PINEY GROVE CHURCH, SAMPSON Co., N. C., October 7, 1879.

The Eastern Association convened according to appointment in the Piney Grove Baptist Church.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder F. W. Eason, of Newbern, N. C., from 2nd chapter of Songs of Solomon, 3rd, 4th and 5th verses.

After an intermission of three-quarters of an hour, the Moderator called the Association together.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Elder J. K. Faulkner.

# Wednesday Morning, October 8, 1879.

Moderator called the Association to order. Devotional exercises conducted by Elder C. C. Newton. Prayer by Dr. Pritchard. Roll called. Proceedings of yesterday read and approved.

The time for special order having arrived, Dr. Pritchard read the report on education. After which, he addressed

the body upon that subject.

Visiting brethren invited to seats. Brother Kadar Vann and Elder H. S. Spivey announced themselves as corresponding messengers from the South River Association; also Prof. F. P. Hobgood, Principal of Raleigh Baptist Female Seminary, and Elder C. T. Bailey, editor of the Biblical Recorder.

Prof. Hobgood made remarks upon the pending motion, which was to adopt the report on education.

Report adopted.

### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The interests of education are of paramount importance to the welfare of both Church and State.

As a denomination we cannot allow other denominations to educate our children, and it should be a matter of sincere congratulation that we have so many excellent schools for the training of both sexes. At Murfreesboro, in the East, Raleigh and Thomasville in the centre, and Hendersonville in the West, we have prosperous institutions for girls, and your own school at Warsaw for boys and girls.

Your Committee are pleased to report that our college at Wake Forest is in a prosperous condition. There are in actual attendance there this session one hundred and thirty students, and it is confidently believed that

the college will report one hundred and fifty by next June.

Among these are twenty-five students for the ministry, of whom fifteen are beneficiaries, supported by the Board of Education. This Board allows each beneficiary the sum of \$96.00, which is sufficient only to pay his board and washing for a year. No student for the ministry of any denomination is charged tuition at this institution.

The object of the Board is not to make it an easy matter for the young minister to obtain an education, but by extending a certain measure of aid

to make it a possible thing.

There are probably now not less than seventy-five young men among the Baptists of this State, who, in the opinion of the brethren, are called of God to preach the gospel. Nearly all of these men are unable to educate themselves by reason of poverty. Preach they will, and preach they should, but they would be far more efficient and useful if they were prepared for their life-work by a liberal education. Some associations, and even some single churches, are paying the expenses of a young minister at college, and the Beulah Association has three beneficaries sustained by its liberality.

Your Committee would, in conclusion, respectfully suggest an increase of interest on the part of this Association in behalf of the cause of educa-

tion generally, and ministerial education particularly.

### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has about forty-five missionaries, native missionaries and assistants in Africa, China and Italy. These are efficient, self-sacrificing, noble men and women. The favor of the Almighty has been upon their work in a remarkable degree. God is blessing the toils and sacrifices of these laborers. The fields are white for the harvest. The Foreign Mission Board is our agent. Let us sustain it with our co-operative sympathy, our prayers and our means.

In this matter the Master expects each to do his duty. Let our pastors and Sunday School Superintendents bring and keep this great interest before the minds of those committed to their watchcare, by information as to facts, and exhortations as to duty.

A valuable auxiliary will be found in the Foreign Mission Journal, the monthly paper published at a low price by the Board in Richmond. It will be sent gratuitously to all ministers who will forward their names and

### REPORT ON STATE AND HOME MISSIONS.

Your Committee report that the State Mission Board has had in its employment eighteen missionaries during the year ending 5th November, 1879. Of these, none have labored within our bounds. Its Committee is located at Raleigh, with Bro. W. H. Pace, President, and J. E. Ray, Secretary. Your Committee regret the absence of statistics, which should make an interesting item of this report.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention does its work principally through its agent, Bro. E. Dodson. He has received heretofore from \$800 to \$1,000 within the bounds of this State.

We need only to urge the brethren to acquaint themselves more fully with the separate work their Boards are doing within the State.

### REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL.

We are gratified to report that this Institution is now in a more prosperous condition than at any other time during the last twenty years, under the management of its present efficient and worthy Principal, Rev. J. N. Stallings.

The apparently insurmountable obstacles which have for years impeded its progress, have at last been removed, and a bright and hopeful future is now before it.

