the times that the churches come together for prayer. Once again, in the Spring, a small but faithful group of people gathered at the Justice Center for the National Day of Prayer. This Fall it was wonderful to see people gather at each of the schools to pray for the faculty, staff and students. I believe God is glorified when His people gather to pray. I am excited to see the calls for prayer that has popped up in the last few months at the school and the courthouse steps. May God's people continue to be burdened to call out for revival in our nation.

Another way that churches came together to worship was through the preaching of God's Word. The churches provided the Bible study, recreation, food, crafts, music and love to the children that came and were able to hear about God and His love, maybe for the first time ever. Each child

was sent home with a treat bag that contained more information about the churches, their VBS schedules and, most importantly, a New Testament from the Gideons.

The churches continue to reach out to the rest of the United States through missions. Gracella and I had the honor to lead two mission trips. At the end of June we made a nine-day trip to St. Johnsbury, Vermont. While there six people from four different churches worked in the Mustard Seed Soup Kitchen and the supporting thrift store. We also attended two nights of VBS being hosted by Newbury Baptist Church. Will Morris even helped the church that went from Mt Airy, NC to lead the VBS.

July 7-9 found us leading a mission trip to the Kentucky Speedway to work with the Kentucky Raceway Ministry. Our team of nine people from three Associational churches worked in one of the campgrounds that ring the speedway. We worked at the ministry tent helping do various ministry jobs as needed. We also spent considerable time out in the campground sharing the Gospel through balloon animals, tracts and New Testament distribution. We were able to talk to many people about God's love for them.

Internationally the churches of the Association are reaching the world with the Gospel. One form of international mission is continued participation of the churches in collecting Christian literature and Bibles for Book Link International to send to several countries in the world. This ministry distributes this literature free of charge to the recipient, often to those that have no access even to a Bible to call their own.

Another way that the churches are coming together as an Association to do missions is to partner on International trips. Cashiers and Ochre Hill partnered on a trip to Romania to teach the Bible through VBS. Felix Villarreal of La Primera Baptist Church continues to host several people from various churches, ie. Lighthouse, on mission trips to several cities in Mexico.

It is a blessing to see churches be on mission here and internationally but it is so beautiful to see them come together to serve God better than they ever could apart.

Discipleship

As Christians we are commanded to make disciples. In obedience to this command the Association has provided a couple of ways to further the discipling of the members of the churches in the Association. The first was a church leadership/ Sunday School training day held in the Spring. This year we had several breakout sessions at the beginning and then came together for Sgt. Johnny Holifield of the Jackson County Sheriff's Office to introduce the churches to the topic of church security. The class was an introduction to a longer course that is offered by the Sheriff to the churches.

In September, the Association sponsored our fourth Mission Conference. This year we had four churches in the Association and one in Swain County host missionaries for five services starting Sunday morning and ending Wednesday night. This year we had missionaries from Australia, the Middle East, Africa, South Asia, West Africa and (new this year) Baptist Men/

was sent home with a treat bag that contained more information about the churches, their VBS schedules and, most importantly, a New Testament from the Gideons.

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Baptist on Mission. The purpose of the Missions Conference is to remind our churches of the work of our missionaries through the International Missions Board.

Miscellaneous

The Lord continues to provide as we do His work. After what seemed like a long time, the property that was donated to the Association and two other parties by the Wall estate finally sold. The proceeds from this sale helped us end the year in the black. The buyer paid half of the money now and will pay the other half over five years. This will help take some of the strain off of our finances but we still need to be ever vigilant so that we do not get back into the dire condition that we once found ourselves.

Unfortunately we lost another church in the Association. With dwindling numbers and very few members left, Wilkesdale Baptist Church closed its doors and merged with Sylva Assembly of God. The new church that was formed is meeting in the former Wilkesdale building and has been renamed "The Armory."

This September brought the end of my tenure as a member of the Board of Directors for the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. The time spent serving was "interesting" and I will never forget it. I thank the churches for their willingness to let me serve in this capacity.

September also was the end of my service to the churches of the Tennessee River Baptist Association in Swain County. I started work with the TRBA churches in January but it became apparent that some in the Association were not ready to move forward in unity. My last day of service to them was September 23rd.

