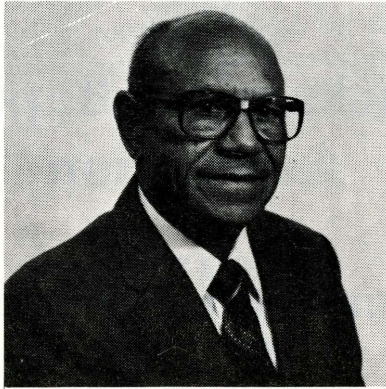

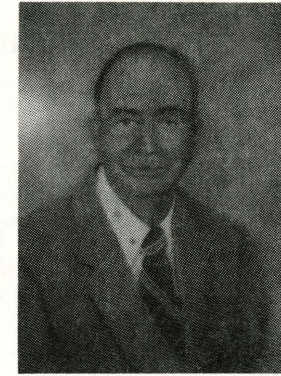
JOSEPH HENRY SMITH

Joseph A. Smith had the unique experience of serving the Liberty Baptist Church of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association for a total of fifty-four years. During this time he earned the well deserved titles of pastor, minister, preacher, evangelist, church builder, missionary, and lecturer. He served the Liberty Baptist Church from 1928 until 1982. He traveled widely visiting and working in such countries as Tokyo, Europe, Japan, Alaska, the Holy Land and other countries. He took advantage of every opportunity to speak, or preach in every country he visited. During his span of service at Liberty, he lead the church through three building experiences.

Joe Smith, as he is affectionately called by all who know him, was born in Jackson County. He completed his elementary education in the Jackson County Schools. He completed his high school education in the Calvary Presbyterian School in Asheville. After graduation he continued his education by studying in several seminaries and traveling. He received the Doctor of Divinity Degree from Shaw University in 1962.

During his life span he has held five pastorates. Serving each faithfully and successfully. God called him into His service at an early age. He has held many offices in the associations in which he has pastored. He has as Paul said, "run with patience in the race that was set before him." He is a man of modest demeanour with a gracious personality, always ready and willing to help in whatever way that arises. He is always generous with his personal possessions; so generous, in fact, that his own car became known as an ambulance and a bus. He hauled so many people to the hospital and used his car to transport children to and from Vacation Bible School and Sunday School.

As a minister of the gospel, Joe Smith wore the "whole armor of God." He truly girded his loins with truth, he wore the breastplate of righteousness, shod his feet with the gospel of peace, his hat became the helmet of salvation, his sword was the Bible, and his shield was the "shield of faith." In his fifty-four years of service he has kept this "armor of God" around him and has touched many lives and saved many souls. He has used faithfully and carefully the gifts the Holy Spirit bestowed upon him. He has truly been and is God's Man. He "walks with God."

Memorial Tribute to Clarence Austin

For Tuckasegee Baptist Minutes

Brother Clarence Austin was born July 21, 1915, to Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Austin of Scotts Creek township in Jackson County.

On July 28, 1940 he joined the Ochre Hill Baptist Church having experienced grace during a revival meeting conducted by Robert Parris, pastor of the church, Rev. O. J. Beck, Rev. Dave Norman, and Rev. Julius Carson in which seventeen professions are recorded in the Minutes of Ochre Hill Church.

On April 5, 1941 having surrendered to the call to the gospel ministry, Brother Clarence was licensed to preach by the Ochre Hill Baptist Church.

Brother Austin married Flora Queen on February 28, 1942 and soon thereafter drafted into the United States Army where he served with honor and distinction.

On January 16, 1954 the Ochre Hill Baptist Church ordained Brother Clarence to full gospel ministry. Although he never served churches as pastor, he was true and faithful to perform such functions as he was called on to do. He served as Sunday School teacher, Church Clerk, preached and conducted prayer meetings in church and homes. He sometimes assisted at funerals and other things.

In later years Brother Clarence moved his church membership to the Mount Pleasant Baptist Church where his people were members. He served his Lord in that church in a true and faithful manner until God called him home on January 25, 1985.

It is fitting that these minutes be dedicated to Brother Austin alongside another great Soldier of the Cross, Brother Joe Smith.

The Tuckasegee Baptist Association is honored to dedicate the 1985 Annual to these two men of God. They have both walked with the Master in their daily lives and in so doing have helped many others to do likewise. O men of God "would there were more of your caliber."

Proceedings

THURSDAY, AUGUST 15, 1985

1. The Reverend Eddie Stillwell called the 156th Annual meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association into session following a delicious meal at the Scotts Creek Baptist Church.
2. Johnny Enloe, pastor of the Scotts Creek Church, gave the devotional.
3. Harry Vance, Associational Director of Music, led the group in singing, "We Have Heard the Joyful Sound."
5. Moderator Stillwell thanked the host church for the meal.
6. John Reid, Director of Missions, made the motion that the "Book of Reports" be adopted with the exception of the reports on business matters. The motion passed.
7. The following were recognized as new pastors and visitors: Reverend Bob Wacks, representing *The Biblical Recorder*; Reverend Frank Reed, interim pastor of the Buff Creek Church; Dr. Terry Peele, assistant pastor at Sylva, First; Bill Crouch, representing the Baptist Homes; Calvin Knight, Representative of the Baptist Hospital; and Reverend Winston Hardman, B.S.U. Chaplin at Western Carolina University.