The entire school property has been leased to the Principal for ten years, from January 1st, 1879, to January 1st, 1889, at a yearly rental of seventy-five dollars, to be applied to the repair and improvement of the property.

The lessee has already paid four years' rent in necessary repairs. There are now sixty eight pupils attending the school, nineteen of whom board in the Institution. The Principal has four assistants in his corps of instructors: Fleet Rose Cooper, a graduate of Wake Forest College; Miss Lucy B. Kennedy, a graduate of the Raleigh Female Seminary; Miss Minnie E. Stallings, a partial graduate of the same school and Miss Kate E, Stallings—all members of the Baptist denomination, and thoroughly qualified in every respect as instructors of the young, and worthy of the confidence and patronage of the Baptists of the Eastern Association, and of our entire State.

Enlarged accommodations for boarding pupils and providing school rooms are now being made, with board and tuition so reasonable as to be within the reach of all who desire to avail themselves of the peculiar advantages which their school affords.

Dear Brethren, this is our school, the property of the Eastern Association; give it that encouragement, that cordial support, to which it is so justly entitled.

# REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Executive Committee beg leave to report:

We have received for the work intrusted to us for the past year \$347.00, and have expended \$200.50. We have had the services of Rev. J. R. Oliver for his whole time in the destitution of Onslow county. He has assisted in constituting one new church—Meadow Bridge. He speaks encouragingly of his field, though no increase in membership during the year. The opposition spoken of last year, he says, is not so manifest at

Bro. Best attended Trenton and Piney Grove for three months, but discontinued his appointments on account of his inability to attend them longer. We have also rendered some assistance to Union, Lenoir county, ad Fort Barnwell, Craven county, two very important places. Bro. J. L Britt speaks very encouragingly of the prospects at these points.

We have given you a brief statement of our work during the past year. Probably much more could have been accomplished if we could have had means sufficient to have sent another efficient man into the field, but we were without the means and had to curtail our work. Brethren, the situation is before you concerning the vast destitution. Can you do more to help the Board to extend their operations, which will more fully appear from the number of letters referred to the Executive Committee. Respectfully submitted,

We, the members of this Association, believe intemperance to be a prolific source of disease, poverty, vice and crime; that moderate drinking is the primary cause of drunkenness; that it is good neither to drink wine nor anything whereby many stumble and are made weak; that we who are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves; therefore we commend abstaining from the use of alcoholic liquors of every kind as beverages, and would welcome any adequate means for the suppression of the liquor traffic for drinking purposes.

Your Committee on Ministerial Support beg to submit the following: There is no truth in God's word more plainly taught than that they who preach the gospel should live of the gospel. And believing that the relation between pastor and church should be mutually candid and honest, and that obligations entered into by them should be faithfully performed, we therefore recommend the following:

1st. That a stipulated salary to a pastor should be agreed upon before he enters upon the duty of the pastorate.

2nd. Salaries of pastors should be paid monthly as far as practicable. and certainly paid in full at the end of his pastoral year; and no member of the church should excuse him or herself from aiding in paying it according to his or her ability, each feeling that a sacred obligation rested

upon them to pay an honest debt.

3rd. A duty alike to the church and its members demands that inquiry be made into the cause of continued and persistent neglect upon the part of members to aid in bearing the burdens of the church, and unless a cause exists that shall prove to be satisfactory to the church, that fellowship should be withdrawn from such member or members for the sin of covetousness.

Report of the committee in relation to the orthodoxy of J. P. King, of the Second Baptist church, of Wilmington, was taken from the table.

### REPORT.

Whereas, well defined rumors being in circulation, alleging that Bro. J. P. King, of the Second Baptist church of Wilmington, held heterodox views of Christian doctrine, and was preaching such views; and, whereas, the said church having sent a communication to the last session of this Association, complaining that a Presbytery, appointed by the preceding Session, had not performed the duty of examining Bro. King with a view to his ordination; and, whereas, the undersigned were appointed at last session a committee to visit said church and examine into the orthodoxy of Bro. King; and, whereas, Bro. King had obtained ordination from ministers of the Brown Creek Association before the chairman of your Committee called the committee together; and, whereas, your Committee has had a conference with Bro. King at this session of the Association, we beg leave to report that Bro. King holds inconsistent and heterodox views relative to God—holding that "He is a Spirit having form and image, occupying a certain position in Heaven, as a person with form and image;" that with reference to "the end of existence of the Devil, Hell and the wicked" he is undecided, as also with regard to the question "of the separate existence of the soul from the body;" and says that he would like to study the question whether "an unconverted man has an immortal part about him.