A new opportunity has opened up on the campus of Western Carolina University. The Baptist Children's Homes of NC has taken possession of the old Baptist Student Union building. They are there to serve the population of students that have "aged out" of the foster care system. These students face unique challenges as they transition to adulthood. With no family support, the Baptist Children's Homes wants to help them in this critical time of their lives. Thus the new ministry. The Children's Homes has asked the churches to come alongside of them to reach these former foster students and other students on campus. Pray as we look to see this opportunity through.

As you can see, this year has, once again, been a busy one. It is wonderful to see how the churches of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association have continued to come together to do much more than we ever could apart. The churches are coming together more and more each year. Let's keep up the good work of serving our Lord.

Gideon Report, Kenny Frizzell and Arthur Stephens

I have a letter I would like to share with you from Jimmy Jacumin who at that time was the NC Faith Fund Coordinator. Brother Jimmy says: "I will never forget the Gideon Bible distribution in Tanzania. We were away out in the back country on our way to distribute Bibles at a school when we came upon a group of children blocking the road. We told them we couldn't stop because we had to get to our assigned school but we would be back in a little while.

When we arrived at our assigned school and determined the number of Bibles needed for all the students, we were 200 short. What would we do? Which students would we give the bread of life and which students may we be condemning to hell? We went to our knees asking God what we should do. When we got up from our knees, a truck pulled in behind us. It was another Gideon team who had gotten lost on their way to their assigned school. They had 200 extra Bibles. God had answered our prayers but our thoughts returned to those children we had passed on the road. Surely they would not wait another 2 ½ hours for us to return. But, when we got there, they were still waiting. They began begging us for a copy of God's Word. Tears began to run down their faces when we told them we did not have any more. There were tears in our eyes too. There was large rock in front of their school with the words "Knowledge is Power" written on it. We all know knowledge of God is power. I promised God I would share this testimony with everyone I could so out-stretched hands such as those students on the road asking, "Please mister, do you not have a Bible for me?" could be filled.

For anyone here that may not know who the Gideons are – we are an organization of almost 175,000 Christian business and professional men in 200 countries throughout the world. Since 1899, our one and only purpose has been to win those that are lost to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, by sharing the gospel with the world.

In this past year, the Gideons distributed over 91,800,000 scriptures in those 200 countries and since 1908; we have distributed more than 2 billion scriptures, God has given the Gideons a vision to be distributing 120 mission scriptures annually by the year 2020. In Jackson County this past year, we distributed 1,400 testaments at Western Carolina University and placed approximately 2,000 additional scriptures in hotels and motels, in the county jail, with fireman and emergency personnel, with medical personnel, at school Bible Clubs and through personal witnessing. We thank God for the \$8,800 that was received from the local churches to help purchase all these scriptures. We thank you for your support for without church support, there would not be a Gideon ministry. The Jackson County Gideons and Auxiliary themselves gave \$21,215 to the ministry. The Gideons pay membership dues to that the monies given go to the cost involved in getting a scripture printed and into the hands of someone who needs it.

high school English class, Megan offers a glimpse into her life before and after coming to Baptist Children's Homes:

Where I'm From by Megan

I'm from an old rickety home where no one belongs, where mattresses lie on the floor and the front door is never locked.

I'm from the deepest darkest family secrets, the nastiest memories that burn like fire in the back of everyone's mind. I'm from the family that told their kids not to be afraid of what would come next, but to swallow the pill that would come next and sit back and enjoy the view.

I'm from heavy hands and thick leather belts. Red puffy welts on hind ends and crooked white scars. From dusty broken mirrors with a reflection of hatred and rib cage bones, from the drink glasses and bottles broken on the carpet floor.

I'm from a father who was never really a dad, the drunk and abusive man who loved me but was too caught up in the drugs to show me what love is. From the family legacy where everyone had some sort of twisted family member who just didn't know what the word "no" meant.

I'm also from a family where everyone cares and where your bad experiences fade away, from a family who feeds me and never reminds me of the twisted mess that I used to be.

I'm from a Father who would do anything to see me be successful.

I'm from holy hands that touch me with grace and mercy, who forgives me of my sins when others fail to do so, from a Father who will love me no matter what I look or act like.

I'm the only survivor in my family so one day my child will be from a family that loves her. She won't be from the rickety old home where no one belongs.

Desiring for their parents' home in Marston to be used for something meaningful, Claudia and her sister Beverly Smith deeded the property to BCH which has become the ministry's newest Family Care home. The Claude and Lois Smith Family Care Home, a residential home for hard-working single mothers and their children, is named in memory of the sisters' parents. The new home was dedicated on August 30, 2015.