8. John Reid, Director of Missions, brought the annual message and the report for the associational year. A copy of the report may be found in these minutes. He commended the churches for the good work they had done this year. His message set the theme for the meeting, "The Killing of the Giants."

9. Thad Corbin brought the report on the work being done in our partnership with Togo.

10. Robert Blanton, chairman of the Constitution Committee, distributed copies of the Constitution with the suggested changes. These changes will be acted upon at the Friday session.

11. Annie Hoyle, Associational Clerk and Secretary was awarded a duplicate plaque for the contributions she had made to the Baptist Center.

12. The Reverend Bob Wacks, Assistant Editor of the "*Biblical Recorder*" presented the report on that Baptist paper. The purpose of the paper, he said was to provide the Baptist people with a knowledge of what was taking place in the Baptist world in North Carolina.

13. Bob Crouch brought the report on the work in North Carolina Baptist Homes. He spoke of the changes taking place in child care and some of the things that the Moody Farms ministry would be able to accomplish. Today the children's homes are dealing more with battered children than they are with children without parents. At least 97% of the children in the Baptist homes have at least one parent; while 77% of this number have both parents living. One great purpose of the homes is to help these battered children recognize and destroy the giants in their lives. The Moody Farms ministry will help accomplish this.

14. In the absence of the Director of Camp Truett, John Reid reported. He pointed out the need for a new dining hall and other facilities that were needed to meet the needs of a rapidly growing camp. He encouraged financial giving and the support of this institution.

15. In reporting on the Baptist Hospital, Calvin Knight, encouraged the adoption of a plan of giving each quarter specifically designated for the Baptist Hospital.

16. Jack Hinson, pastor of the Cullowhee Church, spoke to the Hospital Chaplaincy program conducted at the C. J. Harris Hospital. Within the next two years they hope to have a full-time Hospital Chaplain. The need is great. It is hoped to increase the foundation program to the point that this will be possible.

17. Dr. John Bunn, President of the North Carolina General Board, gave insight into the expansion of the work of the Baptist State Convention.

18. Winston Hardman, incoming Chaplain of Western of Western Carolina University and Director of the B.S.U. at Cullowhee told the messengers that he wanted to get to know them and of his desire to get to know the churches in the Tuckaseegee Association through his work with the students at Western Carolina University.

19. The Digest of Letters, presented by Annie Hoyle, Clerk, indicated growth in the number of baptisms but a decrease in Sunday School enrollment. There is a slight increase in both mission organizations - Brotherhood and W.M.U. and a decrease in giving with the exception of Foreign Missions.

20. Harry Vance spoke enthusiastically of plans underway for the music program in the association. Plans are being made for piano and organ lessons and for music schools and courses.

21. The message of the evening was brought by the Reverend J. D. Griffin, pastor of the Ochre Hill Baptist Church.

22. The Registration report showed that 229 had registered. Of this number, 164 were registered as messengers.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 16, 1985

23. The second session of the Annual meeting convened at 6:00 p.m. in the Old Savannah Baptist Church following a delightful fellowship and dinner served by the host church.

24. Eddie Stillwell, Moderator, called the session to order. There were 150 registered messengers, 20 pastors and 43 visitors present.

25. The Reverend Wesley Hooper, pastor of the Old Savannah Church, gave the devotion using Scripture from 2 Timothy.

26. John Bunn, President of the General Board, gave the report on the work of that organization. This, he said, has been a tremendous year in the life of the North Carolina Baptists. It has been a year of reversing the downward trend. He spoke of the Evangelism explosion with "Good News America, God Loves You" as the climaxing of a great spiritual revival in 1986. Another surge would be the Planned Growth in Giving to all causes which would increase giving by ½ of 1 percent by the year 2000. The expansion and growth in Sunday School, the restoration of Caswell, the new Annuity Program to be launched will all bring more security to the pastors when they retire; the growth and involvement of Fruitland, are all indications of an upward trend.

Bunn commended Robert Blanton for his service on the Board and urged the involvement of more men like him. Blanton had attended each of the Board meetings during his term of service.

27. Coy Privitte related the struggle involved in the defeat of the Lottery Bill.

28. Johnny Enloe, Director of Associational Sunday School Training for the Association, emphasized the need for good strong Bible teaching in Sunday School. He urged churches not to drop names from the Sunday School enrollment unless they had moved away or had deceased. He urged that workers continue to try to enlist all enrollees into active Sunday School attenders.

29. Norman Parris, Director of Church Training in the association, reported that Balsam had organized a Church Training department in the church. He announced his team of workers as Reva Cable, Preschool, Annie Hoyle, Children, Kathleen Buchanan, Youth, and Kenneth Presley, Adults. He urged churches that do not have Church Training to consider getting involved in such work.