To the question, "Do you believe there will be no more of a wicked man when he dies?" he answers, "No, I believe he will go to hell and be punished; but how long hell and the punishment will last I am not prepared to say." We find his views crude contradictory and erroneous about these matters. Upon other doctrines upon which we examined him we find his views correct Upon this examination, if acting as a Presbytery, we could not have consented to Bro. King's ordination. He states that he was not examined upon the above points by the Presbytery which ordained him, and that he did not divulge his sentiments. Bro. King expresses himself as anxious to arrive at a correct and Scriptural conclusion upon all the points upon which he is undecided, and he asks time and instruction.

In view of the above facts we submit the following:

Resolved, That this Association is not responsible for the ordination of

Bro. J. P. King, nor for the doctrine he preaches and teaches.

Resolved, That a committee of five ministers be appointed to confer with Bro. King, and the Second Bap: ist church of Wilmington for the purpose of instructing Bro. King, and if he does not adopt orthodox views to counsel the church to dissolve the relation of pastor which she now holds with Bro. King and to disavow and discourage the heterodox doctrines he now holds, and to advise the church that if this is not done this Association will withdraw fellowship from her. Respectfully submitted,

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling, and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We, moreover, engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant, and the principles of God's word.

# Constitution of the Eastern Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1—This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3—This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

ART. 4—The delegates from each church shall bear a letter, certifying their appointment, and communicating information relative to the state of the church; *Provided, however*, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be annually chosen from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6-It shall be the duty of the moderator to enforce an observance

of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7-It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8-It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9-The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have the power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge. and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ART. 10—The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of her churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11—The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them, all the privileges of the body except that of

ART. 12-The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13-By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

# Rules of Order.

1.—On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

2.—Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3.—At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily sessions read.

4.—The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that

courtesy which becomes Christians.

5.—Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6.-No member shall speak more than twice on the same question with-

out permission.

7.—All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8.—No motion shall be withdrawn after its discussion.

9.—When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, or postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10 .- After a motion is decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11.-No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12.—All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be de-

cided by a majority of votes.

13.—The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall

be admitted to consideration.

14.—The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority of votes.

### Rules of Decorum for the Churches,

1.-We will hold at least four Conference meetings in the year for the transaction of business, also special meetings whenever requisite.

2.—The names of the members shall be called at every regular meeting, and there shall be due notice taken of the absence of those who discover a disposition to absent themselves.

3.—At every Conference, the pastor, in his right of office, shall preside as Moderator, and in case of his absence, the Conference shall appoint a Moderator pro tem, who shall open Conference by devotional exercises.

4.—The Clerk shall keep a Church book, in which all the proceedings of the Conference shall be faithfully transcribed, and at every regular meeting the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read immediately after

5.—An invitation will be given to brethren of our faith and order to sit with us in Conference, who shall enjoy all the privileges of the meeting except that of voting.

6.-Every subject for the consideration of the Conference shall be introduced by a motion, which, when seconded, shall be debated and acted upon, unless withdrawn by the mover.

7.—Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother, and shall confine his remarks to the subject under debate and shall not be allowed to speak more than twice on one subject unless by permission of the Church.

8.—No member shall withdraw from the Conference without the per-

mission of the Moderator.

9.—It shall be required that in matters of difference between members. before complaint is made to the Church, the aggrieved party shall have attended to the instructions of the Lord, Matt. 18th chapter, 16th, 17th and 18th verses, and public offences or such as operate against the peace of the Church, shall be the subject of discipline.

10.—All questions submitted to the Conference shall be decided by a majority of votes, except receiving members to fellowship; and any question may be reconsidered upon the motion of any one who may vote in the

affirmative.

11.—The Moderator shall propound all questions for vote—shall keep the speakers to the subject under debate-may express his own views, after others are done speaking, and see that these rules are faithfully ob-

12.—These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the whole Church.

Resolved, That this Association recommend the adoption of the foregoing rules to all the Churches that comprise this body.