"The home can be a spring board for a better life," Claudia says. "The home offers a stable place. It is a place where moms can be with their children and prepare for their futures. As time rolls by, we look forward to seeing how these families' lives are transformed."

Claudia and Kenneth, who are members of First Baptist Church of Rockingham, also deliver eggs from the chicken yard at their house to the mothers and children. Kenneth is building raised garden beds behind Smith Home. He plans to teach the mothers to grow vegetables and then can and freeze what they grow.

Serving Aging Adults – Emma and Sonny

Eighty-eight-year-old Emma Feimster was trapped unable to come down the steps of her Statesville home and longed to attend church services again. Concerned about her mother's well being and fearful for her safety, Feimster's daughter Sandra contacted NCBAM. Sandra was assured that her mother would receive a wheelchair ramp. Feimster's ramp was built as part of 2016 Rampin' Up! The event is held every two years in conjunction with Operation Inasmuch.

Through the three Rampin' Up! events (2012, 2014, 2016), North Carolina Baptists have built hundreds of ramps. Promoting ramp-building teams of every age, the NCBAM Team joined for the first time constructing three wheelchair ramps. Their team was made of NCBAM staff members and their children. Emma Feimster's ramp was the first they built.

Through Rampin' Up!, North Carolina Baptists built more than 200 wheelchair ramps throughout the state.

Sonny Westmoreland, an active deacon at Haymore Memorial Baptist Church in Mount Airy, has become an ambassador for NCBAM's Red Bag program. The 80-year-old Westmoreland pitched Red Bags as a church community outreach to his pastor Robert McCrary and fellow deacons and they jumped on board. The church appreciates that each Red Bag given away comes with the plan of salvation.

A Red Bag is designed to store all medicines in one place making it easier to take medicines to doctor appointments. Storing all medicines (except temperature-sensitive ones) in the bag at all times and keeping the bag in a visible, central place helps emergency personnel locate medicines if a crisis occurs. North Carolina Baptists have distributed more than 16,000 Red Bags since the beginning of the program.

Serving Orphans – Esmerelda and Santos

The Good Shepherd Children's Home in Quetzaltenango (also known as Xela), Guatemala welcomed its first child on October 17, 2014. More than a year later, BCH's affiliate orphanage has served more than 25 orphans ranging from only a few weeks old to age 13.

"Looking back on the past year, there is no doubt that God had a plan as he prepared the right people and the right place for the orphanage," says BCH Chief Operating Officer Keith Henry. "The Good Shepherd Children's Home has literally saved the lives of more than a two dozen children."

While the majority of those admitted to the home are babies, Good Shepherd also receives older children who have come from dire circumstances. In March, the orphanage brought in seven siblings, ages two to 13, who were living on the streets of San Marcos. They were heavily infected with lice and slept on the ground each night.

The orphanage is more than a safe haven for abandoned children. It is also a place where the Gospel is regularly shared. At the end of March – over the Easter Weekend -- Henry and several members of BCH's Board of Trustees journeyed to the orphanage so trustees could experience the ministry firsthand. While there trustees met 13-year-old Santos, the oldest boy at the orphanage who asked Jesus into his heart soon after arriving. And 13-year-old Esmeralda, one of the siblings who came to the orphanage earlier that month, made a decision for Christ a short time after the group returned to the states.

"It's not hard to imagine Santos becoming a Christian leader or even a pastor," said trustee chairman Jay Westmoreland, a member of First Baptist Church in Charlotte.

Mission teams, coordinated through North Carolina Baptist Men, travel regularly to the orphanage and its nearby medical clinic to assist with work projects. The clinic not only provides medical care to the orphans, but it offers medical assistance to the local villagers while sharing the gospel.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR YEAR 2015

In 2015 the Foundation celebrated its 95th anniversary, and there is much to celebrate. It all started with a \$1,000 gift for supporting the ministry of Baptist hospital in perpetuity. Today we manage 2,264 accounts, 1387 of which are endowments benefitting 541 different ministries on a permanent basis. In our 95 year history we have distributed \$122 million to charity and \$50 million to individuals through charitable trusts for a total distribution of \$172 million.