30. "M" Night was announced for November 25 at the New Hope Baptist Church.

31. Mildred Cowan, Associational W.M.U. Director, introduced a family from Africa who were studying at Western Carolina University and would soon be returning to their homeland to help spread the gospel of Christ among his people. The W.M.U. report is contained in this annual.

32. The Brotherhood Director, Johnny Watson, urged churches to organize Brotherhood organizations if they did not already have one functioning.

33. The Reverend J. D. Griffin, a member of the Credentials Committee, reported that the committee had unanimously recommended the acceptance of the Promise Land Baptist Church into fellowship of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. He made this in the form of a motion. Jack Hinson, chairman of the Missions Committee, seconded the motion. Hinson spoke to the motion stating that the Missions Committee unanimously approved the adoption of the motion. The motion carried. Representatives of the newest church in the association were asked to come to the front of the sanctuary to be recognized.

34. Tim Burleson, chairman of the Evangelism Committee, reported that Johns Creek Baptist Church and Long Branch Baptist Church had baptized the most members during the year. These churches were presented certificates. Each of these churches had baptized 19 new members. Promise Land was presented a certificate for the best ration of baptisms per member.

35. Dean Coward, Treasurer, presented a nine month Financial report. The associational financial year begins on October 1st. This report is included in these minutes.

36. Only one more payment remains on the Baptist Building. Coward urged the churches to pay this off as soon as possible in order to save interest.

37. Dean Coward presented the Budget for 1985-86. After explaining the changes made in the budget, he moved that the budget be adopted. The motion was seconded and adopted.

38. In the absence of the chairman of the Nominating Committee, John Reid presented this report. He moved that the report be adopted as presented by the committee. The motion was seconded and adopted.

39. Wesley Hooper, chairman of the Committee on Committees, presented the report as found in these minutes. While there are a few remaining vacancies, he moved that the report be adopted as presented and that all vacancies be filled as early as possible. The motion was seconded and adopted.

40. Robert Blanton, of the Constitution Committee, requested that Pelham Thomas take over the responsibilities of parliamentarian in his place since he was acting chairman of the committee. Copies of the suggested changes in the Constitution were placed in the hands of those present.

41. Changes approved by the messengers are included in the Constitution as contained in this annual. The new items are indicated with an asterisk.

42. The report for the Vacation Bible School is included in these minutes. The Vacation Bible School Director was not present.

43. Jack Hinson presented the Missions Committee report.

44. Hardin Nicholson presented the Time, Place and Preacher report. It is contained in these minutes.

45. The Memorial for the 106 deceased members was presented by Annie Hoyle with the assistance of members from the Old Savannah Baptist Church.

46. The message was brought by the Reverend Virgil Cook, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church.

47. After the benediction, the Moderator, Eddie Stillwell, pronounced the 156th Annual Session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association adjourned.

Director of Missions Report 1985

First, I want to thank the churches for the support and encouragement that you have given me. It is a privilege to visit with you, to preach and to teach, and to share with you in your church life. It is with deep conviction and a clear sense of God's call that I serve as Director of Missions. Thank you for enabling me to be obedient to God's call for my life.

There are many things I do as associational missionary. First and foremost, I am a preacher. God called me to preach as a thirteen year old boy. The thrust of my preaching has been to encourage and challenge the local church to be an evangelistic and mission-minded church. Time does not permit me to get around to the churches as quickly as I would like and this is the most frustrating aspect of my work.

Another part of my responsibility is that I help in the planning and the coordinating of the associational programs. It is a challenge to maintain the necessary communication for associational action, activities and working relationships.

I have enjoyed attending the Pastors' Conference both in the morning session and later in the evening sessions. The W.M.U. of the Association was very helpful in providing a lunch to honor pastors and wives during Associational Emphasis Week. Mrs. Hoyle was instrumental in helping plan and organize this event. Mrs. Hoyle's contributions have been substantial this past year. She had donated critically needed equipment for the work room and tables for the Assembly room, and a host of other things too numerous to mention. Also she does volunteer work in the afternoon as her job has grown into a full-time job although we only pay her for part-time work. One of my great joys has been to lead in a MasterLife study that began with eight pastors meeting weekly for an hour and a half of study, prayer, and fellowship. Much effort is being put into preparing for the World Missions Conference. Our goal was for twenty churches to participate and twenty-two churches have now voted to participate. This effort requires tremendous amount of praying, planning, coordinating, and team work.

Last year we conducted a successful Key Leadership Conference and we are anticipating another good conference this year. We have a commitment to provide leadership training for your church leaders so that you may be better prepared to do the work of the Lord.

I had the opportunity to help with others in the planning and preparation of the floats in Sylva and Cashiers Christmas Parades. Our Association won first place in the religious division of the Cashiers Parade.