The mission of the NC Baptist Foundation is "to serve North Carolina Baptists and others in generating an increased awareness of Christian stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding Baptist churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis." In 2015 the Foundation was blessed in our efforts to accomplish our mission as:

- 42 new accounts were established, most of which will permanently support
 Kingdom work in North Carolina and around the world
- Total gifts to all accounts was \$5,376,312.58
- A total of \$7,924,388.53 was distributed (\$6,002,348.18 to mission endeavors and \$1,922,040.35 to individuals through charitable trusts)
- Assets under management declined from \$152,648,455.47 to \$146,537,294.91, primarily due to the investment market being flat

Our newest ministry, NC Baptist Financial Services, continued to grow in 2015. By the end of the year NCBFS had provided 68 loans to churches totaling \$37 million. The total invested in Certificates of Participation, which provides some of the resources for loans, was \$13.2 million.

FaithHealthNC - A Partnership of Compassion

FaithHealthNC helps ease the journey to health and healing for people and the communities in which they live. It does this by connecting the caring strengths of congregations, the clinical expertise of health providers and a network of community resources. Partners are linked in a shared ministry of healing focused on compassionate caring.

FaithHealthNC trains volunteers in: respecting patients' privacy, hospital visitation, care at the end of life, understanding mental health, and other topics. FaithHealthNC is:

- > Someone discovering that a patient keeps returning to the hospital because she can't read.
- > Multiple congregations working together to provide a patient with daily transportation to chemotherapy.
- > A church working with community leaders to help start a community garden.
- > A group of committed church members helping a church start a free health clinic.
- Someone who advocates to help a homeless person with a chronic condition find housing.
- > Finding resources to help individuals get the care they need at home so they will not have to return to the hospital.

FaithHealthNC is working closely with churches affiliated with the Baptist State Convention of NC and the General Baptist State Convention of NC to launch FaithHealthNC in northeastern NC. The West

Chowan Baptist Association and its churches are key partners in this growing "movement of compassion" in that area of our state. We are also working to expand FaithHealthNC in the Robeson County Fayetteville, Campbell University area. We continue to build our network of churches and associations across North Carolina.

CareNet of North Carolina - Lifting Spirit. Holding Hope.

CareNet Counseling, part of the Division of Faith and Health Ministries and Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center, is recognized by the state of North Carolina as an innovator and safety net provider for some of our most vulnerable citizens. CareNet centers, strategically located in many rural areas across North Carolina provide needed access to mental health and substance usage services to populations were services are scarce to non-existent. This mission field of quiet desperation, poverty and hopelessness is infused with hope and healing through the generosity of the Baptist State Convention. The support of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina enables us to offer over 50,000 hours of care to people across 85 of 100 NC Counties in 37 CareNet Centers.

FaithHealth Chaplaincy and Clinical Ministries

The Department of FaithHealth Chaplaincy and Clinical Ministries and the Department of FaithHealth Education served as one department, the Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education. This department has provided chaplaincy ministry to Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center for more than 50 years and is the oldest chaplaincy program in the Southeast region, and one of the largest of its kind anywhere. The chaplaincy ministry program combines ministry with education. Crisis ministry and routine visits to patients, families and staff are provided by ministers who are learning to become more effective servants of the people. These chaplain interns and residents provide routine visits Monday through Friday during regular business hours and an on-call chaplain provides coverage for emergent and crisis calls 24/7. Staff chaplains specialize in providing services to the Medical Center in the areas of Advance Care Planning and Advance Directives, support to the hospital staff and other areas.

The Center for Congregational Health – Strengthening Congregations

The Center for Congregational Health has served ministers and congregations in North Carolina for almost 25 years. The Center was originally established through a cooperative relationship between the Baptist State Convention and North Carolina Baptist Hospital's School of Pastoral Care. The Center has sought to fulfill its mission of providing hope, healing and encouragement to God's servants and God's people. The Center provides Christ-centered consultation for congregations and leadership training and coaching for pastors and church staff. Center consultants and coaches guide congregations through conflict resolution, discerning God's call through strategic visioning and planning, and helping congregations make healthy transitions between pastors.

The Center also plays a key role within the FaithHealth Division of the medical center. Center consultants and coaches work to improve the health of congregations so they can serve the people of their communities by extending the healing ministry of Christ.

Additional WFBMC Highlights

The divisions are **Wake Forest Baptist Health**, a regional clinical system with close to 175 locations, goo physicians, and 1,000 acute care beds; **Wake Forest School of Medicine**, an established leader in medical education and research; and **Wake Forest Innovations**, which promotes the commercialization of research discoveries and operates **Wake Forest Innovation Quarter**, an urban research and business park specializing in biotechnology, materials science and information technology. Wake Forest Baptist clinical, research and educational programs are annually ranked among the best in the country by *U.S. News & World Report*.

325 of our physicians were named as Best Doctors in America in the 2015-2016 report by *U.S. News & World Report*. The physicians represented 37 Specialties and 59 of the physicians are Pediatric Specialists at **Brenner Children's Hospital**, a part of **Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center**.

The Comprehensive Cancer Center remains ranked #1 in North Carolina Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center purchased Cornerstone Health Care in 2016 with more than 275 medical providers and 50 medical practices across 12 counties.

The Wake Forest School of Medicine will move into it's new medical education building in the Innovation Quarter in 2016, a state-of-the-art building that will better prepare students for the new models of care now being pioneered as they become the physicians of tomorrow.

IMB Report Fall 2016

Thank you for the way you have partnered together with us to get the gospel to people who have never heard it before.

Over the past year we have walked through difficult days at the IMB. But to see God's provision through churches and through the Southern Baptist Convention ecosystem has been amazing. From the way that you have cared for, encouraged, and supported missionaries who have made transitions, to the way you have redeployed many of them into your churches and your communities for the spread of the gospel here in North America, to how you have sacrificially and generously given through the Cooperative Program and the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering — it's nothing short of breathtaking to see well over \$260 million dollars given from churches with the express purpose of getting the gospel to people who have never heard it.

Toward this end, in 2015 Southern Baptists gave \$95.2 million through the Cooperative Program and \$165.8 million through the 2015 Lottie Moon Christmas Offering[®] for International Missions, the highest total in the 127-year history of the offering. These gifts support almost 4,000 missionaries sent out by Southern Baptist churches through IMB.



In addition, Southern Baptists gave \$6.5 million for hunger relief and development ministries around the world.

Together, these gifts enabled IMB missionaries to report:

- 127,385 people professing faith in Christ
- 54,762 new believers expressing their faith through baptism
- 3,842 new churches planted
- 886 people groups engaged

I hope that this ministry report is also a picture of what lies ahead as Southern Baptists move into the future. We pray the number of people who have come to Christ, the churches planted and the leaders trained will multiply in the days to come as we continue to pray, give, go and send for the glory of God. We want to partner together with you to take gospel to a world where 2.8 billion people have little or no access to the gospel.

IMB exists to empower limitless missionary teams to make disciples and multiply churches among unreached peoples for the glory of God. As IMB mobilizes Christians and churches to join God's mission through evangelism, Bible translation, disaster relief, sustainable development and more, it is with one goal in mind: to make disciples and multiply churches in fulfillment of Christ's commission.

Pray that God will create a missional awakening in our churches. Pray that He will wake up Southern Baptists to see His great glory and that churches will pray with zeal for the glory of God among the nations. Pray that churches will be aware of ways to give with even greater sacrifice for the glory of God among the nations. Pray that churches big and small will play their part in sending the gospel to the nations.

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Biblical Recorder's Annual Report November 2016

People need to know! Christians need to know! Baptists need to know! American citizens need to know! Everyone needs to know! That is the reason the *Biblical Recorder* exists.

The *Biblical Recorder* was founded only three years after the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was organized in 1830. The timing of those two events is significant. It did not take long for Baptist leaders in those days to realize the high value of getting news and information to all of the people in Baptist churches. Pastors needed to know what God was doing in the churches, associations and convention. Lay people needed to know also, especially since they were the ones who gave tithes and offerings each week to support the mission outreach of Baptists.

Twelve years later the work of the *Recorder* proved to be even more important. In 1845 the Southern Baptist Convention was launched to unite Baptist churches across the nation for the sake of the Great Commission. People wanted to know how this new national convention would work. They depended on the *Biblical Recorder* and the small number of Baptist newspapers that existed in the state conventions.

More than a century-and-a-half later news travels at much faster speeds, and there are many new way of getting the news – radio, television, internet, social media and other communication platforms.