I have been busy serving as a consultant with churches. I have worked with Pulpit Commit-

tees, counseled with pastors and churches in crisis situations, offered advice concerning programs and procedures, and answered questions about denominational programs and emphasis.

I have worked with the W.M.U. groups, have visited and spoken when my schedules permitted, hosted groups of young people who toured the Baptist Center and conducted a weekly radio program. I am grateful to the Association for sharing with me in this faith ministry with your financial support of almost one-third of the ministry. Indications from both the churches and the general public is that the program is well received.

A great deal of time and effort is expended weekly for the preparation and production of the program, however, God has blessed this ministry and I consider it a valuable one.

I have attended the General Board meetings and the Convention Staff and Director of Missions Meetings immediately following the General Board Meeting. I have attended several area and state Director of Missions Meetings.

This spring I became one of the three Director's of Missions in the state to be certified in Continuing Witness Training. Also, I attended the Southern Baptist Convention Meeting in Dallas, Texas in June.

Much time is spent in the weeks and months prior to the July Executive Committee and the Annual Meetings preparing for these meetings, meeting with the Nominating Committee and the Committee on Committees just to mention a few. All must meet and do their work in preparation for the Book of Reports and the Annual Meetings.

We have several needs in our Association. First, we must remember our history as Baptists. We have always been Bible believing people. We have not always agreed on interpretation but we have always believed that the Bible is the inspired word of God. Even though our churches are different we have always agreed to work cooperatively to reach the world for Christ. Our cooperation has enabled us to build a huge missionary force around the world, to educate our ministry to sponsor Children's Homes, Homes for the Aging, and a variety of other ministries. In spite of our differences, we have always been able to relate to each other, to conduct our business in a way that pleased God. When we differed, we debated the issues. No one person or one church dictated to everyone else what had to be done. Recently, it seems that Baptists have decided that debating the issue is a sin and we fear hurting someone's feelings if we do not agree on everything. It is one thing to guard our fellowship. We must always do that. It is another thing to quickly adopt something without thorough examination and deliberation, and seeking the leadership of the Lord. We must be prayerful and careful of what we do.

Secondly, we must recognize that partisanship has no place in the family of God. Secular politics are partisan and have made us a strong free nation. But, partisan politics with all the "Mud slinging," name calling, and rhetoric will destroy us in God's Work. Though we must use a political process, if we are to function as Baptists, we must realize that ours is a spiritual family relationship, founded in Christ and built upon a spirit of trust and cooperation. Partisans neither trust each other nor desire to cooperate. Our mandate comes from the Bible, to love each other as brothers and sisters, to reach a lost world for Christ's sake, and to minister in a world broken by sin. We must not listen to those who call for divisiveness, disruption and chaos.

Thirdly, we must learn to disagree without becoming judgmental or seeking to destroy ourselves. Satan is our real enemy, not our brother who doesn't agree with me on every point.

We must determine to reach every lost person in Jackson County with the message of Christ. We must tell it in such a way that they can understand and we must ? for God to bring conviction. We must grow strong churches who shape the lives of their people for God and for good. May God help us to be His servants in the place where we live.

Annuity Report 1985

The Annuity Board sends a retirement benefit check to over 13,000 Southern Baptist annuitants each month. This means that this number of Southern Baptist homes help each month in meeting their obligations. Unfortunately, most of these retired servants receives less than adequate retirement incomes. Many served churches which did not provide sufficient funds needed to build a sound retirement benefit. Along with the fact, inflation continues to eat away their retirement income.

The Annuity Board is the Southern Baptist Agency that administers the retirement and insurance programs for the Southern Baptist Convention and helps meet the daily living needs for so many of these servants who have given their lives to the cause of Christ in a Southern Baptist Church. For a moment, try to imagine yourself living on less than \$200.00 per month. This is hard to conceive in today's economy. The hard fact is that approximately 80% of the retired ministers or their widows in the Southern Baptist Convention try to live on this amount. But that's not all. Approximately 50% of them get less than \$100.00 per month. The Southern Baptist Convention average for all annuitants is \$142.00 per month.

Let's bring this message a little closer home. In North Carolina, there are some 1,321 annuitants. Out of this number, 681 receive \$100.00 or less per month. Around 415 of this number receive from \$101.00 to \$200.00. This leaves 225 annuitants receiving over \$200.00 per month!

The Annuity Board and the Baptist State Convention work hand in hand in trying to improve this situation. One bit of exciting news is the new retirement program, along with improvements, which will take effect on January 1, 1988. Whereas the Baptist State Convention contributes \$200.00 per year to your pastor's retirement program, beginning in January 1988, the convention will contribute up to \$420.00 per year. This will mean that \$210.00 will be going into actually building a retirement income for our ministerial career church staff personnel. This will represent a vast improvement.

It is obvious that one of the great needs is planning for those retirement years. In a recent survey done by Gurman and Johnson of Transitions Planning, Inc., it was found that 85% of employees at all levels, upon reaching retirement, had done no serious planning for themselves. In another recent survey closer to home, it was revealed that the average Baptist pastor spent more time each year in planning a two-week vacation than in planning for approximately one-fourth of his life which he will spend in retirement years!

Baptist Children's Homes

The mission of the Baptist Children's Homes is to care for dependent, neglected and homeless children; emotionally disturbed children, unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives. The broad purpose of the institution embraces services directed toward the preservation, conservation and rehabilitation of families to avoid, whenever possible, the placement of the child away from home.

During this, our 100th year of quality child care, the Trustees, staff and President Michael C. Blackwell, pledge anew our commitment to continue fulfilling the mission and broad purpose of this Christian institution of caring as we enter our second 100 years of caring. In our centennial year we served 1,517 children and 1,167 families.

With the Governor's proclamation of May 19, 1985 as "Baptist Children's Homes Day," the centennial celebration was well on its way. Phil Young of Henderson, was commissioned to write "Praise Book," a musical about children and families. The musical was performed by adult and children's choirs in 11 Baptist churches across the state. Dr. Alan Keith-Lucas, in his book, *A Hundred Years of Caring*, updated the history of the Homes. Baptists from across the state submitted their favorite recipes for a cookbook to be released this fall. In cooperation with the Convention's Communication Department and financed by the Broyhill Foundation, a new video, "100 Years of Caring," was released in February. During May, June and July a 1,400 mile relay marathon, the longest in the history of North Carolina, allowed hundreds of people to participate and celebrate the spirit of caring for children.

One of the final events of the centennial will take place on November 12, 1985 at the Baptist State Convention in Charlotte. The combined voices of our children in care, coupled with other special features, will be an exciting entrance into our second 100 years of quality child care. We hope you will join us at the Charlotte Coliseum for an evening of celebration, praise and thanksgiving.

An update from the Western Family Services Area reveals the following highlights.

The emergency care shelters at Forest City and on the Broyhill Home Campus, as well as the maternity home in Asheville are operating at capacity level.

During the first year into our second century of quality child care, the Moody Farm Ministries, in Macon County, will open its doors to badly damaged and severely troubled children.

We are grateful for the many friends who have given liberally to enable us to begin the Moody Ministries. Our first building will be debt free.

We challenge the Baptists of Western North Carolina to continue the task of developing resources to maintain this "second level of child care" ministry.

1985 Baptist Hospital Report to the Associations

Baptist Hospital is committed to making available to its patients the most advanced medical technology in an atmosphere of Christian caring.

New technology brought into service during the past year includes a magnetic resonance scanner which uses a strong magnetic field, radio waves, and computer techniques to obtain images of the body's organs and tissues without using ionizing radiation. During the past year,

the hospital also introduced a procedure to remove kidney stones by passing a large needle into the kidney and then breaking up the stones with ultrasound or snaring them with a tiny basket. Medical Center cardiologists have helped to develop a dual-chamber pacemaker which helps to regulate the pace of an ailing heart so that its function is more similar to that of a healthier heart. Also, cardiologists are now using streptokinase to effectively dissolve clots in the coronary arteries. In another development, many cancer patients are now benefiting from a new device which makes intravenous injections of drugs unnecessary. Our Medical Center surgeons helped develop this device called a Port-A-Cath. One other seemingly small development this year, but with important consequences, is the discovery by pediatricians that partial bathing of babies in the intensive care nursery rather than total bathing allows the body temperature to remain constant instead of dropping.

These new discoveries help assure Baptist Hospital patients of a high quality of professional care. Equally important, however, is the emotional and spiritual environment in which this care is provided. Through department staff meetings, through staff education programs, through an ongoing program of new employee orientation, the hospital seeks to preserve an atmosphere of Christian caring and concern. The specific functions of the Pastoral Care Department and the Patient Relations Department contribute to the hospital's effort to minister "with skill and understanding."

During the past year, our hospital admitted 25,140 patients for a total of 213,038 days of care. Ambulatory patient visits including the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics totalled 243,096. The hospital has 701 licensed beds, employs 3,537 persons and has an operating budget of \$124,187,316.00. The Department of Pastoral Care made 57,849 visits with patients, family members, and employees and provided 21,194 hours of counseling through the Winston-Salem center and the various satellites.

Last year, North Carolina Baptists gave their hospital \$541,255.16 in financial support through the Cooperative Program and \$367,712.33 through the North Carolina Missions Offering. The hospital staff and the patients are deeply grateful for this continuing support.

The hospital is currently involved in another expansion program which will include new parking areas, a new inpatient tower, a clinical services building, and additions to the power plant as well as renovation and alterations of existing space. The total cost of this project is estimated at \$86,344.00.

The Biblical Recorder

This past year has been one of the very best for the people who comprise the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and because the *Biblical Recorder* is a member of that family of God, it has enjoyed a good year also, perhaps the best in its history.

Readership appears to be very high. Comments, letters and other communications with the paper indicate Baptists read the paper and depend upon it for correct and vital information about the work we do together. That was the purpose of the paper when it was founded in 1833 and it remains unchanged today.