Some believe there is no longer a need for news agencies like the *Recorder*. While it is true that Baptist newspapers in the states surrounding North Carolina have cut back or ceased their services, the *Recorder* has not seen the need to reduce the service we provide to North Carolina Baptists. We believe our ministry to the churches is more important than ever.

There is a great need for news and information from a Christian worldview. The clouds of doubt and distrust hang heavily over most secular news sources. The extremely partisan worldview of many news sources is pumping out information that is not accurate, untruthful and severely biased. Do you want the people in your church feeding on false information throughout the week? Of course not! People need to know the truth.

Would we say we do not need the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina to reach out to troubled children? Would we let the government or some other agency do that work? Of course not, because our children's homes serves from a Christian worldview and offers ministry that no one else provides.

Would we say we do not need North Carolina Baptist Men to do disaster relief work? Should we hand the work over to FEMA and the Red Cross? Absolutely not! The men and women who serve through Baptist Men are ministering from a Christian worldview. They present the gospel, which is something that will not happen if we surrender this work to others.

Do you see the point? Do you want your church family to depend on secular media? Can we grow healthy churches if the pastor feeds the sheep from the Bible on Sunday but sheep feed on a diet of secular news and information the rest of the week?

Your *Biblical Recorder* staff wants to help prepare you to face the issues of life with biblical insights. We support the work of the pastor and church staff as they shepherd the flock of God.

We believe church members and attenders are better equipped to fulfill their life's mission when they have the right information. Where is your church family getting their information from Sunday to Sunday? Are they feeding from unreliable news sources that have an unbiblical agenda, or are they getting the *Biblical Recorder*? Is the secular media their only source? If so, that needs to change.

If Christians are going to impact the culture with the gospel, accurate information is essential. Your *Biblical Recorder* staff is serious about equipping our readers to impact lostness.

We have some good news and some bad news to report.

First, here's the good news. This year the *Biblical Recorder* believes we will end the year financially in the black for the first time in about ten years. Special gifts from churches and individuals as well as some new church group subscriptions are making a difference.

Also, the website *BRnow.org* continues to be a strong resource for Baptists. We are the second highest rated Baptist newspaper website in the world. Averaging between 20,000 to 35,000 unique visitors every day, people around the world trust *BRnow.org* for up-to-date news and information.

But here's the bad news. Judging by the number of subscribers to the *Biblical Recorder*, there are not enough Baptists in our state who are depending on us for reliable news and information. Many Baptists don't even know we exist. In four years we will not exist unless North Carolina Baptists allow us to serve you.

Our survival is beneficial to you and your church. In other words, North Carolina Baptists need the *Biblical Recorder* for many reasons. Here are a few.

- 1. We inform church leaders so they can lead the church and community better. No other news source is doing what we do.
- 2. We inform church members and attenders so they will be strong Christian citizens in this challenging culture, and so they will be healthy, active supporters of the local church.
- 3. We belong to North Carolina Baptists and are accountable to you. The news we report is tailored to the needs of our Baptist audience.
- 4. We write from the perspective of a Christian worldview with a focus on the Great Commission.
- 5. We report news about your Southern Baptist mission agencies, seminaries and related entities.

Cooperative Program Report for Associations, 2016

If we're going to brag, it should be about Jesus.

But you could perhaps spare some glowing words for what Southern Baptists do together in missions and ministry.

Did you know North Carolina Baptists help start a new church somewhere in our state about every 3.8 days?

And did you know that, nationally, we help start an average of two churches a day? Or that, of all the new evangelical churches started each year across the country, we Southern Baptists start about one of every five?

Such positive results happen because, as Baptists, we believe in the Bible and try to be obedient to what it tells us.

We are a fellowship of mostly small churches, yet we get a lot of Kingdom work done. Remember, though, that Southern Baptists are the largest evangelical church group in the United States, with some 16 million members in more than 46,000 churches. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina is one of 42 state conventions across the country; we have some 4,300 churches and more than one million members.

There are two main elements to how we work together as Baptists. First is the **convention approach**. We hold annual meetings because we work together voluntarily; we meet so that messengers from autonomous churches can agree on what work — and how much of it — they want to do together.

Pastors and lay church members serve on our Board of Directors and other bodies and help direct the convention's work. No board or group tries to direct or interfere with local church autonomy.

The second element is the **Cooperative Program**, because working together calls for some method of funding Kingdom missions and ministry that is fair, effective and responsive to the churches sending the money.