Tar Heel Baptists face a great challenge and responsibility as we struggle to meet the opportunities before us in our growing and developing state. Fewer persons are members of churches in our state now than are not members...of any kind of church. Our evangelism burden to win the lost and our ministry obligations to all people, are at the maximum now in all our history.

The *Recorder* gladly and gratefully assumes its role in this Great Commission. More than ever before, the paper will seek to inform, indoctrinate, enlist, inspire and provide a forum for Baptist thought and action as we work together to achieve God's purpose for us.

Subscription rates will *not* be raised for the *fourth* consecutive year in 1986, despite a substantial increase in the cost of second-class postage anticipated in October, 1985. Maximum stewardship of the paper's resources has been utilized to provide the paper at minimum cost so that more families can have the paper in their home. The rates for 1986 are the same as 1985: Individual, \$7.00; Club (four or more), \$6.00; Every Family Plan, \$5.00. Our rates are equal to or less than all other major state Baptist papers such as *The Biblical Recorder*.

All is not well in the larger family of Baptists as our national convention continues to struggle for its direction and identity. Every Baptist needs to be well informed with accurate facts and assessments so that he or she can come to the right position under God as a disciple of Jesus Christ. We must not let the conflict in the SBC deter us from the work and ministry we have here in our own state.

Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc.

For over 34 years, North Carolina Baptists have been ministering with older adults through the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina. The Homes' ministry is one that works - providing security and hope in the midst of sincere concern and love - bringing about the possibility for abundant life - one with a plus. This is all happening in the name of North Carolina Baptists through "Baptist" Retirement Homes.

The Retirement Homes' policy makers, your Trustees, and the Homes' Administrative Staff have put untold amounts of time and energy into addressing the changing scene of retirement

living. This serious effort has enhanced the viability and efficiency of the Homes' ministry. Serious questions still face the Retirement Homes.

What forms must the Homes' ministry take to meet the increasing needs created by the growing numbers of older adults? These and many more issues are under serious study and consideration by your Trustees and Administrative Staff. The Homes have a rich heritage of ministry. Building on the strengths of this heritage, the Homes with the growing support of North Carolina Baptist will effectively meet the needs of many more older persons.

The following facts and information will give an overview of the Retirement Homes' ministry from August 1984-June 1985:

The Retirement Homes had an average daily occupancy of 244 residents in the five group Homes, Nursing Care Unit and apartments.

Over 30 new residents were admitted to the Homes and Nursing Care.

Group Home fees for care were not raised. Cost containment and budget controls made this possible.

Over \$100,000.00 of benevolent care was provided monthly to Home residents.

Sixty cents of each benevolent care dollar was provided through Cooperative Program and North Carolina Missions Offering gifts.

"Heart to Heart" Christmas gifts from friends of the Retirement Homes provided each resident with a \$20.00 gift.

The Homes' Nursing Care Unit, Winston-Salem, can now care for 85 persons. Conversion of eleven Hayes Home rooms made this increase possible.

The Nursing Care Unit is operating at 95% plus occupancy.

Apartment policies have been revised. Plans are being formulated to build another duplex unit on the Hayes Home Campus.

A 20-minute video tape, "Not An Ordinary Person," has been produced to be used in communicating the Retirement Homes' ministry.

The Retirement Homes do have vacancies. Please request admissions information from Mr. Jackson S. Hoyle, Administrative Offices, Winston-Salem, NC.

After more than 24 years of service to North Carolina Baptists and the Retirement Homes, Homes' President, Bill Poole, retired.

The first meeting of the Retirement Homes' "Heritage Club" was held last year, through bequests, trusts, etc., over \$400,000.00 was given to support the Retirement Homes' ministry.

The fiscal year ending September 30, closed in the black, largely due to special gifts.

The Baptist Retirement Homes' mission is to continue providing the most important dimension to meeting the needs of older adults - Christian compassion. Thanks to your mission support, care of which we know you would be proud is provided.

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.

Whether we look at our objectives in life as individual Christians or collectively, as a church, an association or convention, we should be interested, above all other life's objectives, in presenting the message of Christ to those who need to know and accept Him as Lord and Savior. One of the exciting aspects of being a Christian is to feel the joy that come in serving Him now as well as having influence on others in the future.

Some of the future influence we have as Christians is reflected in our daily commitment of service now. This can be accomplished first through our personal witness to those who will live beyond our lifespan and, secondly, through use of our resources. An increasing number of North Carolina Baptists are experiencing the excitement that comes with knowing that a portion of their resources will be set aside in trusts to further the spread of the Gospel, in perpetuity. The Baptist Foundation provides the services that make this possible.

During the past fiscal year (1984), 81 new trusts were established with the North Carolina Baptist Foundation to serve as trustee. These gifts totalled \$265,029.34. Additions and contributions to new and existing trusts totalled \$741,153.00 for the year. When maturity value of bonds in the invested portfolio are considered along with market value for real estate held in

trust, the assets of the Foundation at the end of 1984 totalled \$10,930,279.00. Real estate holdings have an estimated value of \$4,478 million dollars. Income distributed to Baptist institutions and agencies, and to individuals receiving annuity payments totalled \$471,563.00 during 1984.