Thousands of churches, small to mega, voluntarily give through the Cooperative Program because they recognize the amazing amount of ministry that can be done as each church contributes its part towards a budget that has been agreed on during the annual meeting.

Consider that the Cooperative Program is an important part of our Baptist response to the Great Commission, such as in Matthew 28 and Acts 1:8. Together, we can respond more effectively. We cooperate as part of our obedience to God's clear instructions in such passages.

So we have a good system for working together and that system has a proven track record.

Go to www.ncbaptist.org/cpresources and you'll find videos and other materials to help educate your members about how and what Baptists do together.

You'll find some great new videos about Fruitland Baptist Bible College. There's a new video in Spanish, plus one in English that may be best for younger Hispanics whose primary language is English.

One of the best tools for teaching missions and prayer in your church is called **52 Sundays**, a PowerPoint that will enable your church to pray for a different missionary every Sunday: international, North American or North Carolina.

Imagine: You can escort your church on a year-long missions trip and pray with insight for our missionaries you *already support* through the Cooperative Program.

You'll learn how our missionaries continue to serve in troubled parts of the world like the Middle East and in our U.S. cities in the northeastern part of the United States.

You will find much to thank God for as you learn about how He is changing lives with His truths.

For comparison, consider how North Carolina Baptists give, compared to Baptists in other states.

In Cooperative Program giving, North Carolina Baptists are one of the leading state conventions in the nation.

In giving to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for International Missions, North Carolina Baptists led all other states in 2015. Oh, and we also increased our giving to Lottie in 2015 by more than one million dollars over 2014's total.

In giving to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American Missions, North Carolina Baptists also led all other states last year. And so far this year, giving has been up by a substantial amount.

Also, consider NC Baptist missions giving: In 2015, through the Cooperative Program, *plus* the Lottie Moon and Annie Armstrong offerings, NC Baptists sent more than \$30 million to the Southern Baptist Convention for missions and seminary education.

NC Baptists, thus, sent more than 60% of their total missions giving outside our state. We kept about \$20 million for missions and ministry in North Carolina, and that includes the \$2.15 million that NC Baptists gave to the North Carolina Missions Offering last year.

NC Baptists have steadily increased the percentage of our Cooperative Program dollars we send to the SBC; in 2016 we are sending 40% of our CP dollars to the SBC.

So, there is much to be thankful for and much to feel good about, in this business of working together.

However, as NC Baptists continue to push ahead in Christian discipleship and begin to develop churches which have cultures of disciple

making, we are learning that all parts of discipleship must be strengthened in order to be truly obedient to Christ.

Weak discipling efforts beget weak missions efforts.

That's because weak stewardship will produce weak churches without sufficient funds for ministry.

One of the most troubling aspects of stewardship among Baptists is that our giving to the church averages only about two percent of our income. That means most churches would increase their budgets by a factor of five if all the members just tithed.

Generous giving, beyond the tithe, as taught in the New Testament, would empower churches even more.

If we NC Baptists want to truly reach our world for Christ, if we want to send additional missionaries to engage the more than 3,000 people groups around the world who as yet have no way to hear the gospel, we can do so by obediently following what the Bible teaches on giving.

Our system is a good one. As our discipleship deepens and we re-direct more of our God-given resources away from worldly endeavors to Kingdom support, we will begin to see our churches impact our world as never before.

GUIDESTONE

The GuideStone Team of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina (BSCNC) has remained strong in its efforts to serve North Carolina's more than 4,300 affiliated churches. The many governmental changes and updates that have impacted our churches regarding employee benefits and retirement plans continue to dominate the ministry of the GuideStone Team. Our goal continues to be keeping our North Carolina Baptist associations and churches up-to-date on these changes that impact them. The following information is a summary of those efforts.

Retirement

The GuideStone Team works with church staff and lay leaders in an effort to assist them in the restructuring of pastor and staff compensation packages to include retirement benefits. Many pastors and staff members do not see the benefits of participating in the Church Retirement Plan, and they will opt out of the plan if given an opportunity. Therefore, a continued effort is being made to challenge churches to assist their pastors and staff by contributing to their retirement plans in addition to their salaries and other benefits. Sadly, nearly half of N.C. Baptist churches make no contributions to the retirement plans of their staff members. We continue to educate and encourage our churches to be responsible employers by providing for their staff members' retirements in a Christ-honoring manner.

Convention Protection Benefits

2016 marked the first year in decades that the state convention did not contribute directly to the retirement accounts of church staff participating in the Church Retirement Plan. This decision by the Board of Directors was precipitated by an intentional effort to redirect budget dollars that could increase the impact of North Carolina Cooperative Program gifts on the mission fields in North America and around the world. By eliminating this benefit, the convention was able to increase the percentage of Cooperative Program receipts being forwarded to the Southern Baptist Convention for missions and ministry by a full 3 percent in 2016.

We were pleased to be able to continue offering life and disability benefits to all staff members of N.C. Baptist churches that participate in the Church Plan through GuideStone. North Carolina continues to lead all state conventions in the number of participants, but we are still far short of the goal of having every church providing for their staff members through a GuideStone Retirement Plan.

Health Insurance

Health Care Reform Law – GuideStone remains a leader in providing detailed information regarding the impact that new tax laws have on our churches and their staff. Timely and thorough updates of changes in the tax law can be found on the GuideStone website. The ripple effects of the Affordable Care Act continue to cause confusion for churches and their benefits programs for staff, and your GuideStone office is committed to being a reliable source of help and encouragement as churches navigate these changing waters.

Church Staff Compensation

Church staff participation in the 2016 LifeWay biannual Church Compensation Survey was completed on May 31, 2016. The results of the 2016 compensation survey will be available online at *compstudy.lifeway.com* later in the year. Much of the year has been spent educating

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churches on the tax implications of the "lump sum pay packages" for pastors and churches. The taxability of such pay packages continues to be a concern.

Mission Dignity

GuideStone Financial Resources continues to provide financial assistance to elderly ministers and widows of ministers who live under financial duress and need ongoing and/or one-time assistance through Mission Dignity. 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BY-LAWS OF THE TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- 4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as autonomous bodies.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the Bible.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Doctrine Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Doctrine Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Doctrine Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. Any church under watchcare is expected to participate in and financially support the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, at the recommendation of the Doctrine and Executive Committees and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, a Church Profile, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting. SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the Doctrine Committee determines which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be affirmed by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Assistant Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Trustees and team leaders. Team leaders shall be chosen by the Nominating Committee as needed to serve the purposes of the Association (eg. Sunday School leader, Youth/Children leader). Team leaders will work with the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions to form a team to carry out assigned duties.

Associational representatives will be elected as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association. Associational representatives shall be a conduit of information between outside agencies and the Association. They may also represent the Association as the outside agency's policies specify.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from October 1 through September 30.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all meetings; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of the annual meeting; and prepare minutes of the annual meeting (Annual Minutes) to be distributed to each church.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association a congregational church profile as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association as soon as possible or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall oversee the receipts and disbursements, by order of the Executive Committee of the Association, of the money of the treasury and ensure that a complete report is presented at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 6. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business meetings of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Team Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for three years except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Committees members, Team Leaders (as needed) and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 5. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the Associational building, grounds, and equipment. SECTION 6. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- A. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.
- B. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of Associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the Association.
 - C. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the Association's staff personnel.
 - D. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.
- E. When a staff vacancy occurs, other than the DOM, they shall serve as the search committee. When a DOM vacancy occurs, they shall nominate a search committee and present it to the Executive Committee.
 - F. The Personnel Committee shall handle grievances as outlined in the grievance policy.

SECTION 7 THE ANNUAL MEETING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. The duties of this committee shall be to

- A. recommend the church(es) to host the annual meeting and the preacher(s) and alternate preacher(s) to deliver the annual sermon for the following year,
- B. present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting,

- C. bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting,
- D. keep the historical records of the Association up-to-date,
- E. plan the program for the Annual Meeting(s) and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting,
- F. shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meeting(s),
- G. and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIII (amendments to by-laws).

SECTION 7 THE DOCTRINE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five pastors and two laymen.

- A. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.
- B. It shall also advise churches about candidates for ordination with the following guidelines: it serves on an advisory capacity only, serves at the request of the church from which the member is seeking ordination, is to examine such candidates as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led. It should regularly inform the Executive Committee of its work.

ARTICLE XII. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

- A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.
- B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as a minister to the church leaders of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, as mission strategist, as chief administrative officer, and as a general leader of the Association.
- C. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise a job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Annual Meeting Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

ARTICLE XIV. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directs, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.