Investing of Foundation assets is carried out under the direction of the Board of Directors elected by the State Convention. Day to day management is given to the investments by two fiscal agents selected by the Board. Throughout the 65 year history of the Baptist Foundation, its Directors have taken seriously their fiduciary responsibilities as related to the trusts held as well as to the Convention.

Support of new church growth through trusts will receive increasing attention by the Convention in the immediate future. A variety of methods are available to North Carolina Baptists through their Baptist Foundation. Hospital Chaplaincy

C. J. Harris Community Hospital

The Chaplaincy Ministry in the C. J. Harris Community Hospital is made possible by the voluntary cooperative effort upon the part of the minority of the Christian denominations in Jackson County. A standing committee, elected by the Jackson County Ministers' Association, supervises the Chaplaincy Program. Members are elected on a rotating basis. The present committee is as follows: One year: Dan Ward, Phil Bennett. Two years: Jack Hinson, Jack McNearney, Murray Jackson. Three years: Bob Moore, Dorothy Parris, Charles Stewart. Ex officio members: Don Morgan, Hospital resident; Frank Anderson, Chaplain; Arthur Stephens, Treasurer. The voluntary cooperation of 28 churches and 4 individuals made possible our ministry. They gave \$8,124.41 for which we are most grateful. There were 4,104 in-patients in the hospital during the year July 1, 1984-June 30, 1985. What a challenge!

We are most grateful for the Volunteer Ladies who have presented their time and talent in the library ministry. Five days each week they call upon the patients and make available the very best reading materials. Mrs. Parris and Mrs. Stovall are guiding the ministry.

In 1979, The Chaplaincy Foundation was established to secure the ongoing ministry of the chaplaincy. The monies so contributed by individuals, business firms, corporations, or memorials are to remain in the foundation and the interest and/or dividends earned on the monies so contributed are to be used for the current Chaplaincy Program. To date \$72,448.65 has been given in monies and stocks.

Closed circuit television, since July 18, 1981, carries devotional services to all our patients every Sunday at 9:00 a.m. The Chaplain, in presence by audio tape, brings the message, preceded and closed with sacred music.

The Chaplain now, in closing, expresses deep gratitude to the housekeeping department in placing the *Guide Post* in the bed-side tables. This has been done faithfully twice a month for two years now.

We thank also Jerry Thompson and others from the maintenance department for the mechanics of the closed circuit television worship on Sunday morning.

Youth and Campus Ministries

One of the most exciting and challenging ministries of North Carolina Baptist churches through our Convention is that done by the Division of Youth and Campus Ministries. Our task on behalf of junior and senior high school students is to provide leadership training for adult and youth leaders to coordinate the Convention's several programs which include youth, and to project the Convention's Youth weeks at the Assembly. Rick Traylor does an exceptional job in that area.

You have assigned to us your primary ministry with students. We have BSU or some organized group work on 43 campuses. More than thirty volunteers work alongside some twenty full-time campus ministers and four other staff persons in your ministry to students. We as campus ministers are committed to serving consistently as resource persons for church workers with college students in all North Carolina Baptist congregations. We guide in local emphases which include evangelism, missions experience and education, Bible study, worship, integration of faith and education and decision making as part of Christian discipleships. Over \$40,000.00 has been contributed by North Carolina BSUs this year toward a state-level missions program which witnesses around the world. Additional money and time are invested as students find ways to serve in local communities, usually alongside their older Christian brothers and sisters.

Our BSUs from Cullowhee to Greenville and Murfreesboro have teams of students who are prepared to preach, teach, sing and share with those in Baptist churches nearby. Puppet and clown teams, in addition, present the Gospel in unique but effective ways to children, senior citizens and everyone in between!

In seven locations - Cullowhee, Boone, Greensboro, Chapel Hill, Raleigh, Greenville and Pembroke - the Convention owns student centers, facilities especially dedicated to ministry with persons in the academic communities.

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982; August 17, 1984; August 16, 1985. The 1985 changes are indicated by an *.)

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its missions strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure and should notify the association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as its applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

*SECTION 1. The association shall hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian, Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Missions Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairman, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for Aging), (5) *Biblical Recorder*, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected by the association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session with the exception of the treasurer and clerk who will serve from October 1 through September 30 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. The director of associational missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 10 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two week prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing "The Book of Reports."

*SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee of the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report of the annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matter involving parliamentary procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that their office is filled at each associational annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the director of missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

*SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the association, and are not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI - ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

*SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be on a rotating basis with one named each year and serving for a three year term. Committee members are eligible to serve again after rotating off for a period of one year. A person may rotate off of one committee and still be eligible to immediately serve on another committee. To implement this the Committee on Committees shall assign the term of service for each committee nominee beginning in the associational year 1986-87.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

*SECTION 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the July Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

*SECTION 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the association annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. The MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex officio members along with the Director of Missions and the Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

SECTION 14. The BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the Chairman of Deacons, the Chairman of Evangelism Committee, the chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Director of Missions is to serve as chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastor' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacon's meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excuded normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Years' Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving Thursday and Friday; Christmas, December 25 and 26.
4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

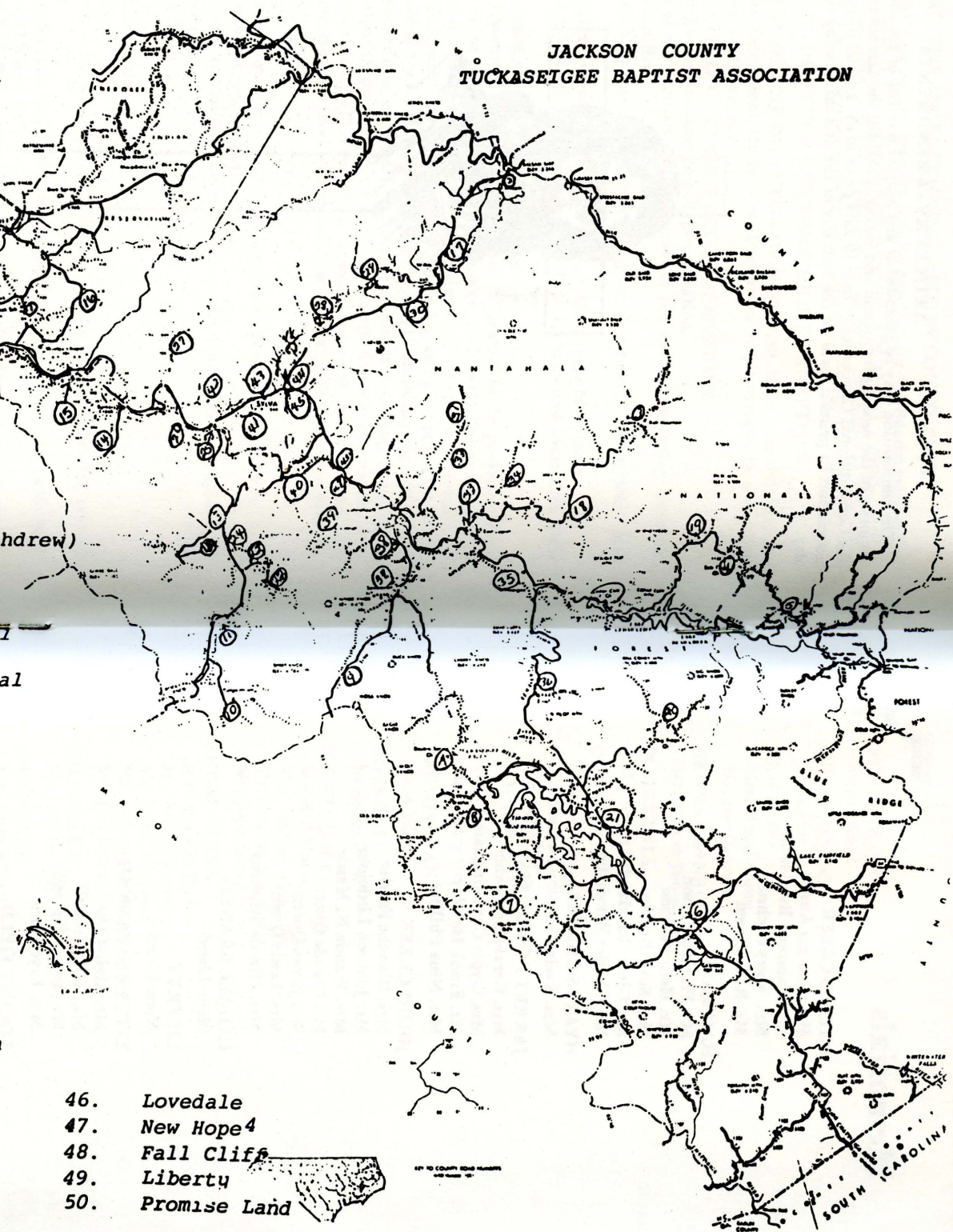

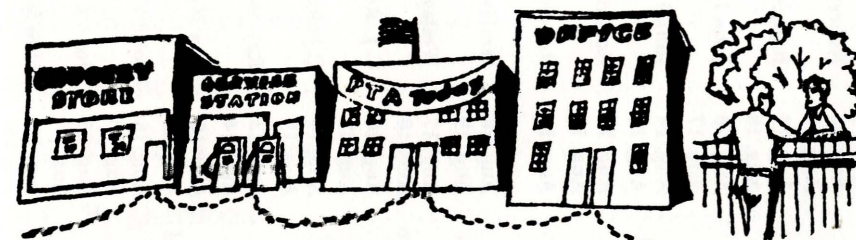
